
WASHINGTON (CUP) -- In the midst of the deepening outrage over the Watergate scandals, Nixon's Justice Department has proposed a new "solution" to the troublesome demand for amnesty for war resisters.

It offers only the choice of army enlistment or jail. This proposal is even worse than Senator Taft's conditional amnesty bill which would force draft resisters to spend three years in "alternative service"

duty as the price for amnesty. The Army, however, seems to have some reservations about the new scheme. According to a recent editorial (August 29) the semi-official Army Times, "resisters are causing a sticky problem for the Government. Public sentiment is against sending them to jail.' Therefore, it concludes, other punitive measures must be found. The editorial cautions, however, that war resisters in uniform may be more trouble than they're worth.

There is some question about the sincerity of the Army's opposition, however, when one considers Defense Secretary Schlesinger's recent warning that falling enlistments may require resumption of the draft.

Also consider Army Secretary Bo Calloway's statement that he's "unconcerned" about the record Black enlistment (35%) and is opposed to any quota for Blacks. His attempt to sow fears of an all-Black army (if he's unconcerned, why mention it at all?) may be part of a well-orchestrated Army campaign to restore the Draft. The military's attempt to recruit sufficient men voluntarily into the service has been a colossal failure.





STAGE HYPNOTISM Dear Don,

What do you think of stage hypnotism?

Dear Walter,

I personally do not like the idea of the highly hypnotizable being identified to the general public. Unscrupulous members of the audience may find ways of using this special knowledge to the ultimate detriment of the person so identified. (I have no scientific research to indicate that this is so and am expressing my intuitive feelings on the matter.)

Under hypnosis a person can experience feelings and have the same physiological reactions to suggestions of experiences as they would to the real experiences. On a crowded stage with 20 or 30 people to keep track

of, a hypnotist could make mistakes. For example, problems may arise when a person with a heart condition who also

happens to be a good hypnotic subject is told on stage to pretend he is rowing a boat in a race. Or he may be told he is a weight lifting champion and that on his next try he is going to be lifting 500 pounds. The strain involved may be too much.


Stage hypnosis in some Canadian Provinces and many U.S. States is outlawed. Only qualified medical or psychological personnel are allowed to "practice hypnosis." However, since the very existance of a state called "the hypnotic state" is difficult to prove, and since one doesn't have to hear the word hypnosis to exhibit the same behaviour as someone who is supposedly "hypnotized," the usefulness of such a law is questionable. (As Kreskin says

he is not using hypnosis, only suggestion)

Last year an incident occurred at NAIT because of stage hypnotism. A stage hypnotist was brought in to perform in the auditorium at the noon break and had several students on the stage. Later back in class one girl who was on the stage was recognized by fellow classmates. As a joke one of them feigned the patter of the hypnotist's voice and told her that she would go to sleep. She immediately went into what was interpreted as a hypnotic trance and fell out of her desk. She could have injured herself in falling. The pranksters were unable to bring the girl out of the trance and panicked. They brought her down to the medical office and spent quite some time in trying to restore her to normal behaviour.

Apart from the previously mentioned reasons my strongest objection to stage hypnotism is charlatanistic mystique which is built up around the phenomenon of hypnosis through the stage routine of some entertainers. This mystique may prevent some people who would benefit from hypnotherapy from trying the technique and perhaps unnecessarily prolonging years of suffering in their lives.

#### **Ability Fund background**

FACT: The Ability Fund Drive is a national campaign seeking funds to be used for rehabilitation purposes for the disabled. Although the Ability Fund is new to Edmonton and Alberta, it has been conducted in other provinces for several years. FACT: Nationally, the Ability Fund is under the auspices of the Canadian Rehabilitation Council for the Disabled. The Alberta Rehabilitation Council for the Disabled has the provincial franchise which is broken down into four areas. Handicapped Housing Society was awarded the Edmonton and district franchise.

FACT: All funds raised in a particular area are spent in that area except for a very small percentage which is sent to the national office for purposes of

national advertising, etc.
FACT: A goal of \$100,000 has

been set for 1974.

FACT: The Edmonton Drive is the only major drive in Canada that is conducted "by the handicapped for the handicapped." FACT: Although the handicapped themselves will organize, co-ordinate and conduct the actual drive, we realize the importance of the input that can be provided by other Edmontonians. As a result we are setting up an honorary committee and an advisory committee. Persons like Premier Peter Lougheed, Mayor Ivor Dent, Honorable Neil Crawford, M. P. Doug Roche, Honorable Horst Schmid, William Hawrelak, Bob Chapman, and many other leading citizens are part of either of these two

committes.
FACT: Funds raised in Edmonton will be used to sponsor projects conducted by the handicapped and to assist in financing a housing complex for the disabled. Response has been very encouraging and we anticipate that such a complex will be completed within a two-year period.

FACT: Our Charitable Contributions Number is 04 14482-01 - 25.

Nationally the Ability FACT: Fund is held January through March each year. However, in Edmonton, the concentration period of the campaign will take place between January 15 and February 15 with the door to door convas being held Monday, February 4, 1974.

FACT: The campaign will be broken down into four areas: the business appeal; mail drop to wards 3 and 4; door to door canvass in wards 1 and 2, and a high-rise blitz by 200 physically disabled persons. ALLOCATION OF FUNDS

#### handicapped housing study

The first of five review meetings planned during a program study on housing for handicapped persons in Edmonton has been held.

The study, to investigate various aspects of housing for the physically handicapped, began December 1, 1973 and is being conducted by the Handicapped Housing Society of Alberta.

The society which held the review meeting, is comprised of handicapped persons who want to participate in the planning, programming, development and eventually the administration of a housing development. The study is expected to take four months. This first review meeting has allowed for an early input by handicapped persons in what they wish the study to cover. Later review meetings are expected to cover such topics as service programs in a development, site alternatives, unit design, special needs and other services required by handicapped persons.

Three handicapped searchers have been hired by the Handicapped Housing Society to conduct the study in cooperation with a researcher from Thorkelsson/Architect of Edmonton.

The idea of a housing development came out of a weeklong charrette the society held for handicapped persons last spring. It is the top priority of the Handicapped Housing Society which will be sponsoring the Ability Fund in Edmonton from January 15 through until February 15, 1974.

The Ability Fund, formerly the March of Dimes across Canada, was awarded to the housing society by the Alberta Rehabilitation Council for the Disabled.

The theme of the campaign "by the handicapped . . for the handicapped".

The goal of the 1974 campaign for Edmonton surrounding area is \$100,000.

The housing society is unique in its participation in the Ability Fund in that it is the only group in Canada with handicapped people themselves directly involved in a major fund raising campaign.


In 1974, a total of \$55,000 from the Ability Fund will be

used to assist in the development of alternative housing for the handicapped.

of the The remainder \$100,000 will assist other projects such as Social Services for the Disabled; Handicapped Forum, a newspaper for the handicapped; the Members of the Legislature / Handicapped Joint Committee; and a study of transit facilities in Edmonton for the handicapped. All projects are or will be operated by physically handicapped persons in the city.

Planning is now well under way for the campaign which will focus on a business appeal, a residential canvass, a canvass of high rise apartments by handicapped persons and a mail drop in certain residential areas of the city.

Roy Jamha, chairman of the Workmen's Compensation Board is chairman of the honorary patrons committee; Jim Mar-shall, president of the housing society is chairman of the advisory committee and Percy Wickman, a member of the society board is chairman of the campaign steering committee.

#### IMMIGRATION **POLITICS**

Peterborough (CUP)--Andrew Wernick, a sociology professor at Trent University in Peterborough has not been one of 50,000 illegal immigrants who have been granted official status under the recent Canadian 60 day immigration amnesty.

Indeed Professor Wernick has been conducting a legal fight with the government for over two and one-half years in order to obtain a decision. He thinks his difficulties have something to do with his radical activities at U of Toronto in the late 1960's.

While at the U of T Wernick participated in several student demonstrations and helped establish the Toronto Student Movement as the New Left Caucus. Wernick was a well-publicized leader of the Canadian student movement during this time.

In March 1971 he married a Canadian woman and applied for landed immigrant status. He hasn't heard anything since.

Unofficially the word is out that Mr. Wernick doesn't meet Canada's immigration requirements. In Ottawa an official in the Immigration Department that if immigration authorities officially notify Mr. Wernick about his inability to become a landed immigrant he may be subject to deportation appeal -- the same without penalty which applies to all illegal immigrants who did not forward during the Government's amnesty period.

Mr. Wernick's only recourse, he said, is to take his case directly to the Minister of Immigration, Robert Andras.

WASHINGTON (CUP-CPS)---George Orwell wasn't really off the beam when he prophesized that by 1984 all of us would have Big Brother as our roommate.

A secret White House study undertaken two years ago, which proposed wiring every American home, car and boat under government control, has been made public by Rep. William S. Moorhead (D-Pa.).

The study, conducted by Edward E. David, President Nixon's science advisor, envisioned a "wired nation" to give the government means of dispensing services, information and disaster warnings.

Some of the suggestions included: detailed descriptions of systems for sending letters satellite; disseminating educational, cultural and social services through a public broadcasting network, including special educational programs for children; alerting the nation or any locality to an impending disaster, and providing local police with information.

One of the more explicit points of the report suggested a special receiver be installed in every home, radio, and television set and in every car and boat sold in the U.S. The receivers could be turned on by the government even if the t.v. or radio were turned off.

The study, which is 300 pages long, had "Administratively Confidential" stamped on each page. The classification means, in the president's opinion, disclosures could reasonably be expected to "cause damage" to the national security of the United States.

Expecting possible public outcry over this governmental invasion of privacy, the study warned "There may be opposition to requiring receivers to be built into all radios and televisions."

According to David, the plan was "rejected outright" and was never submitted for review.

## For you, the Renter.

## It's your turn to benefit under the Alberta Property Tax Reduction Plan.

Yes. Under this section of the Alberta Property Tax Reduction Plan those in the following categories are ineligible.

ARE THERE ANY EXCEPTIONS?

-Senior Citizens (65 or over). Senior Citizens who rent their principal residence apply directly to the Alberta Department of Municipal Affairs for a Renter Assistance Grant.

—Students who rent from a university or college, i.e. reside in university or college residences. . These residences have already received their benefit since they Foundation Levy.


-Residents of nursing homes or senior citizens' homes, public or private. These residences are in the same category as above.

-Members of the Armed Forces who do not live in residences subject to the Education Foundation Levy, i.e., if they live on a base or in a house provided by the Armed Services.

-Anyone who has already received a benefit from the Homeowners' Education Tax Refund or a benefit from the Renter Assistance Grant under the Alberta Property Tax Reduction Plan. This holds if your spouse has received either the Renter Assistance Credit or Grant or the Homeowners' Education Tax Refund in that tax year.

#### AM I ELIGIBLE?

Yes, if you: Are under 65 years of age, have rented your principal residence(s) in Alberta for a minimum of 120 days in 1973, were a resident of the province on December 31, 1973.



#### WHAT IS THE MAXIMUM BENEFIT I CAN RECEIVE?

You may receive a maximum of \$100.00 under the Plan if you are eligible. The amount will either be in the form of a refund included in your Federal Income Tax Refund from the Department of National Revenue or a credit towards your Tax Payable for 1973. The form and amount of the benefit is determined by your taxable income for 1973.

#### SUPPOSE MY RENT IS PAID FOR BY MY EMPLOYER?

Except in the case of Armed Forces personnel described above, you are still eligible for the benefit providing that the amount of rent that your employer(s) pay(s) is included as part of your income. Free rent received in return for services, such as caretaking, must be declared as part of your income but still entitles you to the Benefit.

#### **HOW DO I CLAIM?**

You will receive a brochure in the mail. DO NOT LOSE IT. STUDY IT CAREFULLY. It will describe in detail all the points of which you should be aware when you apply. Your application form will arrive with your Income Tax Return. If you should lose your brochure you may pick another one up at any Treasury Branch. Remember, in order to receive benefit under thisprogram, you must file a return for 1973 whether or not you have a taxable income.


#### "The Sleeper" sleeps on

#### THE CABINET LEARNS THE NEW MATH

canada produces 2,000,000 barrels of oil a day according to government arithmetic this is known as a shortage

OTTAWA - Next week is the formal and symbolic end of 12 years of Canada's new obsolete National Oil Policy. Repairs to

the Trans-Northern Pipe Line Co. of Toronto line between Toronto and Montreal mean the pipe will cross once again the 1961 policy line - the so-called Ottawa Valley Line.

Replacement of 300 feet of corroded pipe and sealing of a pinhole leak near Brockville at a cost of about \$200,000, mean that Ottawa can be supplied with refined oil products-heating oil and gasolines, mainly - from Toronto-area refineries as well as from Montreal.

From the pipeline's opening

in 1953 until the policy of 1961. products refined in Montreal flowed by Trans-Northern to Ottawa, Kingston, Brockville and even Toronto. In 1961, the pipe was cut and, 54 miles blocked off, when the government ruled Montreal refined products could not be sold west of the line.

The decision reserved the big Ontario market for western Canadian crude oil and protected it from competition from offshore crude, which until 1973 could be imported and refined more cheaply in Montreal.

Ottawa, which uses about 55,000 barrels a day of oil products in winter, was left on the Montreal side of the line.

However, feared shortages of supplies from off-shore for this winter resulted in the decision to turn at least part of Ottawa's demands over to Ontario refiners and supply the capital by reopening the pipeline.

(Since 1961, Trans-Northern has operated the existing pipe in two sections, an Ontario Toronto to section--roughly Kingston--and a Montreal-to-Ottawa section.)

In one 3.5 mile section, 300 feet of corroded pipe had to be replaced. Tests showed a pinhole leak remaining, which was not located until last Thursday. Twenty-four hours of testing under pressure with the pipe

filled with water was to be completed during the weekend.

National Energy Board approval of the test results is needed and Friday energy board officials were virtually unaware of the current status of the line. One official of the Department of Energy Mines and Resources said "there is little less priority on it at the moment."

Nonetheless, TransNorthern officials expect a new shipping schedule to be drawn up on Mon-

Contrary to earlier indications, only a small proportion of Ottawa fuels appear likely to be shipped from Toronto. Trans-Northern has orders for about 3,300 barrels a day from the Ontario refineries, or about 6 per cent of Ottawa' needs. The pipe will be able to accommodate up to 10,000 barrels a day from Toronto to Ottawa with potential expansion to about 17,000 barrels a day, still less than one-third of Ottawa's needs.

"We are not aware of a shortage in Ottawa," says W. G. Burks, Trans-Northern manager of engineering and operations.

Trans-Northern owns 450 miles of up to 12-inch pipe between Montreal and Hamilton. It is owned jointly by Gulf Oil Canada Ltd., Shell Canada Ltd., and Texaco Canada Ltd.

University of Alberta Bearcats fit somewhere in between Junior and Varsity league and, because there's no such division have to settle for exhibition games.


They welcomed the opportunity to participate in the NAIT Christmas Invitational, and walked away with the tournament championship Saturday night in NAIT Arena.

of the net on both occasions. With two Knights and one


Ookpik in the penalty box, NAIT put on the pressure and Bob Black scored from his guard position on the blueline.





Another said that he lets guys through that threaten him because its easier than taking


They all try to reason with the stubborn people that insist they have a right to enter J-Wing, the staff being just as guilty, if not more so, than anyone else.


The Commissionaires are only trying to do their job, but after having to face all the unpleasantness of the rude people who can't take no for an answer, I can understand their discontent.

#### NDP backs student wages

RED DEER, ALTA. (CUP) --Grant Notley, Alberta NDP leader and holder of that party's only seat in the provincial legislature, affirmed his support for the National Union of Students (NUS) demand that all university students be paid an annual wage of \$3,000. Notley was addressing the annual meeting of the Red Deer NDP association.

He saw the proposal as a step towards a guaranteed annual income for all Canadians, a policy of the federal NDP.

Claiming that the taxpayer is already paying a large number of students to attend school through the Manpower grant system, and a great many talented students do not have the financial resources to continue

their education, Notley said equal financial aid should be given to all students.

He attacked current student finance policies which emphasize parents' direct fiscal responsibility for their children's post secondary educa-Poor students and students with family problems are automatically discriminated against when parental contribution becomes a criterion for loan approvals. Often, the system shafts those with the most urgent need, he said.

A student wage, financed out of taxation revenues, would eliminate these built-in inequities faced by the poor student. "Parents should be responsible as taxpayers. Their responsibility should depend on their ability to pay," he said.

#### The first big splash

The swimming pool is finally open. After 6 years of planning and almost 2 years of construction, the Activities Centre is completed, and all the areas are now available for use.

Garry Meadus, Director of Student Services, has been laying the groundwork for AC, since its inception, and has been instrumental in the planning, design, and facilities.

The pool and area surrounding, is quite a bit different from existing facilities anywhere else. resembles slightly the McMaster University pool, but still retains its uniqueness.

The pool is 50 meters long, and 6 lanes wide; the depth ranges from 3'6" at one end, to 12'6" at the other. At the deep end are 1 meter and 3 meter spring diving boards and a 5 meter tower.

A movable bulkhead, the only one in the city, can divide the pool into two swimming areas of any length. The bulkhead is

a fascinating piece of equipment. When stationary, it 's as solid as a rock, and wide enough to walk across. To move it, large tanks underneath are filled with air, and its just a matter of floating it wherever you want.

The deck is larger than normal, for teaching purposes and

assembly of competitors at future competitions.

There is a seating area for 450 people, which looked kind of small after yesterdays water polo match.

Pool manager Brian Simpson is absolutely tickled to death with the facilities. He said, "It's the best pool by far that I've ever worked in, and there's been a lot of 'em." He especially likes the colors on the walls, and the lighting system.

Swimming classes will be set up according to the enthusiasm generated by the student body. Lists of times classes will be offered will be posted on the bulletin board outside the gym in the next few days. Courses offered will include water sports,

diving and learning to swim.

Anyone who is interested in learning how to dive, or increas-ing the skills they have already, is invited to attend a meeting next Wednesday, January 16, in the gym during Common Hour.


