2) to compile and distribute a paper on trouble shooting techniques and hints.


During the last meeting I.E.E.E. members met with Dr. K. Puffer, a representative of the Alberta Society of Engineering Technologists (A.S.E.T.)

Even after giving them a few inches in height, the Ooks played well under the boards. Rick well under the boards. Rick Gawlick, Scotty McEachern, Larry Sylvester and Clarence Hinse kept the strong alumni squad from getting those allimportant second chances.

McEachern was the high NAIT scorer with 18, Gawlick accounting for 14.

- stand over the pins



### gays are OK

TORONTO (CUP)...City Council has set a precedent in Canada by approving a resolution stating that city hall will not discriminate against homosexuals in its hiring policy.

The new policy climaxes a six month drive by the Gay Alliance Towards Equality (GATE). Spokesman for the organization claim that this is the first time in Canada any legislative body has recognized gay people as a minority group requiring special consideration to ensure equal employment opportunities.

The city officials, however, phrased the resolution in less straight forward language, for-hidding any discrimination "based on sexual orientation".

Only one of the fifteen aldermen voting opposed the motion.

Prior to its introduction in council, the resolution had received endorsement of Locals 43 and 79 of the Canadian Union of Public Employees, both of which represent the city's workers.

GATE spokesmen said afterwards they hope the resolution will be included in future contracts negotiated with the city.

#### american exams for u. of c.

CALGARY (CUP) Citing it's American cultural bias, Alberta NDP leader Grant Notley recently attacked the University of Calgary's system of early admis-

student who has not completed Grade 12 may be granted admission to the University of Calgary on the basis of the college entrance examination board exams (CEEB). Notley objected that the CEEB exams are American and a Canadian student should not write an American exam to enter a Canadian University.

No matter how objective the exams try to be, Notley contended, they will still contain cultural inferences.

Notley insisted that nationalism is not just a narrow, economic issue, and although "we should not reject other cultures, we should look after our own cultural interests.'

He said there is a hefty public expenditure for education. It is the responsibility of the university administration not to let this sort of thing happen.

The problem is lack of a Canadian equivalent to the CEEB exams. A similar Canadian series, SACU, was established a few years ago but administrators claim it does not cover enough areas and must be supplemented by a number of CEEB exams.

Jim Foster, Alberta Minister of post-secondary education, agreed with Notley but said he could see no solution. The universities need some means to evaluate non-matriculation students and at present the only means is American, he explained.

Foster wants universities to avoid entrance examinations as much as possible.

### forget Remembrance Day?

We've all heard the same old story around this time of year. "The young people of today just don't bother about remembering the dead who fought in the two World Wars. The people that fought and died to give us the freedom we treasure today." What a bunch of bull.
