

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Canada Manpower Centre on campus CMC OC

The Department of Manpower and Immigration has established, for your benefit, an office at the Northern Alberta Institute of Technology. This is one of 72 Canada Manpower Centres in operation at post-secondary institutions in Canada, and has been in operation since February, 1964.

The primary purposes of these centres are: providing information about the labour market and career opportunities, occupational counselling, helping students find casual, full-time and part-time employment and assisting employers in their recruitment of both the graduate and undergraduate students. HYPNOSIS MAY HELP SCHOOL WORK

Door Doo:

I have board that hypnosis has been used to help students in school. How can it help me? Electronics

Dear E:

Experiments with hypnosis education have been going on since 1925 or earlier. Some dudies on learning, learning retention and teaching spelling have shown no differences between those hypnotized and those who were not.

Other studies bypnosis to be significantly beloful in improving reading grado point averages, and student councelling.

A study by two MD's from University of Creighton, Nobraska, used a control group (no hypnosis) and an experimental (those who were hypmotized) to test improvment in students who were on probation at the university. Other experiments have been conducted on pre-examination conducted on pre-examination and examination anxiety. Quite a lot of work has been done on reading and hypnosis.

The research, however, is not conclusive. Some say "yes, it works"; others say "no." Perhaps the best answer I can give you is that it depends on how one wants to measure "succes" and how one designs his approach to hypnosis and the motivation of the student. The school situation is probably not unlike the situations with smoking or drinking --- if you amount of hypnosis or other form of treatment will "make you quit." If a student doesn't study, no amount of hypnosis can make him pass an etam. What it may be able to do is help him control his emotional state, so that he can make maxinoun use of what he does know

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Morgentaler defends abortion

STATEMENT BY EDMONTON COMMITTEE TO DEFEND DR. MORGENTALER

Dr. Henry Morgentaler, a Montreal physician sentenced to 18 months imprisonment and three years probation for performing an illegal abortion, will be making a cross-Canada speaking tour, October 8-18. Part of the tour will include Edmonton on October 8th and 9th. The purpose of this tour is to rally together those opposed to the specific attack against Dr. Morgentaler by the Quebec court and those who are opposed to the restrictions on availability of abortions now being imposed.

Dr. Morgentaler has been an outspoken advocate for the fight of women to safe, legal abortion since 1967 when he publicly presented a brief to the Federal government urging that "abortion on request" be made available in the first three months of pregnancy. Since then he has been in the forefront of a number of

4:15 PM room T411 women demanding repeal of the restrictive 1969 abortion law. Faced with the growing publicity he was attracting for his outspoken views, the Quebec government decided to act.

Since June, 1970, Quebec police have arrested Morgentaler three times and laid a total of 13 charges against him. Police have harassed his patients and stolen his personal files. In an attempt to curtail his legal defence, the Department of Internal Revenue froze his assets on trumped-up charges of tax evasion.

Dr. Morgentaler's colleagues, Dr. McHabee, Dr. Tanguay and nurse Johanna Cornax, have been arrested under the abortion law.

It was in March 1973 that Dr. Morgentaler demanded openly in a letter to Quebec Social Affairs Minister Claude Castonguay that the Provincial government authorize his abortion clinic to perform legal abortions. The clinic would grant an abortion to any women who wanted one. The request was rejected.

In publicly announcing the existance of his clinic in Montreal, Dr. Morgentaler stated that as a prototype of what he hoped to see across Canada, it had to meet the following requirements:

 the operations had to be done competently, under the best, most modern, safest medical conditions
 the fees had to be reasonable and adjustable downward to zero so that no person would be denied this service because of inability to pay.

He affirmed that, over the course of five years, he had performed over 5,000 abortions without a single death or serious

"I am firmly convinced that the law under which I am now being tried is unjust, cruel and dangerous to women", he said. "I do not believe that doing medically safe abortions is a criminal act. On the contrary, I feel very strongly that denying women safe abortions and exposing them to death and injury is criminal."

It is quite obvious that the government is intent on persecuting any doctor who stands for the right of women to control their own bodies. In September 1973, the government forced an early trial by bypassing the normal preliminary hearings with the use of a "preferred indictment" signed by the Quebec Minister of Justice.

During the trial, Dr. Morgentaler's lawyers began a historic defence by bringing to the judge a motion to "drop the charges" on the basis that the Canadian laws were unconstitutional in relation to the Canadian Bill of Rights. They used the US Supreme Court decision that abortion is a women's right, as well as similar judgements in England. as jurisprudence for their case. The judge, however, ruled against the defence motion and the criminal trial of Morgentaler began. on October 18, 1973.

In November of that year, the twelve member jury acquitted Dr. Morgentaler of performing an illegal abortion. Despite publi opinion in favor of repeal of Canada's abortion laws (opinion poll, January 4, 1973, showed two out of three Canadians agreed that abortion should be a private matter between a women and her doctor) and despite the acquital,

the governments and courts have pursued Dr. Morgentaler and have made his case into a test case for the reinforcing of anti-abortion laws.

The crown appealed the acquital to the Quebec Court of Appealwhich ruled that the trial judge had improperly instructed the jury on the law. Instead of ordering a new trial before a new jury, the Court of Appeal undermined the jury system and our system of justice, it declared that there was no further evidence any jury could hear, it declared Dr. Morgentaler guilty! This decision is an attack by government upon the liberties of

Dr. Morgentaler is presently appealing the decision of the Quebec Court, to the Supreme Court of Canada. Hearings began October 2. In an unusual step. the Supreme Court ruled that the Canadian Civil Liberties Association, the Foundation for Women in Crisis and four antiabortion groups will be allowed to present briefs during the hearings. Although a common practise in relation to civil cases, this only occurs with criminal cases if, in the opinion of the court, significant social issues are at stake.

If Dr. Morgental r loses his appeal, he will go to jail for 18 months and Canada's antiabortion laws will be reinforced. This would represent a serious defeat for the women of Canada in winning their right to decide whether or not they will bear a child.

The victimization of Morgentaler is only part of a campaign by government and other opponents of women's rights, such as the Catholic Church, and so-called "right-to-life" to re-inforce an unjust and barbaric law, by further reducing the availability of inexpensive, medically safe abortions. Through its Justice Minister, Otto Lang, the government has made its backward, anti-women views quite clear.

According to Lang, the demand that a woman should have control over her own body is "a silly slogan", he has even promised to make abortion more inaccessable. In Montreal, abortion facilities have been cut back. In Regina, prohibitive fees of \$150 - 200 are being charged for therapeutic abortions - over and above the cost of medicare. The Toronto Metro Council refused a grant to the Birth Control and VD Control Centre because it provided an abortion referal service.

The issue is clearly one of women's rights, and Dr. Morgentaler, as an outspoken supporter of a woman's most basic right, control over her own body, deserves our active support.

"Our fight is a fight for human rights, for freedom to choose, freedom of conscience, freedom of religion. Our fight is for decency and humanity and the most fundamental of freedoms: the right to decent medical care when needed, by women who have decided they need an abortion." (Dr. Morgentaler, May, 1974)



After a couple of ten foot falls, and resulting tidal waves, they shut-er-down. We never did get to see how they were going to get the stretcher across.


After just about everyone on the Civil team got wet, they decided that going to the bar was a much better idea.


