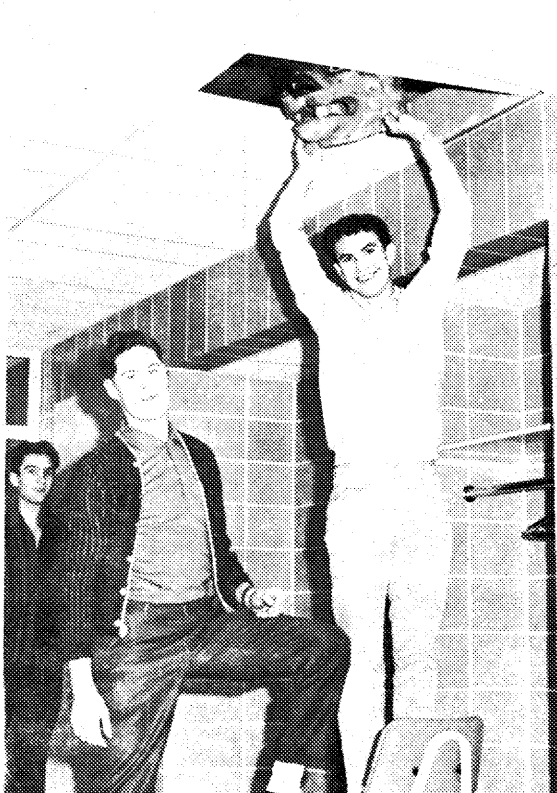
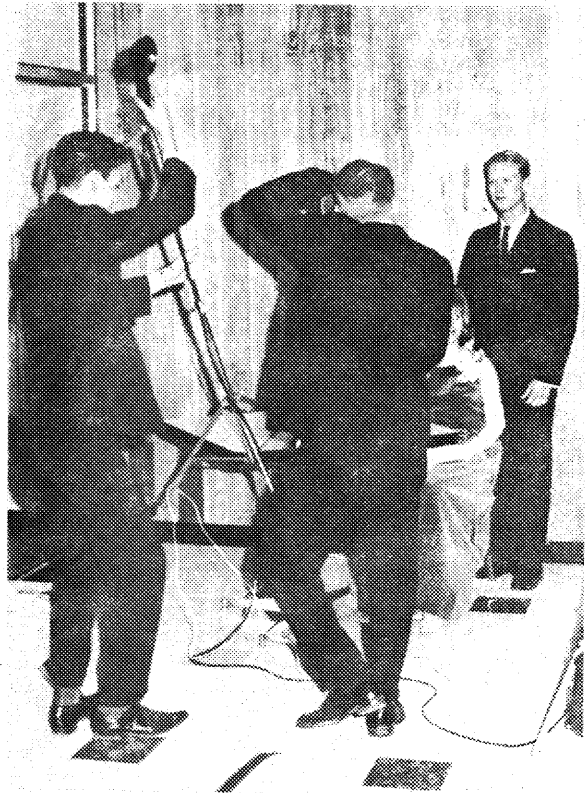
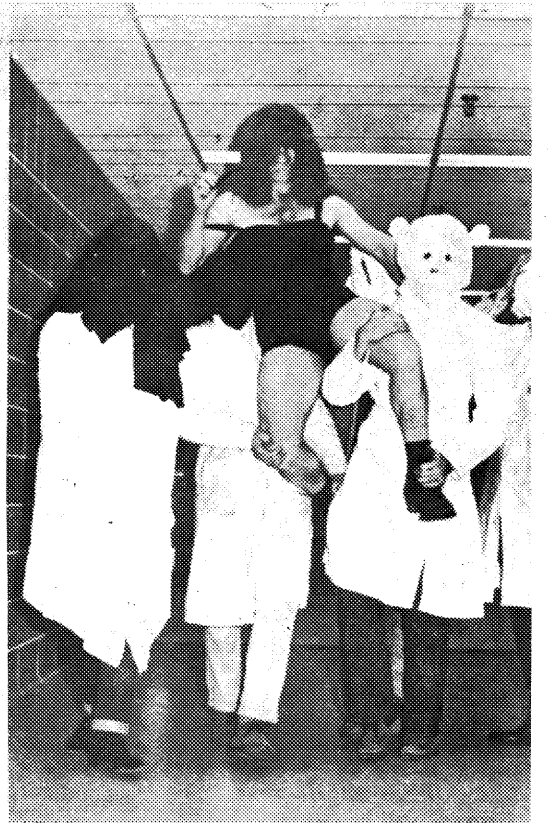
Shown above is Grezalda Zlokstien, the Nugget's candidate for Miss NAIT '64.

could make it to the peace and serenity of a classroom seemed to be strictly incidental to all those concerned with the concert.

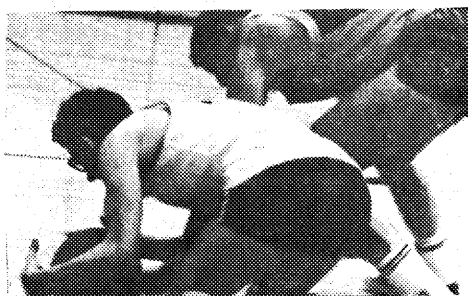

Christmas 1964

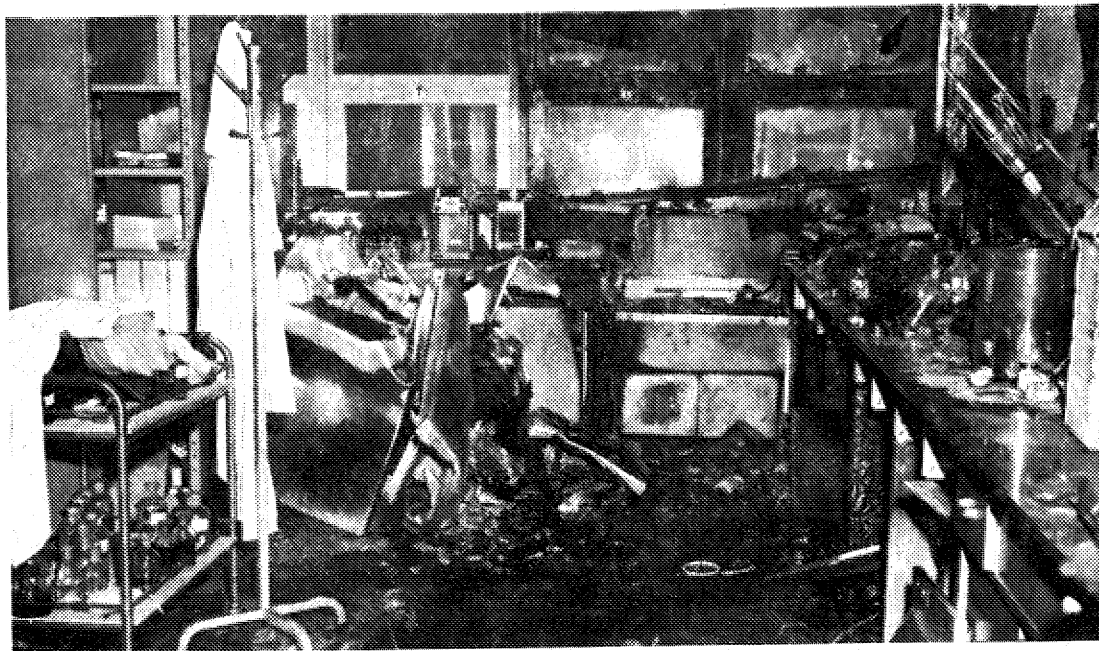
On behalf of the institute, I extend to you, one and all, our best wishes for a very happy and memorable Christmas together with a New Year filled with peace and prosperity.
