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### SAIT ON TASK FORCE FOR HOUSING

Education Minister Robert Clark has announced the appointment of a five-man task force to enquire into the possibility of private enterprise providing student housing for the Southern Alberta Institute of Technology.

Mr. Clark said the task force, which is to hold its first meeting at SAIT December 11, will examine ways and means by which the province may involve private enterprise in such an undertaking.

Members of the task are: J.P. Mitchell, director of technical and vocational education for the province; F.C. Jorgenson, president of SAIT; B.R. Orysiuk, executive director of the Alberta Housing and Urban Renewal Corporation; J.F. Hunt, director of design and construction, provincial department of public works; and Robert Oleniuk president of the SAITStu-

dents' Association.

Mr. Mitchell said if the private enterprise concept is found to be feasible, a proposal will be developed for public tender. He said he expects that the task force will have a report prepared "as soon as possible."

Mr. Mitchell pointed out that SAIT does not have on-campus student housing and that the need for studen accommodation has been expressed previously. At present, SAIT students have to find off-campus accommodation.

It has been suggested that private enterprise can be more efficient than a public body in operating student residences. And this type of arrangement has been used on some campuses in the western United States.



would build a student housing structure and that it would then be operated and administered by a private concern.

He said there is a need for buildings which could accommodate about 1,200 single students a another 250 married students. Mr. Clark has indicated that student housing could appear by 1973.

Mr. Mitchell said the task force will consider both on-campus and off-campus locations for the residences. He said an on-campus location will have to be considered particularly in the light of proposals regarding rapid transit in the area.

"I would expect that we will find many factors to be taken into consideration -- architectural, engineering, legal, financial -and likely will have to call upon additional persons to assist us," he said.

Edmonton, like every other center of reasonable size, has a record industry. A record industry hich is fast expanding and now houses three professional quality recording students which have produced three local albums. All should be released by this time next month. In this brief space, I would like to write about each studio and some of the artists it has recorded. Lengthy articles and record reviews will follow on each of the artists.

The Patmacs - Park Lane Studio
Park Lane Studios are located
at the rear of Wes Dakus' Spane
International just off 109 St. It
is run by Barry Allen, one of the
nicest people involved in music
in this city. The first album to
be recorded in this studio, "Open
House With the Patmacs", (Capital ST 6327) has recently been
released. It was produced by Capital's Gary Buck and engineered
by Barry.

The Patmacs are a folk, ethnic, Irish Ballad type of group.
They have a very strong following
around Edmonton due mostly to
their night club appearances. The
Patmacs are led by Carl Peterson (formerly of the Kingbeez),
who handles most of the lead
singing, as well as playing Cello, mandolin and guitar. The rest
of the group is comprised of Steve
Fearns, drum guitar, and vocals,
Larry Lyons, bass, Bill Hailey
(?) accordian and beautiful vocalists Karen and Carol Tripps.

Unfortunately the recording quality of the album isn't too good but the material contained within the album makes up for it.

Dallas Henson, Russ Thornberry Damon Studios

Damon Studios having only been in production since this fall have done quite a lot of recording. Run by Don Patches (audio for CBC) and Gary MacDonall (CJCA) the udio offers complete record production including commercial jing-les.

Dallas Henson's first single was recorded at Damon and is receiving very favorable reactions within the industry. "Stage of Life", which he penned himself, is being programmed by every local station except CHED and sales have been very good. Many stations in fact have stated that it is the best ever produced single from Alberta. RCA Victor's Barry Haugen, signed Dallas Henson to that label, and has done excellent promotion for the record.

Another Damon product will be the soon to be released Russ Thornberry album (London Records). The folksigner, who now resides in Edmonton has a very impressive past having played with the Pozo Seco Singers and the New Christy Minstrels. CROW MUSIC - Amaret Records ST 5002

Crows first album is quite impressive and I'm looking forward

For Shoes and the "CASUAL" Look — Visit our "CASUAL" Department On the Second Floor to their next. With so many groups continually doing one good song and fading under the dust of the "groove yard", Crow with this album shows that they are not that type of group.

Every song on the album displays good music. My favourite is "Thoughts" a slow moving song building up to a verse using full echo on the vocals. The effect makes the song very powerful. "Da Da Song and Busy Days," "Evil Woman" Crow's virtually unplayed single, and "Listen to The Bop" a song dedicated to and played in the style of Chuch Berry are also fine tunes.

Essentially, the Chicago quintet's style is hard rock with many tight changes and good harmony. The lead singer has a low deep voice similar to John Kay's of Steppenwolf.

The album cover pictures the group on souped up motorcycles wearing leather jackets, and riding down an alley. The cover graphically depicts Crow's hard rock sounds.

NILSSON "HARRY" RCA LSP 4197

Harry Nilsson, a native of Los Angeles was formerly a data-computer supervisor who turned to writing songs professionally five years ago. In that time he has copywritten some 60 songs and become John Lennon's favourite composer. Nilsson's two earlier albums went almost nowhere in the charts but it took "Everybody's Talkin'" (ironically the song was composed by Fred Neil) to bring him public acknowledgement.

The song was initially released a couple of years ago but, received very little airplay. The producer of "Midnight Cowboy" heard it and decided to use it as the title song for the movie. RCA re-released it and sold over a million copies.

Nilsson was responsible for writing Three Dog Night's hit "One" as well as two Tom Northcott singles "1941" and "Rainmaker" which is currently number two in Vancouver.

The album itself contains Nilsson's current single "I guess the Lord Must Be in New York City", "Rainmaker", "Mother Nature's Son" and "Simon Smith and the Amazing Dancing Bear". Most of the songs are composed by Nilsson which alone makes the album very worthwhile.

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


#### ROUND SOUND-TROYKA

Troyka are an exceptional group of musicians who have their own 8-track recording studio (one of the best in Canada) but unfortunately are almost unknown in their home town of Edmonton. They have been together a total of five years but were formerly called The Royal Family. Troyka released two singles under that name both of which sold an impressive number of copies. The group have been touring around Eastern Canada and New York which eventually led to a contract with Atlantic Records. Troyka's first album will be released internationally on that label January 16 and should put them into the international spotlight.

I've heard the tapes of the album and they are excellent. The quality is comparable to anything previously recorded. We will certainly be hearing much of this group in the very near future. Troyka consists of Michal Richards on drums and vocals, Bob Edwards, on guitar and Rumko Lukaivietsky on bass. The album was produced by the group themselves with the help of Dr. Richards who engineered it.

Round Studios overlooks the river valley and provides a very conducive artistic atmosphere for recording. The studio is quickly acquiring a name and Canned Heat are hoping to record there.

#### EDUCATION FOR MARRIAGE

by the NAIT students, an Education for Marriage series will be held at NAIT. This series of six lectures and discussions will be designed primarily for the students who are either engaged or who are married.

This series will be co-sponsored by the NAIT Student Counselling Services and the Edmonton Family Services Association.

A suggested six week series (one evening per week) of lectures and group discussions deals with the following basic aspects of marriage،

1. Law

Legal aspects of the marriage vow, property, insurance, wills, mortgages, children. This lecture-discussion will be led by a legal expert.

2. Money

A home economist, banker, or chartered life underwriter will discuss budgets, credits, financing. life insurance, and money problems.

3. Physical

A medical doctor will discuss male and female anatomy, conception and birth control, and values of sex and children in marriage. 4. Emotional

The feelings that determine your choice of mate, the nature of the marriage relationship, and the ef-

If sufficient interest is shown fects of children in marriage will be presented by a psychiatrist or family counsellor.

5. Spiritual

The underlying values of marriage and family life will be presented by a minister.

6. Your Marriage

The final discussion, led by a family counsellor, will deal with common problems in early marriage, establishing good communication patterns, and a summarization of the services.

The Edmonton Family Service Association charges \$10 per couple for this series.

If you are interested in attending and in participating in this series of lectures and discussions please leave you name with the secretary or a counsellor at the NAIT Student Counselling Services, T112 grey phone 158.

Please remember that this Education for Marriage Series will only be offered if enough students are willing to attend and participate in the series. At least six couples are needed.

The dates and times of this series will be announced later. Each meeting will be held weekly and will probably begin at about 7:30 p.m. It is quite likely that the series will begin in March.

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#### **SLAVE SALE???**

## SIMON

VANCOUVER - The striking faculty and students at Simon Fraser University (SFU) called off the strike of the Political Science and Anthropology Department (PSA) in early November. The weight of a blanket "anti-disruptions" injunction broke the remaining support for picketing and rallies aimed at winning new support for the strike.

Since the calling off of the strike, three of the suspended faculty members have dropped their appeals against the administration. The administration is proceeding to get rid of them and five other suspended faculty. They have not been permitted to resume teaching responsibilities. Many of their courses have been cancelled or taken over by other professors.

The SFU administration is also proceeding with a damage suit against 14 strike activists named in the B.C. Supreme Court injunction.

The combined assualt of the Strand administration, the Social Credit government and the courts has again scored a defeat against the student movement for university democratization. Coming on the heels of the SFU 114 fiasco the PSA defeat calls for a vigorous and thorough discussion within the student movement. Important lessons can be learned from these twin defeats.

Most importantly, the radical leadership on SFU campus has yet to learn how to conduct a defensive struggle; to turn the struggle and the issues towards the is paid in full. whole student body; and to reach out into the broader social arena off campus for allies and support. Similar problems were encountered in the case of the SFU 114.

Three of the 114 who pleaded not guilty have had their cases dismissed. One, Mike Jones, organizer of the Vancouver Young Socialists, was found guilty and faced the victimization of stiff whether or not to accept. fines and some will serve iail sentences. The movement cannot go forward unless it is prepared such repression.

#### RADICAL EDUCATION PROPOSAL

"The free discussion of political ideas in the high schools is a prerequisite for an informed and conscious citizenry" declared a resolution passed here by the provincial convention of the New Democratic Party

A further resolution declared that there should be:

- \* New types of governing structures be developed which will allow students, faculty, staff and community spokesmen (including workers and farmers) to make decisions in all areas of importance...in education
- in admission procedures to stu- Foreign Ownership of Industry in

dents of econimically poor families who do not have the artificial qualifications required, such as numbers of credits in high schools

- Tuition fees should be abolished and students paid a living wage. Students and instructors should be able to involve themselves in left wing political activity without distrimination in hiring or layoff, or expulsion or other descrimination being taken. Left wingers are the only ones who are subject to harassment for their ideas, it was felt, therefore the resolution was made specific.
- Research assistance and facilities are extended to tenants associations, trade unions, co-operatives, and other similar groups for their projects and investigations.

One delegate said that the number of resolutions dealing with school curricula are indicative of the great extent to which a combination of instructor bias and textbook bias obscure whole areas of the Canadian society.

"The role of women in history has been consistently under played or ignored in high schools and institutions of higher learning". the adopted resolutions say. "A generation of youth is growing up quite often hostile, indifferent or with misunderstanding towards the aims and aspirations of the trade union movement.

The solutions posed by the resolutions is the affirmation of the rights of students "to organize political clubs and to have absolute freedom of discussion, assembly, association and distribution of material" which represent partisan viewpoints on political westions "Women should written back into history and social science texts of our schools at all levels," states one resolutopn, while the trade union movement should be represented at all levels of education by text books whose writing is supervised by the Candian Labour Congress.

The resolutions reflected a major victory for the opposition grouping within the party known as the "Waffle" Caucus. 
NUGGET CRUSHES CHNR

CHOCOLATE MARSHMALLOW ROLL

2 squares unsweetened chocolate

1 can Eagle brand milk

1 1/2 cup graham wafers (18)

1 cup fine shredded coconut 2 teaspoons vanilla

Melt chocolate and add milk. Cook in double boiler 10-15 minutes. Add graham wafers, coconut and walnuts. Add vanilla just as you take mixture off stove. Arrange piece of wax paper approx. 20 inches long on table and sprinkle with plenty of coconut. Place mixture on top of coconut and pat down in a rectangular piece about 1/2 inch thick and approximately 18" x 6". Dip fingers in cold water as you pat to avoid sticking. Place a row of marshmallows down the center close together. By picking up the long side of the mixture with wax paper, roll it over the marshmallows. Do the same from the other side and pinch together through the wax paper, pinning the roll. When complete, transfer roll to foil wrap and freeze. When ready to serve simply remove from freezer and slice about 1/2 inch thick.
