



Our executive is involved in several areas, some new ones that have to be instituted, and some old ones that have to be



Hypnosis has been shown to significantly reduce the time required to identify words exposed on a tachistoscope (a machine which can flash words or sentences for a specified amount of time.)

People's Law School Established

Vancouver (CUP)---Activist lawyers and law students here have established a people's law school in an attempt to demystify the law. The school offers a program of free weekly law classes to help people better understand the law and how it affects them.


"Once the public has educated itself about the concepts of law making, the prudence of our law makers is bound to increase. It is ludicrous to have participatory government and not to be given the knowledge to participate effectively," said Patti Pearcey, one of the school's organizers.

In addition to the regular program, the school is offering three seminars to discuss pending legislation. "It gives people a chance to discuss proposed legislation and approach the decision makers to offer informed criticisms and intelligent suggestions," Pearcey stated

We want people to voice their opinions. We're remaining completely apolitical—we help them interpret the laws and hope they will instigate action themselves. We don't want to do it for them," she said.

PERUVIAN REPORTS PROCESS TO GIVE FISH THE TASTE OF BEEF

LIMA (CUP)—A Peruvian nutritionist said here that a West German laboratory commissioned by the Peruvian Govern-



ment has succeeded in inventing a process that gives fish the taste and texture of beef.

Dr. Claudio Consoli, dean of the Peruvian College of Chemists said the government was considering using the formula to provide beef-substitute for 10 million Peruvians who currently lack meat in their regular diet.

The official said the substitute would be richer in proteins than the real thing. It would also save Peru, which suffers from a meat shortage, from excessive beef imports.

Fuller details of the process would be available early next year, he added. He did not give the name of the West German laboratory.



NUDIST HAVEN TO BECOME A BREAKWATER?

VANCOUVER (CUP) -- Vancouver's famous Wreck Beach may become a gravel breakwater if the University of B.C. and the Vancouver Park Board have their way.

The sunbathing and nuclists' haven on Georgia Strait, is unfortunately at the foot of Point Grey Bluff, the site of UBC.

Wave and tide action has been eroding the Point Grey cliffs for many years, eating ever closer to several university buildings.

Many schemes have been produced to halt the erosion: a six lane highway at the water's edge, a concrete breakwater, a gravel 'access' road and most recently, a 3,700 foot strip of gravel fill covered with a layer of sand.

Angry citizens who in the past stopped the road and breakwater schemes have recently rallied to oppose the latest plan. They charge that the fill proposal is just another in a series of schemes to ruin the beach by building a road along it.

They argue that because the engineers for the project refuse to guarantee its success, and some trained engineers think it will be a massive failure, it should be reduced to a smaller area as an experiment.

At a recent series of public meetings, it was revealed that while tenders for the project called for hauling all fill in by barge, the low bidder plans to truck some fill along the beach, and the low bid, \$371,000 was above the budget for the plan. So the fill area has had to be reduced by 600 feet to 3,100 feet.

Yet engineers have insisted me project could not be reduced because it would be ineffective.

Cornered on their 600 foot reduction at the most recent public forum, a project engineer said that while no reduction would be preferable, the project could be cut some without increasing the chances of failure.

"By how much?" asked a reporter.

"I can't say," replied the engineer.

Target date for the completion of the project is early February.




Dear Ms.:

CARPETBAGGERS ARE BACK

(CPS-CUP)

In the wake of a worldwide energy crisis the major American oil companies have made some of the biggest profit increases in the oil industry's history.

According to US Oil Week, Gulf, Exxon, and Mobil reported third quarter or July-September net incomes that were 91, 80, and 64 per cent respectively, above the gains of last year. Ten other major oil companies reported an average increase in profit of 51 per cent above the third quarter last year.

In remarks prepared for the Congressional Record last week, Representative Michael Harrington (D. - Mass.) compared the oil companies to the trusts of the 19th century and warned they will continue to hold their monopoly until they are required to surrender it.

Harrington said that it is time to break up major oil companies through anti-trust action and called for the creation of a US Fuels Corporation similar to the Tenessee Valley Authority, to develop domestic energy

On the other hand, however, a recent editorial in the Wall Street Journal assured the oil companies they need not be embarassed about their high earnings, because the oil companies' good fortune is the nation's.


The editorial inquired: "How can the US pull itself out of the energy hole if not through an industry that finds itself able to generate the capital that task will require? . . . The reason profits have been soaring is that the industry has been operating flat out in production, refining and marketing of oil products.

There is no excess capacity in the system and efficiencies are at a peak."

In order to meet the demands for oil exploration and development the industry's annual income growth, which now averages 8 per cent, must reach an annual increase of 16 per cent, the editorial added.

Rep. Les Aspin, (D-Wisc.) had another explanation for the oil industry's runaway profits. Aspin reported to the House last week the US has been exporting fuel oil to other countries, principally Denmark and Panama, in the amount of 53 million gallons by the end of this year.

The amount exported was a 284 per cent increase over the fuel exports of last year and the price of the exports increased by 145 per cent over the average price per barrel last year, Aspin said

Thanks to the current shortage of jet fuel domestic carriers have already cancelled more than 400 flights a day in the U.S. This is causing a shortage of available departure times and full bookings on available flights. This results in congestion at airports during peak hours and a lack of "back-up" flights if any flight is held up or "weathered out". As well, passengers may have to take a longer route at extra cost to reach their destination.



PASS GAS

While Ottawa imposed a crude oil export tax to gain some profit from the record prices being paid for Canadian crude in the Chicago market nothing has been done to balance off the value of exported natural gas. During the first nine months of this year Canada exported some 775, 117,050 thousand cubic feet of natural gas to the U.S. (Statistics Canada). Yet this was sold at approximately 30¢ per thousand cubic feet while U.S. gas is sold domestically at 60¢ per thousand, or about double. And if our natural gas was pricedaccording to prices of comparable fuels (based on British Thermal Unit values) our gas would be worth in excess of \$1 per thou-



POLITICS OR PIPELINE?

Northern Pipeline Release

For the last five years, the multi-billion dollar Arctic pipeline has raged from the board-rooms of international oil corporations and the chambers of heads of governments to the tiny Eskimo villages in Alaska and the Canadian North. The "one step forward and two steps back" character of the whole question was examined on Wednesday, December 5, when THIS LAND presented "Northern Pipeline."

Producer Jack Emack had set the history of the northern oil struggle in the contest of an opulent drawing room where two disinterested players juggled the issues in a game of POWER. As the players uncovered the varying influences in the power struggle, the film presented the land, the men who want to tame it, the companies that want to control it, and the natives who seem to have been given only token acknowledgement in the struggle.

"Northern Pipeline" was a film that took a different look at the whole energy crisis. As North America is experiencing fuel shortages, gasoline rationing and the constant threat of further cutbacks, the governments, the companies, and the vested interest groups continue to play power politics. Meanwhile, the oil remains beneath the ground, the pipe continues to lie on the frozen tundra and one of the

world's largest potential fuel sources remains untapped.


"Northern Pipeline" moved from the magnificent desolate scenery of the Arctic shores to the boardrooms thousands of miles away where the decisions affecting the future of the North are being made. From the promises of Pierre Trudeau and the protestations of David Lewis, from the plans of the Canadian Arctic Gas group and the debates Washington will come a final decision on the fate of the northern oil and gas.

As "Northern Pipeline" unfolded it asked the increasingly necessary question - after a five-year period of indecision and hesitation, has the power game become more important than the pipeline itself?

The company also announced an increase of 4.5¢ a gallon for aviation and turbo fuels in the same area.








or faculty should be members; -all community and business people be removed from senate which should be solely concerned with academic matters;

-the new senate should be composed of 25 per cent students, 25 per cent administrators and 50 per cent faculty;

-an inter-university body be established to mediate problems between the universities and the education department.

Svend Robinson, student senator at the University of B.C. called the report a 'disaster.' Paul Know, acting graduate students' association president at UBC called it 'boring.'

And Brian Loomes, Alma Mater society council president at UBC agreed, "This document amounts to very little in the way of real change. We're going to have to continue figuring out things ourselves. They aren't offering us a thing in the way of solutions."

Robinson said certain clauses of the report, commissioned by the New Democratic Party government in February are "actually regressive."

Loomes accused the commission of "mystifying the role of the state in capitalist society" by continuing to mystify the role of the boards of governors. "The present function of the boards is

to serve the capitalist economy." Robinson criticized the as-sumption of the report that the board has little influence on university affairs.

"If the boards want to they can disallow any program the senate brings forward by withholding funds. If that's not power I don't know what is."

He also pointed out that the report talks about demystifying the role of the boards, but says nothing about opening board

meetings to the public.

He said the senate repre-sentation proposal will mean faculty will run the academic sections of the university.

"The administration and the student votes will cancel each other out and the faculty is left with the power," Robinson.

All three objected that the report does not recommend community or university workers be represented on the boards and senates.

Both Robinson and Knox also attacked the report for not recommending any fundamental changes in the structures of the universities.

The premise of the report seems to be we'll make a few fundamental changes but basically the university structure is OK," said Robinson.

but then I'm sure students are aware of other things that we aren't aware of."

But according to one student on the committee, "We were not informed of the terms of reference, and went into the meeting only to discover the function of the committee was totally different than what we expected. What we expected was a process of consideration of various candidates. What we got was a discussion of Dr. Beckel and whether or not to ask him first."

He complained that no minutes were sent to committee members and that even to obtain the 'procedures' section required clearance through Dr. Holmes. It was also apparent, he said, that Dr. Beckel is thoroughly aware of the committee's decisions as the minutes are handled by his office.

Holmes disagreed, "If you are dissatisfied, you look elsewhere. We are aware of what is available. There are lists."

When asked if the candidate lists were discussed at the first and only meeting, Holmes

admitted they weren't but said they discussed the philosophy of how to go about a thing of this nature. The students claimed that they were unable to judge the sole candidate, Dr. Beckel, when they had no basis for comparison. They also complained they were unable to represent the student viewpoint as they were not allowed to discuss the matter with other students due to the 'delicate' nature of the proced-

Holmes however thought the procedures were democratic. When students on the committee asked how it could be democratic when no information will be discussed, Holmes replied, "Democracy and secrecy don't have to be opposites. This is a standard procedure for the committee. It's standard all over Canada."

When asked if Dr. Beckel had given the committee any commitment, Dr. Homes had no comments. When asked how the committee could maintain faith in Dr. Beckel when he had given no signs of commitment, Holmes answered, "You have me in a position where I can't discuss it"

His responses to criticisms was to espouse political philosophy

"There are certain practices which of necessity should not be democratic. It is not intended to be a democratic procedure. It is not a general practice to be democratic."

The twelve member committee makes its recommendations to the Board of Governors who makes the final appointment. It is apparent that the selection committee is satisfied with Dr. Beckel, although earlier this year he let his name stand for the presidency of York University.

Although the committee will not meet again until "sometime in December" contract negotiations will continue with Dr. Beckel. Because there are no alternative candidates he will be a strong position to dictate his

The Meliorist, the student newspaper at University of Lethbridge, talked to Dr. Beckel on November 17.

He stated his contract was renewable and as part of his contract, the committee must deal with the renewal clause before interviewing any other candidates.

When asked if he would accept the offer to renew his contract, Beckel said he was considering the proposal but had not given an answer to the committee. He promised an answer by the end of November.

The president also said that Holmes can't have a list, as he believed "there aren't any lists." He also thought the matter should stay confidential in nature especially "after the York business."

The enquiry leaves little doubt that the group was a committee to re-select the president, albeit with a few token students with whom to conduct philosophical discussions.

B.C. Education Stays With U.'s

Vancouver (CUP)--A provincial government commission investigating post-secondary education in British Columbia has rejected changing the structures of B.C.'s three major universities.

Instead, the commission recommended encouraging debate and discussion within existing formats.

Most student politicians immediately attacked the report from the Commission, whose head, John Bremer, so-called

"progressive" British-born teacher and administrator, was asked to make the study by education minister, Eileen Dailly.

Bremer has emphasized that the report, released November 2, is only a preliminary working paper.

The report recommends:

- the composition of the Board of Governors be increased to 15 from 11 and that no students

in the press and the government
suggested that the alert was unnecessary and that Nixon called

White House spokesmen denied the charge, of course, but the simple fact that the question was raised shows how widespread distrust of Nixon has become.

Perhaps the most shocking warning during that period to come from anyone connected with the government was issued by Representative Fortney H. Stark (D.-Cal) as he spoke to 250 supervisory personnel at the Alameda Naval Air Base Station.

According to the Los Angeles Times of November 3, Stark warned that Nixon might "manufacture" an international crisis in order to launch a military "coup" that would keep him in office if impeachment or something similar looked likely.

"Considering the President's irrational behavior and the existance of a military elite in this country" Stark said, "it is not

inconceivable that a military takeover could be attempted." He continued, "The President

treme national emergency', tell his generals to take command and send Congress and the Supreme Court packing."

But Stark added optimistically that "there are too many good officers who put the country ahead of self and politicians." He said that he thought these "good officers" would "rebel against the commander-in-chief and keep the Republic from falling into military hands."



it is barely discernible with the naked eye though confirmed with a U of A Telescope at the Devon observatory. Accelerating towards the sun from the farthest reaches of the solar system, it should provide its most spectacular show after passing the sun just after Christmas. With luck it will then be visible as a bright object at night with a shimmering tail reaching across 20 to 25

degrees of the sky.

Because of the nature of comets no one is betting on Kohouteks brightness or even its orbit. Comets are believed to be made up of dust and/or ice particles (allowing viewing of stars right through them) and are susceptible to the gravitational pull of the planets. However, it is expected to be brighter than Venus and especially available for naked-eye viewing after Christmas. Between January 3rd and 15th it will pass within 78

million miles of earth.

The last such extravaganza was Halleys Comet in 1910 and this time much more time for preparations was given by an early sighting. This allowed adaptations to the Skylab mission and the Mariner Space Probe.

At present the comet's orbit is such that one trip around the sun will take not less than 50,000 to 100,000 years (maybe as much as a million years).

From December 27 to mid-February the local Queen Elizabeth Planetarium is going to schedule special lectures and a possible live presentation of Kohoutek. Times are as follows:

For personal viewing of the comet, Kohoutek avoid binoculars and telescopes while viewing near the sun. Positions will be as follows:

Dec. 1-15 Southeast, near horizon, just before sunrise. Dec. 16-28 Southeast, near

sun.

Dec. 29-Jan. 15 South west, horizon where the sun sets but higher in the night each night. This is the best period for naked eye viewing.

Jan. 16-31 High above western horizon, early evening. Feb. 1-15 High above west-

ern horizon, late evening. Feb. 16-28 Lower in western sky, night time.
