General assembly today

On January 31, '73, there Article 4 (a) reads: will be a General Assumbly held in the Auditorium. The purpose of this assumbly is to amend the various articles in the NAIT-SA Constitution.

Article 1 (a) reads:

Eight or nine month courses including welding - \$30.00 of which \$6.00 will go towards athletics.

Amended to:

Eight or nine month courses including welding - \$30.00 of which \$10.00 will go towards athletics.

Article 1 (b) reads:

Day courses over 10 weeks -\$30.00. \$6.00 of which will go towards athletics.

Amended to:

Day courses over 10 weeks \$30.00. \$10.00 of which will Amended to: go towards athletics.

Student's Council or Council shall mean the bona-fide representatives of DEPARTMEN-TAL clubs which participate in Student's Council meetings, plus the elected members of the Board. Each council mem ber shall represent one vote on all matters brought before council.

Amended to:

Student's Council or Council shall mean the bona-fide representatives of TECHNOL-OGY clubs which participate in Student's Council meetings: brought before Council.

Article 5 reads: Meetings of the Council shall be called by six day's notice in writing, mailed to each member. Any 10 members

shall constitute a quorum.

Meetings of the Council shall

be called by six day's notice. Any 10 members other than the elected executive shall constitute a quorum.

Article 15 (b) reads:

\$150.00 plus tuition for Vice President, Treasurer, Secretary, Activities Chairman, and Publications Chairman. The

\$300 payable in February and the tuition payable in September.

Amended to:

\$300.00 plus tuitions for Vice President, Treasurer, Secretary, Activities Chairman, Athletic Chairman, and Publications Chairman. The \$150.00 payable in February and the tuition payable in September.

Addition to article 24 (g):

All nominees must have an average of 60 percent or better in their academic studArticle 26 reads:

The Board through the Secretary shall submit all nominations to the President of the Institute for his approval, within 24 hours after nominations are closed.

Amended to:

The Board through the Secretary shall submit all nominations to the President of the Institute for his academic approval within 24 hours after nominations are closed.

Addition to Article 30 (a): Re: Athletic Board.

> The books, accounts and records of the Athletic Board may be inspected by any member of the Executive or of the Society at any time upon giving reasonable notice.

NOTE: There will be a motion made by the Publications Committee regarding advertising commissions be paid to the Editor of the NUGGET.

These above are the proposed amendments. Explanations of the amendments will be given on the 31rst of January at the General Assumbly in the Auditorium.

Anyone who wishes to have a copy of the NAITSA Constitution may get them from the Student's Executive offices (E-133) or Student's Services (E-134).

These changes are proposed for the betterment of the Societt and it cannot be made without the support of the student body. Please attend the assembly, as we need 200 people to constitute a quorum.

Dear Editor:

An item appearing on the front page of the NUGGET, Jan. 17th in Arthur Alan's column, warrants correction and amplification. It concerns the yearly field trip of the second year Architecture students.

Mr. Alan correctly stated three facts: (1) that the 2nd year students take a trip each year to a city other than Edmonton to study Arch-

itecture,
(2) that the present
2nd year students plan to
go to San Francisco,

(3) that the 2nd year students have made a representation (not a plea, please) to NAITSA for financial support.

However, by excluding details of the previous trips, Mr. Alan has implied that they were much more exotic than, in fact, they were - to Vancouver and Calgary. He has also misrepresented Architecture students by failing to mention that this year, in additim to raising funds by running the Wednesday night movies and holding keg parties, each student is also contributing personally to the expense fund. Neither has Mr. Alan considered itnecessary to justify the trip in terms of its relevance to the study program of the technology, although this is an important point.

Mr. Alan is blatantly incorrect on one point, his account of the existing state of affairs between NAITSA and Architecture as regards their representation for money: it asked for the presentation of a budget before making a decision.

Mr. Alan's reporting has distorted facts both by including incorrect information in his column and by excluding information relevant to the story. I expect correction of these facts will restore perspective to the topic.

30% - participation of the sponsoring tech.


40% - competition between the candidates themselves.
























Instrumentation.



Belonging to the Grateful Dead family of musicians it is only natural that the music of NRPS is related to that of the Dead. The New Riders though have added nothing to country music other than quality. They play it as it should be played, naturally without any pretentious inflections.

NRPS consists of John Dawson (vocals, rythm guitar, guiding light) David Nelson(lead dobro and mandolin) Dave Torbert (bass) Buddy Gage (pedal steel) and Spencer Dryden (per-Spencer cussion & drums). Dryden is the former drummer for the Jefferson Airplane wisely riding with the purple sage after the airplane started having trouble getting off the ground. Bud-dy Gage, pedal steel extrodin-aire, paid his dues in the Great Speckled Bird before becoming a full fledged Rider on the last

GYPSY COWBOY is NRPS' third album and is a digression , rather than a progressfor the better. album, their best, featuring the San Francisco guru Jerry Garcia on pedal steel was country and western music pure and simple. POWERGLIDE, the second album, was an experiment in country rock with the accent on rock, an idiom better left to lesser groups.

On GYPSY COWBOY NRPS have returned to what they do best. GYPSY COWBOY has all the advantages of country music without the usual accepted disadvantages; nauseous vocals; simplistic chord structures and banal lyrics. The New Riders have seperated and churned country and western music into a sound that is smooth as cream and above all pleasing. GYPSY COWBOY also comes a long way in achieving technical parity with England. The New Riders along with Harry Nilsson are turing out some of the most finely produced albums this side of the big pond. SCHMILSSON it boasts an array of impressive guest stars. Included on 8 of the 11 tracks is Nicky Hopkins on keyboards, plus Paul Buckmaster, Klaus Voorman, and "George Harrysong"(slide guitar on you're breakin' my heart).

Most of the songs are imm-

ersed in nostalgia and sentimentality, the blatant example being REMEMBER(CHRIST-MAS) which once and for all proves Nilsson as being a singer's singer. The album's opener, TAKE 54, is a hard rocker in which Harry semi-comically complains about the difficulty of making a hit record without having a bit of loving inspiration close at hand. YOU'RE BREAKIN' MY HEART which closes the first side rubs RCA's nose with the fact that "I'm so popular I can say fuck on record and you can't do a thing about it." Don't count on hearing this song on AM radio, though. Side two com-mences with SPACEMAN, a song about a lost astronaut in orbit, which more than equals Elton John's ROCKET MAN. worst cut on the album is JOY a vain attempt to satirize country 'n western music. Not far behind is the LP's closer, THE MOST BEAUTIFUL WORLD IN THE WORLD, which coupled with overlush orchestration and inane lyrics makes for a most embarrasing, second rate Beatles GOOD NIGHT.

Hopefully with this release Nilsson has gotten musical satire out of his blood(take a look at the cover) and will once again return to the non-pretentious days of NILSSON SINGS NEWMAN where it was the singer, not the song, which made the album.




Even withstanding these losses, the Ooks can still make the playoffs. Third place is now out of reach but fourth spot should belong to NAIT by season's end.


Lopsided Murderball victory

The first ACAC Volleyball. Tournament was heldthis weekend, the Men's team winning it all and the Ladies placing fourth.





erate under that financial situation, so it was proposed that a \$4 per person increase also be included. This \$4 per person would go to the Athletic Board to be used only for sport's expenditures. That's why a positive vote is so important at the General Assembly Vote on the total \$8 increase (\$4 for NAITSA and \$4 for the Athletic Board) The Athletic board DESPERATELY needs the money.

The problem that had arrived, which this referendum will rectify, is the fact that on the ballot sheet last year, all it stated was that there would be an \$8 increase in fees for NAITSA, but it was understood that \$4 only , was to go to NAITSA and \$4 to athletics. The \$8 fee increase was voted in by the Student body. The problem is that the Athletic Board will NOT be getting the \$4 because it was not specified on the ballot. Consequently, we have to rectify this on Wednesday. Remember, this is NOT a fee increase. The money is there, but in order for it to be given to the Athletic Board, it has to be incorporated into the Constitution.

All you will be voting on is a Constitutional change. You will have a chance to ask any questions about how your money is being spent and why this money (\$4) is being reallocated.


