#### CITADEL NEWS

A sparkling and human play which Alexander Woolcott once described as "the best comedy written for the English stage in the last 100 years", is the next presentation at The Citadel Theatre.

George Bernard Shaw's CAN-DIDA will open a 23-performance engagement beginning February 15 and running through to March 11.

Heading the cast is one of Canada's most distinguished actors, PETER DONAT. He has appeared in five Broadway plays, winning the Theatre World Award in 1957 as the best featured actor on Broadway for his role in THE FIRST GENTLEMAN.

His face is extremely familiar to Canadian television viewers, having appeared in scores of serials and specials ranging from Festival to the very popular coroner series, Wojeck.

Michael Learned will have the title role of Candida. Other performers will be Montgomery Davis of Toronto; Anne Anglin, John Wardwell and Jay Bonnell. The latter three performers have been seen in previous Citadel productions this season.

The play will be directed by DESMOND SCOTT, of Toronto, who once spent three seasons as resident director of the flourishing Manitoba Theatre Centre. The Citadel received an additional Canada-Council grant for bringing him in as guest director.

#### PREPARATION FOR AN INTERVIEW

Some of the more observant members of our student body have noticed that there are students attending job interviews here who must think that because they are specialists, no one will notice or care how they look, act, or are dressed. For those unfortunate students who are laboring under this misconception, we offer the following valuable words of advice. You are a representative of NAIT while attending a job interview and a poor impression will have an adverse effect on the institute as well as yourself.

Some basic and proven principles on this matter have been reprinted here from a publication of a very reliable source.

The employment interview is one of the most important events in the average person's experience, for the obvious reason that the 20 or 30 minutes he spends with the interviewer may determine the entire future course of his life. Yet college recruiters are continually amazed at the number of applicants who drift into job interviews without any apparent preparation and only the vaguest idea of what they are going to say. Their manner says, "Well, here I am". And that's often the end of it, in more ways than one.

Others, although they undoubtedly do not intend to do so, create an impression of indifference by behaving as though they'd dropped in between coke dates. The young man who reports to an interview wearing saddle shoes and a sports coat - who leans back in his chair and lights up a cigarette seems to be saying, "What can you do for me?".

At the other extreme, a few applicants get themselves into a state of mind where they feel as if they are being marched into a medieval inquisition chamber. When they arrive they are in the last stages of nervous fright and unable to do much but gulp and answer in monosyllables.

These marks of inexperience can be avoided by knowing a little of what actually is expected of you and by making a few simple preparations before the interview.

Here are some of the things you can do to get yourself ready:

- 1. Find out the exact place and time of the interview.
- Write the time and place down and keep the notation with

thing besides yourself to talk about during your interview, and provide material to form the questions you should ask.


- Prepare your questions before you go in for the interview. There are a number of publications which can help you research a company. Most of them can be found in any good-sized college or public library.
- Bring a pencil with you and a pen that writes neatly.
- 8. Have some kind of note paper with you, out of sight.
- Plan to arrive at the designated place at least 15 minutes early, if you can. Late arrival for a job interview is almost never considered excusable.
- Clothes. Your own good taste is your best guide. Simply remember that you are looking for a job — not going to a party. A girl should wear conservative clothes - not dowdy ones. A young man should also dress conservatively and, ordinarily, in a suit. His accessories should complement his suit — not contrast with it.

Sport shoes are not proper for a job interview. Of course your shoes should be well

If you are forced to rush to an interview directly from a job or a lab, a polite excuse for your attire will be accepted and the situation under-

- If you use after-shave lotion, wash your hands afterward so that the scent will not transfer to the recruiter's hands. And, since many college interviewing rooms are small and stuffy, such lotions should be used

He enrolled at Montana State University in 1958 graduating in 1961 with an A.S.C. majoring in Economics. Upon graduation from Montana State he worked as an economist for an international construction for 18 months. The University of Idaho granted him a B.Sc. in Business Administration Science in 1963. For the past few summers, he has been working on his Master of Science in Business Administration at the University of Idaho which he will receive this spring.


