



ASTHMA TREATMENT

Dear Don:

I have heard that asthma has been cured through hypnosis. Do you know anything about this? J. Lawrence

Dear J.

Descriptions and speculations on the causes of bronchial asthma are found in medical writing since the time of Hippocrates (460 -355 B.C.), but the psyche was not incriminated until Sir John Floyer (1649-1734) included environmental and emotional factors in the aetiological list in his book, On the Asthma, published at the end of the 17th century.

Today few people doubt the interrelation between the psyche and asthma. However, there are differences of opinion as to the importance of the role of the psyche.

Many research projects have been conducted on the use of hypnosis in the treatment of asthma. Those reporting good results

seem to outnumber those reporting poor results about 4 to 1. Dr. A.A. Meares stated that, in his experience, "the response of patients with bronchial asthma has been so good that it seems foolish for any asthmatic not to try hypnotherapy...". While writing on the use of Steriods for Asthmatic Children, Dr. S.E. Browne suggested " a routine trial of hypnotherapy before exposing any child to the risk of steriod dependency. He reported that 70% of asthmatic children in his practice were permanently helped by this method.

David R. Collison, in a recent study describes how he had either good or excellent response in 16 out of 20 cases in which hypnotherapy was used on asthmatics. In his treatment he emphasized relaxation, both physical and mental. He described asthmatics as tending to be unduly sensitive, and thus tried to give posthypnotic suggestions which would improve the patients' ability to cope with his environment.

It would appear that hypnosis is the treatment of asthma has some definite benefits.

Safe Driving Week (Dec. 1 8, '73) set no examples for anyone to follow with the death of two Edmontonians and the critical injuring of a third. These included the death of an 11 year old boy (by a man charged with driving with a blood alcohol content exceeding .08%) and the critical injury to an eight year old girl only one block from NAIT.

M. promised development of the Alberta oil sands and removal of the Ottawa Valley line which presently "cuts-off" western oil from Eastern markets making the East dependant on Arabian oil

n "INSTITUTE SECURITY" By - S/SGT Johnston

The topic for this column is presented for the express purpose of enlightening any INSTIT-UTE people who might not be aware of their responsibility with regards to the SECURITY of the INSTITUTE.

During after hours, the INSTI-TUTE is kept locked and persons desiring entry must do so via the MAIN entrance - at the east doors of the Main Lobby. They are required to sign in the register and to state the time of entry and the location of the room or area they intend to visit.

All-Staff-Instructors and Students are responsible to resist any plea for entry into ANY area of the INSTITUTE by anyone. Even though the person is recognized as a fellow Institute member, entry must be refused. The reason for signing the register is for identification of area and person and time. This cannot be accomplished when entry is gained without any traceable action.

Any institute personnel or student should report an illegal entry as soon as possible when discovered. This is not a petty act on the part of the person reporting. It is a safeguard for his personal property as well as the property of the Institute that well may be

Fall term university passes will continue to be honored until December 31, 1973.


Students may return these when spring term passes are sold, and receive either a credit on the price of a spring term pass, or a cash refund.

study finds women patients more often drugged than treated



Anaheim, Calif. (CUP-LNS)-Dr. Linda Fidell, associate professor of psychology at California State University in Northridge, claims that many women patients are drugged instead of treated. Her analysis of medical and sociological studies shows women are given moodmodifying drugs, such as barbiturates, sedatives hynotics, relaxants, tranquilizers, antidepressants, and pep-pills twice as often as men.

Forty-eight per cent of American women over 30 years old take mood pills said Dr. Fidell.

Citing a Canadian study, Dr. Fidell noted that, when asked to describe a "typical complaining patient," 72% of the doctors described a female patient, 4% described a male, and 24% did not specify sex. "These physicians are programmed to think of women as hypochondriacs," said Dr. Fidell.

Fidell sees a direct link between this "programming" and the \$750 million advertising campaign that drug companies direct at physicians each year. She and a colleague, Dr. Jane Prather, studied the ads in four medical journals.

Fidell and Prather's report, entitled, "Put Her Down and Drug Her Up", found that adsunderrepresented women as suffering from organic or physical problems. "The women patients were in ads for stimulants or tranquilizers; the men were in ads for medicine treating specific diseases," noted Dr. Fidell.

Pointing to an ad which read, "Treat one...six people benefit," Fidell said "Worst of all, the medical problem in which a woman was used as an advertising model often was focused on the fact that she was irritating to somebody because of her complaints and that someone was usually her husband or her doctor."

The report finds that sex role stereotypes are strongly reinforced. Over a five year period covering some 423 ads, there was not a single example of a woman doctor, despite the fact that 7% of the country's physicians are, in fact, female.

Nor was there a single case of a male nurse. Furthermore, nurses almost invariably were depicted as "attractive" young women. Older women were not in evidence in the medical profession, and in general, women were portrayed as house-keepers, homemakers, clerks, telephone operators, etc. Women were never portrayed in professional positions.

Medical statistics show that women make more visits to physicians, have higher admission rates to general hospitals, and use more psychoactive drugs

However, other statistics show that women live longer and are less susceptible to circulatory, digestive and infectious ailments.

Fidell and Prather conclude that women suffer greater stress in their assigned roles and lead lives of less fulfillment and greater frustration. And both doctors and drug companies contribute toward defining and reinforcing these roles, at the same time making money off the problems they cause.

This is demonstrated by the following ad: "The Collector; at 35 she's collected among other things, a college degree she's never used, two children underfoot most of the day, a husband whose career takes him away most of the time, a folder of unpaid bills, and various physical symptoms--real or imagined."

But whatever woman's problems, physical or emotional, doctors and drug companies have only one solution--"Drug Her Ib"

what women can do to protect themselves

OTTAWA (CUP) -- While only an intensive course in the martial arts (karate, judo, etc.) can give women some insurance against attacks from the general stronger man, here's several hints which may help in time of danger. -If you are going out alone at night, become familiar with the fire alarm boxes on your route' fire engines usually move fast. All you're risking is a charge of public mischief, which is unlikely under the circumstances. -Carry a small can of hair spray. Keep it accessible, say in your coat pocket. The spray will immobilize them temporarily, if you hit them in the eyes.

-Or, follow the suggestion of a gay protective squad in California which advocates carrying small spray cans of red paint.

-To assure a reaction, if you are attacked and are near an office building or apartment block, yell "FIRE" rather than "HELP." People's apathy usually hasn't reached the point of ignoring such a call.

-Do anything you can to harm him.

-Do not use or carry a weapon which could be turned on you. If you have been sexually

assaulted:
-Report the rape immediately to
the police and subject yourself
immediately to a doctor's
examination at a hospital. Reporting the rape may be embarrassing and degrading but you

-Do not expect any sympathy;

owe it to other women.

-Expect to be questioned like a criminal --you must prove you have a case. Also expect totally irrelevant questions about your personal life.

-In court it will seem as if you and your vagina are on trial.
-Dropping the case is condoning the rape. Expect friends and family to urge you to drop it

but do not give in.

If women refuse to be intimidated by the hospitals, police and the courts, rape will lose its stigma and the rapist will lose his best defense against arrest and conviction.

GAY'S PROBLEMS SEVERE

IN STRAIGHT SOCIETY

KINGSTON (CUP)—The female homosexual is in worse straits than the male homosexual since she is both a woman and a homophile and suffers from the stereotyping accruing from the combination of the two, George Hislop of the Community Homophile Association of Canada told

Queen's students recently.

Hislop's speech followed a film "Anything You Want to Be" dealing with the double standard imposed on women throughout their lives; they can be anything as long as they are housewives and mother.

Hislop insisted that homosexuality is a fact, has always been a fact, and needs no more explanation than heterosexuality. The only difference between a homosexual and a heterosexual is the primary erotic attraction.

A homophile is no more promiscuous than is a hetero-

sexual. Just as the heterosexual is not attracted to every member of the opposite sex, neither is the homosexual attracted to every member of her sex, he said.

A large number of homosexuals are married, through pressures applied by family and friends or the need for a cover, he maintained.

The legal aspects of homosexuality are a primary concern of the Homophile Association which Hislop leads. Although the Criminal Code

still discriminates against those single and under 21 who engage in sexual acts, whether homosexual or heterosexual, Hislop claimed that generally it is only the homophile who is prosecuted. He suggested that this is because heterosexual policemen cannot identify with homosexuals.

The homophile is confronted with other legal oppressions. The Immigration Act forbids a known

homosexual to enter the country. A homophile is not allowed to adopt a child. Homosexual fathers or mothers are not allowed access to their children.

The last two restrictions, Hislop contended, were considered to be rooted in the fear that a homosexual is immoral and would raise the child as a homophile.

Although the association has made some progress in amending certain legal discriminations, he admitted that progress is slow and it is difficult to solicit aid from political circles.

Hislop suggested that if straights discuss their fears and feelings of sexuality with gay acquaintances, 4,000 years of discrimination could be terminated. If a straight's reaction was indiffernt to gay's, the homophile would no longer need to fear condemnation. This, he concluded, is the objective of the association.

women face discrimination at U. of A.

Women are being discriminated against at the University of Alberta, or at least some staff members seem to think so.

That was a preliminary observation of a task force study on the status of women at the university released to the Senate in Red Deer Friday.

Although men and women's perceptions vary to a great degree, there is general agreement that it is more difficult for women to be hired, promoted, or appointed to administrative positions.

The task force sent questionaires to 2,000 staff members, testing their perception of discrimination on campus. About 40 per cent of the questionairesthree quarters of them from menwere returned and analyzed computers. Dr. Dallas Cullen a member of the task force, said about 80 per cent of women polled felt men received pref-

erential treatment, and 60 per cent of men agreed.

The report also stated that more than 60 per cent (78 per cent women, 50 per cent men) of those polled believe that men are more likely to be hired.

Overall, 75 per cent of women believe men are more likely to be promoted (40 per cent of men agreed).

Almost 80 per cent believe men are preferred for administrative positions; 81 per cent of women think this is so, 73 per cent of men agree.

Cullen, a professor in commerce and business adminstration, emphasized that the study was only in its preliminary stage. Starting in December, the task force will conduct personal interviews with women on alleged cases of discrimination.

It is hoped the task force will complete the study by May, 1974. If the task force concludes that discrimination exists, it will make recommendations to help alleviate it.

WOMEN and CREDIT

A speech to the Credit Grantors Assoc., Windsor, May 22 reprinted from CHITTY'S LAW JOURNAL, Pat Noonan

One woman had charge accounts in several stores. After she was married she asked that her accounts be changed to her new name and address. One store immediately closed her account, and the others sent her application blanks to open new accounts in her husband's name, based on his credit rating.

A woman making \$20,000 a

A woman making \$20,000 a year, \$7,000 more than her husband, applied for a Diner's Card. She was asked to obtain his signature as her authorizing officer!

One of the banks gave a single man a \$1,000 credit line, while a single woman, with the same salary and more capital, was granted only \$500.

Another woman in her forties the head of her family, wanted to buy a home for herself and her children. She was told that to get a mortgage she would have to ask her seventy five year old father, living on a pension, to cosign it.

A single woman in her early thirties was denied a bank loan to purchase a summer home, although she had the cash for a substantial down payment and was steadily employed as a practical nurse. Her fiance, who had gone through bankruptcy, had no trouble getting a loan to buy the same property with a smaller down payment.

When a couple applied for a home loan, the wife, twenty nine, was told that in order for her salary to be counted as part of the total family income she must sign an affidavit stating that she would practice birth control and planned to have no more children. This despite the fact that the woman had worked steadily for thirteen years, was earning \$475 a month and her only child was eight years old.

The mother refused to sign the pledge, and, since her husband's earnings were not enough to qualify them for a loan, they lost their new home.

A 1971 survey of savings and loan associations asked how these organizations would credit the salary of a twenty five year old wife with two school age children, a woman who worked full time as a secretary. Of the seventy four that replied, twenty five per cent would count none of the wife's earnings; over half would count half or less; twenty two per cent would give full credit.

Another study was done on bank loan policy. A man and a woman, each earning \$12,000 and each sole support of a family with almost identical financial and personal qualifications, visited twenty three banks to borrow \$600 for a used car. More than half the banks refused to lend the woman money without her husband's signature, or approved the loan only as an exception to their usual procedures.

Several suspected that the woman's marriage was introuble when she said she did not want to ask her husband to cosign and recommended marriage counselling.

These and other stories add up to the claim that banks, savings and loan associations, credit card companies, retail stores and the government all discriminate against women in extending credit . . women in all stages of life . whether single, married, divorced or widowed; with or without children, rich or poor, young or old.

Most of the complaints come from married women. They resent the fact that credit cards are issued in the names of their husbands regardless of the woman's financial qualifications. A woman who has worked before her marriage and continues to do so after, discovers that marriage cancels out her former responsibility toward money and bills. She is a non-person. Her credit cards are cancelled. She can get new ones in her hus-

band's name, but her past record is not taken into consideration. Suddenly she is a dependent who cannot be trusted unless Daddy signs for her. Often she suffers from a drop in credit rating and this usually results in loss of credit in her own name.

But no laws exist in any province which prohibit credit being extended to married women. The differential treatment is largely the result of policies and practices arising from the legal responsibility of a husband for his wife's debts.

To many men this is an unfair responsibility. But if women were given salary for housework and childcare services then they could manage their own debts. Until this comes about though, many women have their own money from outside the home and they would like to have credit cards that they can take care of by themselves.

Another area of discrimination is that of loans and mortgages. A married woman's financial status often means little or nothing when she and her husband apply for a loan or a mort-Many banks and lending institutions have simply refused to take into account a wife's income. Consequently, the families have been denied credit because husbands income alone is not sufficient. The decision is often based on theoretical future events: the lender conjectures that the woman might get pregnant and/or stop working. Once again, married women become financial non-persons.

Many women presented briefs of complaint to the Royal Commission on the Status of Women. This led to the recommendation "that the National Housing Loan Regulations be amended so that for purposes of the gross debt service ratio either husband or wife may be deemed to be the purchaser, and up to 50 per cent of the income of the spouse of the purchaser may be included in computing the annual income."

Such changes have been enacted by the federal government but many other loan and credit granting agencies have some catching up to do.

If married women have complaints, widows and divorcees find a new complication. Whether or not they have worked in the past they have difficulty getting credit unless they have established their own credit recordafeat that's almost impossible, since a married woman can seldom get credit in her own name. The present rate of marriage breakdown is increasing the number of women who are making independent financial deals.

Many of these credit complaints have come to my attention because of my involvement in Women's Liberation. It is important to listen to what women are saying today. There's a new consciousness around. Women are standing up and saying that they are people too. This new consciousness rejects the traditional stereotype of the dependent female who has to be defined by the man in her life.

More and more women are saying that they are responsible human beings who are quite capable of making decisions on their own. The use of Ms. instead of Miss or Mrs. says something about their desire to be recognized as individuals. Mr. is accepted for men even though it makes no reference to marital status. But when it comes to a woman, the paramount issue is whether or not she is married.

Marriage would be more popular if it had room for two people instead of one and a half. Most women in Women's Liberation are married, but they do not see why a marriage contract has to wipe out their personhood and individuality. I probably do not have to tell you how they are reacting to some of the put downs they have received.

But there are many other women, not identified with Women's Liberation, who are speaking up about their lack of recognition. They have seen some progress made in the area of job discrimination. Recent work legislation ensures that women must not be treated differently at work because of sex.

But these work improvements only draw more attention to the issue of credit discrimination. More than three million Canadian women are working full time. They make up one third of the work force (and half of them are married). They see the contradiction. If they are good enough to work, why aren't they good enough to get credit?

I am speaking for some angry women . . . Credit personnel are very unpopular in women's circles. Maybe the anger is misdirected but they see credit grantors as people who stereotype women. All women are credit risks . . all women get pregnant . . all women quit their jobs.

Being refused credit for reasons connected to sex or marital status has been a radicalizing experience for women who never believed that Women's Liberation stuff before. Individuals have become angry, but very little large scale organizing has been done locally. But as more and more women exchange stories, the demand for change increases.

Some groups have kept a file of cases where women give reasons for the credit refusal. It doesn't take long to get a list of the places accused of credit discrimination. Boycotting is still an effective weapon for women because of their consumer nower.







Toronto Women's Conference A Disappointment

TORONTO (CUP) -- A concoction of Marxist hairsplitting, rhetoric, and frustration scarred the women's conference held recently in Toronto.

Quite a few of the participating women, who were of all ages and backgrounds, became alienated as certain political groups manipulated the conference and turned discussion sessions into hottempered debates on the necessity of linking feminism to socialism. Booing and hissing was a common occurence.

The three Trotskyist groups present, Young Socialist League for Socialist Action, the Revolutionary Marxist Group, and the Spartacist League from the USA, provoked a general fray with ideological fists flying and angry processions to the microphone.

Although each of these promotes different interpretations of the particulars of the proleterian revolution, they all place the women's liberation movement in the broader context of class struggle. They contend that the feminist movement will not be viable within a capitalist society which thrives on keeping some groups subjugated. In their analysis, the powers to be overthrown are the capitalist institutions which keep both men and women entrenched in alienating labor.

Much opposition was directed at the Spartacists, who tried to dominate several sessions. They believed that there were "important differences" between feminism and socialism. Feminism leads to an alliance with the bourgeoise, they claimed, whereas socialism leads to a union with the working class, the ultimate holders of social power.

However, at least two other discernible groups opposed these Trotskyist perspectives.

The moderate reformist group called for change through the legislation within the social system.

The Resurgent Feminists, a radical lesbian group, espoused the position that women must

struggle for a completely female society. Even Dr. Henry Morgenthaler, the symbol of the prolegalization of abortion group, was not exempt from their wrath. "Men everywhere at all times are the enemy. All males thrive on the oppression of women."

As well as neglecting "to forget individual differences and struggle for agreed-upon issues" as one speaker had instructed the participants, the conference was also characterized by a certain "flea market" atmosphere. The almost evangelical fervor of political organizations to grab more members ('application forms are available at the back of the room, sisters') was strikingly evident as tables piled with literature and buttons choked the hallways.

Despite its lack of energetic decision making, the conference did manage to pass several resolutions which will be submitted to its sponsor, the Ontario Federation of Students (OFS). However, if last year repeats itself, OFS will accept the list and then quietly file it away in its do-nothing cabinet.

The conference endorsed the right of all to free and easy access to contraception information regardless of age or marital status. It also called for the immediate repeal of all abortion laws.

The conference supported the disemination of information on human sexuality in high schools and, in addition, proposed that women's study courses be established in all secondary and post-secondary institutions.

It demanded that OFS also take a public stand in favor of the struggle for gay rights.

The conference, hosted by the university of Toronto's student council, included workshops on such feminist issues as women in politics, human sexuality and women's study courses.

Men were excluded from the conference for the alleged reason that their presence would inhibit women from speaking out.

law permits wife to retain maiden name

TORONTO (CUP) -- One of the few clear things in the law relating to changes of name is that there is no obligation whatsoever upon a married woman to adopt her husband's name upon marriage. The change name is merely a social cus-The common law permitted a woman to retain her maiden name and the Change of Name Act does not impose the husband's surname upon a wire although it expressly permits her to adopt it, if she desires to do so, without using any of the formal provisions of the Act. Thus public or private bodies are entirely in the wrong when they insist a husband's surname by women who have never adopted it as their own.

It would seem likely that a wife who found herself confronted with public officials who take such an ill-founded attitude would be able to apply to the courts for an order to compel the officials to accept or issue documents bearing her own name.

Where problems may arise is when a woman has adopted her husband's surname at the outset of marriage and subsequently desires to revert to her own name. Lawyers who have expertise in this area are inclined to believe that the Change of Name Act, despite certain ambiguities, has not altered the commonlaw rule that a person may adopt any name that he or she chooses, without the use of any formal procedure, as long as the change is not designed to de-fraud others. Thus a woman should be able to revert to her maiden name informally, as

long as the people with whom she has to deal, such as employers or creditors are prepared to make a formal change.

However, when a person refuses to make the necessary alterations in documents, since the Change of Name Act contains a provision which can be used to compel such alterations a successful application can be brought under that statute.

Unfortunately, the Act requires that a married person who brings a change of name application must also apply for a change in the name of his or her spouse, unless the parties have been living apart for the other partner must be obtained before a formal alteration of names can take place. Since very few husbands are likely to be prepared to adopt their wife's maiden name, this provision is sufficient to deprive most married women of a remedy under the Change of Name Act.


A pape r on the Change of Name Act has been submitted to the Ontario Law Reform Commission. While it deals with a number of other points, the paper's main thrust is to suggest an amendment in the Act to permit one spouse to apply for a change in his or her name without requiring the other partner to make an identical change unless this is decired.



It is on this note that I hope we can look forward to entering the New Year.



"Oh yea, well I am what I



Youngblood Alan is a friend we have all had. Beautiful, careless, bright and stoned. We've all had to carry out own Youngblood home, straighten him up a bit, sooth a wounded psychi, and try and compensate for a cruel world which is continually grating at his sensitive spirit. A great song.

PHASE IV

In Paramount Pictures' "PHASE IV", an ecological suspense tale, a strange biological imbalance has taken place some where in the Arizona desert lands with the ensuing battle for survival occurring between ants and two scientists and a girl trapped on a desert research station.

The film should be released sometime in the early new year. It is the first feature-length work by famed designer Saul Bass, charts the escalation of the ants in several phases. 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

alberta ballet does their X-Mas thing



Merrilee Hodgins, a native Edmontonian and principal dancer with the Alberta Ballet, has studied ballet and jazz in Denmark, Germany, Norway, England, the United States, and Eastern Canada.

She, and 39 other young people, will star in two special world-premiere performances, "Mobiles in Motion", and "Harp Concerto", part of the Christmas week shows in Edmonton and Calgary at the Jubilee Auditoriums.

They come. They dance. Give appreciation. lecture-demonstrations. They win respect, admiration, and

They criss-cross Alberta visiting schools, hospitals, and

Cold Lake. Stettler. Banff. High Prairie. Bonnyville. Camrose and Fairview.

They're 16 appealing, professional, and talented young people, our own Alberta Ballet Company.

If they haven't weaved their magic spell in or near your town yet, you can bet it won't be long before they do.

After an extensive fall-winter '73 northern tour playing in a dozen centers, they're now back in Edmonton for a solid month. of rehearsal for their gala Annual Christmas-week production "Ballet and all that Jazz," Calgary's and Edmonton's Jubilee Auditoriums.

Then it's an even heavier season with the spring tour throughout central and southern Alberta.

Many Albertans are unaware of the extensive touring Canada's youngest professional dance company undertakes each year.

But more and more residents are now getting to see their excellent classical, character, and jazz interpretations.

By the end of the current 73-74 season, they will have visited 34 different centers playing to a total audience of more than 30,000 people.

This doesn't include the season's 80 highly rated lecturedemonstrations in schools, attended by more than 35,000 students, making a total viewing audience of about 65,000 people.

"As host principal I was most impressed by the standard of dancing and enthusiasm demonstrated by these young people. They were able to establish an

almost instantaneous rapport with their audience who were largely unexposed to ballet pre-viously."

"I was particularly impressed with the administration and organization. Miss Carse, the stage team and electrician were particularly capable and efficient ensuring that each performance was smooth, well-timed, and executed with a minimum of

fuss."
"The combination of professional skill and joie de vivre among your dancers appealed to all of us and was a credit to them and their directors."

J. F. Hodgins, Managing Director of the Alberta Ballet is proud of the letters he receives principals, recreation from directors, and program chairmen

from throughout the province.

The Alberta Ballet was first incorporated in 1966 to present dance of professional calibre to all the people of Alberta.

The company's secondary goal is to also encourage and develop young Alberta talent.

This is done through tours, and the Alberta Ballet School set up in September of 1971.

Ruth Carse, Artistic Director for the company since it's inception is also Principal of the School.

R. A. D. and Modern Jazz training is offered and the School is approved for Province of Alberta Dance Scholarships.

Miss Carse is certainly wellknown to Edmonton, Canadian, and U.S. audiences as a former soloist, a choreographer, and teacher.

Besides her highly capable direction of the Alberta Ballet, local muscial dance scene, and her participation and contribution to charity and symphony benefits

and performances is endless. Miss Deborah Sims, formerly with the Royal Ballet School in London, England, is the Senior Teacher and Ballet Mistress of the Company.

The average age of the corp is 18, although the dancers range in age from 15 to 26. Most of them are from Alberta having come up through the ranks through the school with years of training and performing under their belts.

The Christmas week shows a matinee performance Boxing Day in Edmonton, followed by an evening performance on the 27th, and evening and matinee shows in Calgary on December 29th and 30th respectively, will draw on dancers from the school.

A total cast of 40 will perform the exciting and electrifying classical and modern jazz program including two new Canadian


world-premiere performances.


As the province's first professional dance company, and a group that's truly bringing enjoyment and pleasure to so many, they certainly deserve our support.



Acadia University made the sporting news last week, their basketball team being ruled ineligible to compete in CIAU competition.

The Canadian Intercollegiate Athletic Union said, "It is evident that the Axemen, the Wolfville Nova Scotia University's varsity basketball team, do not wish to follow CIAU rules on player ineligibility.

The Axemen violated a rule which states that a minimum of nine Canadians is required on a varsity team. After defeating the Dalhousie squad in a recent game, they (Dalhousie) protested because Acadia used more than the maximum allowable non-Canadians, in this case, young Americans competing for the Axemen on scholarships. Dalhousie won the protest, and the CIAU said that any team playing Acadia in ANY basketball competition would also be considered ineligible to participate in the 1974 CIAU

national basketball championship. This seems to be a rather severe move by the CIAU, first ruling Acadia ineligible for further competition and then placing the same fate on anyone who competes against them.

The Alberta Colleges Athletic Conference (ACAC) is experiencing the same type of problem. right now, in TWO sports!

In hockey, the Camrose Vikings are using two ineligible players, taken from high schools in Camrose, to strengthen their team. The ACAC last year recognized these players and ruled them eligible so that Camrose could ice a competitive team, but this year they went ahead and played these high schoolers without the permission of the ACAC. Camrose hardly needs any extra players this year anyway, they've been in first place since the season's start.

Lethbridge College (not the University) has been offering under-the-table scholarships to American basketball players so that they might improve the calibre of basketball in Lethbridge. They were almost unbeatable last year, winning the ACAC and the 4-West, and should be top contenders this year. A limited number of scholarships are allowed to be awarded each year, in very small amounts (just to cover tuition and books) this in accordance with the ACAC constitution. Lethbridge appears to be violating some rules.





Only one thing could have taken anything from their performance. . .a loss. And it happened! SAIT got lucky and won 6 to 5.


It was probably the most lively ACAC game this year, with lots of action, lots of goals and lots of excitement.






