> One word of reassurance: the NAIT Newman Club endeavors to help its members attain a greater awareness and fulfillment of their Christian responsibilities by discussing, planning, working together, but in no way to interfere with other activities of this school, nor give rise to fail in charity and tolerance for those of other faiths.

Participation on the part of all the Catholic students is required to make this year's program successful. NAIT Newman Club meetings are held every first and third Monday of the month in room E 128. All Catholic students are invited to the next meeting to be established on most Canadian and held on Monday, Nov. 7, at 5:15

The final count of all votes in the Ice Arena Referendum held last week indicated that out of more than 2,000 eligible voters at NAIT, only 793 students bothered to vote. This enabled a small, normally insignificant group, to carry the vote against having an Ice Arena at NAIT.

According to the NAITSA Constitution, a 75 per cent majority is necessary to pass any such proposal. Of the total referendum, 574 students (72.5 per cent) voted in favor and 219 students (27.5 per cent) voted against. Ironically, just a week prior to the referendum, the NAITSA Council voted in favor of ammending the constitution by-law to reduce the necessary majority. However, this will not be officially ammended until tomorrow's general meeting.

The voting for or against the Proposed Ice Arena for the future students of NAIT is over and I am disgusted at the results. Yes, the referendum was defeated, but to make it worse, it was short of the 75% required majority by only $2\frac{1}{2}$ %. To add insult to injury, less than 800 students used their voting rights. This was a turnout of 39% of the eligible voters. This in itself is a breakdown of our democratic society. If you are too lazy to exercise your rights, then you are certainly not needed in today's society.

If you the students are too blockheaded to realize the importance of such a project then you don't deserve the almost free secondary education you are receiving.

Your elected technology representatives unanimously voted in favor of this project. He or she was elected because you put them there, realizing that his or her good judgment would express the views of the majority in your technology. Didn't you think that this Arena would serve any useful purpose in the future? No you didn't, simply because you didn't investigate its future use. Did you think that if this Arena were approved you would lose your parking spot? Yes, because again you didn't bother to investigate the facts! You are either too lazy to vote or merely to inert to walk an extra block inside a comfortable building, not that you would have to. This proposed structure would not have been started until 1970 at the minimum, if you would have approved it! It would have been no skin off your... This proposal received the ultimate approval of the administration here at the institute and would have been put through the provincial legislature at the earliest possible date.

Pat Clarke, your president has worked on behalf of you — the students. You supported his policies at the time of the elections, but you won't support him when he really needs it. I hope none of you join the armed services, for Canada would be overrun by communism.

There are two possible remedies to this situation. Another vote can be taken to obtain the required 75% majority or an amendment be made to the NAITSA Constitution that the required majority vote be lowered to 66 and $\frac{4}{3}$ % or even a simple majority of 51%, then take another vote. In either case a written petition must be submitted to Pat Clarke, stating the reason for the petition and be signed by members of NAITSA.

It is my hope that someone will have the guts to accomplish such a simple act.

I agree with most opinions that I got. Actually, a couple of the good things I've noticed about NAIT femme fatales are that they keep jewelry to a minimum, and wear very becoming clothes. High hairdos. of course, have their place. A long-haired miss would not feel quite right at a formal unless her hair was piled high. But, it is poor taste to keep Friday night's pompadour for Monday morning classes. A bulky sweater, flats, and a pompadour don't compliment each other all too well

I did some reading and searching and found a couple of lovely hairdos that will please the eyes of the guys, and are easy to care for. Perhaps you have noticed that the trend in hairstyles is long sleekness. If you have long, gleaming hair, consider yourself one of the lucky, for shoulder-length style trends continue this year. Remember, too, the men-folk prefer it long — it's more feminine.

First of all, the basics (well known, I'm sure), but I'll mention them because of their importance. No hairdo can possibly be at its best unless the hair used for it is immaculately clean. If your hair is dry, and you haven't used a lot of spray net, a once-a-week shampoo will suffice. However, if your hair is oily (like mine is) you'll need to shampoo at least every three days. Use a good medicated or oily-hair shampoo. Normal hair needs shampooing about every four to six days. Unless your home has a water softener, you should use creme rinse no matter what your hair type. City tap water contains minerals that dry both your hair and scalp. Another important item re of your hair" prog-

oils right to the tips of the hair, and makes your hair soft and manageable. If your hair is all sleekness but no body, try a body perm. It gives no curl whatever, but imparts bounce and manageability. Body perms also help to reduce oiliness. Eat a lot of dairy products and protein foods, but keep away from sweets and goop (milk shakes, etc.), and fried foods. Get as much fresh air and exercise as Now the styles. Basically, keep your hair off your face. If your

forehead is high, try a side swept bang and side part. If your forehead is low, brush your hair back and don't part it. Styles are all curve and practically no curl. Use a minimum of spray net. It dries your scalp and kills your hair (a great help to splitting ends, I as-sure you). You long-haired gals keep away from teasing, or your hair won't be long for very long. You'll be blessed with rapidly falling hair, and unless you chop it right off, you'll very shortly be bald

For a young, simple style, sweep the front and crown hair back and fasten with a gold clip, or a bow. Let the ends flip up. For a saucy style, brush your hair to the nape of your neck or over one shoulder, and tie loosely with a bow matching your ensemble. A very popular style is the blunt cut, with either a side or middle part, and brushed sleekly with ends flipping up or turning under. For a short blunt cut and a saucy look, sweep the hair on one side behind your ear and flip the opposite side up.

If your hair is short (long hair doesn't suit everyone's face and tastes) keep it sleek at the sides and back. Curve the sides slightly forward (scotch tape comes in handy). To achieve a casual, tous led look, use rollers that are slightly smaller than the ones you regularly use. Brush well and tease lightly. Then, at the crown, brush loose feathery curls around your finger, one at a time. Run the curls into one another, so that they don't look like a bunch of pin-curls.

Experiment with hairstyles. If after a lot of different attempts, you can't decide what suits you best, talk to a good hairstylist and ask for her or his opinion.

Actually, male tastes are quite uncomplicated (I think), and rather easy to please. They like you the way you are, not an artificial doll. I'm sure you'll agree, it's fun to be natural.
