Canadian Labor Congress Congress Denounces Federal Government's Changes in Unemployment Insurance Act

Ottawa (CUP)

The Canadian Labor Congress has warned the federal government to withdraw some of its amendments to the Unemployment Insurance Act.

In its annual brief to the cabinet, March 5, the CLC said it suspected many of the proposed amendments are the result of a 'scandalous attack' made up on the unemployment insurance sytem during the federal election by candidates for their own partisan ends.

The amendments would prohibit UIC benefits to people who are fired, or who quit their jobs for 'unacceptable' reasons.

'The people of Canada would be much better served if the unjustified attacks on the unemployed were called off and measures designed to bring about full employment for Canadian workers were introduced the majority of whom would much prefer to work for decent wages than attempt to live at the poverty level resulting from dependence on unemployment insurance.', the CLC said.

'It seems to us that benefit

control officer, presumable acting upon guidelines provided by their superiors, are diligently searching for excuses to disqualify claimants. . . We feel strongly that this practice must be stopped and that Canada Manpower offices by made more effective instruments in guiding persons on unemployment benefits to jobs available and suitable for them.'

'Perhaps it is also time the Commission made a greater effort to inform claimants of their rights in respect of interrogation and representation.'

In another part of its 62 page brief, the CLC called for resistance against the 'so-called continental energy policy advocated by the United States'. The brief says that surplus resources should only be sold to foreign nations to the extent that Canada's own future needs are guaranteed.

The Congress also urged the government to enact legislation requiring thorough environmental studies prior to the commencement of activity on proposed development projects.

'Had such a requirement ex-

isted, there is little likelihood that our native people in the areas of James Bay, South Indian Lake and the Mackenzie Valley would have to contend with the problems they now face', said the brief.

The CLC welcomed the tax reductions granted lower income Canadians in the recent federal budget, but suggested these be supplemented with a 'full employment budget' involving a new fiscal approach directed at promoting economic performance along with sophisticated economic planning techniques.

The Congress also called for an increase in the basic Old-Age Security pension to \$135 per month. The additional cost of these programs would be offset by accelerated economic growth, coupled with increased employment, greater profits and higher tax revenues, the CLC claimed.

But the Congress opposed tax cuts and incentives to manufacturing and processing industries.

The brief also called for the nationalization of Bell Canada and an increase in the minimum

wage to \$2.50 per hour. (Current minimum wage for jobs under federal jurisdiction is \$1.90.)

The Congress denouced efforts being made by some companies to introduce the four day week, by expanding the work day to 10 or 12 hours. They demanded the retention of the maximum eight hour day, terming the new development part of the 'age old search for greater profits by employers regardless of the possible ill effects in terms of safety and of health such actions may have on working men and women.'

The CLC also reminded the government that it hasn't yet enacted legislation providing for protection against invasion of

privacy through the use of listening devices and electronic surveillance.

The Protection of Privacy Bill died when the house adjourned on June 30, 1971, and its successor bill has not yet emerged from the Committee to which it was referred on May 2, 1972. The CLC finds the proposed legislation inadequate because it remains silent on the question of data banks, the storage of information by public and private agencies, and the uses of this information.

The CLC brief also called for government aid to community health clinics which would employ doctors on a basis other than fee for service.

Collegiate veterans sue Nixon gov't for its money

WASHINGTON (CUPI-CPS) -Although the Nixon administration is making a national issue of its concern for the returning prisoners of War, its policy toward the thousands of Vietnam vets who have been returning quietly to the United States is strikingly different.

The National Association of Collegitate Veterans has filed suit in Washington, D.C. Federal Court in efforts to "unlock" \$25 million in federal funds. The money had been earmarked for colleges that recruit and help Vietnam veterans as students.

The \$25 million had been approved by Congress as a special

effort to provide college educations for men who had fought in Vietnam, but every last penny of the money was impounded by the White House's Office of Management and Budget.

James Mayer, president of the veterans association, termed the freezing of the funds "pathetic."

President Richard Nixon's 1974 budget submitted to Congress to cancel the \$25 million which has already been approved, and it further askes that Congress scrap the entire \$180 million which was proposed for the program next year."

A three government task force has recommended the construction of a \$1,000,000 submerged weir at Little Rapids on the Riviere Des Roches in Northeastern Alberta. The rockfill dam would restore water levels in Lake Athabasca and the Peace-Athabasca Delta and bring relief to this financially stricken area. This is only one of 10 recommendations brought in by the task

force which represented Alberta, Saskatchewan and the Federal Government. All were designed to boost the economy and protect the ecology. The Delta is presently under threat of permanent damage because of low water levels which became apparent in 1968 after the filling of the Williston Reservoir behind the Bennett Dam on the Peace River in B.C.

A record we could do without

Ninety-eight is OK as a body temperature but as a pollution index it leaves a lot to be desired. That is the record figure reached in Edmonton air early in February when a strong inversion trapped pollutants in a 500 foot layer over the city. When notified of the high reading,

Edmonton Power voluntarily cut back its power production at the downtown Rossdale Station. Within an hour and a half the reading dropped back to a more acceptable 68. Power generating stations and private automobiles contribute greatly to the carbon monoxide and oxides of nitrogen content of air pollution.





What services do you have, as a student, that might be marketable during the 1973 summer Lawn maintenance? Construction? Photography? Drafting?

Last year, a number of these types of student-operated businesses proved to be a profitable alternative to being employed in year-round commercial companies. It was discovered by the student managers. that in some cases, their services were profitable on a yearround, part-time basis, and that after operating successfully for one summer period, it involved little organization to set up operations the following summer. A number of businesses found that the market for their particular services was so extensive that they expanded, and in some cases formed partnerships with their "competitors".

But what resources would you need to enter the profitable student - operated business field? The first and most important is a strong initiative to set up, and the guts to carry through plans for your business venture. The planning should be done early so that operations can begin as soon as possible after final exams. Things to consider in the early stages of planning are:

- What need is there of my service
- What geographical area should I concentrate on
- What types of equipment would I need: shovels, mowers, sun glasses
- What facilities would I buildings, rooms, use: playgrounds or parks
- Who should I hire? -numbers of persons and

their qualifications (i.e. labouring vs. child care work).

- What types of clients will I be dealing with and where will I find them
- What capital will I need? -loans
- -grants
- -donations 8. What about business regulations?
 - -licensing, etc.

In order to help minimize these problems, Operation Placement is again setting up a body of resource personnel to encourage, advise, and promote prospective student enterpri-As sell as this individual assistance to student entrepreneurs, Operation Placement is looking into new and possible student commercial ventures. There is now a recognized market for student-operated subContractors for light construction, law maintenance and gardening services, semi-professional, wedding photography, painting and clean-up services, as well as the familiar rose sales outside A.L.C.B. Stores. There are, however, many more exploitable areas for the shortterm summer period. For example: hiring out to clean up cottages and grounds for persons in and around Edmonton: student - run concessions at the beaches and parks in the Edmonton area.

Available again this year are the Student Enterprise Loans of up to \$2,000. made possible through the Alberta Opportunity Company and the Provincial Gvoernment. These loans are to enable students needing capital to obtain the necessary funding for summer operations.

Christianity is a diversified religion. There are more sects of Christianity than one would care to discuss. The biggest boob is that they all state that



Unlike the previous two releases, ENGLAND boosts the presence of a small orchestra which provides the music with a pastoral feeling.

ENGLAND is in two parts... side one being THE PAINTINGS composed of three pastoral settings for voices, flute, guitars and orchestra; side two a collection of fiv0 individual songs. The latter is the better of the two, featuring a Christmas hymn CANTUS FIRMUS TO COUNTERPOINT and the harpsichord based COLOR DULCIS.

Elizabethan music was rather bawdy and devoid of technique. The Amazing Blondel have taken the basic ingredients of it and by adding musicianship and subtlety, have discovered a pleasant medium between the two.



AMERICAN GOTHIC - DAVID ACKLES (Elektra 75032)

The title naturally refers to Grant Wood's famous painting and the album itself is an 11-piece song cycle concerning the re-discovery of self through the contemplation of vanishing rural America. The musical content is eclectic and the production is of concert hall calibre. As a singer, Ackles is basically folksy and his singing style very straight forward.

The mood of AMERICAN GOTHIC is melancholy and every song is different and interesting, the high point being a moving ten-minute symphonic poem entitled MONTANA SONG, CONCERNING AN IMAGINARY JOUR NEY TO THE WEST.

After a creative leave of absence in which Zappa was involved with comedy rock which was far beneath him, Frank is finally back into the thick of things with a most consistent and imaginitive album, featuring some of his best compositions and instrumental works.

Luckily Zappa has since relocated it and has disposed of his comedy team and with the release of WAKA/JAWKA HOT RATS last summer and more recently GRAND WAZOO, Frank and a new band of Mothers are back in the creative forefront. Side one features Frank writing for a massive brass and woodwind section which complements the Mothers' best ever rythm section composed of the more than competent Ansley Dunbar on, drums and the versatile Erronous on bass, among others. The album opens with FOR CALVIN which boasts of brash and lusty brass parts highlighted with a trombone solo by Bill Byers. The title track features more solos, this time by Sal Marquez on trumpet, and Frank Zappa and Ken Shroyer on guitar and bottleneck respectively, which are woven and interlaced into thick reed sections.

The second side uses a smaller group of approximately eight or nine pieces and the material is consequently looser. Accented performances include Ernie Watts on sax from CLETUS AWREETUS-AWRIGHTUS, keyboard perfectionist George Duke on BLESSED RELIEF, and Zappa himself performing a precise guitar solo on EAT THAT QUESTION.

GLORIDIED MAGNIFIED -MANFRED MANN'S EARTH BAND (Philips 6308 125)

Manfred Mann has been around as long as the Beatles and besides the early success of DO WAH DIDDY DIDDY has been totally and perhaps unjustifiably ignored. The early band, being a pop creation in the same vein as the Zombies, made way for Manfred Mann's Chapter Three, an experimental jazz band which was more than often boring than not. This brings us up to the present and Manfred Mann's latest conglomeration, modestly titled Man-

fred Mann's Earth Band, and their second LP release, GLO-RIFIED MAGNIFIED. Not since WHO'S NEXT has there been such a successful fusion of inventive electronics and powerful rock music. I must admit I've ignored Manfred Mann as much as the next guy, but if there's any justice in the music business and there isn't, he'll cease to be but an obscure conversation piece and will become the household word he's been working so hard at to become. Manfred Mann's been knocking on the door of stardom so long, his fist must be permanently cal-

NUGGET GOES TO THE THEATRE

Noel Coward's 'Tonight at 8:30'

Leaving the theatre after seeing the University drama division's production of "Tonight at 8:30," a friend who was confused asked me if she had enjoyed the plays. When I looked puzzled, she explained, "I didn't know how I was sup-posed to react to Noel Coward." The answer is simple, I told her. Sit back and laugh. Noel Coward is easy on his audiences. He does all the work. You don't have to think, rationalize, or worry about any philosophy. The only test as to whether a Coward play is success or failure is to decide whether you relaxed and laughed during the performance, and whether you feel like drinking champagne when it is over. Well, the audience was relaxed and certainly laughed loudly at the opening night production of "tonight at 8:30," at Studio Theatre, but few, I think had any thirst for champagne.

As a character in one of the three one act plays asks eistfully, "Where did the magic go?" Well, particularlly, it was dissipated in the wrong pace, and partially in the success of the mastery of the English dialect. The young actors had been carefully trained to form the right sounds, and they had learned well, but there is more to a dialect than the ennunciation of sounds. There must be a feel for the rhythm and melody of the language. This was missing from the production.

The first play, "Fumed Oak" is always an audience pleaser. It deals with everybody's favotire fantasy, that great moment when we get to put down everyone around us with a few well chosen home truths. The little milk-toast character who is provoked to lip off his nasty wife, mother-in-law and adolescent daughter, is played by

Glenn Roddie. Unfortunately, the turn of the worm is not aseffective as it might be if the actor shouts as loudly or as shrilly as Mr. Roddie does.

The second play, "We Were Dancing" is a comment in the transitory nature of romantic love. Cowar d wrote it to be taken at face volue. However, the director decided to send up the whole play in a burlesque that had you laughing loudly with an uneasy feeling that maybe you shouldn't be. Camp these days is very popular and indeed let's laugh at the foibles of the old days, but the old days as they probably were, and not a satire of the laughter. There was none here at all.

The final play "Red Peppers" is fast and furious fun. It is a satire on the dying days of variety, or vaudville. The two main characters, a married couple song and dance act, try to hide their fear and keep

their pride and dignity as their fortunes fade. It was well done except here more than anywhere, the British regional dialects failed.


Each play was prefaced by slides on a front scrim. They were worth the price of admission alone. Beautiful line drawings on a pink background, they promised that the proceedings were going to be more skilled than they were. The sets, costumes and make-up were concept and creative in craftsmenlike in execution. The choreography was both clever and satirical, and the music quite syrupy enough to remind us how sentimental our parents must have been.


The standout performance was given by a delightful creature called Debbie Skelton as the too, too sophisticated

Louise Charteris and the irrepressible Lily Peppers. Here is a young actress who will do well. She is lovely, extremely talented, and has that type of magical charm that hits you seventeen rows back.

All in all this is a pleasant enough evening. The cast worked hard and showed fine talent and ensemble playing which says nice things about director, Ben Tarver. Only the older generation of British theatre buffs will carp at the damage done to Mr. Coward. You'll probably enjoy it. Badminton team shows well in ACAC final






Lynn Nickel and Marc Regamey, Mixed Doubles Pair.



How about the fencing that took place in the Provincial Fencing Championships last weekend at the U of A? More specifically two fencers from NAIT who entered the Men's novice Foil event.




There are many other areas of concern right now; in athletics, the present intramural system and the new format of choices for physed are only two of a large number.



THE 4-WEST CHAMPIONSHIP IN VOLLEYBALL




