



Ignore it-maybe it will solve itself

Parking seems to be posing a problem here at NAIT. There appears to be ample parking area surrounding NAIT, but people still feel it necessary to park in every area which is designated "NO PARKING".

People at the present time are parking in all types of "NO PARK-ING" areas; such as; the middle of the road, in fire arteries, along driveways in loading zones and several others. They're even looking for new places to park. Next thing we know there will be parked; on sidewalks, in hallways, the main rotunda and even the skywalk. Yes, even the skywalks, but if you will look closely, you will see a no parking sign of a sort, but watch out for cars in the hallways and rotunda, there are no signs there yet.

People don't seem to understand that these areas are designated no parking for a reason. The roadways are posted to cut down accidents, fire arteries are posted for obvious reasons. Parking in many of the "NO PARK.

The problem has become great enough that the administration is taking steps to combat it, one such step is to bring the city police on campus because we are a government institute, but this can be easily changed.

So keep up the good work and we'll be over run.

Education Minister Robert Clark has announced that for 1971-72 he will be recommending to the Legislature an increase of six per cent in the full-time student grant to Alberta universities. The recommendation is within guidelines previously established for the province's Grade One to Twelve school system.

At the same time, the provincial government has requested the universities to hold Canadian and landed immigrant student fees at the same level as this year.

The university system revenue will, therefore, be approximately 2.6 per cent below the original grant increase recommended by the Universities Commission for 1971-72.

Pending the outcome of a detailed study of the need for increased enrolment in and the cost of graduate studies, the government has asked the Universities Commission to request the Univertisites of Alberta and Calgary to exercise caution and place some limitation on the number of new students accepted for graduate study, Mr. Clark said.

"The government realizes that the support being proposed for the universities, the elementary and secondary schools, and other post-secondary institutions is less than those institutions would wish. However, at a time when the government must meet many needs, including increased welfare costs, development of new job opportunities and improvement of the environment, all while avoiding inflations, the universities must share in the attainment of these goals by operating more efficiently," Mr. Clark

"As the Seventh Annual Review of the Economic Council of Canada has pointed out, governments are now spending as much on post-secondary institutions as on hospitals or the aged - and over the last 10 years, post-secondary expenditures have been increasing much more rapidly.

"In light of the findings of the Economic Council, that in spite of a steady increase in the capital of Canada's universities, they have not significantly improved their output of graduates per teacher, I think Alberta's universities could profit from a harder look at their internal priorities.

"Last year at this time, in the course of announcing the government's level of support for the universities, I made it clear that the time had come for the institutions to perform some searching self-analysis in order to reduce waste and find more effective ways of carrying out their programs.

"Since that time, the universities have begun to re-examine their spending, and some economies have been made. We are convinced, however, that more work remains to be done in this area, perhaps in the area of the teaching load of some professors," Mr. Clark said.

The Minister made three additional announcements concerning government funding for the universities for the coming year: First, student registration in the Alberta universities for 1970-71, although higher than 1969-70, was below projections developed by the Universities Commission in consultation with the universities. The other western provinces have experienced a similar trend.

The consequent shortfall in university revenues, including fees and formula government grants, based on student numbers, exceeded \$4,000,000. As this shortfall was not anticipated on the basis of student applications, it was not known until after preliminary university registration figures became available in mid-October.

At this late a date the universities were unable to make sufficient expenditure reductions in the remaining five and a half months of the fiscal year to offset this large shortfall in revenue. The Government has therefore increased the 1970-71 per-student grant to the universities and the Banff School of Fine Arts to provide an additional government grant of \$1,925,000.

Second, last September, Cabinet met with representatives of the universities and the Universities Commission to exchange views on university affairs. The major items of concern raised by the universities was the provision of formula operating grants based on actual student enrolment at December 10.

University representatives pointed out that if actual student enrolment exceeded the projects, the universities could not prudently spend the extra income late in the academic year to employ additional acadimic and support staff.

Conversely, if enrolments, and thus funds, fall moderately below projections, the universities could not proportionately reduce budgeted expenditure as staff had already been employed to provide for the projected enrolment. If the shortfall was large, the universities would be forced into a serious deficit situation.

As a consequence of this concern and on the basis of a strong recommendation by the Universities Commission, the government has agreed to provide support for 1971-72 on the basis of enrolment projections. If the actual enrolments in 1971-72 are above or below the projections, the 1972-73 projections will be adjusted accordingly. Cabinet proposes to hold a similar meeting with university representatives in the fall of 1971.

Third, in consultation with the Universities Commission, the government has arranged for the establishment of studies essential to effective long-term university planning. These include: provision for student transferability between Alberta's post-secondary education in Alberta; and provision of co-ordinated library computer services for Alberta's post-secondary system.

The studies, Mr. Clark said, were first proposed by the Universities Commission as a part of its desire to rationalize the Alberta universities systems and are in line with the recommendations of the Economic Council of Canada.

"It stinks, because come spring where will all the students park who are parking on the other side of the street, due to the fact that the ground will be too soft for any students to park there without getting stuck."



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



2 tblsp. melted butter

1/4 c. sugar 1 tblsp. cinnamon

Into a bowl mix all dry ingredients. Stir well to blend. Cut in shortening with pastry blender or fork until mixture resembles

coarse crumbs. Add milk. Stir with fork until all dry ingredients are moistened.


Turn mixture out on lightly floured board. Knead gently 20 times. Roll dough into a tean by twelve inch rectange. Brush with melted butter. Combine sugar and cinammon together, then sprinkle mixture on dough. Cut lengthwise into 5 strips. Stack strips. Then cut it into 12 one inch pieces. Place cut side down in well greased muffin tin. Bake at 424oF for 15 to 18 minutes. Makes 1 dozen.

ing.
What is its purpose?

You are entertaining either for pleasure or for business reasons. This in effect, is your whole motive for having a party.

If it is for business reasons, make sure it is done in a relaxed atmosphere. Women can easily create such an atmosphere because they immediately feel at home.

It it is for pleasure and having fun with a few friends, make sure the party is always alive. This is done so by dancing, playing a number of games, or just talking.

There can be two kinds of parties: a conversational party or an action party. Either party should have listeners and conversationalists.

To plan a party, a person has to take a number of aspects into consideration:

1. Amount of Space:

Is there sufficient freedom to move around near the food and throughout the room?

The number of people the area will hold comfortably.

This decides as to what kind of party, an active one or rather settled down kind.

2. Atmosphere:

If you are having several friends over or just one or two people decide if you would like to have it informal or formal. Buffet style: This is very informal and quite friendly for a large gathering.

Sit-down style: This includes 4 or more and is usually rather formal.

Your lights play a very important part in creating the atmosphere of the party. They tend to place the guests in a certain type of mood.

3. Planning Your Food:

Serving interesting foods by serving them in unusual ways, displaying them in different arrangements or trying out new kinds.
