War Resistor Information Program

Draft dodgers and Military AWOLs from the Vietnam War ear should contact W.R.I.P. on Winnipeg immediately if they wish to clarify their legal status and attempt to have their charges, (if charges still exist), dismissed at no charge to them, said Tim Maloney.


Because President Ford's Clemency Program was proven not applicable to war resistors in Canada, the National Council of Churches in New York has undertaken their own program of reconciliation, he stated.

Four counselling centres have been set up in Canada as well as two draft counselling centres and one Military counselling centre in the US. They are staffed by full-time lawyers and counsellors.

Most of the draft charges can be dismissed while the men remain in Canada, and administrative discharges are available for most AWOL's which would only require a safe, short-term visit to certain military bases, he added.

An interesting figure that was revealed by Mr. Maloney, is that of the 192,000 men who evaded the draft, only 4,400 men are still under investigation or indictment for a Selective Service violation. This means, he said, that thousands of men are living needlessly in exile as they are unaware that they no longer face prosecution. WRIP has the official list of men who are wanted. To determine their legal status war resistors in Alberta and Saskatchewan should phone WRIP COLLECT at (204) 774-

Mr. Maloney repeated, that if the men are still wanted in 750 no 1 the US, an analysis of their in the Selective Service file by WRIP's cases ar lawyers can lead to dismissal of their charges. The reason WRIP is that so many of the draft evaders are no longer wanted is because the personnel employed by the



Draft Board did not fully understand the complex Selective Service Law and therefore committed legal and procedural errors that would render it impossible for a US attorney to prosecute. For Military AWOLs an analysis of their files has sometimes lead to men receiving honorable discharges and they are thus free from prosecution.

WRIP has been performing this function for the past 6 months, so as to reunite those men who opposed the war in Indochina with their families, though the men merely want to visit in the US. Of the 1,500 men who have contacted WRIP, 750 no longer face prosecution in the US. The rest of the cases are still pending.

In addition Mr. Maloney said, WRIP is also building a unified body of supporters to fight for a universal and unconditional amnesty.

The Canadian Cancer Society held its 5th Annual Cancer Society Lecture on Thursday, April i0 at the University of Alberta. The public lecture—"The Present Status and Future Promise of Cancer Chemotherapy"— was presented by Dr. Frank M. Schabel Jr., Director of Chemotherapy Research at the Southern Research Institute in Birmingham, Alabama.

Dr. Schabel was born in Great Falls, Montana in 1918. He received a Doctor of Philosophy degree in Bacteriology and Parasitology from the University of Chicago in 1950 and joined the Southern Research Institute in 1951.

In 1968, he bacame Associate Professor of Experimental Pathology and in 1972, Professor

of Microbiology in the Department of Medicine.

Chemotherapy is a very new field of medicine. 30 years ago it was thought that cancer could not be treated by drugs or chemotherapy. Although

chemotherapy will not replace radiation treatment in the near future, there is a possibility that a new and better treatment for cancer will be found. At this time, there are eleven or twelve advanced human tumors which can be treated by drugs and surgury, usually very successfully.

The one problem with chemotherapy drugs is that they are toxic, and while killing cancer they also kill healthy cells in the body.

Tremendous outlays of money are being spent on cancer research. In 1974, \$5,296,988 was spent. This year, 1975, \$6,036,551 will go towards finding a cure.

Abortion seminar gives understanding of controversy


Very few people seem to understand the Abortion controversy - yet we continue to hear about it daily. There seems to be no greater problem or opportunity in our world today than that of sustaining human life itself.

There will be an Open Seminar on Abortion, featuring the topic "Life: A Right or a Privilege."

Speaking at the Seminar will be Dr. Eloise Jones MD, a practicing psychiatrist from Saskatoon. She had at one time recommended approximately 500 therapeutic abortions. She contributed to the book Death Before Birth.

Also speaking will be Professor Alphonse de Valk, CSB Author, Professor of History, and Editor of the Chelsea Journal. His book Morality and Law in Canadian Politics: the Abortion Controversy is the only book of its kind in Canada which traces the historical development of the Abortion controversy.






It is to be realized that they are paying for one stall ONLY.
