

CANADIAN **MUSIC** LIVES!

A while ago, namely, a couple of weeks, I was at the SUB at the university for a VERY important, ah, meeting. What I ended up doing that evening was not what you may think, but I had a good time anyway. If you want to know just what it was, read on.

We (I don't have to say who

was with) went down to the Dinwoodie Lounge. It seemed there was some kind of concert going on, so we went in. The band was relatively well known; from Toronto, "A Foot in Cold Water." We waited for them to come on. And waited. Then a girl mounted the stage and told us a little about the band and the delay it turned out to be contract buggerup. They said they were going to play anyway. And they did.
A Foot in Cold Water is a very

good, Canadian, Yank, or otherwise. Their instrumentation and choice of equipment is as good as any other band, and they know what they're doing on stage and in the studio. They played for only an hour or so, but people were clapping their hands and whistling anyway. Alex Machin didn't sing a hell of a lot, but when he did, his voice fit in with every riff, rhythm and melody they produced. In ("Make Me Do) Anything You Want," the song that was released as a single not too long ago, Paul Naumann played a slow. rhythmical guitar solo that, well, was pretty damn good. Hugh Legatt, on bass guitar, didn't come into the spotlight, but, like most good bass players, he world have ruined the set by not being there. Bob Horn, playing electric organ and backing percussion, did a couple of good breaks without overdoing his thing.

The last number, featuring Dan Taylor on drums, was something you don't expect to hear live, especially here in Edmonton. His drum mikes were connected to some kind of instrument that changed their tone electronically. So, if you can imagine what his solo was like, you must like good drumming.

"A Foot in Cold Water" has one album out, on their own label, and another one coming soon. If their albums are as good as their NOTE: concerts, then this is one band worth listening to.

EDITORIAL

Ninety-two point four per cent of Juvenile delinquents have eaten tomatoes

Eighty-seven point one per cent of the adult criminals in penitentiaries throughout the United States* have eaten tomatoes.

While I am generally positively-oriented toward NAIT and its student body, there are a few things I dislike - some rather vehemently.

For what they are worth here are my beefs. I will list them briefly now:

1. Even though NAIT is a school of technology and trades and has some of the most advanced equipment and knowledge in all Canada, we have no intercom system. Trying to contact an individual without an intercom is often very frustratingly complicated process. For example, when a student leaves his car lights on, there is no way for the commissionaires to contact him. I could cite other examples too.

2. Because NAFT has a relatively high student withdrawl rate in some technologies, in my opinion, I think that more applicants should be interviewed before they attend NAIT. If this was done, the withdrawl rate would probably be lessened and several students would be spared additional expences and frustrations. One of the main reasons for student withdrawl at NAIT is lack of knowledge concerning his choise of technol-Whose fault is this.

3. Almost everything is

cheaper at NAIT than at the University. Food prices and tuition are two very obvious examples. One thing that is not cheaperat NAIT is the price of making copies from the two copy machines in the library. The price at NAIT is 10¢, while copies can be purchased f per page at the U of A and the U of C. The quality of the copies at NAIT are also relatively poor-in my opinion. NAITSA owns the copy machine in the library, SO I am suggesting that all users of the NAIT copy machines UNITE and PROTEST to the NAITSA excutative! Why should copy machines users be discriminated against? If NAIT SA needs more money then they should get it some way. When I want copies made I have my brother make copies for me at the University. 4. I am the NAIT chaplaincy

co-ordinator and it is my distinct impression that the services of our chaplains are grossly "underused". The chaplains are here for the students. Why not consult them? They can be contacted through the Counselling Centre (E-121, 416 Grey Phone.)

"Lady Sing The Blues" is the typical overblown Hollywood production. It contains 168 scenes and 64 actors and actresses with speaking roles... 34 black and 30 white. Five months alone was spent sorting through 200-odd songs that Billie Holiday performed; many other days and hours were spent digging up the time-worn photos of Harlem in the 1930's...all adding up to a far too lengthy motion picture. From the opening scen it takes two and a half hours for Billie to reach the top subseq avoiding showing her death but instead merely superimposing the headlines of her final decline over those of her triumphant opening night at Carnegie Hall.

Billie Dee Williams, whose only previous exposure was the portrayal of Gayle Sayers in the television film "Brian's Song" and is more competant as Louis McKay who loved and helped Billie in her climb to success and her fight against drugs. Diana Ross is surprisingly good in the title role, considering this is her first acting assignment. Her attempts at comedy, though, are useless. even ambarrassing. One thing is certain, though, whenever Diana Billie witnesses the injustices of Ross opens her mouth to sing, she is, indeed, Billie Holiday.

TWO MURDERED IN BATON ROUGE CAMPUS CLASH

BATON ROUGE (CUPI) -

The flurry of press reports concerning the killing of two black students at Southern University here last week studiously glossed over the background to the crisis and events leading up to the mur-

Any analytical account would have revealed the student uprising was the result of deep-seated grievances and commanded the support of students across Louisiana.

The actions were aimed against an administration which ruled with

with virtually despotic powers, and campus facilities which were outmoded and inadequate.

On Nov. 1, Southern president Leon Netterville closed Baton Rouge campus after a loud student demonstration protesting the State Board of Education's refusal to consider the students' most important demands for university reform.

The demands included the immediate dismissal of Netterville and vice-president Emmett Bashful. Students also asked that their successors be selected by a "university executive council," composed of two students for each faculty member or administrator. Under current practice the pastpresident choses his own succes-

Student grievances over the two officials arose from the State Board of Education's policy of allowing a university president complete control over the operations of the universities. Netterville reportedly ran the Southern University system as a "complete monarchy." Appointed 3 years before the retirement age, Netterville reserves absolute authority over hiring and firing of

Students on the predominately black campus consider Netterville and Bashful "Uncle Toms." Racial tensions in the New Orleans and Baton Rouge areas have been unusually high over the past few years. Three years ago New Orleans witnessed a Black Panther shoot-out, resulting in a general discontentment on the part of local militants.

Local feelings against the Panthers ran high, with court convictions of blacks frequent, even by black jurors. Many out-ofstate Panthers have apparently come to Louisiana to assist the Southern students.

While rejecting the key demands on Nov. 1, the State Board of Education did approve others, including better maintenance of the campus and improved classroom facilities. The Board had originally refused to hear the students but a large march on the capital persuaded it to open its

Immediately after Netterville closed the Baton Rouge campus that day, students on the New Orleans campus staged a sympathy strike and occupied the administration building there. Militant students ejected all newsmen and university officials from the building and hoisted the black. red and green flag of black liberation to the top of the flag-

Other colleges around the state experienced supportative actions. Students at the virtually all-black Grambling University in Ruston staged a related strike and class boycott. The boycott was 30 percent effective, an administration source said.

Student organizers of the Grambling strike gave the administration a list of grievences which included a lack of student voice in the decison-making, the administration on-imposed dress code, the lack of adequate medical facilities, and the lack of an effective telephone system. Administrators met with a committee of students and agreed to work together to solve some of the complaints.

Students, meanwhile, continued to strike, marched to the dining hall where they tossed tables through windows, went to the stu-dent union building where they broke more windows, took over the women's dormitory, blockaded campus streets, burned the state and federal flags, and destroyed the press boxes on the football field. The students were dispersed by 150 state troopers with mace. The administration tried to keep classes open, with a 10:30 p.m. curfew imposed on the campus.

With the National Guard standing by throughout the state, a member of the all-white, all-male Board of Education said Nov. 6 the Board "cannot allow revolutionaries to dictate policies to our schools....immediate action is a must."

On Nov. 9, the action came but not the way this gentleman anticipated.

Louisiana governor Edwin Edwards gave the students in New Orleans until 1 p.m. to vacate the administration building or be evicted "by whatever means nec-essary." State police and National Guardsmen stood by, out of

Some 90 minutes after the deadline had passed, administrators met with the Governor and emerged from the meeting with the resignation of vice-president Bashful.

Vice-president for 14 years, Bashful said he hoped his resignation would avoid any confrontations between students and the police "that might result in loss of lives."

The governor said university officials had been reluctant to ask for Bashful's resignation but Bashful was determined the action would be best for the university."

The 150 students inside the building then left with fists clenched high in the black power salute, to the applause of their fellow students. But they vowed to continue a classroom boycott until all further demands are met.

"If Dr. Bashful had not resigned we were prepared to move them out this afternoon," the governor said. We are very grate-

ful to resolve this without any means to protest, and warned the damage to property and injury to persons.'

The students also secured 'academic amnesty" for themselves and the 9,000 students at the Baton Rouge campus which was still shut down.

Other concessions won included city bus service direct to the SUNO campus, authority for student audits of the university's financial records and improved campus medical services.

The strike continued up to Nov. 16 when students entered the administration building at Baton Rouge. Police ordered them to leave and advanced on the building. Police claim a bomb was thrown at them, resulting in a 10 minute confused melee in which police hurled tear gas at the crowd of students outside.

When it was all over, two students lay dead of gunshot wounds this type of oppression." in the head and shoulder. Police claimed no officer discharged a weapon during the confusion, but Edwards later said some officers may have mistakenly put buckshot-filled shells in their shotguns instead of the tear gas cartridges they were supposed to carry.

But , police officials had admitted earlier their men carried live amunition, although they denied it had been used. No weapons were found in the building or

Leaders of the student protest movement charged at a news conference Nov. 17 they had been "set up" to be killed in the confrontation.

They said they were told by Netterville to wait in his office until he returned from a meeting and could talk to them. Authorities said they moved because the students were occupying the building.

To avenge the killings, students set fire to three university buildings that day.

In Toronto black civil rights lawyer Charles Roach told about 150 students at a memorial service for the students Nov.16 the university, city, state were to blame for the killings.

"Power doesn't yield to briefs," he said. "The students there and at other campuses are forced to take these actions because they are frustrated by the lack of representation they have in democracy."

Roach said the same type of oppressive approach was taken by the administration at Montreal's Sir George Williams University in 1969 when a \$1 million computer centre was destroyed when police tried to remove occupying students during a protest against racism.

"This oppression of minority peoples should be of great concern to you, for you are not far from the same situation," Roach said. What happens in the U.S. has a very strong influence on our lives here in Canada and we must avoid

Roach recently represented former Black Panther Edward Hogan in his attempt to fight deportation to the U.S. Hogan was serving a sentence in Cleveland for murder and armed robbery. He escaped to Canada.



LOCAL BOYCOTT COMMITTEE SEEKS HELP

Committee is a volunteer group of Edmonton consumers. Our membership consists of students, workers, and housewives. We have organized ourselves in support of the National Farmers Union boycott of all Kraft products. Our committee is organizing and co-ordinating boycott activities in Edmonton in conjunction with the activities of The National Farmers Union and other boycott committees across Canada.

Some time ago, the McFarlane Task Force on Agriculture in the 1970's appeared, predicting that by

The Edmonton Boycott Kraft the year of 1980, two thirds of the then existing farm families will have left the land: The present migration from the land is due in a large part to the cost/price squeeze whereby large agri-business--secondary industry related to farming, from machinery manufacturers to foodprocessors, confront the farmer in monopoly-oligopoly form at both

the input and output ends of his operation. Family farms are being replaced by corporate farms, which then tend towards vertical integration, from seedling to finished product in the supermarket. When the family farms disappear, NUGGET Boycott

rural communities stagnate and are eventually replaced by a few company towns.

- Over 1000 farmers per month are being forced off the land.
- -- Both the provincial and federal levels of government are speeding up the trends outlined in the task force.
- The small cheese plants in Ontario have had their milk supply taken from them with a quota system introduced and managed by the Ontario Milk Marketing Board and transferred to outfits like Kraftco. Once there were 500 cheese plants, there are now 42.
- Taxpayers are forced to subsidize the Kraftco plant at Ingleside to the tune of \$250,000 in the form of an interest-free, forgiveable government loan. Kraftco's net income in 1969 was \$82,006-
- Production and merchandising costs will increase under total corporate control, while the qualcorporate control, while the quality decreases. This directly affects the consumer.
- Many farmers are being forced onto high unemployment and welfare in the overcrowded cities.

After all other attempts failed, a boycott of all Kraft products was initiated by the Ontario dairy farmers through the National Farmers Union to bring Kraftco, he price-setter in the purchasing of industrial milk, to the bargaining table to negotiate the terms and conditions under which industrial milk will be marketed.

The Kraft boycott is the first step in a non-violent protest (in the manner of Martin L. King and Cesar Chavez) by Canadian farmers against giant American corporations over collective bargaining rights. "The average Canadian farmer is 52 years oldhis net income is in the vicinity of \$2,000." A moral issue is clearly involved when a quota system is being used to bankrupt farmers through the creation of monopoloid cheese processing. A Kraftco monopoly is equally ominous to us as consumers. OBJECTIVES of the BOYCOTT COMMITTEE.

We seek social change in two areas, the first of an immediate nature and the second of a more continuing nature.

Establishing the reality of collective bargaining as a right of the farmer.

Establishing and strengthening rural-urban alliances as educational and action oriented community groups non-aligned with any particular political party.

We seek the educational tasks of the committee to be as follows:

- To demonstrate that both the individual dairy farmer and the individual consumer are over the same 'cracker barrel'.
- As an informational alternative to the advertising now used by Kraftco, to provide sound quantitative and qualitative data on the nutritional value and the wholesale and retail marketing activities of Kraftco with comparative figures on other producers and their products.
- To demonstrate that existing trends quoted in task forces are the results of decisions and non-decisions by citizens and their governments. We are advancing the urban-rural alliance as a lobby of the individual producer and consumer against corporate and government policies that favor the concentration of wealth, power, minority at the expense of creating urban and rural social and economic problems.

You can support the boycott W. A. S. by sending a letter to Kraftco urging them to sit down with the farmers at the bargaining table. Let us know of your support also. As well we are requesting that you distribute boycott information amoung your membership. The purchase of media materials is our greatest expenditure. 














IN DEFENSE OF THE NASTY SWASTIKA

Record Reviews

Mckendree Spring "3" (Decca DL 7-5332).

As the title states, this is the third release by McKendree Spring, their first 2 LP's no longer available to the public. Their roots are entrenched in country and their first 2 albums included such country-rock standards as James Taylor's "Fire and Rain," the difference being the 1se of a moog synthesizer and/or theremin to carry the melody.

This is their best release as Mckendree Spring has gained their own confidence as songwriters... the best composition being "God Bless The Conspiracy," composed by violinist Michael Dreyfuss. It is an electronic extravaganza as his violin and viola are fed in via a direct line. These are out through some effect units, then a ring modulator, and finally an echoplex tape delay. The resultant effect is staggering. At the other end of the spectrum is a much improved and much more relaxed version of Neil Young's "Down By The River."

"Gone To My Head" - Andy Bown. (Mercury SRM 1-625)

Andy Bown, formerly of the Herd and more recently the obscure Judas Jump, has released a solo album for Mercury Recorus. As is the tengency wim most solo efforts, the session musicians involved tend to become almost overlooked as they are merely a backreop for Andy's work upfront. This is a shame since there is a fine performance on acoustic guitar by ex-Herder Peter Frampton. Also rating an "A" is Micky Waller, Rod Stewart session man, on drums.

The production provided by Jimmy Horowitz is lush but not overly so. Strings are used merely to fill in the holes and nothing more. All the songs are carefully constructed with no words wasted. The transitions are smooth and there is nothing on the album that doesn't belong.

All eleven tunes are hummable and easily memorable after only a few listenings. All are potential hit singles but with prepubic crap such as "Puppy Love" reaching no. 1 you never know for sure.

"SAILIN' SHOES" - Little Feat. (Warner Bros. BS 2600).

Like Crosby, Stills, Nash, and Young, Little Feat are concerned with contemporary myths and living folklore. Unlike C,S,N & Y, Little Feat deal with the more realistic aspects of American life, not the more surreal ones. Whereas the former sing of pollution-free rural skies and country pastures expansive as infinity itself, Little Feat deal with clip joints, greasy spoons, big trucks, and seedy hotels...... and they do it with a passion. Complete with steamy organ manned by Bill Payne and a roaring, howling slide guitar played by Lowell George this album is surprisingly reminisc-ent of the Stones' "Exile On Main Street" (minus the horns) even though "Sailin' Shoes" is an earlier release.

"THEM. FEATURING VAN MORRISON" - Them (Parrot BP 71053-4)

> roots...a two record testament to the turbulent rock of the midsixties, complete with punky chord changes and Jagger-like vocals.

Naturally Morrison was the leader and chief songwriter... sometimes an almost mentor-like guiding light, so much so that hardly anything is known concerning the remainder of the group. Much included here is performed by session men, prominently Jimmy Page, but all the conceptions were Van's and fine creations they were too. "Gloria" (probably the greatest punk-rock song ever written) alone is well worth the price of the LP.

This album is in fact an edited version of 2 long-since deleted American releases, "Them" and "Them Again". Other Them material was released in Britain and hopefully another anthology. LP will result. If this seems a good idea it's because THEM's music is so overpowering. They were an Irish band from Belfast and all their street-fighting Celtic roots transformed into their music untouched. "Them, Featuring Van Morrison," no matter how gentle the intent, all songs come off hard as nails.
