EDITORIAL


Journalism could very well be one of the most important occupations in the world today. To continue highly advanced networks of mass communication, more and more skilled journalists will be used to supply fast, efficient, factual information from all corners of the world. The point to remember is that these people must be TRAINED to work in a world where tomorrows news is wanted yesterday. Most of Canada's top Technological Institutes have relaized this need for trained writers, and are offering courses in Journalism.

Unfortunately here at NAIT this type of course is not offered, and we are losing much needed writing talent to other parts of Canada and even the United States. The part that hurts is that even SAIT has a Journalism course offered which compares favorably to the course offered by the Ryerson Institute of Technology in Toronto, which is probably one of the best in Canada.

People have often asked Larry Bush and myself why other Canadian Techs can put out student newspapers every third, second, or even once a day while we have an edition every two weeks. The reason is that they have people who are working in the journalistic field, and a student newspaper fits in well with their courses. They generally have little trouble in staffing their paper. But these people are getting experience in the job they will be doing after graduation.

Why isn't Journalism offered at NAIT? Maybe the administration can't see the value in it that has been noticed by other top Canadian Institutes. It would be of considerable value to offer Journalism at NAIT - if even on a trial basis.

The need for qualified journalists has steadily increased in the past decade, and we should not fall behind the other Technical Institutes in the variety of courses offered.

When watching Tim Buckley in concert it is hard to visualize him in a football outfit or even playing "Lonie Lonie" on stage. At fifteen, however, he did play quarterback on his varsity team (Buckley only weighed 110 pounds at the time) and later the selftaught guitarist played in various country and western bands. Buckley hung around with car clubs, got arrested occasionally and played what he calls "carburetor soul."

His first LP release, over two years ago, was simply entitled Tim Buckley. It met with some favorable reviews but dealt mainly with love songs and easy flowing melodies. "Goodbye and Hello" his second album release is my favorite. The lyrics are poetic, sometimes critical and all sung with conviction. The title song "Goodbye and Hello" is a structural masterpiece. Co-quthored by Larry Beckett, as most of Buckley's songs are, it features three separate structures and themes; anger, hope and redemption.

Buckley puts down the older generation and places his faith in the new. Other songs on the album condemn war and drugs.

On Buckley's latest LP, Happy Sad, he seems to have lost much of the old faith he once had. Some of his songs approach blues structures which he had not done previously. If my interpretations are correct, he has matured much like Phil Oches. On Oches' LP, "Rehearsals for Retirement" he is also very down, touched off obviously by the Chicago riots.

Buckley's recent appearance in Edmonton turned out to be one of his best shows this year. Buckley and his three back up musicians were great. Carter Collins, the percusionist, plays congo drums which gave a very weird and haunting Afro-Cuban beat.

Tim Buckley avoided all the nicities of being an entertainer. He walked out and played without a word. When he played you knew that he was playing for you and putting everything into it. Almost at an awe mood, nobody was dis-

Buckley then said a few things he believed and almost insulted the audience. You've probably read a full account of that in the Jour-



"Much of the irrational juvenile violence and killing that has written a new chapter of shame and tradegy is traceable directly to this hemp intoxication...I wrote articles for magazines; our agents gave hundreds of lectures to parents, educators, social and civic leaders. Yet recently in the final report of the combined committee of the American Bar Association and the American Medical Association on narcotics, it was concluded that "Crimes of violence are rarely, and sexual crimes are almost never, committed by addicts." Dr. George Tayleur Stockings, (Cited in the Marijuana Papers) England's most noted experimental psychiatrist, has concluded:

"Prolonged use of the drug (marijuana) does not lead of physical, mental, or moral degeneration, nor have we observed any permanent deleterious effects from its continued use. Quite the contrary, marijuana and its derivatives and allied synthetics have potentially valuable therapeutic ap plications which merit future investigations."

5. An increased perception except that actual artistic output does He further mentions that the only link between marijuana and the addicting chemicals is that it is illegal. Drs. Samuel Allentuck and Karl Bowman, as cited in The Marijuana Papers, state another effect from the use of marijuana.

"Attention, concentration and comprehension are only slightly disturbed, as is evidenced by the fact that the results in his (the users) educational achievement tests are only slightly lowered."

In summary, based upon the limited investigation carried out by this writer, it seems that marijuana is an innocuous chemical a sort of fool's gold for the mind. There seems to be no rational argument to justify still legal sanctions against its use. Excessive use of the drug is more likely to indicate a personal social unhappiness which may bear investigation, but assumptions that the drug is the causative factor are probably invalid.

The reader of this report will be guilty of a logical fallacy if he assumes the writer of this paper is encouraging him to use marijuana. The severe legal penalties are quite real and the simple pleasure of its use is not worth all the fuss of a legal hassle.

The October 1 Council meeting was called to order at 5:20.

The first moton was put forward by Swede Knox. He proposed a grant of 50 dollars from NAITSA to Mr. Puffer to allow him to attend a volley-ball coaches' clinic in Calgary. Mr. Puffer coaches the men's and women's volley-ball teams. The registration fee is \$5; travel expenses, \$30; and accommodations are \$15. The motion was passed by Council after it was pointed out that Mr. Puffer is likely to continue as coach for a few more years.

The Business Admin rep said that there were some clubs that were in financial difficulties due to lack of andparticipation, and that such feescollecting would increase participation. 


