

## Censorship:

### Paradox

Censorship is concept that affects everyone. From the moment of birth until your demise the magazines, books and movies you see are censored.

The concept basically implies that YOU are not capable of distinguishing between obscene and unobscene literature. The person or persons censoring your literature is supposidly in a far better position to judge what you should or should not see.

A definition of "obscene" is given by Webster's Dictionary as: offensive to modesty, indecent, filthy or disgusting. Most books, magazines and films are censored because they are purported to have an obscene content. Most material considered obscene is views of the nude or female form. It is impossible for me to imagine that the human form can be indecent, offinsive to modesty or disgusting. There is basically little difference between human beings, and how the censors term one nude to be obscene, and the other not, is hard for me to understand. Or, if the censor finds all human forms, not fully clothed, to be indecent then he is obviously in need of psychological help. Let's be realistic about the whole idea—we're stuck with the present form and not much can be done to change it.

A prime example of "Censorship in action" was seen three weeks ago in Edmonton. The November issue of Playboy was pulled off the newsstands. The imagined 'obscene'' material in the magazine dealt with a history

of "stag" films. The article was a chronicle of stag movies from their conception to the present date. Pictures of several of these movies were displayed. I bought a copy of Playboy before the furor started, and was amazed that it was censored. The pictures shown were no more daring than the rest of the magazine itself.

If censors remain with us, as I'm sure they will, their efforts should be directed in a different direction. It is quite ridiculous to ban stag pictures and films when more and more are now coming out containing extreme acts of violence. If showing people being killed is more socially than showing people in the nude, then our present value system must be wrong. The late Lenny Brice, in one of his acticles was amazed by this fact and stated, "I've never seen anyone killed in a stag and stated, movie yet.'

The main contention I have against censorship is that, someone else's moral values are being imposed upon me and you. I believe censorship to be an unnecessary restriction which is better left to the individual than the state.

## **Bathtub Race** This Friday of A Arena





Patricia Hamilton and Leslie Carlson, of Toronto, will portray a married couple in Henrik Ibsen's soul-searing classic.

Miss Hamilton has the intri guing title role of Hedda, described by The New Yorker as "Ibsen's evasive, destructive and frigid Nordic woman..the first modern married female egotist. as flighty and undomestic as a sea-gull, and the erratic prototype of too many twentieth century women to come,"

The role has been coveted by most ambitious actresses, and played by many of the greatest. says Artistic Director, Robert Glenn' "It is undoubtedly one of the most challenging roles in dramatic literature, Miss Hamilton last played Hedda Gabler in 1961 at the Cincinnati Playhouse in the Park.




#### Curling BY PAUL RAGAN


## AIT Takes Opener


