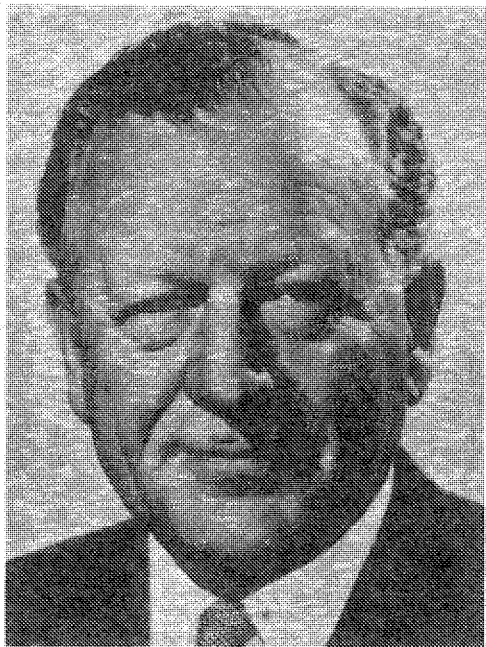

What are the goals of a student newspaper— This varies with different papers and the Nugget has many common goals with other student publications but it also tries to have an individual format, one that is distinctive and different from any other publication. One of the ways we try to achieve this is by having a variety of personalities on a staff. I think we do because it ranges from people who carry on personal battles with the secretaries to people who have a sincere interest in promoting school through a club news column.

The term newspaper makes one of our objectives the presentation of all events at Nait which pertain to the students and administration. The material gives the student body and idea of what the school is doing, what students and student groups are participating in activities and gives recognition to the people involved. This function is probably the most important but there are others which this paper serves.

The Nugget is an advertising agent for the school. Through mailing list the Nugget informs other educational institutions about ourselves and what we do in academic, athletic and social fields. If you find a picture of yourself in the paper it will be seen by someone as far away as Moncton, New Brunswick.

This paper compiles the historical events of our Institute. Through the years all the important developments and events that have occurred at this school will be found in the old files of the Nugget. If any past information on Nait is required the Nugget offices are probably the easiest place to find it and looking back at old newspapers will uncover the formation of many traditions that have become part of Nait today.

The people who work on the Nugget are given the opportunity of participating in a very beneficial experience. It provides an opportunity to write, gives experience in management and most important it helps develop a team spirit in working together towards a common goal. I think more people should take advantage of this opportunity the paper provides.

Most people want a paper that is controversial. They want to see matters they don't agree with brought to light they want someone to say "This is wrong" or "That guy is doing a rotten job." There seems to be much demand from the student body for this type of material and since it's your paper your actions will be approached in a critical manner.

There is one particular goal that the Nugget would like to reach. Although the content of the Nugget is dictated by the staff we would like you to realize that this paper is a tool that can be utilized by everyone at this institute.

Student organizations or individuals may present copy which they feel is pertinent to the paper and providing it is in good taste it will be happily accepted for publication.

"We care-- don't you?" was picked up by people through petition being supported by over three miles of signatures-- including Premier Ernest C. Manning.

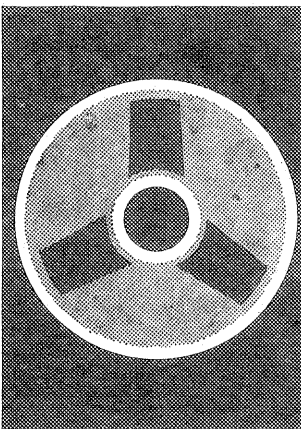
DRAYTON VALLEY FIRST

Hello Again! Girls, on what basis do you select the color of your clothes? Some girls see something, like it and buy it. When they get it home they decide that it doesn't suit them. Are you like this? Here are a few points to remember when buying clothes.

Colors are enormously powerful and as personal as your perfume. They can affect your mood. They can cheer, depress, calm, stimulate, and inspire you. Hair skin, and eyes are all toned in the same accordance. When buying clothes, select colors that "add spice" to you. Choose styles that flatter the "good you" - not emphasize the "poor you." There is only one reliable way to find which colors suit you: any color that does something for you when you have no make-up on is bound to be right. It has been said that with proper make-up any girl can wear any color successfully. However, there is no natural complexion there. Right? Your end result is a mask-like artificial effect.

Those of you with sallow skin, stay away from swampy greens,

mustard, and brassy golds, grayed browns - and avoid those stressed neutrals such as: black, gray, tan and camel. You will find that clear colors in light and medium values will be most becoming, and for neutral, choose navy or light beige. Strong, hard colors - such as shocking pink, chrome yellow, acid green, sharp turquoise - can drown out a person with delicate features or hair of an indefinite shade.

The way to satisfy a color craving that doesn't agree with your complexion is to wear it away from your face - in a skirt, pants, or on your feet. If you love poison green, but it makes you look as though you had swallowed some, sling a green bag over your shoulder.

What is the relationship between size and color? White and all the pale pastels make the area they cover look bigger. Black and all the dark colors tend to slim. Why are most road signs printed on shiny white or yellow backgrounds? That's Right! The better to see the curves! The same thing happens on girls. So, it stands to reason, that the wise use of color can help de-emphasize figure problems.

In planning your wardrobe, it may sound sensible to pick a basic neutral color and plan around it. GORDON LIGHTFOOT IN CONCERT.

It was Lightfoot Night October 20 as NAIT greeted one of Canada's most celebrated folksingers.

The Pied Piper with a guitar charmed a crowded auditorium for two hours of folksongs and his hit parade tunes. Although a broken string posed a few problems during his show, Mr. Lightfoot's performance received a standing ovation and evoked enthusiastic responses from the audience.

Gordon Lightfoot first started his career as a singer and a dancer on the CBC show "Country Hoe-down", and also took a turn at playing drums and jazz music. He hosted eight one-hour television specials for the BBC when he toured the United Kingdom, but disenchanted with his tunes, turned to songwriting.

After his return from Britain, Lightfoot was an internationally recognized performer. His appearances on "Let's Sing Out" and "Canadian Folk Festival" increased his popularity, and he entered his first big year in 1965.

In this year he cut records for United Artists, coming out with "For Loving Me", and "I'm Not Saying". With these two successes in his pockets, Gordon Lightfoot represented Canada at the Newport Folk Festival in Connecticut, a major accomplishment for a Canadian.


For the last two years, Gordon Lightfoot has concentrated his tour in his homeland. He has played at Expo '67, and in addition, watched "Spin, Spin", "Go Go Round" and "The Way I Feel" rise higher on the hit parade charts.

Although most groups and sin-

gers today make use of psychedelic sounds, Gordon Lightfoot works only with two guitars and two back up men. Simplicity, are repeated in most songs he writes. As for the importance of singing and writing, he feels that one is nothing without the other, and that only one in several composition has the required elements to make it a strong number.

After Gordon Lightfoot's two day stop in Edmonton, he headed south to Calgary for another two days, then started back East to his home base of Toronto via several colleges and universities. Before cutting a new record and album in November, Mr. Lightfoot hoped to rest and write a few more songs.

If NAIT's response is anything to judge by, the future looks extremely bright for the lanky twenty-eight year old singer. The Lightfoot sound is soaring.

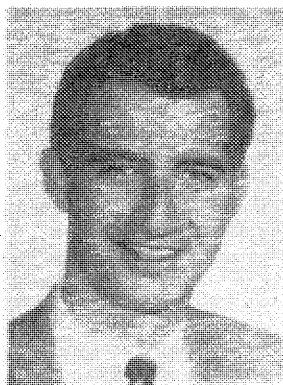

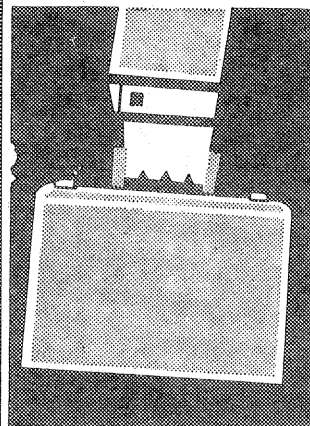

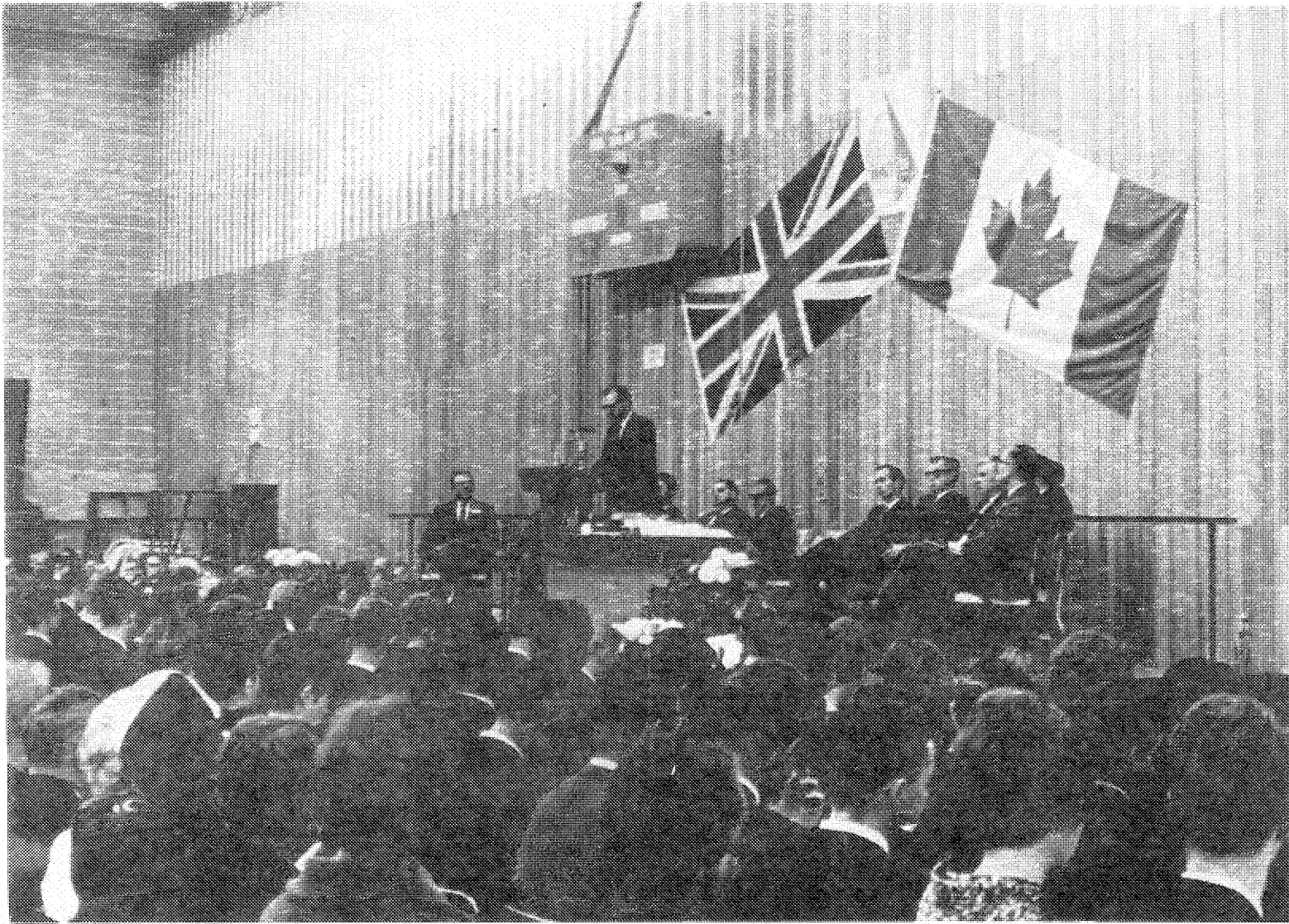

wishes on behalf of himself and the city of Edmonton.

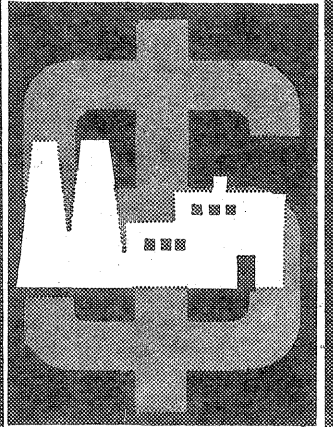

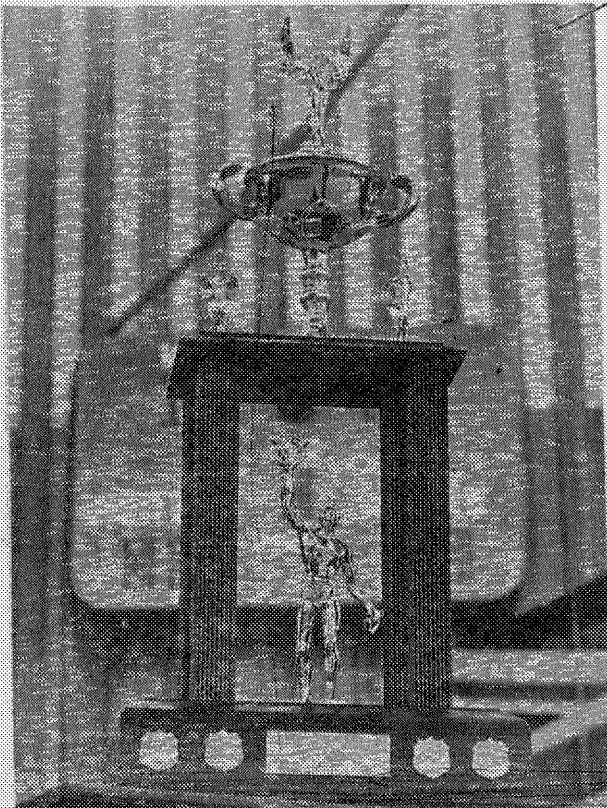

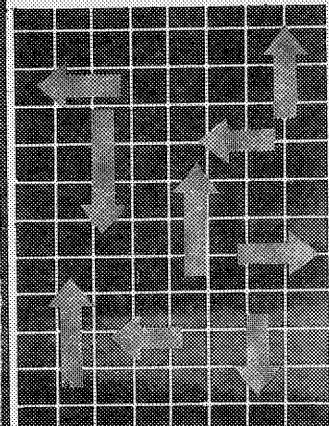
