





Anyway it was a lot of fun! You can smile today because tomorrow you will make some-. one very happy.







NEWSPRINT SUPPLY DOWN, CORPORATE PROFITS UP

ottawa (CUP) -- During the last few months periodical publishers have been plagued by shortages, and rapidly rising prices of paper.

Newspapers have been forced to limit the number of editions or temporarily cut out non-essentials such as cartoons, crossword puzzles and syndicated columns. Newspaper weekend magazines have, on at least one occasion not published.

And the prices of all types of paper have been increasing. Ordinary bond paper has risen almost a dollar a thousand in the last year. Some newspapers have blamed increased subscription costs on the price of newsprint

Paper producing companies lament that they've been beseiged by strikes and unreasonable wage demands. They say the shortages and the prices are the fault of the unions and the market.

So no-one's winning, right? Wrong! In the second quarter of 1973, the paper and forest companies increased their profits by an astounding 172.6% compared to the same period During this time last year. they made \$86.4 million compared to \$31.7 million.

Statistics included in a Report on Business survey indicate that Canadian corporations have increased their second quarter profits by an average of 44.9%. metals industry showed the largest increase - 300%. The paper and forest industry was second. The food processing industry increased its profits



WHERE HAVE ALL THE CHILDREN GONE?

In the last few years, Day-Care Centers have been a major topic of discussion on Government levels, on the streets and, yes, even at NAIT. Before a Day-Care Center can be established here on campus, a few facts should be known.

Out of 26 Day-Care Centers, baby sitters (professional) and nurseries, these facts have been found.

1) People are paying on an average of \$75.00 to \$80.00/month for these centers.

The prices range from free to \$120.00/month. Unfortunately you are not paying for full advantages. Your money could bring. For \$70.00 you can have the child taken care of ONLY. But if you browse through the Yellow Pages like I did, you would find that for the same price your child can get warm meals,

education, and professional care, not just a blob of plastercene to play with. For \$120.00 a month your child can recieve food, and education, yet for \$100. a month your child can aquire better food (hot meals, not just cookies and milk) and professional teachers, and a thoroughly educational childhood.

Out of 26 established centers, one was found to be free of charge. This was the Bissell Babysitting Service. This center was established with the non-working mothers in mind. If a doctor appointment popped up, the mother drops the child off at the center.

2) Not all Day-Care Centers are in it for the money. This means that quite a few of the lesser charging centers are just making enough for wages of staff, rent, supplies and utilities. The


only ones that seem to be making money are the larger or subsidized centers. The subsidized centers will be explained later on.

- 3) Most staff members are in the 18-25 age bracket. Reasons for this are:
 - A) Younger girls have more affection towards children.
 - B) Don't mind working.
 - C) Don't have set upbringing of the young rules.
- 4) The smaller private centers seem to be getting hasseles by the larger centers.
- 5) Quite a few of our own NAIT students are dropping off children at these centers.

MY OWN OPINION as a student is that we should do something for the married, single, divorced,

unwed, and common parents. We have the resourses for a competent staff, (a couple of thousand students and teachers with spares at all times of the day) good food (thanks to the students in cooking, baking, meat cutting etc.) and I'm sure the room can be found. The only problem is money. I've heard that \$2,000 was set aside for a center on campus last year but this year not a peep about money, support, nothing!!! I won't expand on this just yet, not until I look into it further. SCURVY VICTIMS IN NAIT

Masses of NAIT students have been admitted into hospitals throughout the Edmonton area. Doctors diagnosing the problem, say it is "SCURVY".

SCURVY IS DEFINED IN THE WEBSTER'S DICTIONARY AS "CAUSED BY EATING SALTY MEATS, WITHOUT ANY VEGETABLES."

There is actually no scurvy problem in Edmonton, but, vegetables are one of the main foods which all good students need, to keep healthy.

Where in Edmonton, or anywhere for that matter, do you buy a meal in a restaurant, and also pay for the vegetables on top of the meat price? Well, you are all doing just that at the NAIT cafeteria.

We in the Nugget, have put off this article for a couple of weeks, so to see your reaction to the increase in meals.

1) Last year, for \$.70, staff and students received a meal consisting of meat and two types of vegetables, one being potatoes and another vegetable, changing The cafeteria staff are daily. saying that last year, the vegetables were included with the meal, this year, your \$.70 meal does not include vegetables. If you want vegetables, then you will be charged extra. Vegetables are an absolute necessity to our diet, but now we are paying extra for what we have always included in our meal.

Students everyday are filing in line for the meals and being asked if they want vegetables. Now, how can a meal be a meal without vegetables, so the student always says "yes", and why not? Doesn't everyone eat vegetables with their meals? They don't realize that when the time comes up to pay their meal, it's another 20¢ over the cost of the meal.

2) Everyone realizes that prices are going up everywhere. But to increase the food prices here at NAIT by so much, what does this mean, besides extra profit? Is the money leaving NAIT to cover the increases, but is it lost somewhere?

An example is the latest increase in the cost of milk. Retail depicts that we pay 5¢ a quart more for milk. For that 5¢ increase for a quart of milk, how can we justify paying 5¢ more for just a cup of milk?

That 5¢ increase of one cup of milk pays for the total increase of a whole quart of milk. But, there are 4 cups to a quart, so therefore, 20¢ extra is coming in from every 4 people who like milk, and only 5¢ is being paid out to cover the increase in cost.

Who are they fooling when they say that the increase in milk in the cafeteria is paying for the increase of milk brought to the school? Somehow, it doesn't seem right to raise the price of milk by 33% a cup, when the price of a quart of milk went up only about 10%.

You readers may sit back and say "what's 5¢?" But, if the average student buys 1 cup of milk a day for the 5 school days a week while attending NAIT, it will cost the student \$10.00 more this year over last year. Of that, \$1.50 goes towards the increase, and \$8.50 falls into somewhere none of us students know about, but would like to where. Do you realize the cafeteria is a nonprofit organization? Yet, \$8.50 a year off every student who buys just 1 cup of milk a day is a lot of money. For 5,000 students, that counts up to some \$42,000.00 over a year, just from that 5¢ which nobody cares about, and that's what is going to happen unless people put their heads together and start asking some questions and getting some an-

NAIT bought milk from N.A.D.P. last year for \$1.29 a gallon. Selling cups of milk for 10¢ each brought in \$1.60 a gallon. Therefore there was 31¢ profit on every gallon. With that profit, cups and other expenses claimed the profit, which it should, being the cafeteria is a non-profit organization.

But this year with the increase cost of milk, N.A.D.P. is charging Nait \$1.49 a gallon. An increase of 20¢ a gallon. Nait then raised the cost of 1 cup of milk to 15¢. Therefore the total increase in money coming in is now \$2.40 a gallon. Now there is a 90¢

PROFIT. An increase of 300% PROFIT. Does that sound fair? There is no way that the expenses are taking up 90¢ where before only 30¢ was necessary. 18 despensers of milk containing 5 gallons each are used here a That is a total of 90 gallons of milk a day. At 90 cents a gallon profit, it comes out to \$81.00 a day profit. That's after paving for the milk. In one week it totals to over \$400.00. Not too many non-profit organizations can bring in that much money from the students every week, just off milk, and still claim themselves as a service to the students. Take a look around you, and everytime you see someone drinking a cup of milk, you'll also see the Cafeteria stuffing money into their hungry cashregisters.

3) I'm sure there are many students still waiting for their student loans. Actually, I've only come across a few who have received their loans. With this shortage of money, many people are budgetting their spendatures on food. When a person is hungry, and has little money to spend on the so-called Cafeteria meal, he tends to eat what comes cheapest and regular. Last year, people survived daily on just crackers and butter. I came in contact with many people who can just afford the 10¢ for soup and just fill up on crackers and butter plus a couple cups of free water. Things are changed this year. Extra crackers are 5¢ and butter is 2¢. Now, are you sure you can see the cafeteria seriously doing this, or what is exactly happening to this non-profit organization.

Anyone hungry enough, and that poor that their diet wholy depends on crackers and butter, shouldn't be charged for them.

This may seem a senseless subject to some, but to the poor and hungry, it means a lot. I wouldn't bring this subject up unless I thought it needed some attention.

4) Now that I've picked on a few subjects, this next section will be on several incidents which are occuring everyday.

pastries

Do you realize the pasteries that are sold at NAIT are made by students and by machines which are bought or rented by the Provincial Government. And they charge us 10¢ for a donout which is the same price you pay in a bakery, where the profits go to paying for the staff, equipment, rent, utilities, and a little profit for themselves. Here at NAIT, the profits go to none of these due to free rent and utilities, and the students don't get paid for making them. So where does all the profits go to after the actual dough has been bought?

We all know how bad the service is. If we have to stand in line for 10-15 minutes just to get a meal which you are taking a chance on finishing, is it worth it?

One day while waiting 5 minutes before placing my order for a grilled cheese, I noticed that they weren't serving french fries there. So I had to wait in line to get my grilled cheese then walk over to another line on the other side of the Servery and place my order for french fries. That's not all, there were only a few people in line when I went to get some milk, but when I got to the line-up for the cashier and the line ended somewhere in the middle of the Servery, I almost gave up.

People were coming into the Servery, and all they saw were line-ups. Well, which one were they supposed to be in. There were 20 people in line for hamburgers, 30-40 people on both sides of the center meals section, and 4-5 lines of people in all directions, leaving by the cashiers. It reminded me too much of rush hour traffic downtown, and I was wondering how many people had insurance. (I myself put down my tray and someone not wanting to wait in

and picked up my tray and saved himself 10-15 minutes, but was lucky, there were only about 15 people in line to pay for their food this time. Many people just look inside and keep walking, too much risk involved.)

Really, what is the use of buying a hot meal, when, by the time you are trying to find a place to eat it, it is already

the food itself

If the price of food is raised by the amount it is now, why can't we at least have better food? I have no arguments about food if it was reasonably priced. but, when you pay that much for food, I think you should at least know that you will finish it. Too many times the tables in the cafeteria have been cluttered with trays with food still on them. The campus food is terrible. The only people who are really enjoying the meal everytime (not just once in a while) are the ones who only eat once a day, and cannot compare it to anything else. If you are really hungry, you may find that when eating it, you'll wonder why everyone complains about it. That's only because you're so hungry, you don't realize that you could eat anything and say it is good. It's after you have eaten and got up and gone to class, that you start feeling bad. I mean really bad. Have you ever considered go-

ing to Simpson's Sears for something to eat? It's just a block away, and it's almost as cheap, there is no waiting around for 15 minutes before you get a meal that you haven't got a selection of anyway. The french fries are only 5¢ more and the hamburgers are only 15¢ more. Don't you think it's worth it to get a little fresh air and eat some better food anyway?

Also, here people who are rushed for time and cannot wait 15 minutes for a hamburger, usually grab a coke and a few pasteries. Now, how much nutrition can you get from that? Yet students are doing just that.

FOOD COMPLAINTS ACROSS THE COUNTRY

junk foods from general mills

Miami Beach (CUP-LNS)--Betty Crocker and 'her' parent General Mills were awarded the second annual Bon Vivant Vichyssoise Memorial Award in mid-June for the corporation's encouragement of bad eating habits.

The award, a garbage can, was given by the Centre for Science in the Public Interest, as a counter event to the 33rd Annual Meeting of the Institute of Food Technologists at the Miama Beach Convention Hall

"Bad eating habits start young," said the Center's representative Dr. Michael Jacobson, "and General Mills spends millions of dollars a year to encourage kids to eat foods that contain a high percentage of sugar, a good deal of salt, potentially harmful artificial colorings, and refined flour from which many nutrients have been removed.

More specifically, the company was cited for marketing "breakfast" products, like Kaboom, Sir Grapefellow, Baron Von Redberry, and Frankenberry, that contain between thirty and fifty percent sugar and are conducive to tooth decay, while pushing better foods out of the diet; these products are more candy than cereal."

Like other cereal manufacturers, General Mills boosts its sales by advertising directly to children, zeroing in on Saturday morning TV, as well as using box top hypes and other premiums as lures.

WUA sues beef companies

New York (CUP-LNS)--Women United for Action (WUA), an American organization of women fighting for roll-backs in soaring food prices, has filed a civil antitrust suit against 23 major companies in the beef industry for conspiring to "create a false shortage" by withholding beef from the market until federal price ceilings are removed on September 12.

The suit also asks that damages be paid to consumers by the meat companies and that no further price increases be granted even after September 12.

WUA spokeswoman Laura Fierstein said the current high Dr. Jacobson said that the refined flour used by General Mills, "although enriched, lacks many valuable vitamins and minerals, and is virtually devoid of roughage."

Two General Mills cereals, "Total and Wheaties, are identical except for 1/3 cents worth more vitamins in a 12 ounce box of Total. That 1/3 cents mushrooms into 18 cents at the store-a 5400 percent mark-up"

"This adds up to about a \$10 million a year gyp," said Jacobson. "It is cheaper for someone to buy Wheaties and a vitamin pill than Total."

The Center also accused General Mills of secrecy (the food producer recently declined to make public the nutritional analyses of its products) and deceptive labelling. Many General Mills' labels violate American federal regulations which require that preservatives

be identified by chemical name. And Betty Crocker markets a "butter pecan" cake mix which contains no real butter and no

After the Kellogg Company, General Mills is the second largest cereal producer in the country. But cereal alone did not account for last year's profit of 65.5 million on sales of \$1.6 billion. With Lionel Trains, Play-Doh and Parker Brothers games, General Mills is now the third largest toy manufacturer in the U.S.

Frozen seafood, a frozen meat substitute, Hamburger and Tuna Helper, clothing, jewelry and industrial chemicals (including vitamins) are among the company's other products. There is also a 65 unit restaurant chain (Red Lobster Inns), and the company is currently testing a computerized weight reduction program, travel companies, and adult education centers.

BEAT FOOD PRICES INVEST IN FOOD INDUSTRY

Ottawa(CUP) Not everyone loses because of the current escalating food prices.

For the 28 weeks ending August 11, M. Loeb Ltd., owners of IGA stores, and Horne and Pitfield Foods, more than doubled the profit made at the same time last year.

This year, Loeb made \$1,080, 300 compared to last year's \$465, 000. Loeb's new, highly lucrative subsidiary, Horne and Pitfield also more than doubled its profits in the same period. Horne and Pitfield profited \$461, 599 this year compared to \$221, 729 last year,

As well as a controlling interest in IGA, Loeb also owns several drug stores, including the Shoppers City chain, and other food and drug related industries.

beef prices are the result of large corporations controlling the producing and marketing of The beef industry today is a network of connecting links involving the beef industry with the largest and most diversified companies in the world," she For instance, "Teneco (a large American beef producing and retailing company) who not only owns ranches and retail stores but owns subsidiaries involved in the manufacture of farm equipment, chemicals, oil production, packaging, etc. This company characterizes the whole beef industry which is largely huge corporations, many of whose main interests are in other fields. The monopoly character of the beef industry can be seen in the fact that less than one per

accounted for thirty-nine percent of all livestock raised and only one per cent of all feedlots feed sixty-two percent of all cattle."

Fierstein claims there is no reason for the beef shortages other than the controlling companies' desire for increased profit. "This year cattle production was fifteen per cent higher than in 1972, but the huge monopolies are using their control to keep prices high and illegally withhold meat from the market until the beef price freeze is lifted."

Dr. Herrell DeGraff, President of the American Meat Institute, admitted that "cattle that are not so far along in the feeding process can be delayed in their maturity for market and will indeed be so delayed."

SAFEWAY BOYCOTTED IN ALBERTA

Edmonton (CUP) -- Only five days after the Alberta Supreme Court dropped monopoly charges against the largest food-retailing chain in western Canada, some Edmonton consumers decided to confront Safeway stores themselves.

The boycott has been called to protest Safeway's handling of boycotted products as well as to protest Safeway's control of the food retailing industry.

Safeway has refused to cooperate with nation-wide boycotts of table grapes and lettuce from the U.S., Kraft products, Dare products, and all products from South Africa, Angola and Mozambique.

U.S. farmworkers have called for the boycott of table grapes and lettuce from the U.S. where the United Farm Workers, a union of migrant workers in southern California is using the grape and lettuce boycott as a tool in their contract negotiations with farm owners.

The Kraft boycott has been called by Canada's National Farm Union in an effort to pressure Kraft which controls more than 80% of Canada's cheese industry, to agree to

collective bargaining with farmers.

The Dare cookie boycott is designed to help workers who have been on strike for more than a year at Dare's factory in Kitchener, Ontario.

The boycott of all products from South Africa, Angola and Mozambique has been called by numerous groups throughout North America to help bring pressure on the right wing governments controlling those countries.

Safeway is one of the largest purchasers of all these products and refuses to replace them on its shelves with nonboycotted products.

Safeway also has owned a virtual monopoly, in Western Canada in the food-retailing industry and has been charged with monopoly practices in Edmonton and Calgary for the period of 1965-1972.

As a compromise between the state Albertan prosecutors and Safeway, the monopoly charges were dropped and Safeway promised to obey the courtorders. The court orders prevented Safeway from continuing its "market-saturation" advertising and prohibited it from making leases that prevent com-

petitors from opening stores in Safeway's vicinity.

Under the terms of the courtorder, Safeway will not be able to expand any of its grocery stores in Calgary or Edmonton for three and one half years and during that time, can open only one new store in each city.

The boycott committee points out, however, that Safeway still remains without any competition in the two cities-even from all the competitors combined.

Economics prof, Charles Nunn, at the University of Alberta called "naive" any assumption that the court order would lead to any competition in the food industry in Alberta. The court order also applied only to the monopoly practices in Edmonton and Calgary and did not deal with the rest of the province.

The boycott committee plans to picket Safeway on a hit and run basis. So far the impact of the boycott has been considerably greater than the impact of the court. Twenty per cent of the cars entering Safeway parking lots have turned back when informed of the boycott.

DARE STRIKE AND BOYCOTT STILL ON

Kitchener (CUP)--Workers at the Dare biscuit factory here who have been on strike for more than a year, are still fighting the company and encouraging the public to boycott Dare cookies.

Picket lines were first formed by the striking workers of Local 173 of the International Brewery and Cereal Workers against the Dare factory on May 29, 1973. The strike has been long and bitter and has been marked by periods of physical violence. Pitted against 350 workers have been the Kitchener police, a strike-breaking company, the courts, Kitchener city council and Dare management.

In reply to the company's offer of pay raises over two years of 45 cents to women and 55 cents to men, the union demanded equal pay increases of forty cents for each year of the contract. The workers also demanded that the 8 1/2 hour day shift be replaced by an 8 hour shift.

The picket lines were quiet and orderly for the first few days of the strike. The appearance of Canadian Driver Pool, a strikebreaking outfit Dare hired to move products in and out of the plant, initiated a violent phase of the strike. With the active support of the Kitchener police, the Driver Pool drove tractor-trailer trucks through the picket lines, Because of the violence and

adverse publicity the Driver Pool had caused, the Dare management decided to stop using these strikebreaking services. But, also as a result of the violence, management got support from the Ontario Supreme Court. In June 1972, two injunctions were granted limiting the number of pickets and picket lines. Following the injuctions a number of strikers were arrested for violating the court orders and obstructing police who were assisting scab workers entering the plant.

Confronted with court injunc-

Confronted with court injunctions, a refusal by Kitchener city council to ban strike-breakers from the city, and the company's attempt to induce strikers to return to work, many Local 173 members fought back by instituting a boycott of Dare products. At first, the boycott was a local phenomenon but with the support of the Ontario Federation of Labour and the Canadian Labour Congress the boycott has become national.

Of the 250 union members who remained on strike, about 50 who have been unable to find other employment, collected strike pay until the end of July, 1973. The local is now having trouble finding funds to continue paying the strikers. According to one union official, the international has agreed to financially support the ten person boycott committee so that employment is provided for some of the older workers who are having difficulty finding jobs.

Presently Dare is using scab labour to produce its boycotted cookies.

SAFEWAY BUSTED

Calgary (CUP)

The supreme court of Alberta has ordered Canada Safeway to reduce its domination of retail food marketing in Calgary and Edmonton.

The order is a compromise between gov't prosecutors and the company. Safeway had been charged with monopoly practices in the two cities from 1965 to 1972.

Counsel for Safeway told the court the company was accepting the order without pleading guilty or being found guilty.

The court order will prevent Safeway from continuing its "market-saturating advertising" and profit it from making leases that prevent competitors from opening stores in Safeway's vicinity.

Safeway will not be allowed to expand any of its grocery stores in either city for 3 1/2 years and, during this time, will be allowed to open only one new store in each city. The following year it will be allowed to

open two stores in each city.
For the next six years, Safeway must charge uniform prices
in all its stores.

Canada Safeway operates more grocery stores in the two Alberta cities than all of its competitors combined and is a subsidary of the American Safeway company which is the second largest supermarket chain in the U.S.

It is the largest food store chain in Western Canada, with 91 stores in British Columbia and 154 on the prairies. There are a total of 201 supermarkets in British Columbia and 248 on the prairies. Canada Safeway had a profit of \$18 million in 1972.

When Safeway negotiated a contract for a new store in a shopping centre, it demanded the right to restrict the amount of space other shopping centre tenants could use to sell food. Outside of shopping centres, it negotiated leases that prevented the owner from renting in any other premises, within Safeway's area, to other food retailers.

A 1968 study indicated that Safeway stores in low-income areas of Edmonton charged higher prices than stores in higher income areas.

Unquestionably one of the most amitious and elaborate productions in rock history, "A SONG FOR- THE NEW WORLD" is the first part of an album which it is humbly hoped will unite the rock and classical music forms like never before.

"A Song For-The New World" is based on one of the world's best known and loved classical Symphonies-Dvorak's New World Symphony, which was premiered in New York in 1893.

In "A Song of Joy", Miguel Rios restricted himself to an adaptation of the closing refrain of Beethoven's 9th Symphony, the section known as "Ode to In the follow-up however,

vision or style. After devoting almost three

years of his life to "A Song For - The New World". Migue noted that it wold have been comparatively simple to produce a pop record (and a highly commercial one at that) from one of the various sections of the New World Symphony. But Miguel his fellow visionaries (including classical conductor Alfredo Carrion and keyboards specialist, Teddy Bautista) felt an obligation to Antonin Dvorak to reproduce faithfully as much of the full symphony as possible. As a result, you will find segments of the Adagio, the Largo, the Scherzo and Allegro all contained in the 6' 17" rock adaptation of the New World Symphony.

The original Spanish version (entitled "Cancion para un nuevo mundo") is already an established hit in Miguel's homeland.


Supervision of the English redition was undertaken by the well-known rock journalist and instigator of several successful rock/classical unions, Ritchie

The team of Rios, Alfredo Carrion, Teddy Bautista and Yorke are now deeply involved in the production of an album, the working title of which is "Some Songs (For the New World)."

To be released early in 1974, the album is sure to come as a large surprise to the world music

Miguel Rios says that "(A Song For) The New World" is a taste of what's to come.

Radio stations might note that A&M is releasing an edited mono version of "A Song For - The New World" at 4' 14" along with the full stereo 6' 17" version Either way it's one of the most powerful records to come our way in a long time.



Dust is the principal menace to the continued good performance of a record and also it is the most widespread. It is everywhere in the air we breathe, it settles on every exposed surface and especially collects on the turntable mat.

It is well worthwhile making a thin polythene disc to cover the turntable mat. This can be bought or easily cut from a spare inner record sleeve. It is easy to clean and relatively simple to wipe just before placing the record on it directly upon its removal from the record jacket. This polythene disc serves another important function in acting as an indicator for any electro-static charge which may have been excited in the record.

When a disc carrying a static charge is removed from a turntable covered with a polythene mat, the mat will adhere to a greater or lesser extent to the underside of the disc, depending on the strength of the charge. Sometimes the mat will be completely lifted from the turntable, sticking to the disc like a skin.

It is believed that electrostatic effects in gramophone records are, at least in part, due to the orientation of small electrical forces (dipoles) existing in the molecules of the material of which the record is composed and probably resulting from an electrical asymmetry of the consti-

When a perfectly new and clean record exhibits no evidence of a static charge, it can be assumed that the dipoles are in a quiescent and mutually balanced state of strain amongst themselves. Any friction produced by wiping the record surface with dry material will cause the dipoles to be oriented and become aligned with their axes parallel (polarized) to form an external attractive field. The record will now behave like a magnet, attracting to itself small solid particles from anywhere in the vicinity, also moisture and any pollution in the air.

It is important, therefore, to control any static charge in a new record or any that is excited during the cleaning or preening process. A new record will generally require a slight surface trace of either moisture or anti-static agent to minimize static effects and a gradual treatment is to be preferred in order to permit observation of the minimum amount required for adequate control. It is far better to treat a new record in this manner than to allow the static to attract its own traces from the atmosphere as this is sure to contain undesirable pollution. Once this initial treatment has been provided, one simple preening routine before each playing is all that is required to provide ideal playing condi-





TAE KWON-DO the art of using the feet


Chun Duk Ki, 6th Dan Taekwondo, and his demonstration team gave a small demonstration of Tae Kwon-Do last week with the hopes of starting a program here at NAIT.

Tae Kwon-Do is the modernized way of an old oriental art of self-defence or unarmed combat. It was first heard of 1300 years ago in Korea when it was called Tae Kyon. Tae Kyon is a form of foot fighting. Through the centuries hand techniques were introduced and the combination is now called Tae Kwon-Do, but in the more advanced techniques the use of the legs is still more important. This makes Tae Kwon-Do more effective and spectacular than other oriental self-defence arts, because the legs can develop more power and reach farther than the hands. The Korean word "Tae" means kicking, jumping, flying with the feet; "Kwon" means punching, striking with fists, and "Do" means art, technique or way.

You don't have to be great or


even good, to run. It sort of comes to people after crawling and walking. And the social aspect is just about as much fun as the running.
