For a fee of \$3.00, students can enroll in an eight hour course, composed of lectures, films, and illustrations designed to make drivers aware of the concept of defensive driving.

this is being arranged.





The J-Wing was supposed to be completed by February 18, but complications have now moved the completion date into April. This project was undertaken in anticipation of an increase in student enrolment, Administration expects an increase of about 800 student registrations at the Institute for 1968-69.

The new wing will bring muchneeded classrooms for a number of technologies. Since it is expected that Electronics and Instrumentation Technologies will increase something like 180 students, the first floor will be for their use. The second floor will be apportioned to drafting technology with the remainder to be used as classrooms. And of course since more instructors will be required, part of the third floor will be used for staff offices. Since the expiration of Business Administration's contract at the end of January, NAITSA has been considering a tender from Distributive Technology for operation of the store, and also the executive have been considering assuming operation responsibility themselves. Business Administration has asked for a three-year renewal lease.

How strange that no man ever seems To answer all a lady's dreams, Although, as viewed by woman kind, Her ideal shouldn't be hard to find.




Alas, for woman, doomed by fate To never find that perfect mate, (???) That dream man sought be all in frocks; Their paragon is a paradox.

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


