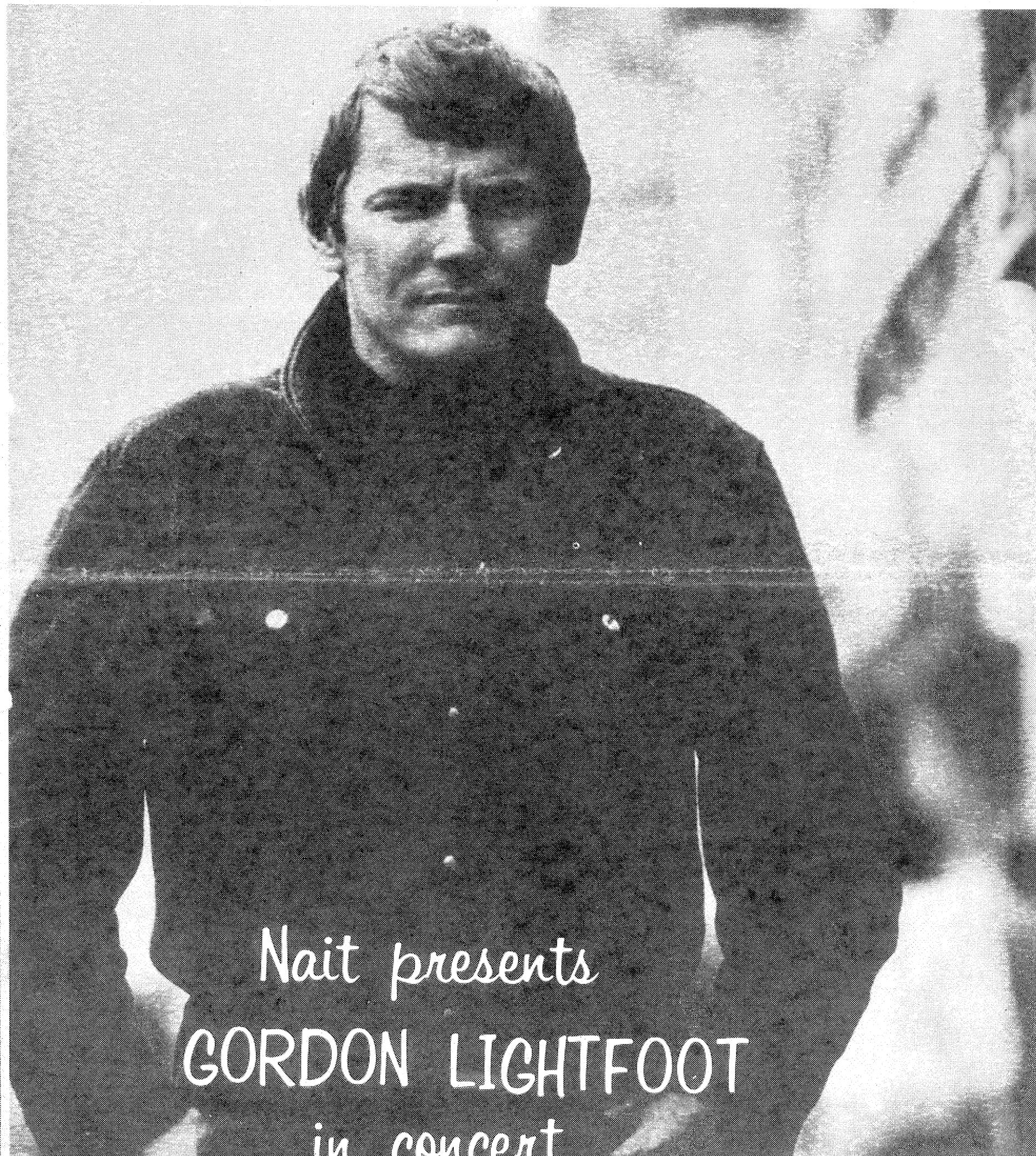

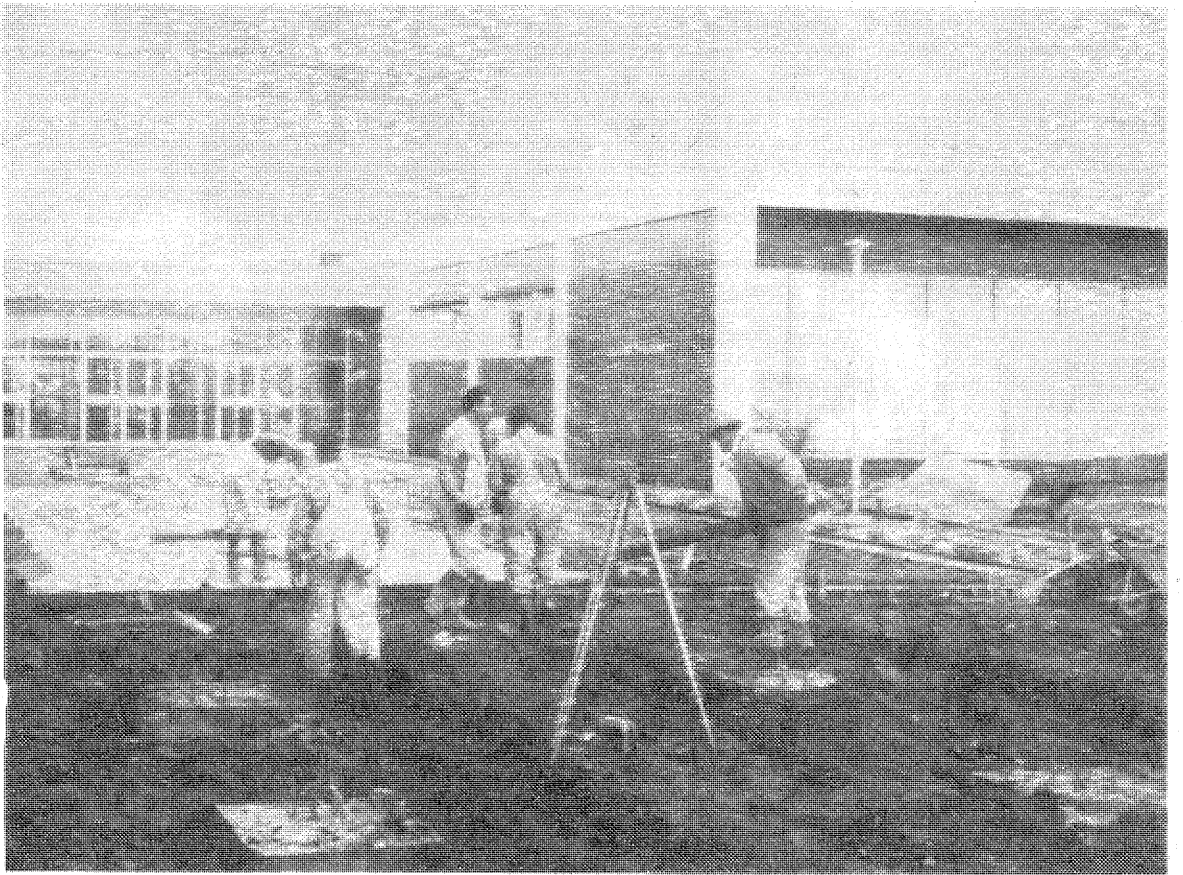

SYNDICATE CRIME

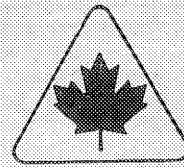

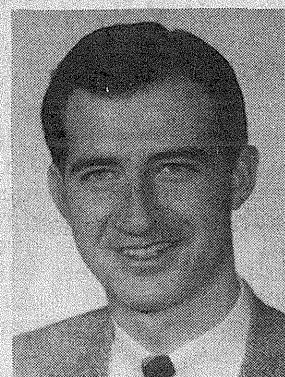
The Association offers everyone a year-long membership for ten dollars, and a lifetime membership for only fifty dollars. The "Pathfinder", a monthly

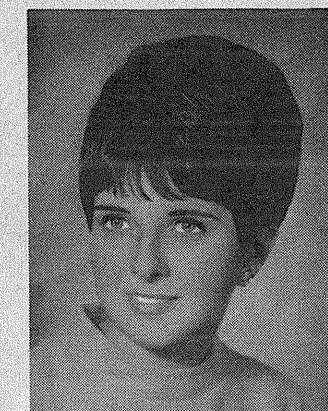

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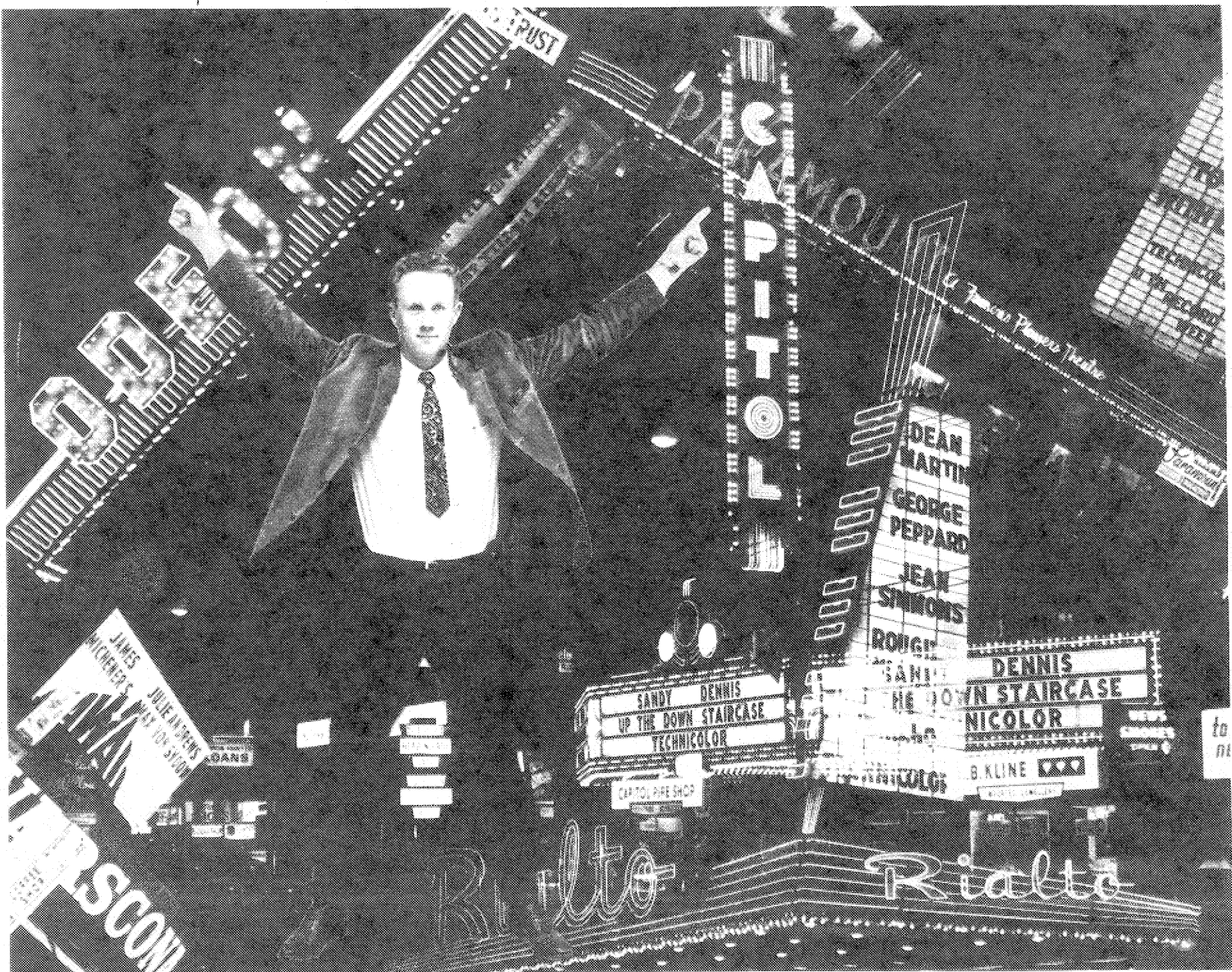

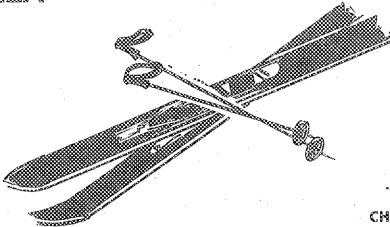
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PRESIDENT JOHN LAW

In an institute of this size it is always a problem trying to promote school spirit. The basis for school sport must come from the departmental clubs.

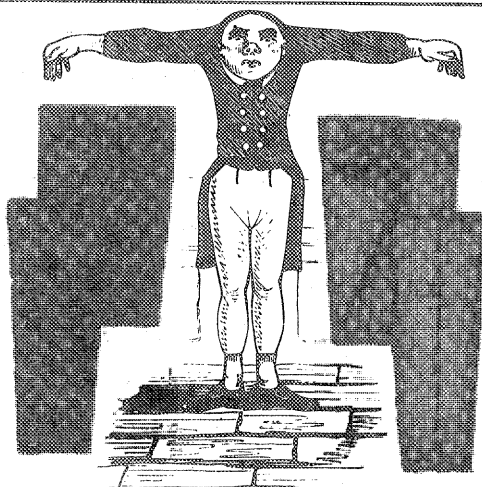
Do your part in participating by seeing that your club has at least one representative at NAITSA Council meeting.

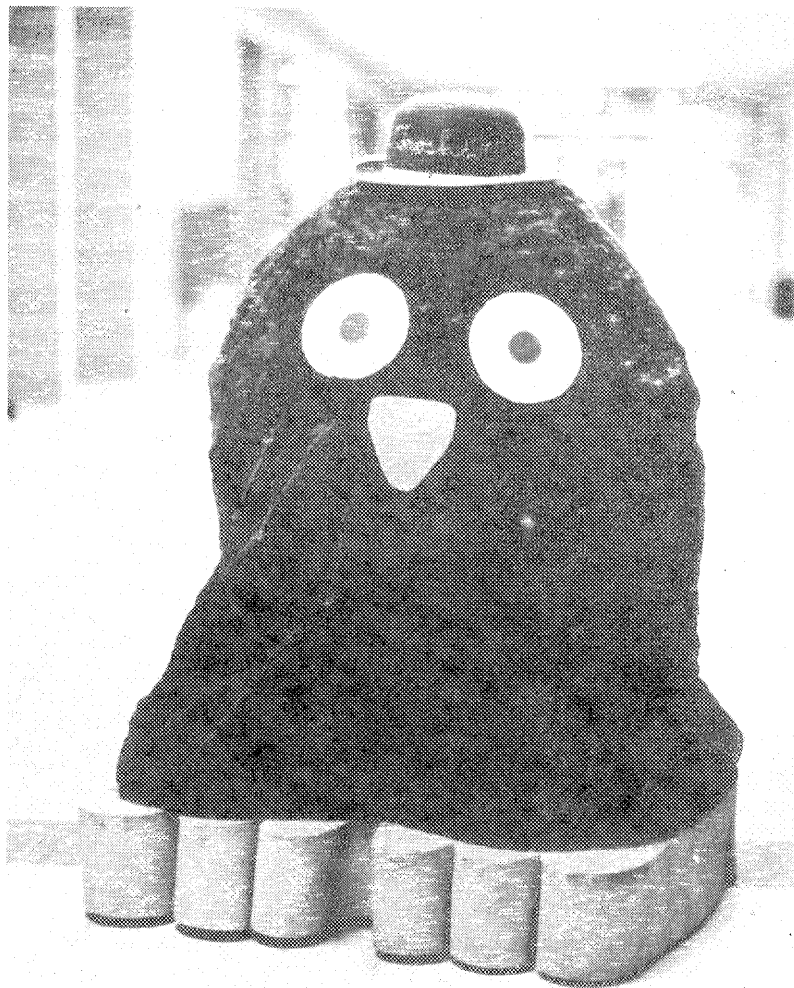

The Electrical and Electronics departments of NAIT have combined their talents to develop a mobile mascot to promote the IEEE.

The project, which started in August, was headed by Jim Tutton, Al Koybo and Wally Gerina of Electrical Technology and Wally Ger-Technology and Willie Wong of Electronics under the supervision of Mr. Campbell, a staff advisor with the IEEE.

The electrical ookpik stands close to four feet tall and is covered entirely with sealskin. It is powered by a car generator rewired to act as a motor which is driven by a rechargeable twelve volt battery and is capable of running up to four hours on a single charge. The drive mechanism is hooked to a twelve inch tire centrally located at the base of the assembly. About the underside are four casters of which the two rear ones are controlled by brakes to facilitate steering and stopping of the ookpik. The controls are at present wired to the base, but it is anticipated that a remote control set up will be in operation before NAIT "Open House".

Last Saturday the ookpik proved to be the children's delight as it operated before a crowd of over 500 viewers in Morinville at a Centennial Caravan event.

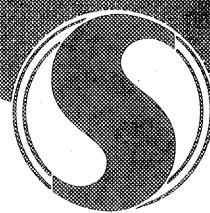

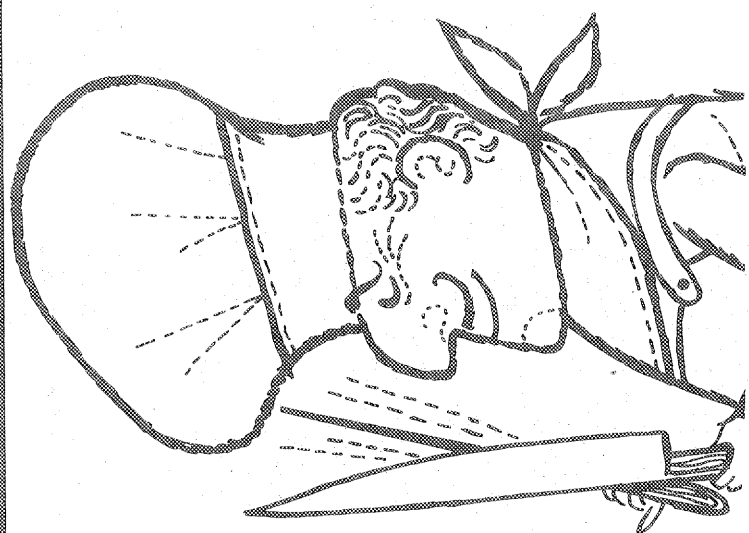
STENE ON SPORT

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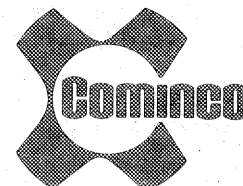
