# Jon Thibert will be missed by all

Jon Thibert leaves today, for a job as Senior Account Executive for ITV (Independent TV), the brand new station that should be in operation by the 1st of September. He's been here for 6 years, teaching Advertising to the second year Marketing students.

A colleague of his said that things just won't be the same when he's gone, but he wants his name kept quiet, so I won't mention Bart Symons.

Jon was born in a place called Merlin, Ontario, many, many years ago (at least that's what he says). He went through school in that area, and attended Ryerson Institute of Technology from 1950 to 52. He enrolled in Radio and Television Arts, the start of a long and successful career.

Even as a boy, Jon wanted to get into the "electric media". While most kids his age were making mudpies or playing cowboys and Indians, he used to sit in front of the radio and listen to Ty Tyson (an old time Howard Cossel) describe all the action at the Detroit Tiger ball games. In high school he'd MC the dances and all the other things that high school kids used to do.

He started out as nighttime disc jockey, which is where most young DJ's start, and he spun discs there for about 18 months. That was when good 'ol Bill Hunter was behind the bench for the Tigers.

In 1957 Jon got into sales advertizing for CHAT, and became the local sales manager two years later

years later.

TV became a part of his life in 1960, when he left the radio end of CHAT and became the local sales manager for CHAT-TV.

Two years later he became national sales manager and two years after that, operations manager.

From a DJ in '52 to bossman for the whole station in '64, Jon was going places fast. He stayed there though, for only 4 years as operations manager, before NAIT enticed him with what must have been an offer he couldn't refuse. He joined the Business Administration Department in January 1968.

And now he's leaving. After six years of teaching kids how to make it in advertising, he's leaving to see if he can make it in







#### AM I ELIGIBLE?

Yes, if you: Are under 65 years of age, have rented your principal residence(s) in Alberta for a minimum of 120 days in 1973, were a resident of the province on December 31, 1973.



WHAT IS THE MAXIMUM BENEFIT I CAN RECEIVE?

under the Plan if you are eligible. The amount will either be in the form of a refund included in your Federal Income Tax Refund from the Department of National Revenue or a credit towards your Tax Payable for 1973. The form and amount of the benefit is determined by your taxable income for 1973.

#### SUPPOSE MY RENT IS PAID FOR BY MY EMPLOYER?

Except in the case of Armed Forces personnel described above, you are still eligible for the benefit providing that the amount of rent that your employer(s) pay(s) is included as part of your income. Free rent received in return for services, such as caretaking, must be declared as part of your income but still entitles you to the Benefit.

#### **HOW DO I CLAIM?**

You will receive a brochure in the mail. DO NOT LOSE IT. STUDY IT CAREFULLY. It will describe in detail all the points of which you should be aware when you apply. Your application form will arrive with your Income Tax Return. If you should lose your brochure you may pick another one up at any Treasury Branch. Remember, in order to receive benefit under this program, you must file a return for 1973. whether or not you have a taxable income.

### ARE THERE ANY EXCEPTIONS?

Yes. Under this section of the Alberta Property Tax Reduction Plan those in the following categories are ineligible.

-Senior Citizens (65 or over). Senior Citizens who rent their principal residence apply directly to the Alberta Department of Municipal Affairs for a Renter Assistance Grant.

-Students who rent from a university or college, i.e. reside in university or college residences. These residences have already received their benefit since they are not subject to the Education Foundation Levy.

Residents of nursing homes or senior citizens' homes, public or private. These residences are in the same category as above.

-Members of the Armed Forces who do not live in residences subject to the Education Foundation Levy, i.e., if they live on a base or in a house provided by the Armed Services.

Anyone who has already received a benefit from the Homeowners' Education Tax Refund or a benefit from the Renter Assistance Grant under the Alberta Property Tax Reduction Plan. This holds if your spouse has received either the Renter Assistance Credit or Grant or the Homeowners' Education Tax Refund in that tax year.

You may receive a maximum of \$100.00

The Nait Men's Volleyball Team travelled to Medicine Hat for the first ACAC competition. colleges and instimet other tutions in the Round Robin competition.






NAIT Department of Physical and Leisure Education will offer one class in Springboard Diving to begin Wednesdays 12 to 1. The first class will be held February 6.


All those interested in learning to dive, or to improve their diving skills, are asked to see Miss Hanson before that time. If there is not sufficient interest the class will be cancelled.

# NAITSA Annual Meeting Feb. 13

At the last Students' Council meeting on January 23, NAITSA President Gary Everett announced that the annual meeting of the Students' Association would be held on February 13th. This meeting, to be held in the auditorium during the Wednesday Common Hour, will deal primarily with the fiscal year September 1, 1972 to August 31, 1973. The financial statements for that period will be presented by NAITSA Treasurer Ed Wychopen. An amendment to the constitution will also be proposed at the meeting.

Normally, the Annual Meeting is held in December, however this year the delay may well be worth it Mr. Everett stated. By the end of February it is planned that NAITSA'S present accounting procedures and records shall have been integrated to a computer program. In the future all invoicing, billing, journalizing, etc. will be handled on the computer

To set up the computer program a very accurate financial position is necessary as a base. For this reason the accounting firm auditing NAITSA'S books have taken considerably longer this year to complete their analysis. Also, for the first time, the financial records of the Student's Store have been included in the overall audit.

Many reasons can be cited for the switch to computer-accounting, one being that partial and "running-total" financial statements will be more readily accessible. This will allow the Students' Council and the Executive to use a system of time-flow analysis to aid them in many of their decisions concerning future business transactions.

Secondly, the computer system will free the NAITSA Treasurer from many of the menial tasks which now form a greater portion of his work. These func-

tions include the day-to-day posting requirements necessary to such journals as accounts receivable, accounts payable, etc.

At this point, however, it must be remembered that the Treasurer no longer looks after just the administrative side of NAIT-SA affairs but now two business ventures (Students' Stores and Games Room) and a \$10,000 yearly newspaper operation. By relieving him of these duties he may now be able to sit down and help plan new business ventures, more efficient expense and budgetary controls, etc. After all. .isn't our Treasurer on Students' Council to attempt to improve NAITSA'S financial operations, not maintain them at their existing level?

As was mentioned the second major item to be discussed at the Annual Meeting will be a proposed by-law amendment to the constitution of NAITSA. The present By - Law and its amendment are as follows:

Article 17 reads: The By - Laws may be rescinded, altered or added to by an "Extra-ordinary Resolution" passed by a majority of not less than three-quarters (3/4) of such members entitled to vote as are present in person at a general meeting of which ten days notice specifying the intention to propose the resolution as an extraordinary resolution has been duly given. Such notice shall be given by posting notices on the School Bulletin Boards.

Amended to:
The By-Laws may be rescinded, altered or added to provide that the motion to rescind, alter or add to is passed by a majority of representatives present and voting at a meeting of Students' Council except that:

a) any amendment involving a change in the total student fees must be proposed in the form of an "Extraordinary Resolution" at a general meeting of which ten days notice specifying the intention to propose the resolution as an extraordinary resolution has been duly given.

Addition to Constitution: Article 4:

(i) a written notice setting out in full the proposed such repeal, amendment or addition has been submitted to the Association Secretary at least (48) hours previous to a meeting of the Students' Council.

(ii) the motion to repeal amend, or add to, is passed by a majority of representatives, present and voting, at three (3) consecutive meetings of Students' Council.

This amendment has become necessary in an effort to faciliate and streamline the many minor changes occuring in and around the operations and functions of the Students' Association. With NAITSA's emergence into student service, and other, business ventures, a set of by-laws must constantly be revamped, repealed, and amended, to aid future student executives and councils in their decision-making processes. There must be an accurate, although not necessary stringent, set of guidelines for the students' association to follow in their endeavours. new in the constitutional frame-

work of organized societies, associations, or governments for that matter. Only after passage at third reading does any Bill in Canada's federal parliament go to the Senate for royal assent. It does not become law until this entire procedure is complete. Our city council uses the same system as do several student unions and associations throughout Alberta and the other provinces. The procedure could only work to disadvantage with the representatives of almost 2000 students acting incorrectly. This would seem very remote indeed.

For the most part any changes which must be made are minor and do not require the gathering of at least 200 members (which is no easy task, what with staggered classes and breaks). It is expected that the fifty eligible reps to Students' Council carry with them the majority feeling of the students they represent.

The greatest single issue which is most certain to affect all students is that policy regarding the level of student fees. A major portion of the proposed amendment relates to this instance. Should any change be considered in the total student fees, that cha-

nge must be taken to the entire student body for ratification. Only at a meeting attended by at least 200 members can a proposal relating to fees be discussed and its passage or defeat depends entirely on the choice of those present and voting.

Please show your interest in the affairs of your students' association and attend this General Meeting February 13. As was pointed out earlier, this meeting cannot proceed without the presence of at least 200 members. Also, please bring your ID card with you.



## From the CIA with love . . .

OTTAWA (CUP)--The Ottawa diplomatic corps, an international community, is currently pondering one of President Nixon's latest decisions. Nixon announced from his San Clemente western White House last week that William J. Porter is to be appointed the new American ambassador to Canada pending U.S. Senate approval.

diplomatic Porter was posted to many places around the world as a member of the American Foreign Service. Most recently, he acted as chief American deligate (under Henry Kissinger) at the Paris Peace Talks, 1971-73. He had previously headed the American 'rural pacification' program in South Vietnam, 1965-67. At that time, the American government had decided bombing the Vietnamese back to the stone age was not a sensible strategy and had brought in a team of experts under Porter to convince the Vietnamese the Americans would bring about true economic and social re-That program failed, Porter resigned, and was posted

to South Korea in 1967.

The Ottawa 'dip corps' is alive with theories about why Nixon chose this man for the Canadian posting. He replaces Adolph W. Schmidt who has been U.S. Ambassador to Canada since July, 1969. The Toronto Star sparked the speculation with their Jan. 9th story headlined "U.S. Ousts Porter: Posted to Canada." The Star alleged that Henry Kissinger is kicking Porter, number three man in the State Dep't, out of the way so he can promote one of his men to that spot.

Kissinger wants to move up Joseph J. Sisco, presently numfour in the department. Sisco has been Kissinger's 'silent partner' in the Mid-East negotiations. "When Hank's in Cairo, Joe's in Tel Aviv."

The second level of speculation goes a little deeper: many of the smaller nations of the world are expecting Canada will be the 'next Vietnam'. They reason Canada has many of the basic resources needed by the U.S. business interests - thus the U.S. government - if they are to maintain military control of their empire.

Porter was head of the WHAM program in Vietnam - Win the Hearts and Minds of the people. Another example of CIA social emgineering? Are they about to try it again in Canada? What does Porter's appointment mean for the Canadian people?

Porter spent his first eighteen years as a diplomat in the Arab countries, (Iraq 37-41, Lebanon 41-43, Syria 43-46, Palestine 46-47, Morocco 53-57, Algeria 61-65) and the rest of the time in Washington.

Amongst other things he was the head of a CIA bureau and political advisor to the Voice of America, a radio show for foreign broadcast, in the 'fifties; businessman, diplomat and CIA ag-

U.S. Senate approval of Nixon's appointment is expected early in February. There has been no official Canadian reaction to Porter's nomination except for the statement by the Canadian reaction to Porter's nomination except for the statement by the Canadian Ambassador to the United States, Marcel Cadieux: "He speaks French... he has always been very friendly...he is also quite a hockey fan."

#### TORONTO'S POOR GET PRINT-OUTS INSTEAD OF HAND-OUTS

Toronto (CUP) For welfare recipients in Metro, 1984 is arriving ten years early: their personal life histories will go on secret file in a metro computer which will belch out everything from common law relationships to clothing needs.

The ghost of George Orwell's "Big Brother" must be roaming through Metro as the section of the bureaucracy putting together the new system is called the Management Information Section of Metro Chairman Paul Godfrey's office.

The computer system already handles the issuing of welfare cheques, pension data for all civic employees, and road survey information.

For those on welfare it will keep track of the following: name of recipient and all

name of recipient and all family members; all addresses;

health of recipient and all family members; reports of previous work rec-

ords; notes on educational level; marital status, including whether a single parent, divor-

ced or widowed; a record of common-law relationships;

All sorts of social services being received in addition to routine cheques, such as homema-

king and day care centres.

In return for storing the information, the computer will

set out budgets for the recipients based on the information stored in the memory banks.

The computer will tell recipients how much can be spent on rent, food and clothing and write the welfare cheque for whatever sum the computer calculates as appropriate.

There is no indication that this computer will be tied into the federal government's unemployment insurance computer in Belleville, Ontario, but Metro officials say one reason the welfare computer is being brought into existence is to cut down on welfare fraud.


Senior Metro officials say the computer is designed to contain a complete case profile on each welfare recipient.

But the file in the computer is to be confidential, according to Metro social services commissioner John Anderson.

Even members of Metro council will not have access to all information, reserved for employees of the welfare department.

The computer will also use files on any person receiving any sort of assistance from Metro.

This will include a new programme being phased in by Metro to assist the working poor by providing drugs prescribed by a doctor, surgical supplies, moving allowances, dental and optical services, art-



ificial limbs, vocational training, and funerals.

Once the new welfare scheme assisting the working poor is brought into effect, the total number of people on the Metro computer will number in tens of thousands.
