Flash is coming . . . get the Brylcreem ready

FLASH CADILLAC of Flash Cadillac & the Continental Kids explains the groups' preoccupation with Rock and Roll of the '50's this way:

"There's no substance to the new music, man; to identify to it. It just can't move people. What we need is a revival of really hairy music, good drinking and party music. Music to cop a feel by. How long has it been since you heard any of that real 'good time' rock and roll, or had a really great evening, when like you take home souvenirs like the usher's ear, or put your head through a plate glass window? That's what I call a good evening."

Flash and the boys think of themselves as crusaders against the pretension and boredom of the current music scene. They feel most of today's music is 'down', not happy, and they're trying to make music a happy experience for people again.

Onstage, whether in bowling shirts, leather jackets, athletic warmup jackets or rolled-up jeans, they try to instill this feeling in the audience. They are an incredible band to watch, totally uninhibited and clever showman all.

They do splits, flip their bodies and instruments, leap on each others shoulders. Yet their zaniness and exuberance cannot disguise the fact that they are all outstanding musicians whose interpretations of rock and roll classics often come across better than the original recordings.

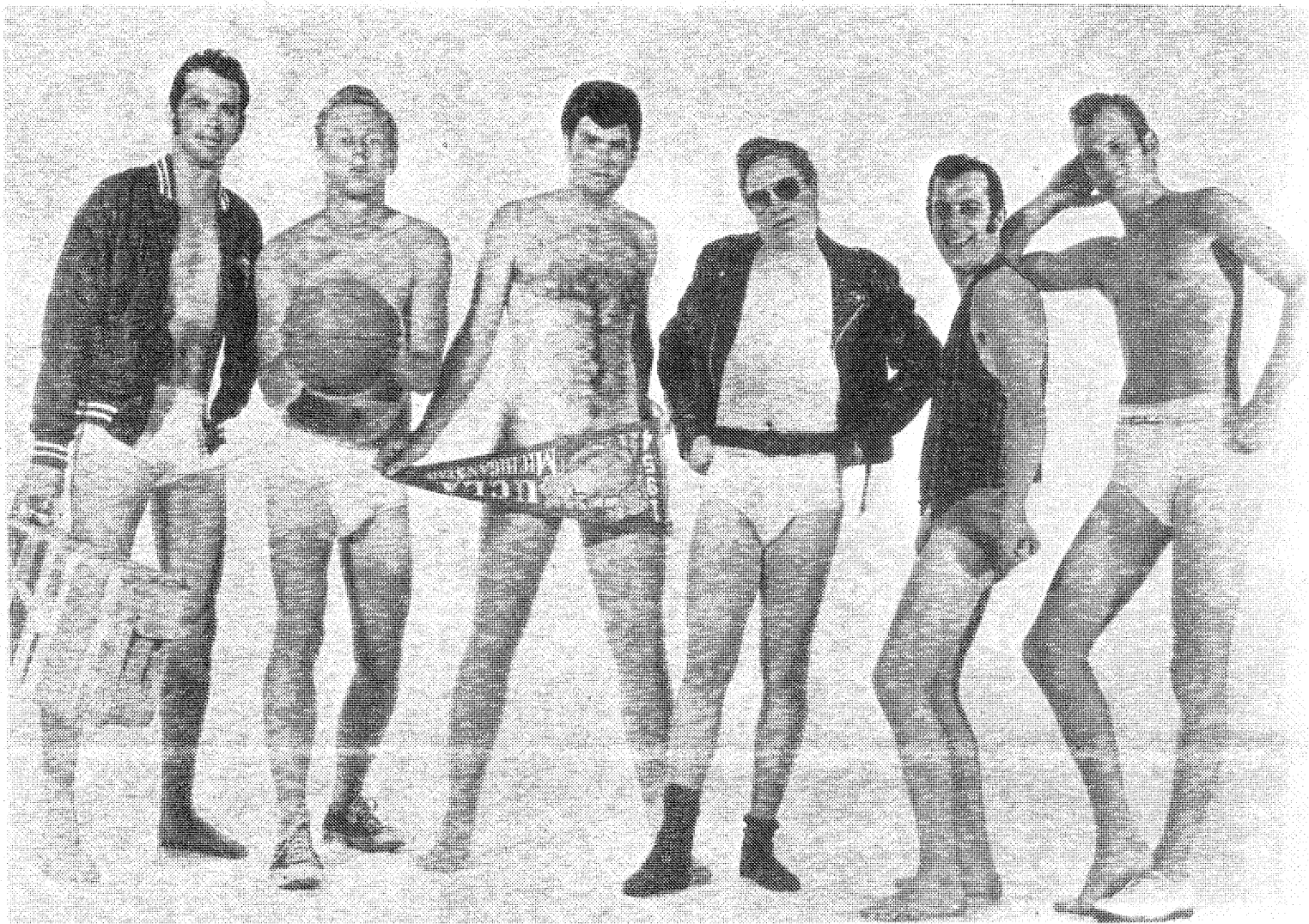
That the group has arrived is evident on many fronts: their first album for Epic Records, "Flash Cadillac and the Continental Kids" was released this year and has done phenomenally well for a debut album; they made their film debut in Francis Ford Coppola's acclaimed "American Graffiti," writing and performing the movies' only original music; they have been playing to SRO audiences in concerts coast to coast.

The LP's success set to rest the question of whether their special on-stage brand of magic and visual appeal could be captured on records. While they're exciting to see, they are also exciting to hear, proving, as many critics contend, no matter what they play, they are one of the best pure rock and roll bands in the history of pop music.

The group is made up of Flash, Spike, Rockin' Ricco, Butch, Angelo and Spider. They got together four years ago in Boulder, Colorado and their first professional job was supplying the music at a frat party at Colorado University. They played for several other college and private parties in Colorado and then took off to the land of Golden opportunity, Los Angeles, where, by their own admission, they starved for a year and a half.

Then they began getting bookings as the opening act on top concerts, invariably outshining the featured acts. It didn't take them long to wind up on top of the bill and now they are recognized as one of the biggest attractions on the concert tour.

The leader of the pack, FLASH, hails from Colorado, plays guitar and is the lead singer who belts out such rock

and roll classics as "Teen Angel" and "Jailhouse Rock". He looks like the typical bully in his leather jacket, but along with his high voice and baby face, one is convinced he wouldn't harm a fly.

SPIKE, lead guitar, claims he was born in a Pennsylvania coal refinery and looks like a real Fifties punk. When he isn't combing his hair, he sucks on a can of beer and makes peculiar finger gestures at the audience.

BUTCH, the bass player, looks like a combination bookworm and jock. His usual ensemble consists of high-water trousers, white socks, black shoes, letterman's sweater and sunglasses. He calls Colorado home.

ROCKIN' RICCO, plays drums and looks like Jack Armstrong, All-American boy in sharp contrast, **ANGELO**, keyboard, looks like he joined the group after he was kicked out of the Sharks of West Side Story fame, for being too greasy.

The sixth member, **SPIDER**, hails from California and was

found, according to legend, in a Gulf Station in Escondido where he was known as the fastest lube man in San Diego County.

Probably the most oft-asked question of the group has to do with their musical selection and way of life.

"How come you play 50's rock and dress so weird?" people want to know.

Flash's scintillating response: "What's it to ya?"

Their music was perhaps best summed up by a Houston, Texas critic, who wrote: "They have shown us that the greatest virtue of early rock and roll, the thing that made us love the music in the first place, is the very thing which contemporary rock so sadly lacks - that incredibly wild head-busting exuberance that makes the body shake while it uplifts the spirit."

Flash puts it more simply, "We just give entertainment, man, that's what we do."

What does the NAIT Students' Association offer you?

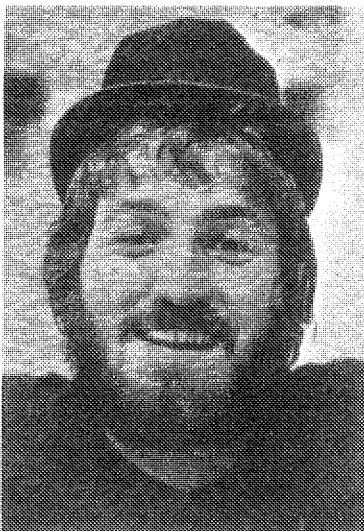

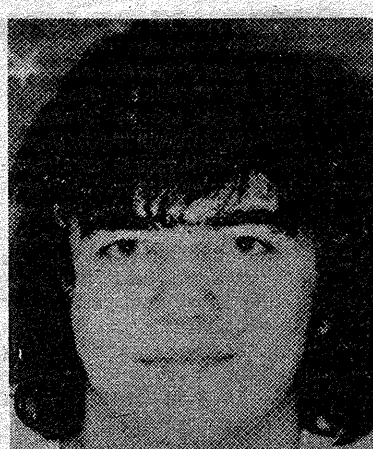

P.S. I hope this year will be a happy one for all new students.

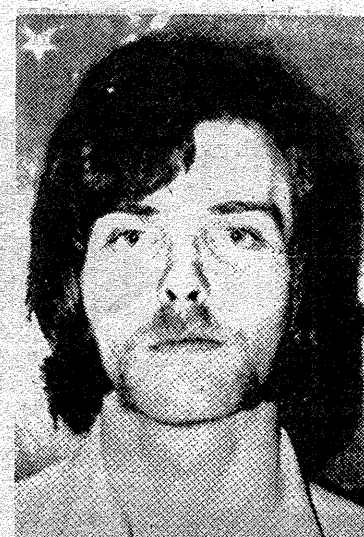

better.

Polish, brushes, transportation and entertainment afterwards are supplied, but the main ingredient for success in this drive is you. Not the person in front of you, or the one across the aisle, but YOU.

Why, you ask? Why should you bother to get off your butt to go out and shine shoes?

For a variety of reasons

- 1) you will be helping to further a worthy cause - the research for a cure for Cystic Fibrosis.
- 2) it gives you a chance to go out with fellow students and get to know the other side of the people you'll be seeing for the next year.
- 3) finally, as an entire student body, it gives us a chance to triumph over our sister Institute, SAIT.

Five kegs of beer will go to the Institute that raises the most money, compliments of the loser. Last year NAIT succeeded in losing five kegs, but with your help things are gonna be different this year.

Just what is CYSTIC FIBROSIS?

It's a hereditary disease passed on to the child when both parents carry an excessive amount of a certain gene. One of every 1000 babies born in Canada has CF and is not expected to live past 20.

Imagine being faced with the realization that your child will never reach adulthood, yet spending up to \$2000 a year to possibly sustain that life.

CF is characterized by a number of symptoms, chronic cough, large appetite but small weight gain, repeated respiratory infections and abnormally salty sweat. The disease itself causes the lungs to clog with thick grey mucus which reduces the oxygen intake. In the stomach, faulty digestive juices cannot extract the essential

nutritive value from the foods eaten.

A glimmer of hope dawns when one realizes the progress that has been made since 1938, when the disease was first identified.

Although the CF child's

future is by no means certain, constant research, associated with early diagnosis and effective treatment of the disease is brightening the child's future. Every dollar earned enables researchers to come closer to a cure.

EVERYONE IS A WINNER IN INTRAMURALS!

That quote is our philosophy of what Intramurals here at NAIT should be. During the past few years our Intramural program has reached and surpassed that. It has only done this because of the student body - namely YOU!

The program is geared to allow as many people and teams as possible from each tech, participate. The events are scheduled after classes so as not to interfere with what you came here for.

Officiating of the games or competitions is done by students. They are paid \$2.75 per hour, so if you're interested, leave your name, phone, address, and the name of the sport you wish to officiate, in the Student Services Office in Room E 134.

Entry forms for all the activities are also available in E 134.

The Intramural scoreboard is just outside of Student Services.

Schedules of up-and-coming events are posted on the bulletin board outside of E 136.

There are two types of technologies, large techs, having more than 70 students, and small techs, with 70 or less. The ladies have their own competitions.

In the Intramural program, the following activities are offered: Cycle drag, golf,

floor hockey, flag football, ice hockey, basketball (3 on 3 and 5 on 5), soccer, archery, cross country, badminton, curling, squash, continental handball, racquetball, inner-tube water-polo, table tennis, speedball, wrestling, broomball, volleyball, and bowling.

Activities that could be added, if enough interest is shown, include table pool, tennis, riflery, water basketball, and a relay meet in the pool.

Also under the jurisdiction of the Intramural program is a cup known as the Challenge Cup, currently held by Electronics.

This is a cup that a group of individuals in a technology can challenge the tech that has it, to any activity, and they must accept the challenge, or lose the cup. It can change hands as often as technologies want to compete for it.

In May of each year we have our annual Awards Night on which trophies and certificates are presented to the winning technologies of each event. A Supremacy Trophy is presented to the large technology with the most points, the small tech, and the ladies tech.

Individual trophies are also presented to the male & female athletes of the year, for participation in Intramural activities.

This conference includes nine full-member post-secondary institutions and three associate members. These are: Camrose Lutheran College Red Deer College SAIT Mount Royal College University of Lethbridge Lethbridge Community College Grande Prairie College NAIT all full members, and Grant MacEwan College Vermilion College Olds College as associate members.

Sporting activities included in ACAC competition are: men's and women's basketball, men's and women's volleyball, hockey, curling, bowling, golf, badminton, cross-country, and wrestling.

The winners of the ACAC competitions advance to the 4-West Championships, held every year in a different province. During the 1973-74 term, NAIT hosted 4-West in hockey and volleyball, in conjunction with our Tenth Anniversary and Open House. The large number of spectators was most

encouraging.

Last year NAIT hosted, as well, the 1st annual NAIT Invitational Hockey Tournament, from December 26 through 29, with ACAC as well as out of province teams, competing.

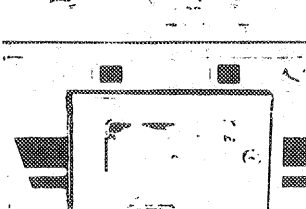

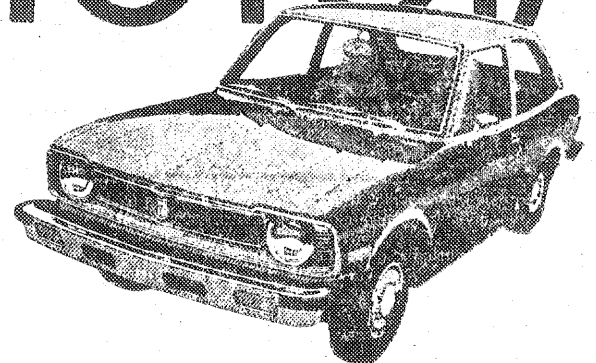
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
