RAILROAD COUNCIL

They helped in the following ways:

On Tuesday Distributive had a habit of losing a certain wheel, and after the disappearance for the second time decided they had had enough. They started spreading the word that if the wheel was not returned by 2:00 P.M. that whoever had it would have their queen disqualified.

How many times have you listened to one or another person in your group state without equivocation that he has the answers to some complicated problems in life? Did you admire and perhaps envy such confidence? Did the poise and sense of direction the person seemed to possess make you long for a similar trait? Perhaps you said to yourself "I wish I had the intelligence to solve problems like he does".

Before you go too far down the road of self pity and before you develop too much of an inferiority complex (wondering why you weren't gifted with such insight) let me disburse a few thoughts for your consideration and then perhaps you won't feel too bad.

President Johnson was sure he "knew" what he was doing when he escalated the war in Viet Nam; the greatest minds in the world "knew" that the world was flat in the middle ages; and many people today "know" what a person is like simply by the way he dresses or combs his hair or speaks in public. An interesting thing to observe is the relation-

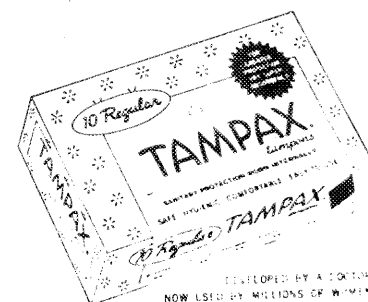

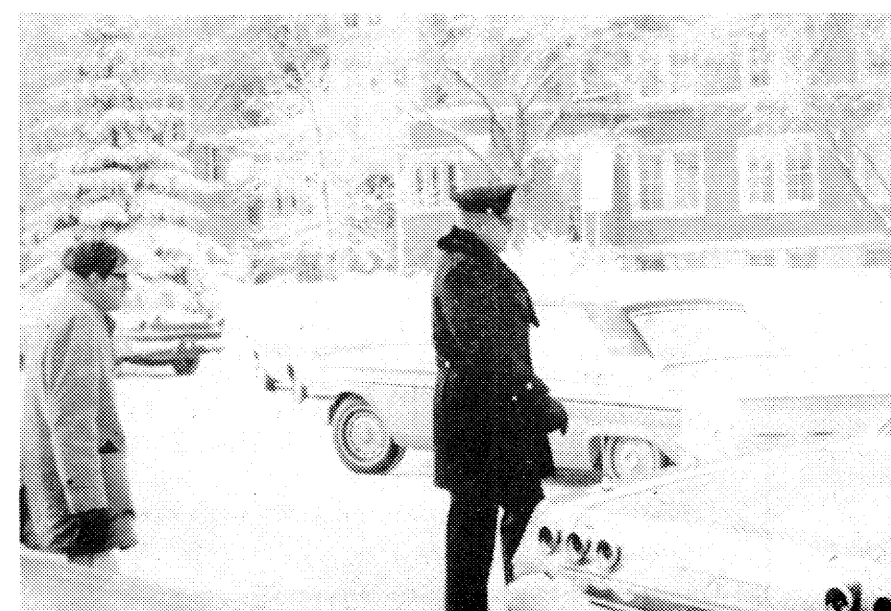

THE HARPERS BIZARRE

Eldridge Cleaver-Black Panther

Eldridge Cleaver was born in Little Rock, Arkansas in 1935. His family later moved to Los Angeles and he was raised in the negro ghetto there.



In 1958 he was sentenced to 14 years in jail for assault with intent to kill and rape. He got his parole in December of 1966 and soon after that he joined the black militant group - the Black Panthers (the Black Panthers were formed in Oakland, California, 1966, by Huey Newton and Bobby Seale) and today the party has up to 5000 members throughout the United States.

Eldridge Cleaver is probably best known for his book on the American racial scene - *Soul on Ice* and he is also one of the editors of *Ramparts* magazine.

Unknown by many Canadians, Cleaver ran for the Presidency of the United States in the last federal election as the nominee of the largely white majority Peace

and Freedom Party. Throughout the campaign, he based his platform on *Soul on Ice* (remember Mein Kampf) and he called for the withdrawal of U.S. troops in Viet Nam and immediate social reform of the American society.

The Black Panther Party today is growing rapidly in the United States and members of the Party are often seen at negro meetings throughout urban communities and large cities. They are identifiable by their black leather jackets, black berets, and empty .50 calibre shell worn around their necks with rawhide.

Although many white citizens and the police consider them dangerous, New York City Human Rights Commissioner-William Booth considers them an asset to the community by what he calls helping "relieve tensions in the community". Prominent Americans such as James Baldwin, Marlon Brandon, LeRoi Jones, Norman Mailer and the widow of Malcolm X have pledged their support to Cleaver in his battle against the white society.

What do the Black Panthers stand for? The policy of the Black Panthers policy is underlined in ten steps:

- 1.) Freedom for black people.
- 2.) Full employment.
- 3.) Adequate housing.
- 4.) Decent Education.
- 5.) Black men to be exempt from military duty.
- 6.) Stoppage of robbery of black people in their own community by white racist businessmen.
- 7.) End to police brutality.

- 8.) Negro's released from jail.
- 9.) Fair trials.
- 10.) Land, money, clothing, justice, and peace.

Although this is asking a lot, especially points 5.) and 8.). Eldridge Cleaver seems determined in his bid to lead his followers to what he calls "the American Dream".

The Black Panthers oppose Adam Clayton Powell, the negro congressman because "He's not militant enough and he represents only the black middle class, not the masses".

A discrepancy shows at this point. In point 10.) of the programme of the Black Panthers, Cleaver has stated that his party wants peace and he has stated that they opposed Adam Clayton Powell and probably this would also include the deceased Martin Luther King.

Eldridge Cleaver has stated that if the Party's demands are not met, an underground guerilla movement will be started in major cities of the United States. It should be interesting to see what happens to "the American Dream".

IN THE GROOVE

Harpers Bizarre brought genuine Santa Cruz, California sunshine into Edmonton at their recent concert in the new Students Union Building at the University of Alberta. Despite thirty below temperatures both of their shows were sold out and most people there, are still talking about them even now. Harpers Bizarre have a "happy" sound. Their simple melodies float into your ears and come out of your mouth in the form of a smile. Their on-stage wit broke up and completely captivated the audience. Instrumentally, many of Harpers Bizarre arrangements are jazz influenced and always interesting.

Dick Scoppettone and blond haired Ted Templeman are the lead singers of the group. Ted is the most versatile musician in the group playing trumpet, drums and guitar. Dick Yount plays bass, sings and grabs the audience with his amazing sense of humor. The drummer is 6' 3", John Petersen, formerly with the Beau Brummels. Through the help of the university promoters (see Electronics Tech., they're not all bad) I talked to Harpers Bizarre between their sets.

I mentioned to Ted Templeman that when the group knock something they do it with a great deal of taste. He said they were not a protest group, but that they do have their own social comments purposely done in a subtle way. I asked Dick Yount if Harpers Bizarre plan to record any more old standards as they've done in the past. He stated that two songs they plan to record are "There's a Boat Leaving Soon for New York" by Gershwin and "As Time Goes By". They will both be included on their next LP. Dick Scoppettone mentioned that this LP will feature more real rock and roll and have less

orchestration in it. I told John Petersen that I thought Harpers Bizarre were more of a vocal group than an instrumental group where-by Dick Yount wittingly responded with "the vocal part is instrumental in the total sound." Ted Templeman told me that some of their material was influenced by the old folk groups and jazz groups. Their on-stage arrangements are influenced by some of the R and B groups but the group is not influenced by any individual artists.

After the interview, Harpers Bizarre went on to play a full one and a half hour set which included an encore. It's great to see a top group play for that length of time and still do an encore. Most groups I've seen have played less than an hour (sometimes half of that) and an encore seems to be a forgotten thing.

Harpers Bizarre currently have three LP's on the record shelves. "Feelin' Groovy", (Warner Bros. 1693) their first, was of course released after their million seller by the same name. "Anything Goes" (W. 1716) which I consider the groups best and "The Secret Life of Harpers Bizarre" (W. 1739) their latest.

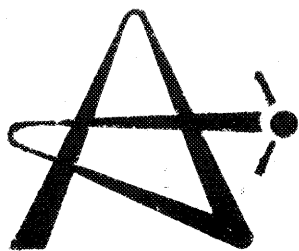
THE NEWEST THING IN T.V.

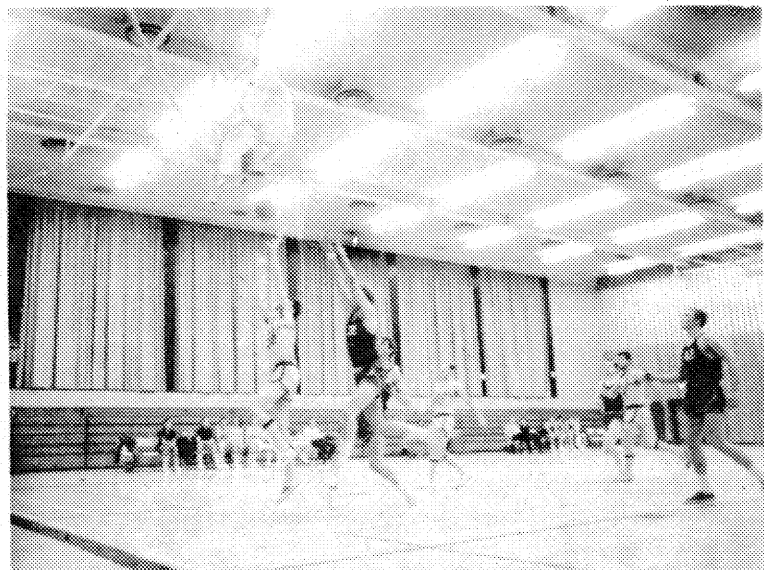

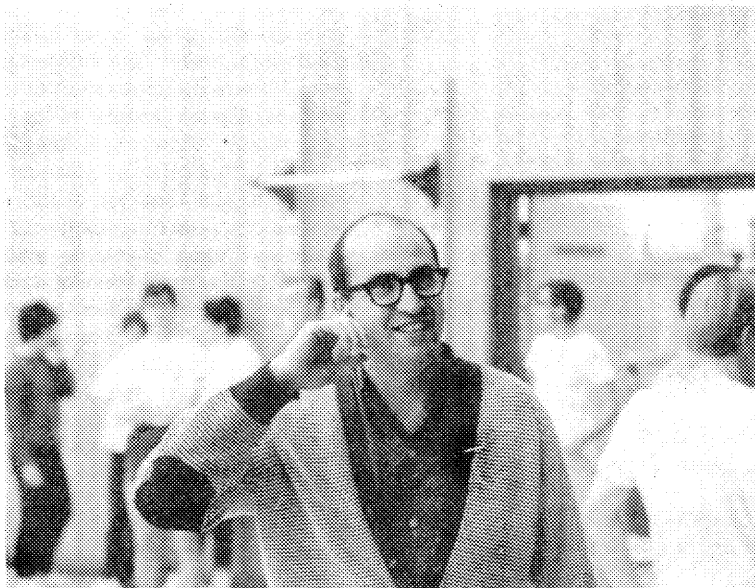

Mr. Paranoid's Paradise
