# **MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT**

The 2015-2016 year was full of momentum for SAMU as we continued working towards achieving our goals. The SAMU Building project was our main focus, and we had a historic year as the students voted in favour for the new building plan. The successful referendum created leverage for the project and resulted in the approval of the building location, the hiring of Stantec as the project architect, and the approval of the building design by the MacEwan Board of Governors.

Student engagement continues to be a priority for the Association. Students' Council especially focused on building student relationships and continued with the monthly Councillor Days initiative, along with hosting two Food for Thought town halls (one in October and one in February). Nearly 300 students attended and participated in discussions surrounding the new SAMU Building, mental health, and our programs and services. Both Council and the Executive Committee are already incorporating this feedback into plans for the 2016-2017 year.

SAMU's Programs and Services are supporting our students more than ever, providing them with opportunities for growth and the skills to succeed after graduation. With over 4,000 volunteer hours logged and over 100 clubs operating, students are making an impact both on and off campus. We continue to support students through our Food Bank, with over 250 hampers distributed, and through the Breakfast Club, which served over 8,000 students free breakfast this year.

Let's not forget about our events; this year was a record-breaking year for both Fall Fest and the SAMU Speaker Series. Over 5,000 students attended our annual fall kick-off and over 800 students welcomed Jenna Marbles and Laci Green to MacEwan. Finally, the much-anticipated Fall Reading Break was approved and will be implemented in November of 2016.

This year, SAMU introduced the Vice President External to the team. With an additional leader, we were able to have a more predominant presence in advocacy in all three levels of government. Both provincial and federal governments faced elections this year; our advocacy efforts had a significant impact on voter turnout and the student vote created historical shifts in the political climate. In addition, our advocacy work with the Council of Alberta University Students (CAUS) brought a two-year tuition freeze for all students, helped reinstate the Student Temporary Employment Program (STEP) and extended mental health funding for universities. Federally, we were successful in advocating with the Canadian Alliance of Students Associations (CASA), receiving a 50% increase in financial aid funding for low to middle income and part-time students, and additional assistance in debt repayment programs.

Here at SAMU, we are continually working to improve the student experience by supporting you in your academics, advocating your needs to government and providing you with programs and services, ensuring your time at MacEwan is successful both in and out of the classroom. We are excited about the momentum building within the Association, and look forward to continuing to serve you in the 2016-2017 year.

# **ADVOCACY**

- Over 4,000 students pledged to vote in the 2015 Federal Election with the Get Out The Vote campaign
- Government of Canada agreed to increase the Canada Student Grant program by 50% in 2016, which will increase funding to MacEwan students by approximately \$2 million
- Tuition was frozen for 2015 and 2016, saving MacEwan students \$3.5 million and ensuring MacEwan continues to have the lowest tuition in Alberta
- The SAMU Executive Committee, along with their counterparts from other Alberta universities, met with over 40 MLAs to discuss ways to make university education more affordable and better for students
