As a thrilling climax to a week of active campaigning by the seven Technologies sponsoring queens for the annual Miss NAIT award, Miss Cecilia Halwa was crowned the new Miss NAIT for 1967. The crowning took place at the Queen's Ball on Friday night in the NAIT cafeteria. Cecilia was Distributive Technology's candidate in the campaign.

A good crowd of close to 200 students and honoured guests attended the Ball. Music by the Esquires kept a good portion of the people on their feet all night enjoying dances ranging from waltzes to polkas. At 10:30 p.m. the band was given a well-deserved rest while the formalities of crowning the new queen took place. Charlie Floyd, Social Chairman for NAIT, introduced the seven queen contestants, the three judges, then asked Mr. Saunders to announce the new queen. Mr. Saunders' preliminary talk was short before he announced that "Cecilia is our new Queen".

Cecilia, upon hearing her name, rose from her chair and stepped forward amid the applause of congratulation to be crowned by Sonia Dowhaniuk, Miss NAIT for 1966. Along with being crowned Miss NAIT, Cecilia was presented with a few more surprises. A large trophy with her name on a plaque on the base was presented to her. Perhaps if the public had a greater realization of the important role that the Blood Bank plays in the saving of lives, they would be more enthused about donating their blood. Here at NAIT, we try the Challenge Cup to the technology with the highest percentage or aonations. But evidently this acheme hasn't been too successful.

Picture this! A blood drive comes to your community, but not one person domes to donate! Not even you! (This is a hypothetical case used for illustration). No one cares enough! This carries on, community after community. The Blood Bank is empty. Then, one afternoon, your little sister is hit by a car, and is bleeding extensively. She is rushed to the hospital, but your parents are informed that several pints of blood are needed for immediate transfusion, or your sister will die. But, remember? No one cared enough to donate! Your little sister may need many pints of blood to stay alive. Surely you wouldn't want a situation like this to happen. This illustration gives only one of the many important life-saving functions of blood. Did you know that babies which would have been stillborn five years ago can now he saved by prenatal blood transfusion? This is done by passing a needle through the mother's abdomen, and into the unborn baby. Leukemia and cancer victims can have months added to their lives as the result of blood trans-

A smiling nurse, or well-trained technician will lead you to a high cot, and will apply a pressure band to your arm. you do not even feel that it is "the needle", or by just plain, or- there. Relax! If you tense up, the blood vessels will contract and the blood will flow more slowly. A tenminute rest is then needed to help restore the oxygen that was removed with the pint of blood, and to be sure that plenty of blood is flowing to your brain. Fainting is the result of a reduction of blood to promote enthusiasm by offering flow to the brain. The most common cause of fainting after donation is fear. A person's stomach may feel queasy because he is tense. Relaxation is very important in blood donating. A person should not smoke for at least onehalf hour after donating and not consume alcoholic beverages for a few hours afterwards. He must not participate in vigorous physical activity, neither directly prior to nor directly after donating

> Blood is divided into four types: A, B, AB, and 0. Type 0 is the universal donor, which means that it can safely to given to all four blood types in transfusion. Type AB is the universal recipient, which means that it will accept all four blood types in transfusion. Type 0 is the most common, 46%. Type A is next, at about 39%, type B is about 10%, and type AB, about 5%.

There are two blood groups: Rh positive, and Rh negative. 85% of the world's people have Rh positive and 15%, Rh negative. The Rh factor or rhesus factor, is determined by the presence of a protein in the blood. 

TECHNICAL EDUCATION

This is the first of a two part series on technical education. A two pronged view will be presented, the first will present what the employers' views of the education and the people receiving this education are; the second will attempt to get an evaluation of this type of education by professional educators.

We have tried to take as many views into consideration as possible by securing a number of personal interviews plus research material. These are not the views of the school nor shall there by any direct quotes from people interviewed. This article is a personal judgement of what we have experienced and have been told; you may differ greatly as to what is stated in this article, in fact, we hope that some of you do. It is only through difference of opinion that an interchange of ideas can really take place.

A great deal of thanks must go to Mr. O'Keefe, the NAIT Placement Officer. These series of articles are possible mainly due to his unheralded efforts in arranging for interviews and appointments to see these various people. Dr. Bolle should also receive a bouquet for his contribution in arranging for interviews.

By rights we should have gone into background of vocational and technical education, but we felt that with the number of employers coming to school to hire the students, it would be best to hear their views first.

WHY do companies hire technical students?

The obvious answer to this is to fill a need for a certain type of job. How were these jobs filled before or, did those jobs exist? We can go from one extreme to another, some companies hire the students because it is cheaper to do so than to train their own people, or they are looking for people with a different attitude towards industry than many high school and University students possess. An attitude of willingness to start at the bottom is expressed by many technical students and to take assignments as they come. The immediate job satisfaction is much higher for the technical school student because he has, to some extent, been trained to do the job immediately. University students as a whole have to be trained on the job with a result that many of the duties associated with their work seem to be beneath their dignity. This attitude that technical students have, make it much easier for the students to fit into the companies.

Evaluation of technical school diplomas

The majority of employers gave the diploma a good evaluation; there was little or no confusion with vocational high schools. In the business education section of the school, the majority of companies placed us directly below the Bachelor of Commerce graduates.

Some companies, such as life insurance, did not care what course a person has been trained in, just as long as he has had a post-high school education. These companies are using the diploma merely as a screening device or a process of elimination. They feel if a person has passed all the courses, no matter what he has studied, he has shown the ability to learn.

Many employers have realized that students graduating from a technical institute possess as much and in many cases, more ability in their chosen field than some University graduates.

Companies were surprised at the high quality of instruction and the long way NAIT has come in its short existence. One interesting factor that was brought to light was that many companies felt that some of the courses depended for their quality of one man, the Department Head. One personnel officer felt that the high quality of the students was due to backlog people in their twenties and early thirties, who desired to get this type of education, but had been unable to because of the lack of facilities in the city. The big test for the technical schools will come when the majority of students come directly from high schools and graduate at a much lower average age than the earlier students.

Personal observation

Many personnel officers stressed the idea that they do not close the door for promotion to students who do not have a University degree. They emphatically stated that "merit" alone would be the determining factor. Merit should be defined as hard work, the ability to fit in, to get along with people, native intelligence and desire. A training program is standard procedure for many companies. They like to see a student improve himself by taking additional training at nights. In fact, many companies will pay up to 75 per cent of the cost involved, upon graduation.

A number of oil companies are extremely pleased with the Gas Technology, Drafting, Business Administration and Instrumentation graduates.

If there is any single thing that a company is looking for in a student, no matter what course he is taking, it is the ability to "fit in", to get along with people and to understand human relations.
