On Wednesday, January 4, a press conference was held at the Legislative Building to give the news media a better understanding and fuller background of the Alberta Service Corps. Organized about one month ago, the Honourable Robert C. Clark, Minister of Youth, appointed Mr. Donald Hamilton as the ASC supervisor.

The ASC has been set up to allow students from Universities. Technological Schools and Junior Colleges to aid areas in Alberta which request help. It is hoped that an even distribution of students from these three institutions can be obtained. Present plans call for the employment to be only during the summer vacation months but if a student excels at his assigned task, arrangements could be made to permit a permanent stay. As this is the first year of the ASC, only 20-25 students will be accepted, and these people will be assigned to one of the five areas offered by the service. These areas are:

- 1. working with the mentally ill.
- 2. assisting on Indian reservations. 3. aiding blighted urban areas.
- 4. working with migrant or seasonal labourers.
- setting up a medical corps, providing a health program in remote communities.

If the students are able to cope with the problems encountered in this experimental year, the corps will be expanded next year. Mr. Hamilton hopes for about 100 active students within the next three years. A request from a community must be received before students are sent out to that particular area.

The selection of students will be on the basis of those who:

- 1. show that they are mature enough to cope with the problems of lesser developed communities.
- want to work with people. have a good academic record.

The Sociology Department at the University of Alberta will be assist-

ing in the selection of students. Students who do qualify for the ASC service will receive a living allowance plus a small allowance while working, and upon their return to school, they will receive a bursary, according to their own personal needs.

Don Hamilton has visions of great success for the Alberta Service Corps, and it is hoped that by the end of this week or during next week, posters and brochures will be seen in all the Universities Technical schools and Junior Colleges in Alberta. For a quicker response, there will be an application form attached to the brochure.

Fee Increase Turned Down By Student Vote

NAIT students turned out at the Polls 748 strong to cast their votes on the NAITSA Referendums. The following two issues were put to the student body to decide upon: ISSUE No. 1

A referendum to ask the students to approve the payment of \$1.00per student per year to the Province of Alberta in exchange for an Ice Arena on campus. This \$1.00 would be paid until 1/3 (one-third) of the original capital cost of the Ice Arena has been paid.

A referendum to ask the students to approve a Student's Association fee increase from \$17.00 to \$24.00. The increase would include yearbook picture costs, freshman orientation week costs; (which are not now included in the fee but paid for separately) plus a general increase of \$3.00 per student.

Returning Officer, William Jeffs, announced that the final tabulation showed 82% in favour of the Ice Arena and only 63% in favour of the fee increase. Since 663/3% is needed to pass an issue the fee increase is now turned down. However, the NAITSA centennial project a of an ice arena has now been OK'd by the student body and plans can be started immediately.

One program is an extra-curricular activity involving the NAIT Curling Club. The second is an optional service offered to freshmen through an extension of Physical Education Class-

For several years the NAIT Curling Club has operated from the Menorah with a membership of approximately one-hundred students. These enthusiasts come from all Technologies within the school. Needless to say, the skill-level and knowledge of the game expressed by these participants varies from the complete novice to the highly skilled years this club has developed into ful programs at the school. The club operates twice-a-week and is organized to accomodate both mixed and men's curling. Following instruction and practice of the skills necessary to the game, teams are formed and competitions and awards from these various teams to represent NAIT in the Western Inter-College Conference (WICC) in early March. This practice is very useful and successful as NAIT has always placed well-

Last year a few classes were scheduled for the rink as a pilot study of the Physical Education Department. The results of the project indicated a definite interest in the sport and that many students would continue to use curling as a recreational and leisure activity. This year will see nearly one-thousand students taking curling as part of their regular physical education classes. A total of five classes of twohour duration are offered. Instruction in basic skills necessary to the game is given during each session, with time alloted for a 4 to 8-end game.

As the philosophy of the Department is to acquaint students with activities which may be useful to and competent playmaker. Over the them in future years, curling is certainly one activity that meets this one of the most active and success- need. With the assistance of Mr. Fred Swartz, Manager of the Menorah, it has been possible to operate the program at a reasonable cost to the student. Needless to say, without this assistance, it would not have been possible to schedule these curling sessions. NAIT is certainly grateful for this help. It is hoped that this program will contribute to keeping the rinks active with NAIT graduates in future years.

Being born and raised as part of the free world, we do not realize the full significance of our freedom. Mr. Tung Chi-Ping, a refugee from the cruelties he suffered behind the Iron Curtain, tells of the ridiculous education situation developed in Red China.

Mr. Chi-Ping can scarcely believe his good luck in being able to escape from behind the Iron Curtain, from Red China. He retains vivid memories of insecurity, turmoil, hunger, fear, and a minimum of education. Chaos is close at hand for the Party leaders of Red China, showing the basic flaws in communist ideology, the lack of cooperation between people and leaders.

the Chinese universities. The Party who think for themselves. These leaders deeply fear the young, bright intellectuals who will see through "the propaganda smokescreen". University students are capable of quick action and strong opposition. For this reason, the Party has suspended university classes for months. To keep the students busy, and to prevent their thinking, the Party forces them to march through the streets during every waking minute, shouting and carrying banners proclaiming what is called the "Great Cultural Revolution"

At the beginning of the new term in the summer of 1960, all enrollment was suspended at universities and high schools. Exams were eliminated as a requirement of entrance. Physical abilities and family background were considered most important, and intellectual ability came in a weak third.

If your father was a political or army leader, you were set for life. Mr. Chi-Ping recalls a boy who was enrolled in his high-school class. The boy's father was a Peoples' Liberation Army general. The boy was immediately put at the head of the class. When given a Russian exam, the boy merely scribbled a Chinese obscenity on the paper, and handed it in. He not only received the highest grade in the class, but was thanked by the teacher for giving the class "the benefit of his superior class wisdom and experience". This boy was rather dull-witted, and could not even hope to enter an academic school on scholastic ability. He applied for entrance to a textile school. However, he was sent to study nuclear physics with the most intelligent students in the country. He was immediately put in charge of "political enlightenment" of the school.

A great suppression has set in in ials deeply fear ambitions and people people are sorted out and pointed out as freaks. The party forces the classmates of these unfortunate individuals to shun them, and demand their liquidation, or thus be destroyed themselves. Teachers, originally shown great respect, were to be considered inferior, and potential leaders of the enemies of the state. The students were encouraged to defy and denounce the teachers. A good percentage of the teachers committed suicide, another large percentage went insane, and the remaining few were replaced by army trained personnel. Entire classrooms of students are sent to labor in fields to reduce the cost of labor and production. If the students managed to fill the ridiculously high quotas set for them, they received a good mark in their school work.

> For a short period, between 1961 and 1962, the "informer" system was dropped. New Party members urged the students to study, and criticism of the existing systems was allowed. 
One of Bev's greatest ambitions is to become an expert at judo for the fun of flipping friends rather than a means of self defence.



The Income Tax Office will not recognize any other form of receipt from N.A.I.T.






The second half turned out to be a nip-and-tuck battle with SAIT having the edge and scoring their winning basket as the buzzer went.

The Ookpiks had very little trouble defeating their Southern Competition Friday evening by skating hard and forechecking for the full sixty minutes of the game. Larry Froland opened the scoring for NAIT at 13:13 of the first period by neatly deflecting the puck past SAIT goalie, Ron Jenkins, on a play set up by Joe Higgins and Don Pruss. One minute and seventeen seconds later, Ron Pruss and Larry Froland assisted on Bill Caston's goal which proved to be the winner. 

Referees Johnny Young and D. DeFriend called a total of eight penalties during the game, giving NAIT four in the second period, and SAIT two in the second and one in the first and third periods.

Saturday afternoon with the attendance down from 0033 to 016 the two tech teams hit the ice again. Mr. Hooks once again was at the helm as NAIT won its second game in as many days. Although the Ookpiks won 6 to 3 the first two periods showed no indication that NAIT was the superior team.

Brian Scoggins started the scoring 16 seconds after the starting buzzer, on a goal from Rick Pugliese and Jim McMillan. The remainder of the first period became a defensive battle with SAIT showing great improvement from the sixteen hours before. SAIT's extra drive paid off at 2:15 of the second period when Wayne Alexander scored SAIT's first goal. Within 90 seconds D. Clayton put the Trojans ahead by a score of two to one. Four minutes later at 7:28, NAIT's "St. Paul Kid", Ernie Joly, tied the game with an assisted goal after battling through SAIT's complete team and beating the Southern goalie.

Once again the rest of the period became a defensive duel. During the twelve minutes of second period action, Bill Caton and Brian Scoggins donated to NAIT's Blood Drive early and colored the Varsity ice red. The two NAIT stars ran into high sticks and had to receive medical attention and stitches.

After a healthy pep talk, NAIT came to life and showed the form they had the night before. During the third period, the Ookpiks outskated and outchecked the Trojans to score four goals to the Trojans one. Dale Evans turned the trick after five minutes of play and started NAIT moving with his unassisted goal. After 10 minutes of play, John Zakotuk drilled home the winner from fifteen feet out on a play set up by Jim McMillan. Two minutes later Ernie Joly moved his second goal unassisted and at the half-way point of the period, Jim McMillan potted NAIT's sixth goal. Wayne Alexander scored SAIT's third goal at the 16:52 mark to finish off the scoring.
