It seems that not too many people care whether or not we have a President, or an Executive Council, as shown at the General Meeting last Friday. As we all know, only 38% of the students turned out to vote on the Ice Arena, but this was 253% MORE than the number on hand to cast their votes for the Amendments to the Constitution of NAIT. Don't you care how our School is run? Especially you, the first-year students. You're going to be here for one or two more years and these Constitutional changes will affect you as well as all newcomers.

All of the amendments, except for the money by-law, were approved by a whopping 15% of the student body. This means that the Executive is, in reality, governing 388 people here at NAIT. What happened to the rest of you? Now, I suppose that you will all bitch like hell when the Constitution is properly put into effect. If you do put up that much of a stink, the Students' Executive has volunteered to relinquish all the business of governing you to their utmost ability, and let you, the students, do what you want.

But you don't seem to want to do anything: just come to School and go home. You aren't even showing up to support the Extra-Curricular activities, let alone support the Executive. Any student refereeing Continental Handball received one dollar an hour. What happened? Because of your avid participation and eager willingness to help, Handball was delayed a week while recruits were found to act as officials. Little help has also been given in sorting out the pictures and I. D. cards. You had your picture taken (or did you?), so don't you want them? The Students' Executive seems to be doing that task also. This year's Executive came in all fired up and wondered why last year's Executive was so complacent. They now know why. Nobody will lift a finger in aid to their requests, and nobody is offering any ideas to how they can improve themselves. In fact, it is working in reverse. The help experienced so far outside the Executive has been nil. More co-operation is necessary or the Executive will do little more than administer the necessary laws. Most of the Amendments restricted the powers of the Executive, and now they will not be able to offer you as much as they would like. You have restricted them, so they are going to start restricting you.

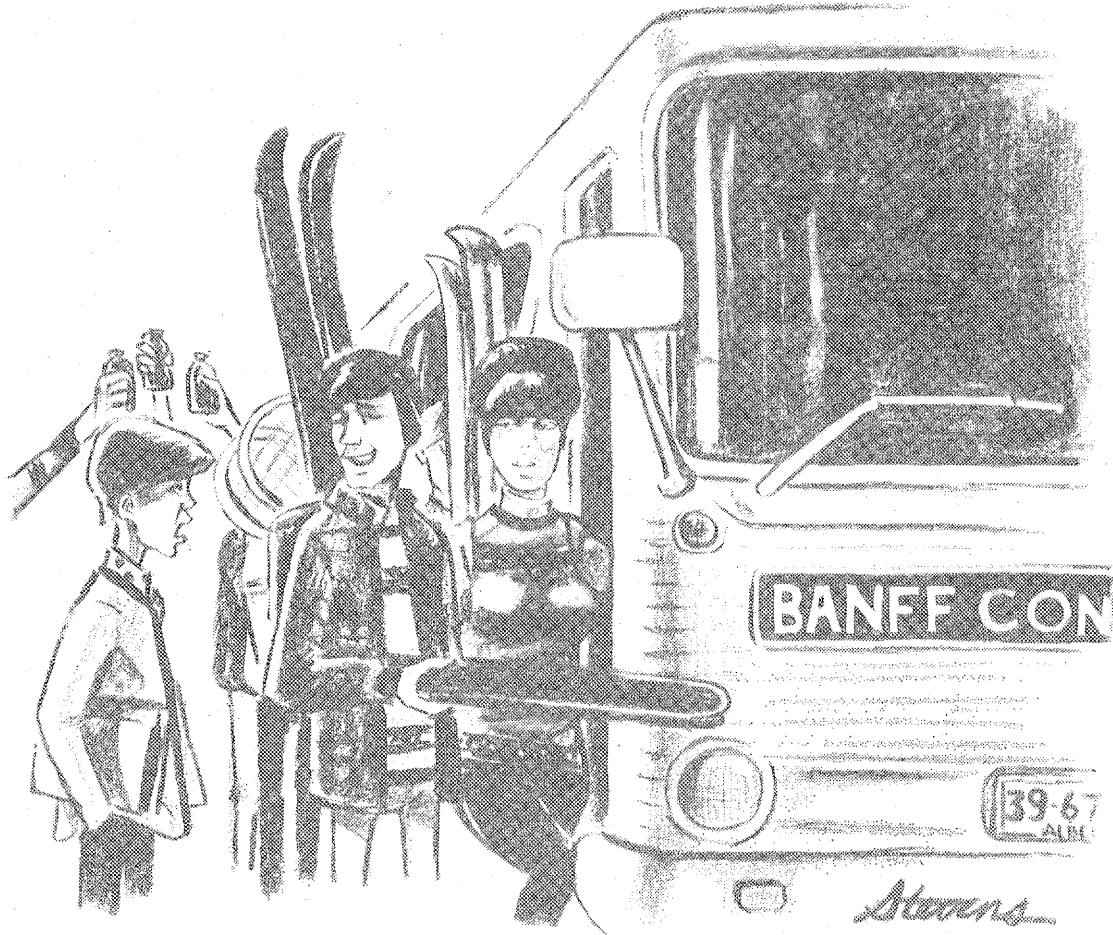
For example, the Yearbook is paid for by you. But just because you invested in it doesn't mean you should sit back and wait for it to be handed to you. It takes People-power to get it out on time. Right at this moment, an Editor, Assistant Editor, and other staff members are needed for the Yearbook. If these people are not found within two weeks, there will be no Yearbook. And what about the Nugget? You enjoy reading it every week and scream when it isn't out on time. It is very hard for seven people to write all the material that goes into a weekly edition. Unless re-

porters are found, the Nugget's doors will close. This will hurt all those connected with the paper because to its reputation of being the best School newspaper in Canada. Typists, proofreaders, and people to help in editing are required to put the Telephone Directory together. No help, no Directory!

Over the long weekend, there is a Key Persons Conference to be held at Banff. You probably haven't heard about it because your Council representative wasn't at the last Council Meeting, at which they were informed. In fact, the representatives who were there did not even inquire of the Executive why they were going to the Conference. They weren't interested either. As a result, the Editor of the Nugget will not be attending the Conference because he doesn't feel that you, the Student Body, will back up his views and ideas.

I, myself, feel that another referendum should be held concerning two matters; the increase of Students' Association fees, and the Ice Arena. If Pat Clarke had explained these two items to a fuller extent and had clarified just what was included in both, there wouldn't have been any no-votes cast at all.

On the whole, you don't seem to care if there is a President, an Executive, or a Council. You pay for some extra goodies and wait for someone else to feed them to you.
