HEADSLATE KULL - RADICAL?

During the recent campaign, several students formed a group known as the HEADSLATE. Their leader was Frank Robert Kull. He became for a brief moment, NAIT's philosopher, a somewhat uninspiring position. However, read what he has to say very carefully and THINK. It may be worthwhile in the end.

Utter and complete blackness enveloped everything. Slowly from the vacuum a shape appeared. It was a bone. A head appeared and it was my own. The bone began to beat the head mercilessly until its stagnant consciousness was cracked and a new perception was born within me. I have cradled the bone to my breast and nurtured my vision. I have been asked to tell what I've seen. Here is the tale, pretend it's a fable if you wish.

Seven months ago, come an autumn day, sunshine falling round about a young boy. His feet weren't bare but his mind was - of dogmatic dead facts. Cleansed by summer lazies. Heart light and floating, he went eager with the joy of expected knowledge. Towards first day of new school he was walking sure of self ability to master chosen technology until he'd created an art form. He entered yon doors of NAIT, cold slate surrounding and there in grey halls his heart fell - kerplop - and lay bleeding on the concrete, and he, eyes glazed, wandered aimlessly off. Good janitor coming along saw sad bleeding heart and realizing how sacred the NAIT image, bent quickly and swept it into a closet - and no one knew.

Except a few of us.

I've seen that boy wandering the halls - empty. I've seen him at noon by the hundreds, I've seen him alone at midnite. I looked within and saw myself empty and began my search with a few friends.

We have looked in closets and have been harassed. Some unidentified pressure has been applied to urge us to discontinue our search and conform. Two weeks ago we tried a door that said "Executive Elections" and the pressure to discontinue our search was increased. Two of my friends have discontinued the search. They said, "We have too much to lose." I have been told this also, "Boy, you have too much to lose". It's like a grey cloud hanging over all of us. A nebulous threat that no one will admit to making. But

still, we've all got too much to lose.

Too much to lose to search? People, we've already lost too much not to search. Indeed, most of us are no longer able to search as the election has shown.

We have been pushed and driven by endless time schedules and disconnected technical facts into a state of acute schitzophrenia. "Oh God Damn it, I've got a test in physics tomorrow and I can't concentrate - I'm really involved in this photographic assignment." Continuously this is the atmosphere. Attempting to wrench the mind from its natural flow of interest, and brutalize it into structured areas of forced knowledge. Back and forth we're forced to jump to fit a static time schedule. Unfortunately our minds never quite make the transition and our time and energy is wasted. Worse by far, having continuously been

forced to memorize bits of unrelated information and having never been given the opportunity of pursuing an area of interest until satisfied, our minds give up the struggle to relate. We become, as individuals, a collection of disconnected facts. We have no central entity to identify with, and thus we die, if not physically then spiritually and socially.

It seems better to me to integrate our beings. This can be encouraged here at NAIT, if we're given the freedom of deciding for ourselves our own patterns of study and the time to develop an area of learning until we have discovered its relationship to ourselves, and to our environment. This is what I mean by developing a technology into an art form. When we have a working knowledge of all the various aspects of our technology and the awareness of how the aspects relate to each other we can

begin to be truly creative and work past our present knowledge to develop new techniques. Would you not rather develop into an artist in this sense than an automation which has facts fed in one end and somehow by tremendous mental turmoil within produces mechanical shit at the other end?

One of the existing media which could be used to develop this self awareness and freedom of thought in the english course. It could be converted to a free period where the students, themselves, provide the direction of the discussion. The instructor would be a catalyst, but not an information bank forcing his social values upon the students.

Bill Mills attempted to give his students this freedom, and was fired. Why? He refused to grade his students because evaluation by his personal standards would des-

troy their free development. The administration said there is no room at NAIT for people with these advanced methods. I say make room. What the hell is the administration for if not to place each individual where his personal worth is most valuable. However no room was made. Why? Does this mean that the administration is so blind that they are unable to see the value of Bill Mills and other instructors with progressive ideas. Why weren't Mills students asked to evaluate him? They had no say in his being fired. Why? After all, they are the ones best qualified to judge him. Other english teachers have said he was an inspiration. In a few years when eyes begin to open, we will need people like Mills, for leadership at NAIT, but they'll be gone: fired, because they didn't fit into a dying educational system.

During the recent campaign, a number of suggestions for basic policy change at NAIT were recommended by the Headslate. I would like to make it clear that each change in itself is insignificant. Our aim is to develop an atmosphere at NAIT conducive to creative learning. We do not want an atmosphere of hostility between the administration, faculty, and students. This would be a destructive development. We feel that the administration has valuable leadership qualities which are needed. However, with age the energy level decreases. The administration needs a kick in the ass, and the students will provide that energy. To do this we need power.

It's gotten late along and my head is sore from all the banging, so I guess I'll wander hither away into hazy blue distances. Somewhere our tale took a nasy turn, but my tongue goes its own way too. Go back to sleep children and dream about the dream we're all living. Watch the crank turn and watch yourselves being mass produced. Oh my yes, with pretty shining faces and bright eyes ready with an infinity of facts, but don't look too deep because you'll find you're rotting inside. And remember when all the pretty lies and promises are gone, me and my bone will still be here. Shhh, quiet now - go back to sleep - I hope I didn't disturb you.

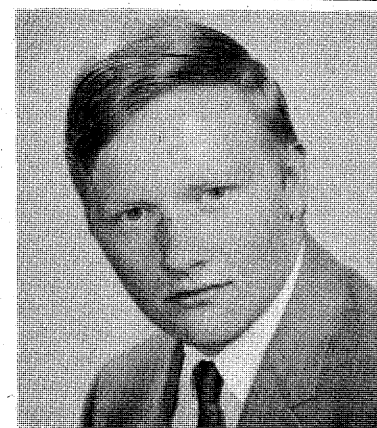
NAIT'S MILES FOR MILLIONS COMMITTEE

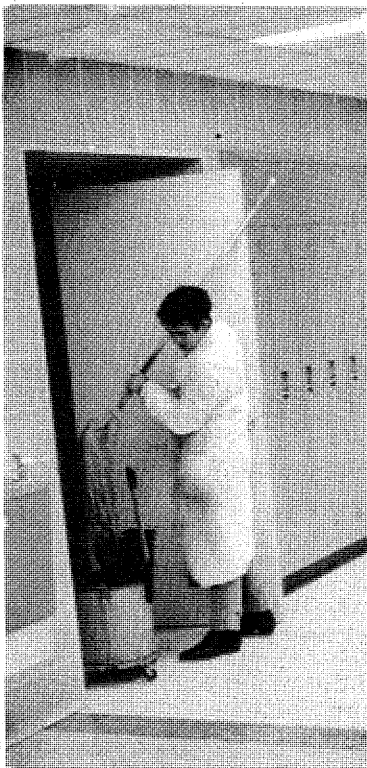

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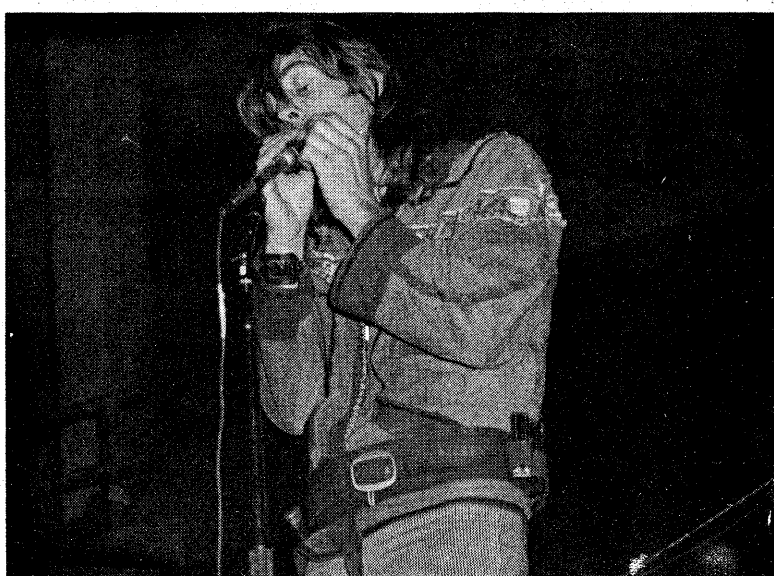
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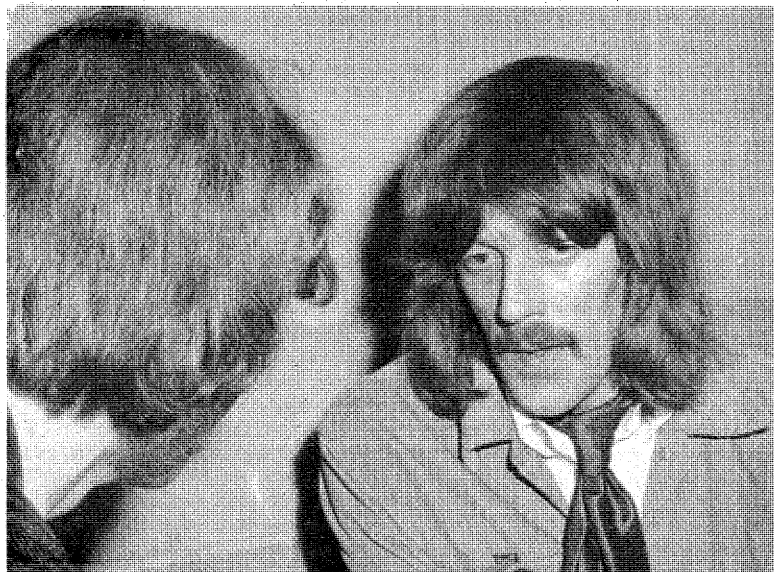


VANCOUVER SPRING

Photographer, Luby Todoruk, and I spent our Easter in Vancouver to catch some of the artists that were appearing there. We stayed with an old friend of mine, Jim Allan who manages many groups around the Vancouver mainland and writes a column for the Laby Columbian. Jim Allan is fast gaining a reputation as "the master of the pun". As a matter of fact, people analyze every sentence he speaks, thinking they might have missed one.

The first night in town, Jim took us to see a band he is managing called "Spring", at a club called Big Mothers. I was so impressed with the group that I went to see them again three times during our six day stay. As the name implies, "Spring" is refreshing, warm and here to stay.

They have all done studio work up and down the coasts backing up various recording artists. Bob Buckley, vocals, guitar, piano, organ, xylophone, flute, and saxophone does most of the writing for the group. Both he and Terry Frewer, lead vocalist, and guitar, have music degrees from UBC. They were part of the group backing up Tom Northcott.

Edmontonian, Bob Fisher, formerly with The Pretty Boss, plays drums. Bob, along with bassist Pete McKinnley provides the groups' rhythmic patterns. "Spring" are playing with the Vancouver Symphony Orchestra early next month. Bob Buckley wrote the entire score for all the members of the orchestra. Hopefully they will be coming to town fairly soon. When they come, be sure to see them. Their music will appeal to everyone's taste. If you're deaf, come anyway, their stage act is great too.

Thursday afternoon, I met Luby's brother, Ihor. Ihor Todoruk, did the graphics and publishing of a book called 555-1212. The book sold out in the Edmonton area two days after an interview with Ihor appeared in the Journal.

He is now publisher, editor, and art director of a magazine called "Poppin". Having looked at the first issue (April 1969) I was really surprised at the quality of the magazine. It deals mainly with music but will also cover controversial items in the near future.

Hand Zelvallos of the Rolling Stones, will soon take over as editor. There have been 10,000 copies of the first edition printed and Ihor plans to build onto this every month. If you would like to contribute in the form of articles or manuscripts, please write to:

Just before we left Edmonton, we heard that Jeff Beck's group had broken up and therefore would not be playing. When we arrived we found out that the substitute would be Bo Diddley. On the day of the show, Bo Diddley did not appear because of his fear of flying.

The day after that, there was supposed to be a concert featuring Canned Heat and The Grassroots. When we arrived at the door of the auditorium, we were met with a large sign (see picture). A press conference on a riverboat plan-

ned for the following day was also cancelled because of the groups' failure to show.

Complete interviews with John Mayall and Jon Lord of Deep Purple will be published in the next edition of the Nugget.

WITNESS, (formerly Witness Inc.) will be playing at Zorba's from April 16 to April 20. From what I've heard about them, they will be a great group.

At the time of this writing, Tommy James and the Shondells are on stage of the Kinsman Field

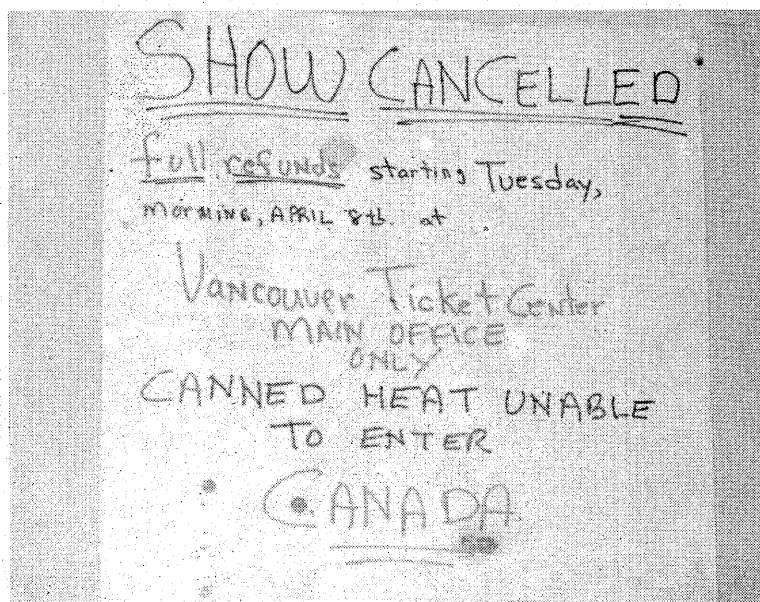
for three songs.

I'll start at the beginning. Arvi Liimatainen and I met at the door and went inside to catch the warm up act. The Montreal quintet, whose name I didn't even catch, were totally unimaginative. They played a few cuts from top selling LP's and all in all got the show off to a dull start. Many of our local bands could have done a better job. I then trundled backstage to interview the man who has had at least 10 singles in the top ten.

All the members of the group turned out to be great people to talk to and very co-operative. Tommy James indirectly stated that he thought his commercial music was an art. Does music that is geared for the 12 year old strike you as being an art form?

Anyway, they went to do their show while I hoped the material they would do would be better than their records. It wasn't. No wonder the group has had so little exposure after having 10 singles and 6 LP's do so well.

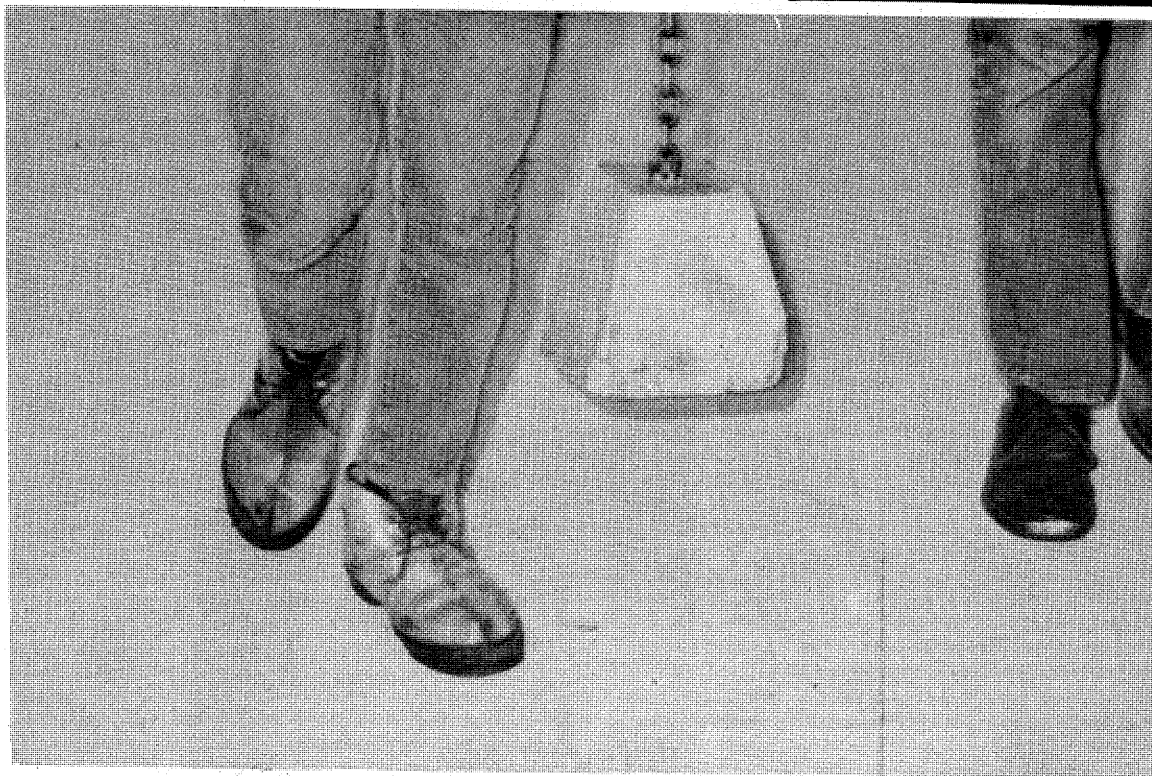

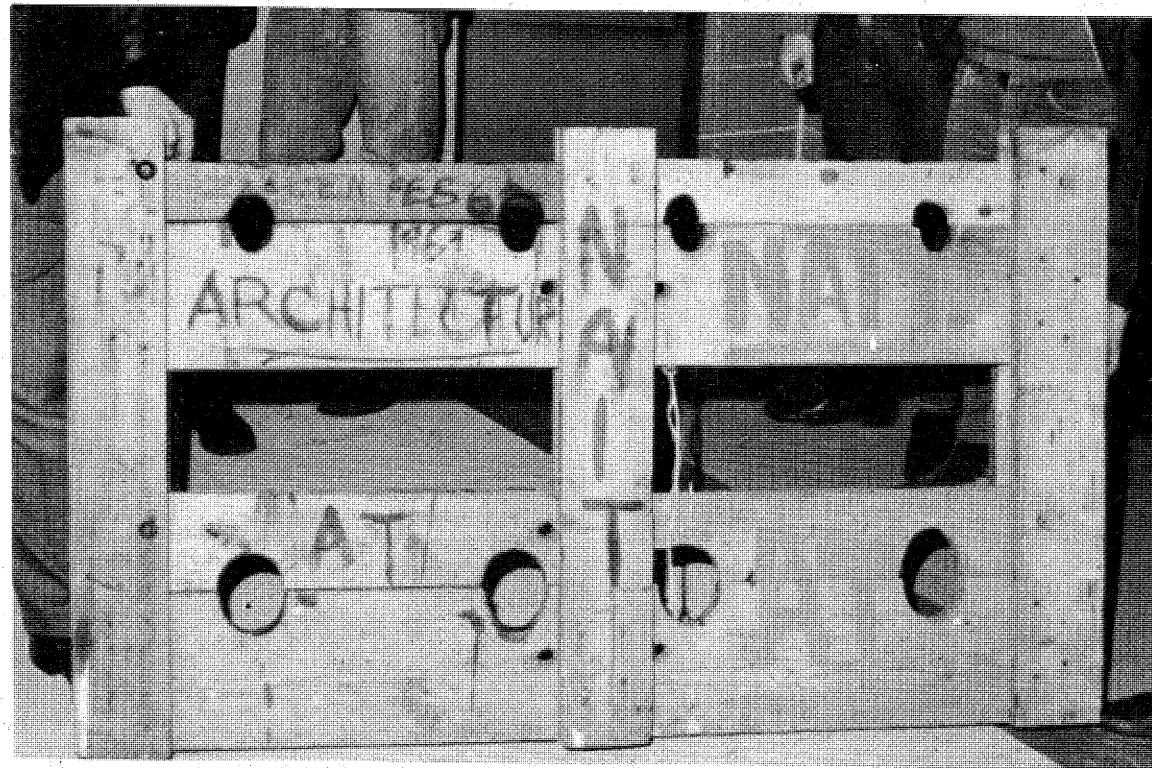

CUSO AND THE MARCH FOR MILLIONS

EDMONTON CONTRIBUTION

As a result of the March for Millions and local recruitment, Edmontonians have a large involvement in CUSO both at home and overseas.

Ten percent (32,600) of last year's march went to CUSO. It went towards supporting 13 of the 33 volunteers recruited in Edmonton from the University, NAIT, and from the public. Each of these thirteen were residents of Edmonton who volunteered their training to CUSO.

The cost of CUSO is \$2,500.00 per volunteer per year. This compares favourably to the Peace Corps' cost of \$8,000 and the Canadian Government External Aid Office of \$19,000.00, for each person in the field each year. CUSO expenses are kept to a bare minimum because overseas salaries are paid by the host country, and because much of the administrative work done in Canada is performed by voluntary workers on Local Committees at Universities and Technical institutes. Furthermore, CUSO receives an estimated \$400,000.00 worth of free advertising from the radio, TV and newspaper industry in Canada. Funds invested by Canadians in CUSO cannot be misspent in Canada. Funds in-go to support CUSO volunteers who are making a direct contribution to the development of the new nations.

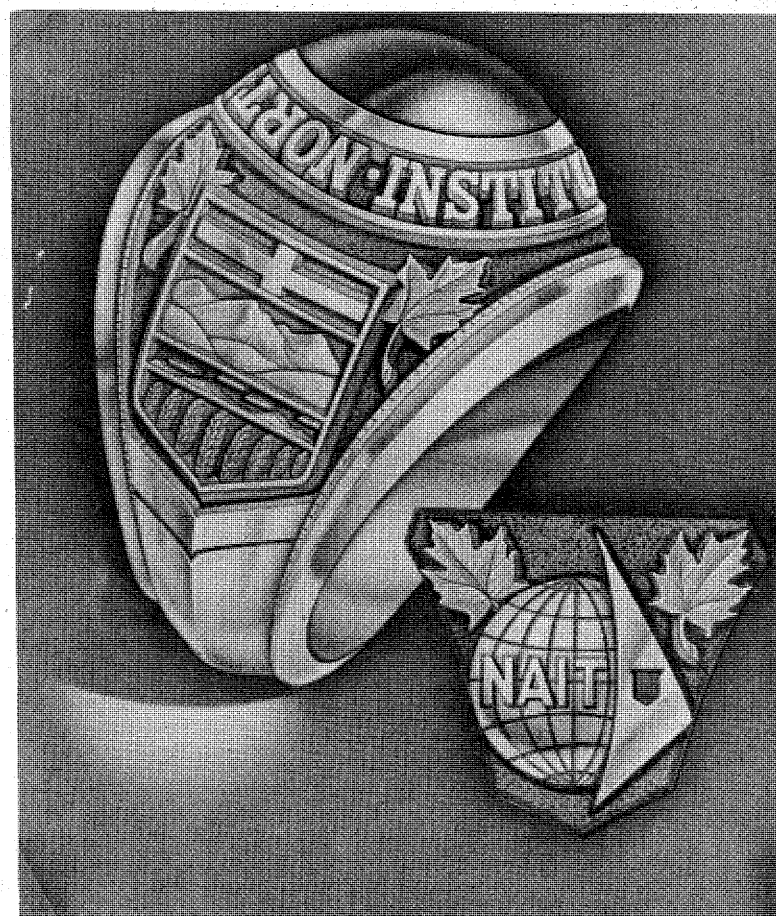

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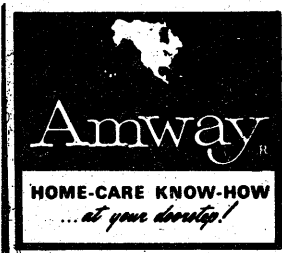
