instructors, section heads, department heads administrators and NAITSA council. The purpose of the meeting was to develop a broader appreciation and understanding of the various roles and responsibilities of institute personnel, to develop a greater team effort among the varying segments of the organization, to discover and explore otherwise barely discernable feelings, attitudes and ideas which may be utilized for future policy development.

Edmonton, Alberta

Camp Theme: How can NAIT Improve Its Relevancy Through The Seventies.

The keynote address was to be made by the Honorable James Foster, Minister of Education, but he could not appear, therefore the agenda was brought forward and Mr. Carter, President of NAIT, presented his opening address.

Mr. Carter opened his address by stating that the six objectives of the school are:

(1) To prepare highly skilled technicians and trademen for useful employment in the service, business and industrial segments of the economy.

(2) To provide opportunities that will facilitate students becoming fully responsible members of society. (This is a new dimension extracted from the objectives stated by Grant McEwan.)

(3) Serve the needs of citizens and the economy by providing retraining, upgrading, refresher and continuing education programs through the media of workshop seminars, symposiums focused on part-time and full-time programs.

(4) To provide community service.

(5) To provide staff development of courses and programs to meet specific needs and requirements of the business and industrial community.

(6) To foster innovation and to provide leadership for the business and industrial communities with regards to training and development of a work force.

(7) Mr. Carter then proceeded to speak about problems of the institute.

When the subject of the rising cost of education came up he really layed it on the line. He

On October 1 and 2nd Camp told the gathering that by He Ho Ha hosted 140 senior sharing this problem with them they may be able to appreciate why certain decisions are sometimes made.

Outside direction helps to make certian decisions. An example he gave was last year when they brought down the budget. It is limited to a certain per cent age over the budget of the year before, based on an inflation factor. It doesn't take into account the increase in in staff or service facilities. Last year's institute salaries were reduced by 1/4 million dollars. This year we are operating on a reduced budget and will need help. Every wage position will be examined and scrutin-

Mr. Carter then spoke on the problem of increasing student efficiency and the problem of keeping our material up to date and yet not become too far ahead of industry.

The rest of the seminar was spent discussing the three topics on the agenda:

(1) How do we develop new and expanding programs?

(2) How do we develop and evaluate curriculum?

(3) How do we improve instruction?

It was felt by most of the people there that much time was wasted on these topics. It was pointed out to Gary Meadus of Student Service that these questions have been asked for the past three years, only in different words. Mr. Meadus replied by suggesting to the gentleman that maybe the problems have never been solved. Once again this year no decisions were made. It was rather disturbing when the topic of developing and evaluating the curriculum was being discussed. Mr. R. Evans, a Marketing Analyst and senior instructor in the Business Education Department, brought forward his group's proposal. At

this point a decision could have been made. The group proposed that research be done by the Central Office and section heads who would then meet, possibly in the fall on a weekend, to discuss what they found and make a decision. They suggested this would upgrade information. improve instruction and improve communications. Mr. Evans stated that the whole process would take two years but that it should be started now. This proposal was turned down because the instructors were not willing to spend a weekend working for the well-being of NAIT and the students attending. They displayed the sick attitude of most government employees. Maybe if their tenure was taken away from them they would become more conscientious instructors. When Mr. Evans asked the gathering how many would come to a weekend meeting two thirds raised their hands. It should be noted, once again, that Mr. Evans was speaking to senior instructors, section heads, department heads, and administrators.

"How do you improve instruction" was probably the most interesting topic of the day. An "Instructor Improvement Task Force" report was passed around the room. It was prepared by five instructors of the **Business Education Department.** This report and Mr. Carter's speech were probably the only highlights of the whole seminar. The report recommends that there be student evaluation of the instructor as well as the course. It is the intention of the Nugget to get down to the real gut of this in future issues. At the moment I have to go peel a few instructors off the ceiling because I've mentioned abolishing the tenure system.

After it was all over a comment by one senior instructor

"Well it was just like last year, only this year we have to be more vigorated."




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
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2001: A SPACE ODYSSY

More than half of the movie seems to be wrapped up in an excellent display of the most advanced sets ever used on the movie screen. In a way, the film is quite lacking in actual acting content, but it is no less than excellent in its thought stimulation value. No one can leave the theatre without this movie leaving a very deep impression on their mind, either favorable or unfavorable.

PART ONE: THE DAWN OF MAN

The first part of the movie is a film history of man from his beginnings as an ape-like creature living in harmony with other animals. As it moves on, it shows man gaining dominance over the other animals of the animal kingdom and forming tribes to protect himself from other tribes of roaming humans. Living in desert conditions under the rule of "survival of the fittest", man is forced into using his intelligence to develope tools, weapons and to control fire in his quest for survival. During all this man finds a need to worship the great unknown controller of the world around him, this need being satisfied by the appearance of a giant metal column or 'oblisk' which they can't explain or destroy. Part one of the Space Odysy ends with a beautiful trip into space to the music of BLUE DANUBE WALTZ which brings us into the future in about two thousand and one. and Part two A.

PART TWO-A

Part Two-A deals with Man's high degree of technology man has reached by the year two thousand and the discovery of another oblisque (oblisk), this time on the moon. The most outstanding part of this sequence

of the film is not the acting, but, again the visual part made possible by the planned mockups made available by Pan American Airlines of future space travel vehicles that might actually be in use around the year two thousand. Man is unable to explain the presence of the nickel column, but it is pointing upwards into space towards the planet Jupiter and man is again stimulated into further exploration of the universe.

PART TWO-B

Part Two-B is probably the most interesting portion of the whole movie. It occurs about a year and a half after two-A. This part of the movie takes place on a futuristic space vehicle heading towards Jupiter (in search of the oblisque). All of the decisions on this flight are made by 'HAL', an IBM SERIES 9000 computer. Hal has total control over everything. Providing an interesting prediction that man will one day be ruled by machines or that his mind won't be able to cope with all the technology he has developed. In this part of the movie, man just performs manual tasks and makes no decisions while Hal, "the perfect computer" makes an error by losing faith with the crew members and trying to kill them as a solution, resulting in one crew member. Dave, disconnecting Hal's memory bank.

JUPITER AND BEYOND: THE INFINITE

After all this, Dave chases the monolith (oblisque) past Jupiter where we see the twenty minute light show; an exploding star; a new universe being formed from the star's fetus and a new earth being born in infrared photography. Here Dave sees the oblisque which reverts to a fetus, symbolizing a rebirth of humanity.

2001 A Space Odysy might be confusing to some people and each person who goes to see it might reach a different conclusion about it, but then again, that could be the hole purpose of the movie.

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JENSEN JACKETS & CRESTS

This is the third in a series of columns intended to inform those who are interested in high fidelity music reproduction. This time my topic is the record playing device.

There are three types of machines on which to play your records. These are the automatic changer, manual turntable and the automatic turntable. The automatic changer is what is in the widest use in the consumer grade of systems as it will automatically play a stack of records. These units are usually of inferior construction as they are not used for high fidelity reproduction. The manual turntable is the coldest type which requires the operator to set the tone arm down on the record and to remove it upon the records completion. This method does give the highest fidelity dollar for dollar but is inconvenient for most people. The most popular method is the automatic turntable. These units have a removable centre spindle and can be used as a manual turntable with the added feature of the automatic shutoff at the end of the record. For the money, the automatic turntable is the best way to start out in high fidelity.

When buying an automatic turntable make sure it comes with a synchronous motor to ensure maximum speed accuracy

along with minimum rumble and

The tone arm is an important thing to consider since this determines the life of your records. To ensure optimum record life the arm should have a counterweight and a pressure adjustment on it. Record wear is greatly recreased if the needle place less than two grams of pressure on the record. The tone arm pivot should be virtually friction free and should move easily with light taps by your fingers.

Some nice features to have are: an anti-skating control which prevents the needle from placing too much pressure against the walls of the record groove, and a cuing lever which sets the tone arm down on the record very gently.

When buying a turntable one should buy a magnetic cartridge with a diamond needle along with it. No other type of cartridge can equal their fidelity at the present time for a comparable price.

Some good lines of automatic turntables are the Dual 1200 series, the Garrard SL series, the Miracord series and the BSR McDonald series. Price starts around \$75.00 in Edmonton.




