McNALLY LIBRARY

The Library's collection of books, pamphlets, magazines and newspapers, is available for use by all students who have registered at N.A.I.T.

McNally Library is located in the South Lobby of the Central Administration Building.

Library Hours

Monday - Thursday - 8:00 a.m. to 10:00 p.m. Friday - 8:00 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Saturday - 1:00 p.m. to 5:00 p.m.

Library Regulations

- 1. A N.A.I.T. identification card is necessary to borrow books.
- 2. Borrowers are held entirely responsible for books charged out in their name.
- 3. Brief cases are to be left in the special area
- 4. All BOOKS must be presented for inspection at the exit control desk; this is to prevent theft of library material and your co-operation in this matter is requested.
- 5. Smoking, refreshment, and loud conversation are prohibited in the library. Students violating these regulations will be asked to leave the library.

Locating a Book

To find a specific book on the shelves, first consult the library's CARD CATALOGUE.

All cards in the card catalogue are interfiled alphabetically. You may locate a book in the card catalogue by its author, the title or by subject.

The CALL NUMBER on the upper left hand corner of the catalogue card indicates the location of the book on the shelves.

Arrangement of Books

Books on the shelves are arranged by subject according to the DEWEY CLASSIFICATION SYSTEM. Each book is assigned a Dewey Classification number according to its subject and an author "number". Together these numbers make up the CALL NUMBER. Books are first filed numerically by their Dewey classification number and subarranged alphabetically by author.



Institute security

The topic for this column is presented for the express purpose of enlightening any Institute people who might not be aware of their responsibility with regards to the security of the Institute.

After hours, the Institute is kept locked, and persons desiring entry must do so via the MAIN entrance - at the east doors of the Main Lobby. They are required to sign the rgisterand to state the time of entry and the location of the room or area they intend to visit.

All staff and students are obligated to resist any plea for entry into ANY area of the Institute by anyone. Even though the person is recognized as an Institute member, entry must be refused. The reason for signing the register is for identification of area, person and time. This cannot be accomplished when entry is gained without any traceable action.

Any Institute personnel or student should report an illegal entry as soon as possible, when discovered. This is not a petty act on the part of the person informing, it is a safeguard for his personal property as well as the property of the Institute that well may be jeopardized.

During the festive season, when the Institute is kept locked for longer than normal periods, Institute personnel and students should make an effort to cooperate as much as possible. A quick call on the Grey Phone to the Commissionaires (394) would help to alert them. A description or possible identification of the person violating security would assist the commissionaires in either apprehending or reporting the incident.














Flash put the topping




This fresh young performer from Seattle sang and picked her way through two class changes with apparent ease as she conversed casually with her audience.

Allan Fraser is a songwriter of great talent and many of his lyrics reveal subtle webs of emotion and sensitivity.



Bridge on the river, Why?

This year's Bridge Building Contest promises to be one of the biggest and most exciting events of the year for NAIT.

Already ten technologies have entered the competition, Food,

Chemical, Surveying, Drafting, Computers, Bldg. Construction, Architecture, Marketing, Civil, and Gas.

Last year, Bldg. Construction won the contest in a record time of 28 minutes, with a very well constructed bridge.

The rules are as follows:

Objective - to construct a rope and wooden stick bridge across a designated area (Whitemud Creek)

Equipment - Rope: must be standard rope of any thickness which has not been previously prepared in any manner, ie braiding, knots

Wooden sticks: may not be manufactured dimensional lumber; they may, however, be precut to length, ie branches, trees. Rules -

- 1) Areas will be chosen and numbered by the Bridge Building Contest committee. These areas will be drawn for by team representatives prior to contest date.
- 2) Teams will consist of 20 members or less, each of which must have a team marking, ie team sweaters, pennants, etc.
- must have a team marking, ie team sweaters, pennants, (
 3) No mechanical devices of any kind shall be used.
- 4) Bridge cannot touch water at any time during contest; if this occurs during crossing, the team member must return from the side he started from and start again.
- 5) Each area must be marked designating the technology (responsibility of team members)
- 6) There will be one judge per team and two timers.
- 7) Two team members will start on opposite bank and team must throw rope across creek
- 8) All teams must start with ropes and sticks piled neatly and finish in the same fashion.
- All teams (members) will start behind a designated line and finish behind same line to complete race.
- 10) (a) All team members must go across and return on their bridge.
- (b) Included in this crossing there will be an emergency stunt, where one member is carried across on a stretcher and back again.
- 11) All bridge designs and building procedures must be OK'd by a secret neutral committee prior to contest date. No changes will be made after designs have been checked.

The day's events will be:

2:00 pm - start of the contest 3:30 pm - presentation of cup 3:45 pm - "Evil K. Navel"

And to make this event even more spectacular, and to increase incentive, a Bridge Building Cup has been donated by last year's winners, Building Construction.

As an added attraction, we are in the process of obtaining "Evil K. Navel" Williams, who says that anything his blood brother Evil Knivel can do, he can do better, so he will attempt to jump his motorcycle across the Whitemud Canyon, immediately after the contest.

With his nerves of steel he will take off from the ramp, soar thru the air, and, hopefully, make a graceful landing in the mud on the opposite side. His only problem at the moment is whether or not his semirocket machine will be ready for jump day. 


