CIVIL TECH. FLIES TO PEACE RIVER PROJECT

It seems that not all the technologies are lax in gaining further knowledge about what the future holds after completing their course here at NAIT. Civil Technology is one of these, and the students took the initiative and chartered a plane to fly them to the Peace River Project at Hudson's Hope, B.C. 35 students, 5 instructors and 10 others made the trip on Sunday, April 30 and spent a full day touring the Portage Mountain Dam. They used their own funds for the venture and the total cost came to a mere \$1400, or, approximately \$30 per student.

A few facts about the dam itself were brought back by the Civil group:

The Dam itself will be 600 feet in height, 1 1/4 miles long, with a breadth of 1/2 mile at the base. The total amount of gravel, sand and rock is estimated at 180 million tons (60 million cubic yards).

The powerhouse is situated 400 feet below the bedrock and will be 1600 feet long and 70 feet wide. The 10 turbo-generators will produce 2.3 million kilowatts.

The reservoir will be 240 miles long, covering an area of 680 square miles. Much of the 1000

miles of shoreline will be converted to tourist facilities by 1975, and I hear that many of the Civil students have put in bids already.

There is a total of 17,000 feet of conveyer belt system used in transporting the material from the glacial moraine 3 miles away to the damsite. 15,000 feet of this is one continuous belt and is the largest of its kind in the world.


At this moment there are approximately 2500 men employed, which brings the monthly payroll to around 2 million dollars.

All of those who were on the field trip thought it very educational and proved to be a very well spent Sunday. They wish to thank the B.C. Hydro and Power Authority for giving them the opportunity to take the trip and for supplying them with tour guides. They also extended their hospitality by treating the Civil group to a lunch on the house.

For getting MORE out of the course you are taking, I think it would be a great idea for you to plan a field trip to a business related to your Technology. You could profit by it.



AWARDS NIGHT SIDELIGHT

EDUCATE THE MAYOR

It was brought to the attention of the Nugget, by someone who was eavesdropping, that the City of Edmonton didn't really care who was to be their representative at NAIT's Awards Night '67.

It seems that a lack of respect due an Institute the size of NAIT has been accorded the organizers of the Awards Night. Not until Thursday afternoon, the afternoon prior to Awards Night, were the planners informed of just whom would be representing the citizens of Edmonton.

The outcome was that Alderman, Doctor Ivor Dent, was the individual to whom the Mayor delegated the chore. It must be stated here that Dr. Dent was certainly a credit to the citizens of Edmonton and he himself was quite entertained and entertaining.

The Nugget, however, has no bone to pick with Alderman, Dr. Ivor Dent. The "rub" lies with the way the Mayor, busy as he may be, let the matter of Awards Night fall by the wayside. The Mayor's acceptance was the LAST to be received — "although the Mayor will not be able to attend, a representative of the City would be present".

The matter was hereafter forgotten until telephone inquiries by the worried planners prompted further action. (The name of the City Council representative was necessary for the printing of the programs.)

For the economic and social effect that the Northern Alberta Institute of Technology has and will have for the City of Edmonton revenues, is it too much to ask for name respect. The Provincial Government thinks highly enough of NAIT to honor the Institute by providing two cabinet ministers (invited before any thought of an election). NAIT's effect on the economic and social well-being of the Province of Alberta is not as immediate as that felt by the City of Edmonton, but the Mayor's attitude of complacency gives the impression that NAIT really doesn't matter.

The Provincial Government has plans for NAIT's expansion of facilities and enrollment. This represents a mere drop in the bucket to the total expenditures by the Provincial Government. But the people in the Legislature are aware of the need for technically trained personnel. The contribution these students can make in bettering Alberta's and Canada's social and economic drive for progress in a world of changing technology and automation is well acknowledged by the Provincial Government.

Perhaps someone should "educate" the Mayor of Edmonton as to the spending power of students at NAIT — and then compare to the spending power of the same students after completion of their training at NAIT. Hopefully, the City of Edmonton officials will change their attitude of complacency; and for once open their eyes to the progress, the acquired skills and knowledge, and the striving for the betterment of humanity made by the students of NAIT; instead of arguing senselessly over trivia in Council.

"A student attending a designated educational institution, and the spouse of the student, is entitled to vote as an absentee student voter if the voter

- a) is qualified to vote as an elector in the Electoral Division in which the voter ordinarily resides, but
- b) will be absent from the Electoral Division on election day by reason of being a student at the educational institution or the spouse of such a student".

A person who is qualified to vote under The Election Act must be 19 years of age before or on the 23rd of May, 1967.

An ABSENTEE STUDENT VOTER may vote for the candidate of his choice in the Electoral Division in which he ordinarily resides and is qualified to vote.

This is now the beginning of a new chapter in NAITSA's history and with your help we can make it a prosperous, beneficial and enjoyable one.






