SUPPORT YOUTH INVOLVEMENT PROGRAM

Whether you realize it or not, right here in Edmonton there are many children facing social isolation because of unfortunate family circumstances that have arisen. These children seldom see the beauty of parks, lakes, zoos, and many of the other leisure and recreational facilities that we like to take for granted as being visited by everyone. This type of problem is too big for these children (usually with one parent) to face by themselves, and too small to involve a specialized social worker. So, about two years ago, Bryan Watt from the University of Alberta organized what is now known as the Youth Involvement Program

(Y.I.P.)

Small groups of volunteers are assigned a family who has been referred to Y.I.P. by welfare workers, and the volunteers are expected to visit the family at least once a week. Their purpose is to help the kids become aware of their social surroundings by means of field trips and to various places such as the Alberta Game Farm, Storyland Zoo, and various lakes and playgrounds. Volunteers help children with school work if they are having difficulty in understanding or are in danger of failing. Most of the children being helped are between the ages of five and twelve, and so far there has been a warm

response by the children as well as the parent to the participation of volunteers in family affairs. Occasionally the parents seek friendly advice on certain family problems - most of them have accepted the volunteers fully within their confidence. Y.I.P. members are also trying to create better communication between the families with the rest of the community in which they live. Children are encouraged to participate in community group activities which will help them meet others their own age. By working with the Youth Involvement Program the volunteer gains an insight into many of today's social problems that are in the process

of change.

Membership at the present time is about forty - mostly university students with good support from senior high schools. The board of directors is made up of representatives from the government of Alberta, St. Mary's High School, and NAIT (Linda Behm in Social Service Technology).

There are mostly female university students involved at the moment, and there is an acute shortage of males. Meetings are generally held every two weeks at the Students Union Building at the University of Alberta, and volunteers have the opportunity of discussing their problems with their fellow

workers as well as a professional social worker who is available for consultation. Orientation for new and potential members will be held here at NAIT on September 27th, and anyone who is sincerely interested (especially students in social service technology) in joining the organization are welcome. Further information can be obtained by calling Bryan Watt at 424-5855 or 488-3647.

The key to social change and development is through involvement - and the Youth Involvement Program is helping to make Edmonton a better place to live. Please give your support to this very worthwhile project.



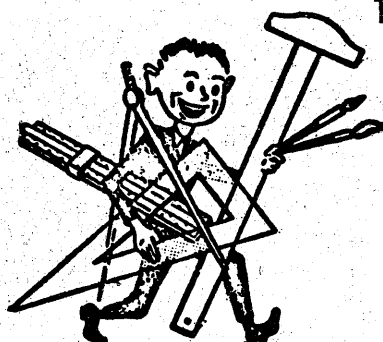

One of the major reasons for the success of NAIT's Frosh Week Friday night's Frosh Dance credit should go to the Wes Dakus, Barry Allen Group, who provided the entertainment. The group has only been together a couple of months and is already one of Edmonton's best groups. Their sound is country rock which pleases almost every listener. They are still however doing mostly old standards and no original material.

The Patmacs LP (Capitol Records) should be released by December. A single by the group should be out within a couple of weeks. The material was produced and recorded by Barry Allen in his Parklane Studios.

Edmonton's new Deram Studios cut a pop country thing by Dallas Hansen to be released on RCA Victor. Don Patches who does the audio recording for the CBC is in charge of the sound and Gerry MacDonald of CJCA will handle the production chores at the studio.

With the success of the last few rock concerts locally, we are bound to get more. I've heard rumors of Donovan, Simon & Garfunkel, and Blood, Sweat and Tears. The Tim Buckley Show Sept. 25 at the Jubilee Auditorium should be well worth taking in. Incidentally, the Steppenwolf Show sold more advance tickets than any rock show previously. A complete verbatim interview with John Kay of that group will be published in the Nugget soon.

Although Jack Bruce, former bass player for Bream, has been almost unheard of since the group's separation, he is far from out of the pop scene. He has been busy recording two albums and trying to organize a concert tour which would also feature George Harrison of the Beatles. One of the LP's, (due to be released in Canada shortly) is entitled "Songs For A Smiler". In a recent interview with Toronto's Richie Yorke, Bruce stated, "I don't really know what to say about it. It's purely rock 'n' roll songs, and a couple are in the Cream vein."

"I've done a lot of overdubbing of myself playing various instruments, and I also used some of my friends such as George Harrison. We're thinking of getting together for a short concert tour. I don't expect it to be an instant

smash album though."

Toronto's Neil Young, formerly with the Buffalo Springfield, has accepted an invitation to join Crosby, Stills and Nash. Young will play the guitar and organ, sing and write for the group. He also has a 3 year commitment with Reprise Records to produce two solo LP's per year.

Somebody recently wrote that the chief reason for Glen Campbell's success lies in the mass frustration of young married women. Lonely, ignored, and neglected, they create an image of perfection in handsome young entertainers such as Herb Alpert, John Gary, and Glen Campbell. Talent is incidental; it's the image that counts.

Rolling Stones, Through The Past, Darkley (Big Hits Vol. 2) London (NPS 3)

In my opinion, whenever the Beatles or Stones release a new LP this country should declare a national holiday. This Stones LP (released only this week) contains

no new material but is still an album of great potential beauty. Listening to the Big Hits LP is an experience of rediscovery. Eleven of the best things the Stones have done in the last three years, all together on one LP is sure to make for some heavy listening. The album cover is eight sided and contains an obituary for Brian Jones, the group's former guitarist.

RECORD REVIEW

McKenna Mendelson Mainline "Stink" (Liberty LBS 83251)

By now, everyone in Canada is aware of certain Canadian musicians who have made it to the States. When magazines like Chatelaine, and the Weekend write about it, you can be sure that there is something happening down there for our musicians.

Toronto's McKenna Mendelson Mainline realized that they would have to leave Canada in order to make it, but picked England over the States. They felt they needed two things to get by down south—a work permit and a gun—they had neither.

England gave them a record con-

tract with Liberty which led to their first LP "Stink" and two single releases. "Stink" is basically a very well recorded blues album which features a lot of standard and occasionally overdone blues progressions. The music comes across with a lot of power and conviction and is very refreshing. With the fact that it is a very musically honest LP, it should put the group into the international spotlight. I particularly enjoy two country novelty things called "Think I'm losing my marbles" and "Don't give me no Goose for Christmas Grandma."

Sometime when you've nothing to do, sit down and list as many Canadian LP's as you can. You'll be amazed. You should have at least 25 on the list.

Colosseum "Those Who Are About To Die Salute You" (Dunhill DS 50062)

John Mayall's publicity department recently released a list of sidemen who have accompanied him from the beginning of his career to the present. If you follow British blues, you will not be surprised to find the number of musicians who have gone on to play with almost all of Britain's significant blues groups. Three of those musicians who were with Mayall when he released the "Barewires" LP have gone on to form a group called Colosseum.

The group's first LP, "Those Who are About to Die Salute You" is one of the best I've heard in

year. It's basically a jazz blues LP with the majority of the songs being instrumental. The strength of the LP lies in an instrumental entitled "Valentyne Sweet". The song covers the best part of the second side of the LP but unlike many long instrumentals, it contains many unbelievably tight changes. Some of the changes are so tight that I believe they were done by splicing tape together. The musical ability of the group is incredible. Organist Dave Greenslade is second only to Steve Winwood of Blind Faith. During "Valentyne Sweet", he actually bends the notes on his organ. Saxophonist Dick Heckstall-Smith has played with many of Britain's top jazz groups. He adds a touch of class to the group, being about mid forty and balding.

Leader and drummer for the group is Jon Hiseman who has played with Graham Bond and John Mayall. James Litherland plays guitar for the group and Tony Reeves, a former record company executive, plays bass.

This is probably the sleeper album of the year.

Ten Years After "Ssssh" (Deram) DES 18029

On the liner notes, Alvin Lee writes, "The major problem of being 10 Years After, has been to record an album." He goes on to

say that although they have recorded three previous LP's that have been commercially successful and musically very good, "Ssssh" is the first LP that has really been 10 Years After, as they see the group.

The LP itself is outstanding and their best yet.

On the group's second LP "Undead", guitarist Alvin Lee displayed such incredible speed during his guitar breaks that the image of the group changed from that of a hard blues band to one of the group's members being speed freaks. On this LP, Lee is still as fast in places but the emphasis is once again on the group's blues styles.

"Bad Scene", which opens the album is a hard rock thing, displaying the group's power. This song leads to a modern rural blues thing that features a bottleneck style guitar. One of my favourites on the album is "Good Morning Little School Girl". Only 10 Years After could take a tired overworked song like this and come up with something new and refreshing in it. The second side is written entirely by Alvin Lee and features many rhythmically beautiful things that the Stones occasionally come up with. The album contains no disappointments and is well worth it.

Nature has a strange way of rebelling against those who foolishly tamper with environmental conditions.
