XMAS OOKIES

From "A Childs' Garden of Grass"

GRASS BROWNIES

1-16 oz. package of Betty Crocker Fudge Brownie Mix

1/2 cup grass* 2 eggs

1/2 cup of nuts or ground mac-

Follow the directions on the box for cake-like brownies rather than the fudge brownies. Betty Crocker mix is recommended because it has the strongest brownie flavor and therefore best masks the grass flavor. Put the raw grass in a bowl and mix it well with the dry brownie mix. Add the water and two eggs and mix. You might find that you have to add about another tsp. of water. Add the nuts or macaroons (this is used to camouflage the gritty grass texture). After cooling, cut into twenty portions. They can be eaten frozen but if you are going to eat all of them within a week. you won't have to do this.

*For a less gritty texture, grind the grass up before adding it to the brownie mix, using a blender or pressing it through a very fine strainer. Hash will also give equally good

You usually won't get off on the brownies for a good hour and one brownie is usually quite sufficient. As a general rule, a lid of grass is needed when used for cooking purposes and will get twenty people bery stoned or one person very stoned twenty times.

Grass is not among the most tasty substances around. The flavor resembles some spice that found its way into a particularly bad slavic soup, and its texture lies somewhere between pumice and a good grade of sawdust. Never use monosodium guitamate (MSG or Accent because it brings out the grass flavor.



Presently, it costs too much for the yearbook to handle any more than graduate pictures which means a good share of students aren't included.

This year's yearbook will cost NAIT students 23,000 dollars or about a third of the amount budgeted for all student's union activities. It would seem such a vast amount could be spent in better ways. Scholarships or worthy charities would surely benefit more from this money than the production of yearbooks could. This amount could be used to set up recreational facilities such as pool tables in the soon-to-come extension to NAIT. Such facilities could soon pay for themselves and make money for the student's union.

Many post high-school educational institutions have decided yearbooks aren't worth the cost of producing them. NAIT students have an opportunity to follow suit on December 15 at the general meeting. It's to be hoped they'll do just that.

Dear Concerned Student:

If you are so worried about the \$22.00 that you have paid to the student's union, why haven't you taken the effort to come down to the students unsion offices and obtained the information you are so in the dark about?

Assuming that your concern is legitimate, I will supply you with the following answers to your question, "Where is the money going and who is using it?":

1. The money is going to the students union general revenue fund. This consists of a checking account and a savings account.

2. 3500 students (this year 3000) are deriving something from it in the following way. The students administration is alloted \$12,350.00; Three thousand students benefit from this, as the students government works for all the students. The Social Council is allotted \$11,735.00; Three thousand students benefit from the social activities. It's up to you to par-

ticipate in them.

The yearbook was allotted \$23,300.00; Three thousand students are supposed to benefit from this. As of now a study is being done on the need for a yearbook of this type. The newspaper is allotted \$5150.00; Three thousand students benefit, it's up to you to pick the paper up, it won't be mailed to you. The telephone directory (of much discussion lately) doesn't cost you a cent. This is because advertising pays for it. We hope that eventually this year 3000 students again benefit because NAIT's name is spread favorably across the country thus giving all students a little more edge in getting employment, etc. I.D. cards is allotted \$2500; this pays for 3000 student identifications. NAIT Radio is given \$2600. 3000 students hear the music over the waves of this radio station. At present approximately 50 people rwun it. If you want a part, it's up to you to

The photo directorate is given \$1000. This benifits 3000 students again, as the money is used for picture taking for both the newspaper and yearbook.

The athletic fund is given \$21,000. Three thousand students benefit here. Any student can participate in any sport or activity imaginable, again depending on your own ambition. This covers 95% of the allotted

As you can see, dear concerned student, the students union fees are used for the benefit of all us students. But it is up to each of us individually to participate and take advantage of the various outlets available. No one is going to take our hand and say, "here, baby, you can play here today." It's up to you Also if you're interested, it's being proposed that students' union fees be increased affective next fall. If you're interested at all there's a general assembly meeting on Dec. 15, 1971.







Music Industry. The book is written by Canada's most prolific
rock critic, Ritchie Yorke, who is
also one of Canada's most
ardent proponents of the Canadian Rock Music Scene.

Axes, Chops and Hot Licks explores the development of over forty of Canada's musical groups and stars. It contains the meat of interviews with all of the major names of Canadian music: The Band, Joni Mitchell, Tom Northcott, Tundra, Ronnie Hawkins and Chilliwack, just to name a few. The book analyses the past, present and what may happen in the future of Canadian music as well as any one writer could have done. It makes a few digs at the media which was responsible for holding the Canadian music scene back, with special criticism of radio stations who wouldn't give airplay to some of the world's finest music.

Hot Licks makes easily understandable reading by anyone over ten years of age and contains about twenty pictures. It is all put together in a logical sequence and doubles as a handy information reference of Canadian groups and entertainers. A must for anyone interested in Canadian Music!

THE REAL POVERTY REPORT

By Ian Adams, William Cameron, Brian Hill, Peter Penz. Price \$2.95 paper; \$8.95 cloth.

The authors of this book were, until April 1971, staff members of the Special Senate Committee on Poverty. They resigned in protest over what they considered to be unilateral censorship of their work. What is strange is that they ever got on the committee in the first place. They have terrifically biased views on the definition of poverty and what affects it. The book would be better titled "Inequality of Living Standards in Canada" since their definition of poverty is "a standard of living below one-half of the nation's average standard of living." This is strictly relative and says very little about actual living conditions of Canadians. It is a highly dubious view of poverty.

The authors deal with such varied topics as welfare, corporations, competition, discrimination, unions, unemployment, and public services; but they are approached with the attitude that many stirctly left wing views are self-evident truths.

All this is unfortunate since a good report on livign conditions in Canada, including poverty, and what affects them would be valuable. This report does not do the subject justice.





I hope you enjoyed their concert last night. As a followup to the concert, here is a review of their double album. (just \$5.98 for two LP's) Side one contains all the commercial A.M. cuts: "Lonesome Mary"; "Eat"; "Rosie"; "Ridin" and "Ride-Out". The other good A.M. cut is "Always". The rest of the album isn't very impressive if taken from the commercial viewpoint. A lot of it is made up of experimental improvisation and freeform music. It is all personal appreciation type music. Good space music for contemplative moods and as background for heavy philosophical discussions.



NICE FEELIN' by Rita Coolidge on A&M Records, No. SP4325

It surprised me when I was at Rita's concert last month, to find her getting so far into Blues material. This album was recorded with Marc Benno and The Dixie Flyers, who also accompanied her on that concert here. Their Records by Howard Hariton

You already know my views on Procol as a group so there's no use in pointing out in detail about Keith Reid's lyrics or outstanding musical points because the albums and their contained material are all good. You either like it or you don't or then again, could it be possible that you haven't yet heard any of Procol Harum's music? I'll just talk about the themes and a few very outstanding cuts.

Contains, of course, "Shine On Brightly" and "In Held Twas In I", which is their masterful eighteen minute Contata. There is just no limit to the words I could write about it, so I'll just leave it at that. Imagine it as being a personal letter to your-



A SALTY DOG/Procol Harum on A&M, NO. SP 4179

The album paints a very descriptive picture of the sea as seen through the senses of a mariner. Quite likely their best known and best liked album to date. Right now, the album rates number eighteen on the singles list in Edmonton, which also makes it outstanding. All the cuts are short, but each tells a story of the sea.



HOME/Procol Harum on A&M, No. SP4261

This is the death album! Death isn't all though. Wherever they are though, its all dark and mysterious with the possible exception of Whiskey Train, which is an instrumental number. The collective lyrics are probably the deepest of any that Keith Reid has written for any of Procol's albums. HOME marks the beginning of Procol's move away from their earlier style to a heav ier rock base, even though most of the album is slow.



BROKEN BARICADES/Procol Harum on A&M, No. SP 4294

This IS their heavier Rock album. Contains: "Simple Sister"; "Power Failure"; "Broken Baricades"; and "Luskus Delph". Procol Harum appears to have been highly concerned about sex! It contains some of their most explosive material and some of their most beautiful. "Song For A Dreamer", by former guitarist Robin Trower, is more experienced than Jimmy Hendrix ever got on a cut that short.

Bob had a strong defensive game and made a couple key plays to prevent goals. I feel the whole team should be stars as they played one man short for 19 minutes and 39 seconds in the game. In addition, they played two men short for 1 minute and 32 seconds. They allowed only one goal in all this time.

It appears Ken Ruptash not only is trying for the top goalie honors but he wants to be the league "bad boy" as he is second only to Red Deer's Don Gillis in the PIM department; 34 minutes to 39 minutes. Don't worry, Ken, he's played one more game than you.
