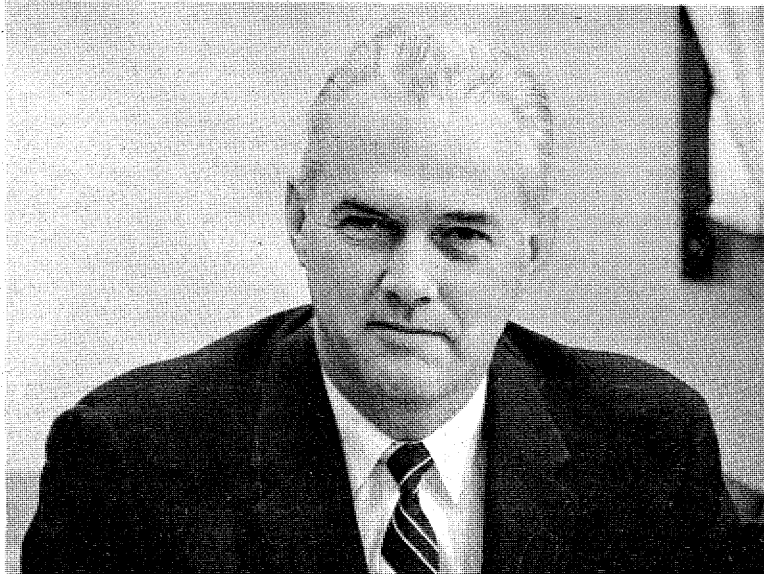

NAIT Principal, W.B. Saunders, has just returned from a short one month trip to Zambia. He, and a group of experts, were brought in at the request of the Zambian government to act in an advisory capacity in the setting up of a Zambian Institute of Technology.

The extent of their work in that country was to establish the Institute, choose the sight of the building, and to discuss courses and equipment to be used.

The trip arose from a report submitted by Mr. Saunders two years ago to the president of Zambia regarding the establishment of such an Institute. He felt there was a great need for such a school to train Zambian people for more highly skilled work. Previous to Independence no Zambian was allowed to hold such positions. Since then the great lack of skilled technicians has left a great gap in the Zambian labor force.

The Institution is basically or-

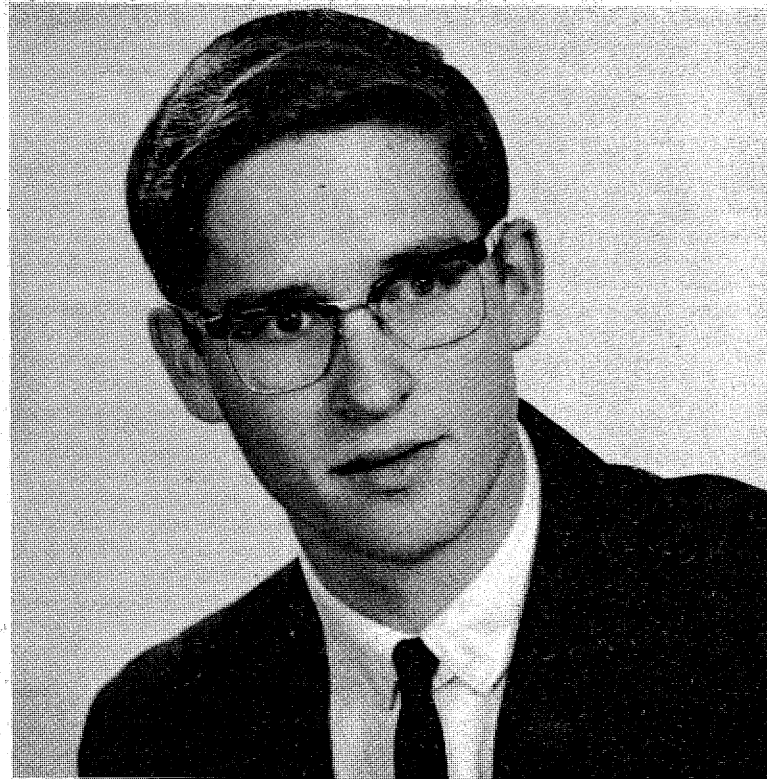
iented to the Copper Industry which forms the backbone of the Zambian economy. Several courses such as Aeronautical Engineering, Computer Technology, and other such technologies are offered.

Mr. Saunders travelled extensively while in Zambia and found Zambian acceptance of Canadians and the Canadian image very favorable. He stated that they were royally treated and anything they needed was at their disposal. They were also given a comfortable office in the Zambian capital of Lusaka.

He attributed the Zambians warm and friendly acceptance of Canada to the work of CUSO volunteers working in the area. Through them they have learned to trust and respect the Canadian people.

He stated that it was very satisfying to work in a country like Zambia. He is also very optimistic about the Canadian role in the development of this emerging country.

As everyone knows by now, The Poppy Family will play a concert at NAIT this Friday. The Vancouver group have released three singles in the past and have gained national recognition with their number one record, "Which Way Are You Going Billy." Although the record has been the most commercially successful for the group, my favorite of their releases is "What Can the Matter be". This record unfortunately was banned on many radio stations because of its controversial lyrics.

Terry Jacks, guitarist for the group has written all of the groups recorded material. Susan Jacks, his wife, is the singer. The Poppy Family is unique in that it features a sitarist and a tuba player.

Harmony Grass is a hard luck group who after seven years of constant playing, have only this year received national recognition. The six member group from London, England, have recently enjoyed success when their debut disc "Move In a Little Closer Baby", soared high on the English charts.

Harmony Grass as it now stands has been in existence for eighteen months, but as Tony Rivers and the Castaways, they played almost ev-

ery club and cabaret in England over a period of seven years.

They were playing the Cavern Club in Liverpool just as the Beatles started to make it and were managed by Brian Epstein up until his death.

The group was in Edmonton last week on a promotional tour for their soon to be released LP. The group put on a free concert at the Dinwoodie Lounge on the University campus.

Although the concert was given on only two days publicity (I use the word loosely), a surprising number of people turned out. Harmony Grass displayed a fantastic amount of five part harmony second only to the Beach Boys. From their club experience, the group has developed a very casual and relaxed attitude on stage. They have also developed and perfected their on stage humor. The group will be returning to town in January.

JOHN MAYALL

LOOKING BACK London (PS 562)

As the title implies, the album is an eleven song history of John Mayall. The songs were recorded between April 1964 and December 1967 and surprisingly enough have not been previously released on Mayall's L.P.'s.

The L.P. is a collectors item of British blues stars. Jack Bruce, Eric Clayton, Peter Green and Mick Taylor, to mention only a few, perform on this album. The eleven songs are placed in order of date recorded which clearly shows John Mayall's and in fact English blues musical progression from 1964 onward.

The inside of the foldout L.P. shows old pictures and news clippings of the group. Some of the choice items include Mayall's pictures at age 19 and a newspaper article announcing Eric Clapton's arrival to the group in 1965. The article refers to Clapton as, Eric "Slowhand" Clapton.

LIGHTHOUSE RCA LSP 4173

After RCA Victor's big buildup of this Canadian group I naturally expected a great album. I am disappointed. The album does, however, show a great deal of potential and I'm anxious to hear the next.

The major pitfall of most of the songs seems to be that they are too busy. "No Opportunity Necessary", a Richie Havens song is a good example of this. Lyrically it's beautiful and the song was meant to be interpreted that way. Lighthouse has added their horn section to it along with a chorus. The result is a song that has about four completely different things happening to it, all of which of course distract from the lyrics.

With a group of this size (13 members), no matter how good the musicians are, there are bound to be problems. Lighthouse will solve these and I hope before they record their second album.

JOHN HARTFORD

RCA VICTOR

LSP - 4156

John Hartford is what is today known as a renaissance man. He has found success as a singer, a comedian, composer, artist, comedy writer, and probably a few more.

His down home banjo picking, his funny voice and sound effects all make his music fun and easy to listen to. John Hartford reminds me very much of Frank Zappa, (mother of invention). Hartford stabs at today's society and mocks the beer drinking pornography fan. He is accepted as a middle of the road performer while others who say the same thing in their music are branded as radicals.

Linn County-Fever Shot
(Mercury SR 61218)

Blues has gone many directions in the last 5 years. Certainly, jazz blues is nothing new and by many accepted definitions of blues, jazz falls under that category.

Good jazz, has always required much more talent to play and understand than blues. So naturally when 5 jazz musicians get together with a friend and play blues, it's got to be good. At least that applies to about half the LP. The best cuts are "Suspended", "Lonely Avenue" and the title song "Fever Shot". These songs are much in the vein of the old Blues Project with a touch of Doors.

It is during "Lonely Avenue"; that Linn County is most predominate in displaying their jazz influence. Particularly impressive are Fred Walk's guitar and Larry Easter on sax. It is interesting to note that a flute is predominate on a couple of cuts, yet none of the members play it and no credit is given.

Today crime is increasing at an unbelievable, terrifying rate. It is not hard to associate the surge of crime with the increasing amounts of murder and destruction being shown on television programs. The effects of these programs are psychological. When small children watch cartoons of make-believe people committing murders, thefts, kidnappings, and almost every form of vice known, they view themselves as the figure doing the killings and it all seems glorified. The children grow up believing that violence is a necessary part of our society.

It is estimated that American citizens own somewhere between 50-200 million pistols, rifles, and shotguns. Psychiatrists admit that there are an estimated 700,000 paranoid persons in the United States alone, and at least several thousand are potential killers.

When political leaders have the philosophy that there is no right or wrong, that if it's good for your country, it's right, it is not sur-

prising that many people are confused as to what is right and what is wrong. Why should a man who kills someone with a gun or other weapon be hung while another person (intoxicated) who kills with a car is set free?

What is the main cause of crime in our society? The human characteristic of greed seems to be the main consideration. A man who is still moral and honest is considered an oddball who has little chance for success. Breakdowns in the family unit and almost non-existent moral values increase the crime activity. Violence is the result of a restless society rebelling against authority and it is a fast means to gain selfish ends. Crime seems to be a necessary by-product of human nature.

Crime can be greatly reduced if citizens would wholly support the police in their efforts to stop violence before it starts. Like it or not, the police really are on our side, and their job would be made a whole lot easier if they only have to fight the real criminals instead of the general public at large.

COUNCIL CAPERS

The first meeting of NAITSA General Council was brought to order at 5:15 sharp, Wednesday, September 17, 1969.

Jim Draginda reported on Shinerama. It was a flop. It flopped because of its being held after a major frosh thing—the Frosh Dance. Next year it will be held on the Thursday of Frosh Week. This year only \$2300 was raised.

It was announced that Naita has been approached by the Savers Club. The Savers Club has gone around to different businesses to arrange discounts for members who pay cash for purchases. Savers Club sells memberships, with plastic I.D. cards, for \$12 per year (soon to go to \$15). Cards will be sold to Naita for \$8 a piece. Council approved the proposal, and the price to students will be \$9 for memberships. Further details of the 450 firms giving discounts, will be given in a few weeks. Unfortunately, the Liquor Control Board refuses to sign up with Savers.

Naita president, Eric Lishman, announced that an administrative seminar will be held this fall. He asked reps to collect complaints concerning administrative actions, and to give these to him so Council can present them to the seminar.

Valerie Perra, social convenor, brought forth a proposed concert involving the Poppy Family, a rock

group from Vancouver. They have a hit currently on the hit-parade.. "Which Way are you going Billy?" The concert would be held on October 3, with the profits going to the Canadian Paraplegic Association to help send 5 people to the Paraplegic Olympics in Argentina. Proposed prices are \$2 for students, \$2.50 for non-students (advance sales), and \$2.75 at the door. The concert was approved by Council.

Council agreed to send 5 representatives, at a cost of \$25 each, to the fall conference of the Alberta Association of Students. The Association links the post-secondary institutions in the province. It was pointed out that one of its achievements was the removal of clauses, from proposed legislation, that would have put NAIT under direct government control, with abolition of student control of student affairs. Former Naita president Steve Dillenback was chiefly responsible for getting the AAS on the move to lobby the government.

It was really heart-warming to see such a well-run, and fast-moving Council meeting. Most of the discussion was intelligent and to the point. The attendance was roughly half of its peak. This still leaves our student council a little better than our national Parliament. The high level of comments and questions from our students reps puts council well ahead of Parliament. To be truthful, I'll have to admit that I've never attended a session of Parliament, but a lot of people who have been there have written descriptions of

it. Since the idea of reporting Council meetings to inform the students of NAIT, I will report some of the less intelligent remarks made by reps, along with the technology of offenders (this will be if I get bitter enough).

ON STUDENT HOUSING

After reading Sandy Hopkin's fiery statement on NAIT Housing in the September 4th issue of the NUGGET, I sat back and had a big laugh. "Hell, I thought, 'it couldn't happen to me!'. But, after looking around, I quickly came to the conclusion that my landlady was taking me for a ride.

Here I was, paying \$45.00 a month along with three other guys for a sleeping space roughly 6 feet wide by 8 feet long, divided off by two curtains, along with use of a kitchen, washroom and a sofa. I had to do my own cooking and if I was lucky, she would do my laundry every second week or so. The door had no lock, so she'd be down quite often, many times, not even bothering to knock. On top of that I had killed by fifth cockroach, mopped up the water leaking in from the outside wall and was constantly spraying the place with deodorant to cover up the foul smells from the open shower drains.

It was time to do something, so I decided to find a new place. As luck had it, two friends wanted to move out of their suite, so we agreed that I'd take over the lease. Since they had already found a new place, I rented them the bread to pay the front for the old place so that they could move out and I could move right in. On September 13, I was introduced to the new landlord and he agreed to my being his new tenant. He asked to see the apartment and discovered a slightly damaged door and a cigarette burn in one of the leather chairs. The former tenants agreed to settle with him for the damage later on and I was to move in as soon as the place could be painted. At the time, I was amused to find that the landlord couldn't understand English too well, but he had no trouble with the language of money.

The next Saturday, I came by to see how things were progressing and was surprised to discover that someone else had moved in.

I got hold of the landlord who told me I didn't leave him a deposit. After I insisted I paid the rent he went on to say that he used the rent money for the damage. I contacted the Police in turn who told me that unless I had a receipt, I might as well forget the whole thing. I then contacted the previous tenants, who went to see the landlord to try and get a receipt. The landlord not only refused, he also wouldn't let them see the receipts for the damage repairs. After this, we got in touch with the Canadian Renters and Leaseholders Association who also informed us we were helpless without a receipt. The only other recourse we had was to bring this to court, but on the shaky evidence we had, we would have probably lost.

Here I am then, up that famous creek with a broken paddle. In my humility I went back to my old Landlady and asked if I could get my old "Bedroom" (for lack of better adjective) back. After hearing my tale of woe, her heart bled for me, but not before demanding a \$25.00 damage deposit and handing me a list of house rules like: no parties, no friends after 10 anytime, no drinking, no girls and no smoking. She then went on to say that not all landlords are bad.

I couldn't help but agree.

INTERVIEW WITH A BUSINESSMAN

He will sit there and say I am only a NAIT student and all the universities have beat us to all our jobs. Not so say a few businessmen. The NAIT student can be one of the best workers, if he did not sit around and feel sorry for himself. He must get out and show us and themselves that they are as good if not better than some others. How do you do this, I questioned? He has to go out and show everyone that he is proud of his school. He can do this by getting out for things like games, sponsor different things during the year. Get the school known throughout the country. But if only a few students want to do this how can such a thing be done, I questioned him once more. Get more people to join the different clubs and social functions. How? Tell them that it will help them to get a better view of the school and the poor attitude of the students. Once they have joined

you can get them to attend different things put on by everyone and anyone. They can go there as representatives to NAIT and show them that NAIT is interested in them. In turn people will get interested in NAIT. You see, he continued, the whole problem is that everyone thinks you are interested in no one but yourself. At the present time it seems to be true. But if you go some more well known people will be there and if you did things which others would like to do you will get more publicity and people would look up to you more than they do now. Make it a project of a certain club or organization to do a certain thing that year and have them stick to it. Make sure they stick to it and make it known that a certain group is going to do this certain thing and this way everyone will get involved and become part of the school and have the whole school back them. Well thank you very much sir, for your words of wisdom.

This was an interview with a local businessman, who is a great supporter of the students across the country. Please get out and join your newspaper, Radio club or any one of the clubs which NAIT has running in the school. Only can help these clubs which are especially low in membership. The newspaper needs many people to help it get to a height which it has never attained. Please help them out!

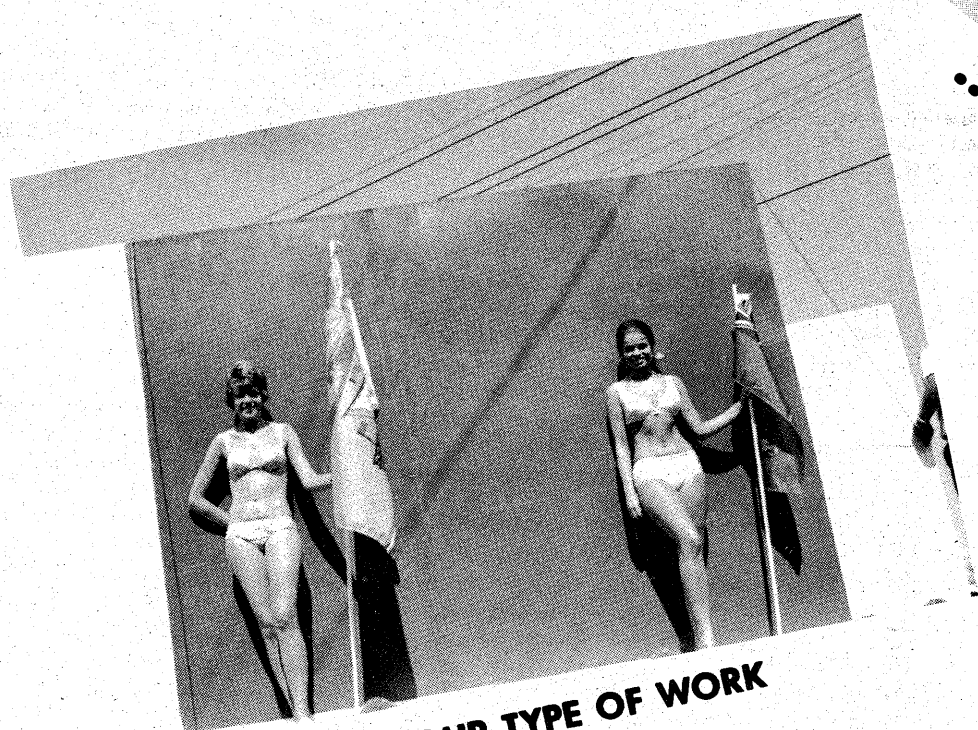
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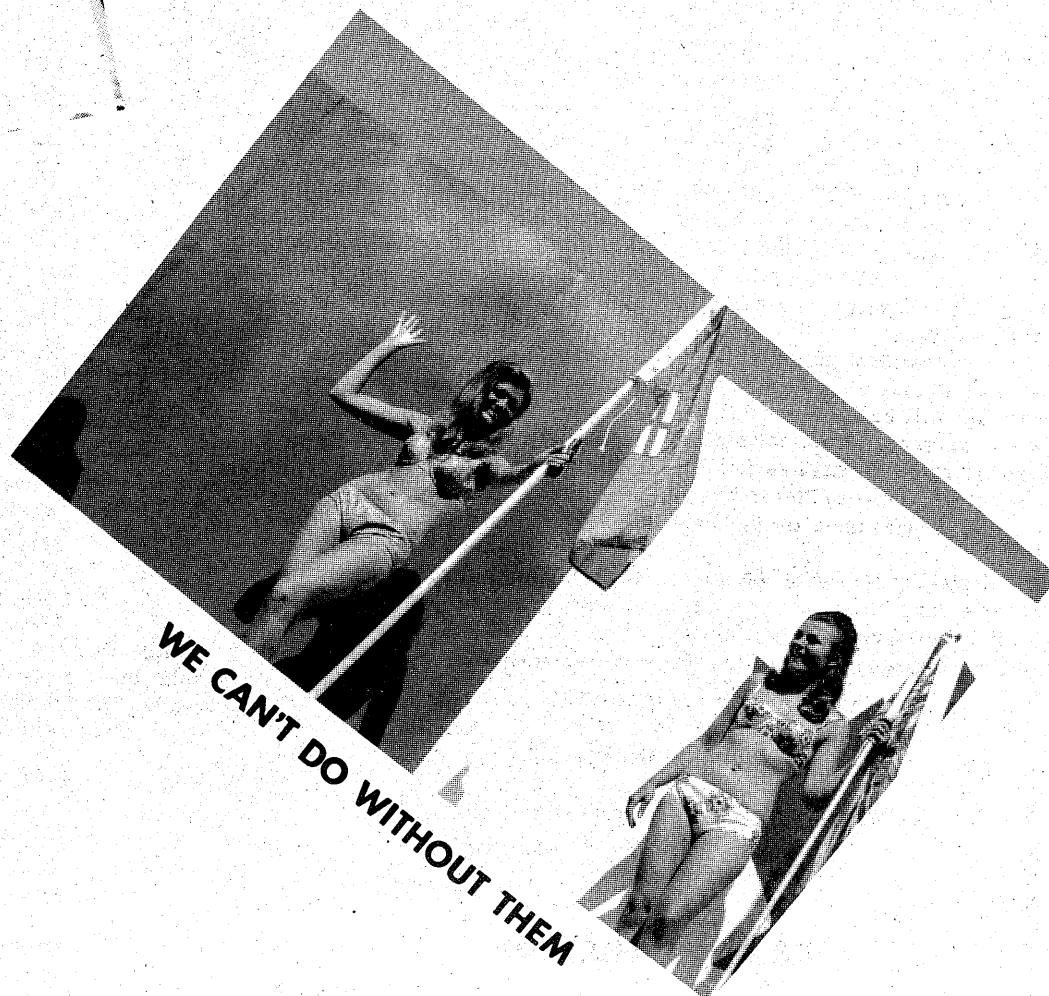

We purchased a teletype machine

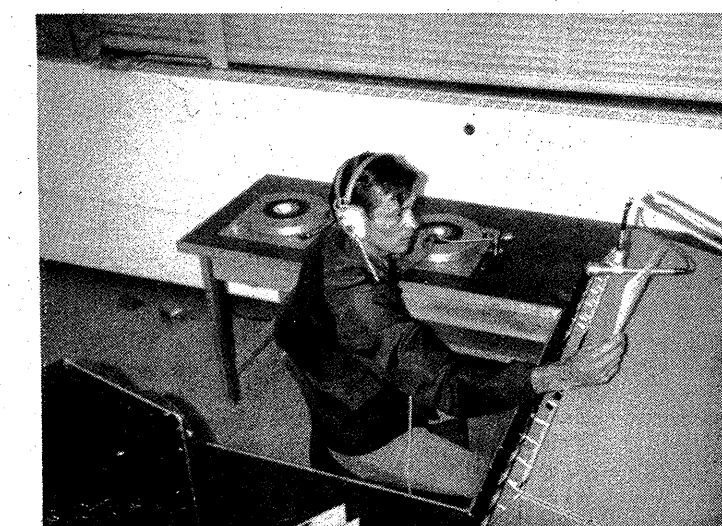

WHY FIGHT IT?

By all means, let's lower all the standards of morality, integrity, and decency. Let's dispense with any rules and regulations that may restrict any individual in his pursuit of happiness. Let's make things as "easy" as possible for everyone--and heaven forbid that we should expect any young people to conform to any set pattern established by an older generation which is still guided by an out-moded moral code and is still clinging to some vestige of human dignity and established mores. For the sake of peace and quiet and unruffled feelings; let's give in to all the rabble rousers, the hippies, the beatniks, the enlightened generation. Let's rationalize--it's the thing to do--all the kids are doing it--so why fight it???

Why fight it??? It should be apparent--that somebody will have to start fighting it--and soon.

It would seem that some "enlightened" educators and some "enlightened" ministers and priests are leading the pack to "lower" the standards--to lower the standards established by their institutions. They apparently want to be "in" with the younger generation and, in doing so, they're way "out".

Instead of telling their students, "These are the rules on this campus--you live by them or get out"--they are easing up on all the rules in order to accommodate those who cannot or will not conform to set standards to good conduct and morals. Instead of raising up those who enter there, they are lowering themselves to meet standards set by the generation that has been pampered and spoiled, catered to and coddled.

It is no wonder that the young people of this nation have become disenchanted with us, the older generation. We haven't got enough guts to stand up and tell them, "Well, Buster, this is how it will go--and if you with all your modern ideologies and modern standards on drinking, dope, sex, and moralities can't stand the gaff--then cut out--and find your 'niche' in the world some place else--some place where you'll fit in--because you don't fit in here."

In a recent article in the Minneapolis TRIBUNE (Sat., Nov. 18) a Minneapolis minister was leading the campaign for more lenient punishment for high school athletes found drinking. "If you take away from youth something he has given so much for as athletics you are doing him great harm." It would seem to me--that you are doing him more harm by not expecting very much from him. The standards have already been lowered from a one year suspension to 18 school weeks for drinking violations. The lowering of this requirement has not lowered the number who drink--rather the drinking violations have increased. It would also seem to me, that any boy who is really dedicated to athletics, and "who has given so much for them",

should and would be willing to give a little more to comply with all the rules--or he's just not quite as dedicated as he pretends to be--and if the rules were enforced as they should be, to the letter of the law for every infraction and violation, you would find that those who really want to be on the team--who really want to play for their schools would give it a little more thought--a little more consideration of what they were about to lose--of what they would have to give up, before they broke any of the rules. Living by rules will not destroy an individual--rather it would help him better able to cope with life and its complexities just because he has the discipline and the moral courage to keep his integrity.

And then, we get to the colleges--where drinking is allowed in the dorms, girls are allowed to visit in boys' rooms and vice versa. Of course the door must be one-quarter open and all four feet must be planted firmly on the floor. How modern!

But in our quest to be modern, we have neglected one important ingredient. We have forgotten that we are not dealing with two wooden statues, but with two human beings--with ordinary human emotions and desires. Give them every freedom with no restrictions on hours. Give them the most ideal conditions for their rendezvous, but don't expect them to react to the circumstances. Lead them into temptation, but don't expect them to be tempted. They could plant their feet firmly on the floor of the lobby or waiting room in the dorm, and if they're 21, they could go off campus and drink, but why put any obstacles in their paths on the road to their degeneration. Give them a helping hand.

Why fight it??? Because it's just about time the educators, the ministers, the priests and the dogooder took a long hard look at the situation. Easing the rules is not the answer. Lowering the standards is not the answer. This very generation that we are coddling and pampering and giving into and easing the rules for are the very ones who are involved in more automobile accidents, are taking more dope, drinking more booze, are involved in more "have to" marriages, and divorcing more than any generation before it. But that's modern!!

Why fight it???? We must, because this country is deteriorating from within. History has proven that almost every great nation and empire that crumbled and fell--fell, not from outside sources, but because it rotted from within, and here we quote a paragraph called "Food For Thought." The average age of the world's greatest civilizations has been 200 years. Each one has progressed from bondage to spiritual faith--to great courage--to liberty--to abundance to selfishness--to complacency--to apathy--to dependency--back to bondage. Now, using scientific criteria, acid in a time-lapse period may result in mental complications. Whether this is true or not might still be debatable. I believe it is up to the individual, depending on the drug, and the number of times which it is taken. The question is up to you.

The Institute of Electrical and Electronics Engineers is the world's largest body of engineers. The NAIT Student Branch of the IEEE is getting organized for the 1969-70 term. Membership is open to students in Electrics, Electronics, and Telecom. technologists. Students from all years are welcome. The cost to students is \$5 per year. This includes the Spectrum (designed for the graduate engineer) or the Student Journal (best for year A or AB people).

Among the advantages to be gained from membership is participation in design projects. Some of these come from industry, such as: a device to measure the moisture content of slurry (watery mud) radio control gear (12 channels) for a large model aircraft--wing-spread of 8 to 10 feet; and a receiver/decoder to print pictures from weather satellite signals. Other ideas will come from students. Experience on a project---one night a week for 4 or 5 months---will help in getting a job, as well as keeping that job. Employers like people with initiative and experience.

The IEEE has a contest for student papers. Papers written by technical students are not judged against those of university students, except in the International Finals. A year or two ago, the top Canadian paper was written by a member from SAIT; the runner-up came from a NAIT student. This really shook up the people from Manitoba Tech. and Ryerson who have a tendency to feel that they are the only technical institutes in Canada.

The advantages of the IEEE continue after graduation. It is after graduation that the benefits will become most apparent. The various specialist groups have publications which will help you to keep up with advances in your field.
