## NAIT ADDS 85 TO TEACHING FORCE

When a new academic term begins at any educational institute all the attention is immediately drawn towards the freshman student, who is beginning another phase of his education. They are not the only people who find themselves in a new environment with many expectations, hopes, and doubts for the coming year.

Nait has added between 85 and 90 new instructors to its teaching force and although their problems and purpose differ, these people are sharing some common feelings with the freshman student. Both groups are looking forward to finally getting settled into their proper routine.

Some of the new instructors will complement the present teaching staff in established departments, while others find themselves instructing classes in the new Technologies. The majority of this group have been drawn from local Al-

berta industry but a few have transplanted their roots from as far away as England. These instructors collectively bring to Nait a vast store of practical skill, knowledge, and training which is ready to be passed on to the future Nait graduate.

Early in August this new teaching force arrived at Nait and was put through an orientation process which gave them the necessary information to help them fit into the Nait instructional system. Now they have relinquished their desks to the students and many begin a new career as instructors.

## NAIT Adds 7 New Technologies

The Northern Alberta Institute of Technology offers more separate technologies and trades than any other institute in Canada. It seems that this lead will be kept for the future as seven new technologies have been added to Nait's ever growing list of courses. This total is now 49.

The formation of these new courses gives everyone a more secure feeling about the Institute's purpose and the future of its graduates. This is evident because local industry was totally responsible for the origination of these courses. The new technologies offer a breakthrough for the student in a number of diverse fields. Excellent student response to these courses shows that the future graduate holds a Nait diploma in high regard. Listed below are the new additions.

Food Processing Technology.

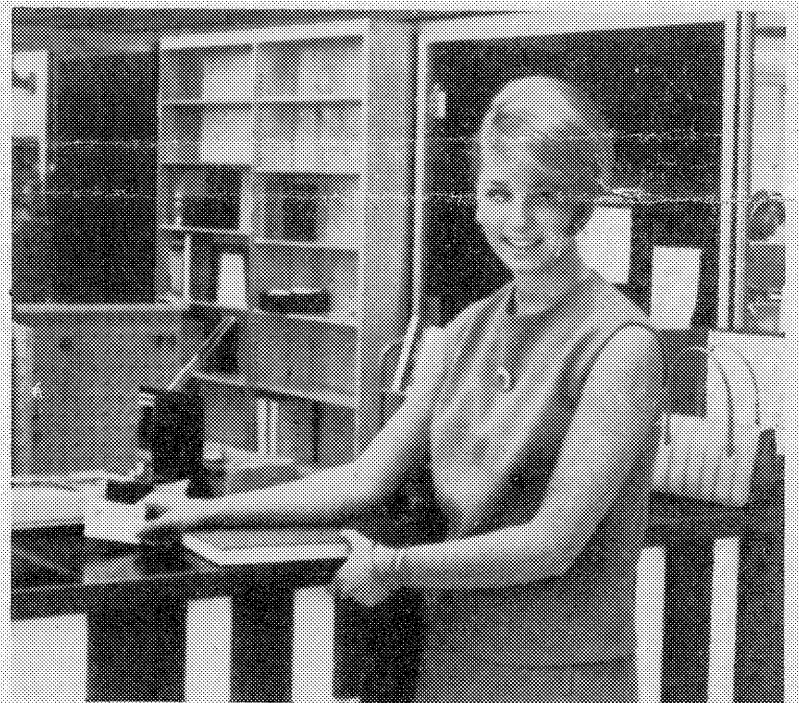
Adding courses to the list is not the only factor in keeping the institute up-to-date. As time passes the administration finds that courses should be revised or lengthened. In keeping with this a two year Banking program is now offered, and Computer Technology has been revised, to allow for specialization. It is obvious by this year's additions and revisions that Nait will continue to progress in the Technological field of education.

## DEPARTMENTAL CLUBS

For those of you who are new at NAIT, and for those of you who have not discovered the various clubs up to your second year, here follows an explanation of the departmental clubs. Almost every major section or technology in NAIT has what is known as a departmental club. These clubs send representatives to the Naitsa meetings, that is, your student government, to let you know what is going on and also to let your club give the school activities some direction.

The Nugget welcomes the opportunity to write up any activities or special club events. We only ask that you let us know plenty of time in advance. This gives us a comprehensive newspaper and it gives your club widespread publicity.

To promote rivalry among the departmental clubs we have a challenge cup. The present holder of the challenge cup is Civil Technology Business Administration. Last year winners were subjected to some rather feeble efforts to have the cup taken away during unimaginative competition. With some fresh blood in our seven new technologies we are expecting seven more clubs and perhaps a more concrete effort to secure the challenge cup.

# EDITORIAL

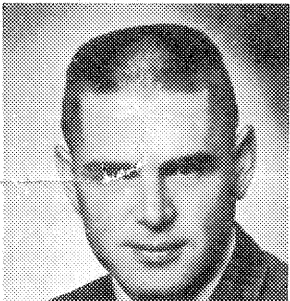

The Frosh this year, as in any other year, have a big responsibility placed upon them; that of outdoing what the new students accom-



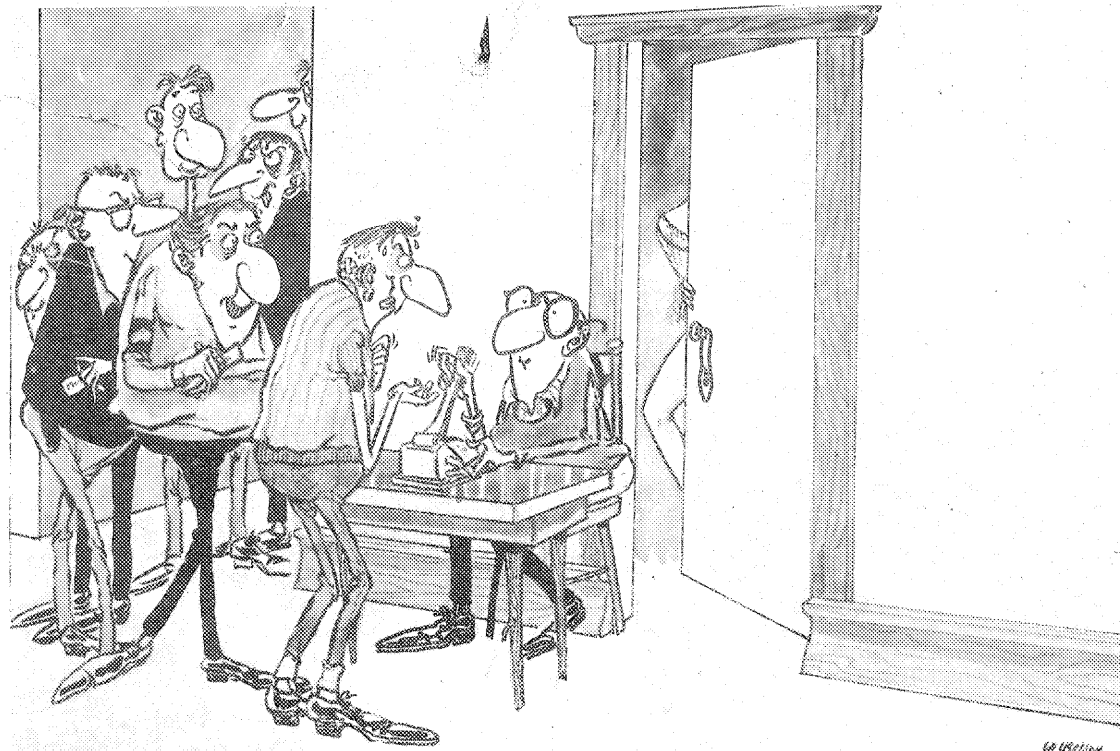
## Message From The . . . Director Of Student Services

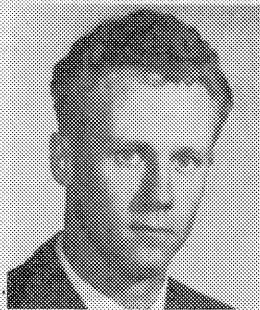

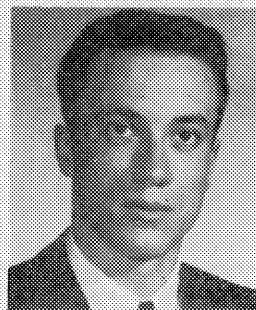

prefer ham radio operations there is VE6MR for you.

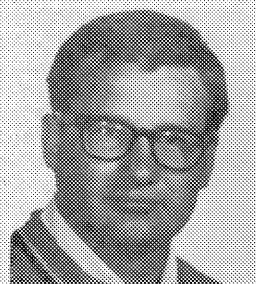

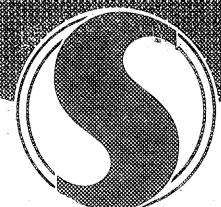
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
