

NAIT represented at U of A conference

On Sunday, October 18th, 1964, a joint council meeting of all Universities, Technical Institutes and Junior Colleges in the Province of Alberta was held at Lister Hall on the Edmonton Campus of the University of Alberta. In attendance from NAIT was Bill Miles, President of NAITSA.

The opening address was given by Dr. Walter Johns, President of the Edmonton Campus. He set the mood for the following discussion by cautioning the councillors about too much organization. He pointed out that the main cause of the Fall of the Roman Empire was an over-organized state or bureaucracy.

The next topic on the agenda was discussion of the formation of an Alberta Union of Students. In point form the proposed Union would:

1. Embrace all Universities, Technical Institutes and Junior Colleges in Alberta.
2. Set up channels for the exchange of information.
3. Would lobby in the Provincial legislature for matters concerning Alberta students.

It was felt that at this time there were not enough common interests between the member groups to warrant setting up a rigid group.

Mr. David Estrin, CUS chairman for the

Edmonton Campus, addressed the group on the benefits of membership in the Canadian Union of Students. He pointed out that CUS is at present conducting a "means survey" to determine the costs of higher education. The survey is to be presented to the Bladen Commission on financing of higher education. He went on to describe the CUS "Student Government Research Centre" in Ottawa. When asked to define definite monetary advantages of membership in CUS, Mr. Estrin pointed to the Federal Education Loans and also the law allowing students engaged in higher education to deduct tuition fees from income tax. Both measures were a direct result of CUS applying pressure on the Federal Government.

A motion was made setting up a survey to investigate the principle that all institutes of higher learning in the Province give mutual recognition of courses taken at other institutes. In our case at NAIT, this would mean that an investigation is being carried on by the survey to see if it will be possible for NAIT students wishing to continue their education at the University of Alberta, to receive credit for some of the courses which they have taken at NAIT. The motion was carried unanimously.

It was also moved that the Technical Institutes and Junior Colleges be invited to all future meetings of the joint University councils and be given full voting rights at all meetings of the council. This motion was also carried unanimously!

A motion was made that SAIT look in to the possibility of setting up a Curling Play-off for Provincial supremacy between the Universities, Technical Institutes and Junior Colleges. The motion was passed unanimously.

COMMENT

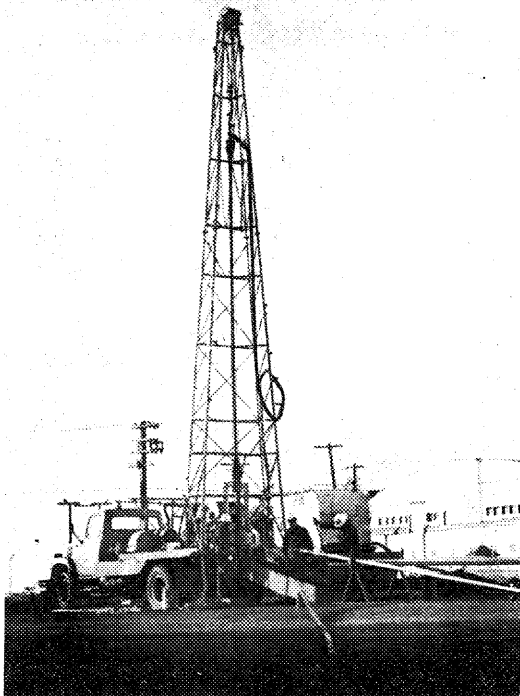

Something New To NAIT Campus

During the past week something new was added to the Northern Alberta Institute of Technology Campus. Pictured above is an oil drilling rig which for the past week has been drilling an oil well under the supervision of Mr. Lipsett, head of the Explorations Technology division.

The well, which in fact is a bore-hole with a depth of 500 feet, is in the area that is shortly to be excavated as the basement of the new seven storey tower building. With the well complete, the basement will be excavated around the well, and the bore-hole capped at basement floor level. Mr. Lipsett said that the well will be primarily used by Explorations and Gas Technology students to gain training and ex-

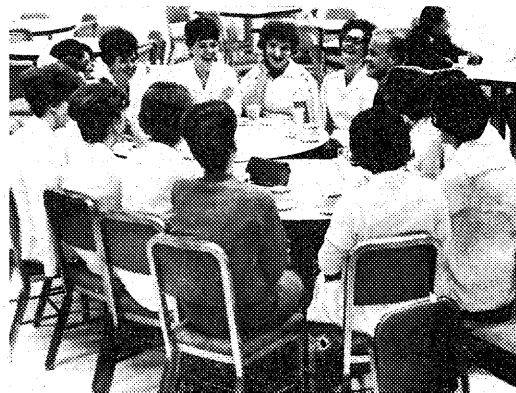


perience in logging methods, drilling and completion techniques, and the use of pressure control equipment.

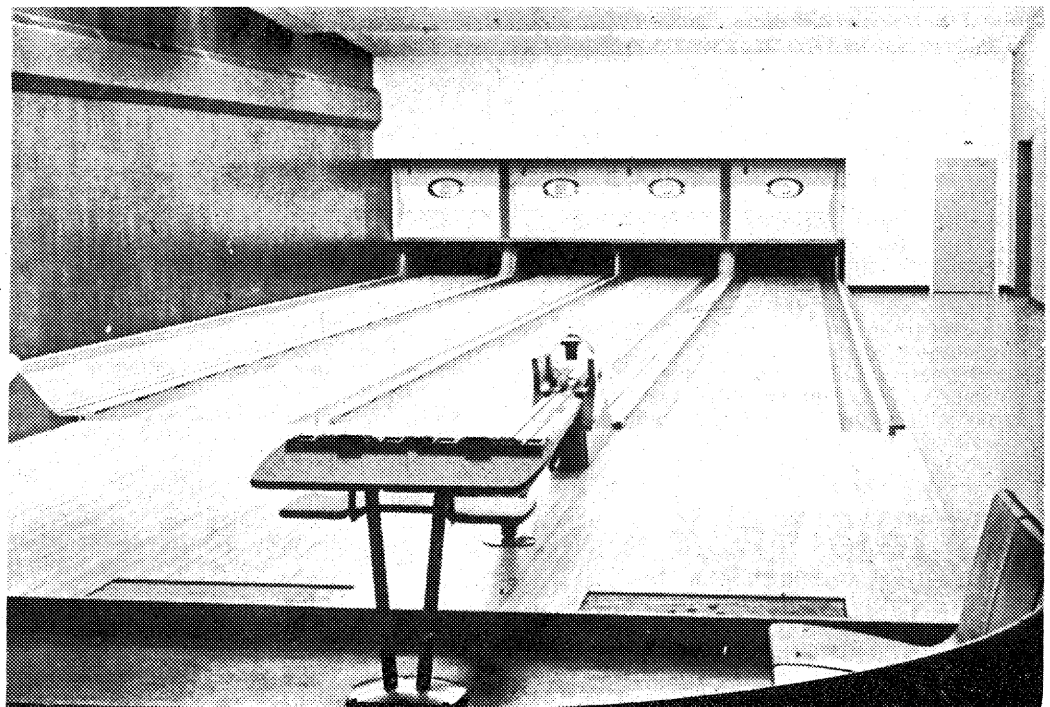
Well logging refers to those procedures which measure various electrical, sonic and radio active characteristics of the rock strata which are penetrated by the drilling bit. Electronic devices are lowered into the hole and the measurements are continuously taken as the device is raised and lowered in the hole. These measurements are used to determine the thickness and type of rock formations, porosities, fluid content, etc.

Regarding the article by Tolbert Sanxis in the October 15, 1964 edition of the Nugget. Tolbert said, and I quote, "Did you know that Architectural Technology has control of the Drafting Society? Did you also know that the Architects have more club executive per capita than any other technology?" Just what did he mean? The ARCHITECTURAL DRAFTSMEN have three members in the Drafting Society of which one was the president. I say "was" the president because the ARCHITECTURAL DRAFTSMEN are no longer part of the Drafting Society. They were KICKED out at a meeting held Tuesday, October 20, 1964. So they have not got control of the Drafting Society and they never did have control except as mentioned in "Irresponsible Columnist."

In regard to the second sentence that Sanxis wrote, "club executive" is not clear. There are no ARCHITECTURAL DRAFTSMEN on the Executive Council or the Students Council. The newspaper has no ARCHITECTURAL DRAFTSMEN on their executive, nor has the year book. Sure, there may be ARCHITECTURAL DRAFTSMEN working in some capacity but certainly no executive members. Only the ARCHITECTURAL DRAFTSMEN that were members of the Drafting Society would be qualified to hold and carry out executive positions.

The reason I have stressed ARCHITECTURAL DRAFTSMEN is because this is what Architectural Technology produces. It does not give you an Architect's degree as the majority of the ARCHITECTURAL DRAFTSMEN seem to think. When you, as ARCHITECTURAL DRAFTSMEN get your diploma, you are limited to the field of Architectural Drafting. The Drafting Technology students are qualified to be Architectural Draftsmen, Topographical Draftsmen, Structural Draftsmen, Mechanical Draftsmen, and Electrical Draftsmen. So don't be so narrow-minded, thinking your course is superior. We as Drafting Technology students have far more job opportunities than you have. So ask yourself this question, "which course is superior?" and come down to earth with everyone else.
