



*Establishing a know your student executive campaign early in the year. Perhaps pictures of student executive members and details to which students can relate information on where to go to find these people and when.


*What is happening with our money and where is it spent? We intend to present to the students information which will enable them to see what is happening with the student's money.

NAITSA Executive elections are upon us once again, with positions to be filled for the 1972-73 year. The campaigns are taking

their shape and it looks like one of our most active election weeks ever.

My nomination for the posi-

My nomination for the position of student President has been submitted, now I am in the running for that position.

In the past three years I have been very active with the Students' Association - Public Relations Director for two years and Vice-President uring the past year. In that time I have gained a great insight into the needs of our students at NAIT. Our needs do differ from college or university students in some ways and are similar in others.

There have been many considerations I have made in establishing my presidential platform through personal experience, talking and working with students, contact with instructors and staff administration, along with knowledge of government positions in regard to NAIT students, but mainly because of my concern as to the direction that I feel our students should be taking. This direction may be in the form of suggested alternatives to known problem areas, it may be in direct action, or in the form of new programs. Any of these depending upon the area in discussion.

The following is a list of some of the areas of my campaign platform and ideas I will be working on in the position of president if I am elected!

 Student Directory and Yearbook.

We have experienced much discontent with these issues in the past. I feel we should be considering alternatives to the present situation that would offer a quicker, more reliable and better quality of publications than we have received in the past.

These are actually two separate issues but they both have to be re-established, possibly as a single issue. Produced within the first four to six weeks of class. Also producing a saving to the Students' Association in the area of ten to fifteen thousand dollars.

This saving could be used to provide more student facilities within the Institute.

2. Re-activation of the President's Advisory Committee.

This group has only been called upon once during the past year and then the students desires at that meeting were not listened to. Their purpose is to assist in problem areas. There should be ascheduled monthly meeting of this committee allowing faster response to student needs, and increasing communication at the same time.

3. Reactivation of student offices; eg. Nugget, P.R., CHNR., Yearbook, etc. The communication between these areas is not what would be the best for their operations. We should look at establishing a committee with a rep, from each office, meeting at regular times, to produce a more complete internal and external communication. If communication • can be completed within the nucleus of a group then it can do nothing but mushroom to the total membership.

4. Library and Study Areas.

As we all know we have one of the most under-qualified libraries of any Institute, the Mc-Nally Library. In researching this problem I found that in area our library can only handle a student population of 1000 persons. While NAIT can hold a full time population of 4500 students and in a period of one year we house around 16,000 students. Ridiculous isn't it. But we do have alternatives, the auditorium area can easily be turned into library and studying area, to better than double our present facilities, a real need that we deserve.

5. Student Lounge Areas.

Each year our students have to give up some of their lounge areas. This effects all students, giving us little area for meetings, etc. An alternative may be sought with the opening of Grant McEwan. A decrease in some areas of enrollment at NAIT may allow us to secure room for lounge area, a definite possibility.

6. There are also areas of concern that have been started by our past student governments. I find these areas as a President's responsibility to carry them on; areas such as;

a. Student loan, Government financing

b. Student evaluation booklet of course and instructors.

c. Re-activation of participation in the Alberta Association of Students, etc.

7. A new area I would like to see instituted at NAIT is an option of self enlightenment, cultural and personal interest courses for individual students.


These are some of my areas of concern that I think of in my wish to seek the seat of President



Shinerama.





Just after the CBC Television film documentary ONE WAY TO QUIT was shown Februrary 16th, students from a Quebec Grade School wrote a touching letter to "The man who had to carry around his own oxygen supply", who appeared in the film.

Their letter was too late. The man, who cried when he pleaded with young people not to smoke, said, "For God's sake, quit while you can. If you don't you'll die." With that, tears sprang to his eyes and his voice broke.

ONE WAY TI QUIT will be repeated on CBC Television Wednesday, March 29th from 8:00 to 9:00 p.m., so that more school children will be able to see it. The film documentary, produced by Larry Gosnell, brought more favourable reaction from its 1.4 million than any other information program on CBC-TV this season.

Toronto Sun TV Columnist, Bob Blackburn, said the day after he saw a press review of the program, that he wrote his first column in 25-years without lighting a cigarette.

At Branson Hospital in Willowdale, the switchboard was jammed with telephone calls the day after telecast for 12-hours. Branson's anti-smoking program increased its enrollment from 150 to 600, and calls are still coming in from people wanting to quit smoking.

MUSWELL HILLBILLIES The KINKS

Norman Jewison's movie, "Fiddler on the Roof" which stars Topol, Norma Crane, Leonard Frey, Molly Picon and Paul Mann to name a few, is the story o fa small Jewish village in Czarist Russia just before the revolution. The story centers around a poor but happy milkman, married and "blessed??" with five daughters.

An old woman in the village is acting as the village matchmaker and is working very hard to find a husband for the milkman's oldest daughter. In the past the milkman has not been very happy with the choices that the matchmaker has come up with and has said "no" to the marriages. This time the matchmaker comes up with a good choice, the village butcher.

A change is creeping over the land and even enters the milkman's quiet little village. A young man, poorer than a church (pardon me, a synagogue) mouse asks the milkman for his daughter's hand in marriage. Preposterous! Unheard of! But then, it's quite ob-

The change continues to come. The second daughter tells her father she is going to marry the boy she loves. All she asks is for his blessing. The milkman is openminded enough that he gives his blessing and his permission. The third daughter commits an even graver sin. She wants to marry a young Russian farmer. With this thought the father cannot cope. He orders this daughter's lover to be forgotten.

Then comes the edict that all the Jews must sell their homes and leave in three days. The unhappy people prepare to leave. The one happy spot at this time is that the third daughter and her husband come to say goodbye as they too are leaving. The milkman says nothing to his daughter until they turn to go. Then with a quiet "God bless you", he takes her back into his heart.

Who is the fiddler on the roof? He is the symbol of the shakey position of people who rely entirely on the past and on tradition to govern their lives. He is also a symbol of strength for the future because he gives the milkman a smile on his face and a spring in his step as he and the rest of his family leave their old home and move away. Where to? Nobody knows.

In my opinion this film is superb. The musical score was adapted and conducted by John Williams who has done a fantastic job. The man behind the camera need not play second fiddle to anyone, for the photography is excellent. I believe that this film rates on at least an even par with "Dr. Zhivago" or "The Sound of Music".
