# and exec all get their money

We won! Students voted overwhelmingly in favor of a paid editor for the Nugget and monthly salaries for the NAITSA executive.

It was a day full of surprises. First of all, not too many people thought that 200 students, the qurorum, would attend the meeting. 238 showed up. Then there were doubts as to either of the Amendments passing. Both passed with 80% of the votes.

192 people voted for paying the executive, 46 against, and 191 voted for a paid editor, 46 against. One ballot was spoiled on the editor question.

Each member of the executive (excluding the President and the secretary) now recieve \$85 a month. The President recieves \$4000 per year, plus a \$1000 travel budget. The secretary is paid \$2.50 an hour.

Social Activities Chairman Ed Kohel, spearheaded the drive for monthly salaries, and his plans worked without fail: except in one instance.

He expected the monthly salary to be retroactive to the beginning of this years executives' term of office, in May. That was not stated in the amendment, so he, along with the rest of the executive, will have to be content with a salary starting this month.

The Editor of the Nugget now recieves \$3.00 an hour, to a maximum of \$500 per month. This year is the first year a Nugget Editor has been paid.

### Cops have a new beat

The days of the policeman on the beat will not be lost, at least in Edmonton.

With the announcement of the coming of Robert Lunney as the new Chief Constable, our deskbound commandos of corruption will be out working off their lunches.

The man on the beat will be required to stop in on all the businessmen to introduce himself and have a short chat and be on his way. The officer must acquaint himself as well with the principle of the school nearby.

Calgary, which has had the same system in effect for some time, operates with much less staff than Edmonton at present.

The 'on the beat' method which is referred to now as community policing is supposed to reduce public apathy toward criminal behaviour or in other words "in sight, in mind".

Chief Lunney also has some views on the treatment of natives and told the police commission that he would like to see some native constables on the force. Having been with the RCMP for 21 years the idea is not new to him nor the problems it presents.

With the coming of the new chief possibly Mr. Lunney's noted administrative talents can unsnarl the paper jungle that many of the officers have to live with throughout the day.

### Amendments should never have passed

It should be called "a fluke". The passing of the amendments to motions in the Constitution should not have happened.

Our executive went about it the wrong way. If NAITSA President Russ McLeod had finished rewriting the Constitution, a project started by past-President Gary Everett last year, the need for a General Assembly would be eliminated.

The new Constitution would have left matters, such as those voted upon, up to the Representative Council.

Our present Constitution is outdated. It has to be rewritten. Much of that work has been done, but it is up to Mr. McLeod to see that the Constitution is completed and to rid the student body of boring referendums.

## Morgentaler trial continues

The Supreme Court of Canada has reserved its decision on whether or not to allow Montreal doctor Henry Morgentaler to appeal his conviction on abortion charges made by the Quebec Court of Appeals.

The reserve means that the court will deliver its decision at a future date, which could be months away. It can decide one of three ways: to uphold the Court of Appeals' decision, to overturn or to order a new trial. Indications are that a new trial may be ordered.

Member of the court expressed some doubts about an appeal court substituting its verdict for that of a jury, as had the Quebec Court of Appeals.

The court also seemed of the oninion that only a jury should decide whether the abortion performed by Morgentaler was necessary and therefore not an illegal act.

The Crown's lawyer, Louis-Guy Robichaud, argues that Morgentaler made on effort to come within the 1969 abortion laws when he performed the abortion in August 1973.

Robichaud says the doctor made no attempt to have the girl brought before a theraputic abortion committee established in Montreal as called for by law.

He also urged the court not to apply Section 45 of the Criminal Code as a defence against abortion saying it would open the way for 'abortion on demand.

Section 45 states that everyone is protected from criminal responsibility for performing a surgical operation upon any person for the benefit of that person 'if the operation is performed with skill and care and it is reasonable to perform the operation and having regard to all the circumstances of the case.'

If that were a valid defence against abortion charges, everyone, not just medical doctors. could perform abortions, Robichaud said.

Earlier the court had ruled that the defence of the abortion laws being unconstitutional was not valid leaving Morgentaler with only Section 45 of the Criminal Code to use as a defence




### Canada Manpower Centre on campus

### Apathy vs. Materick



I have read that there is some connection between E.S.P. and hypnosis. Is there?

Dear Curious:

An extensive review of the research related to the interaction between Extra Sensory Perception (E.S.P.) and hypnosis was reported by a man called Van De Castle in 1969. Of the twenty-one studies investigating the affect of hypnosis on E.S.P. sixteen found positive results.

The three main areas of ESP studies appeared to be telepathy (G.E.S.P.), clairvoyance and pre-cognition. G.E.S.P. refers to the phenomenum whereby communication is made between people through other than known physical means. For example, a person in one room may look at a card with a number on it and transmit that number to a person in another room simply by concentrating on the number.





# Strathcona Historical Group strives to save its district

History was made recently or rather documented. The Strathcona Historical Group signed their incorporation charter at a reception on Wednesday, Nov. 6.

The Group has been in existence for some time now. Its aim is to preserve the distinctive community character of Strathcona which at one time was a separate entity from Edmonton. The Group is a collection of architects, politicians and others. The Group in its effort to save the Strathcona area is working with the City Planning Commission to prepare rapid and traffic movement to compliment the area.

Many of the plans the Group

has stressed is keeping older buildings as part of the character of the area. To that end the Group hopes to receive more support from the federal and provincial governments as well as from the Devonian Foundation and Heritage Canada. But to get this support the Group has to modify its standards and goals somewhat. The scope of its operation initially spanned from a few blocks east of the CPR tracks on Whyte Avenue to the University area, however it has to be modified to the area centralized around the immediate area on the west side of the CPR line.




Accompanied by guitarist Glenn Foster, Materick didn't let the size of the crowd hamper his hour and a half show. You


The Ook's (or is it the Streaks?) winning ways began last Wednesday in Olds, where they tamed the Broncos, 11-0.
