Andras reacts to Summer 75

SUMMER '75 - STATEMENT BY THE HONOURABLE ROBERT ANDRAS, MINISTER OF MANPOWER AND IMMIGRATION.

At this time of year plans for summer holidays would not seem to be of immediate importance. But planning for the summer will be in the minds of students and employers as they begin their search for jobs and summer workers. To all these people, I extend an invitation to join Summer '75 and "have a young summer."

The Summer '75 Program (student summer employment and activities program), sponsored by the federal government, is designed to augment the effort the private sector puts into providing meaningful employ-

ment and activity opportunities for Canada's youth in summer.

Private industry has always employed youth in the summer time to the greatest extent possible. Over the years employers in private industry have provided more than 85 per cent of all summer jobs. There is, however, an upper limit to the private sector's capability to absorb the very large number of young Canadians who enter the labour market each summer. More than 1,400,000 young people are expected to seek jobs this summer. Some additional direct job creation is necessary to meet their needs. For this reason, programs such as Opportunities for Youth will once again be an integral part of the federal government's plans for Summer

'75.

The major objective of Summer '75 is to provide Canadian students with more extensive work opportunities and to co-ordinate all major federal government activities for greater effectiveness.

Four basic strategies govern the many diversified programs: the facilitation of employment of students by matching them with the manpower needs of key areas in the private sector; the direct hiring of students in federal government departments, some in career-oriented positions; job creation, through programs such as Opportunities for Youth; and non-salaried activities such as the Secretary of State's Hostel Program.

Gun support

Dear Editor:

Mr. H. C. Sleeth's letter in Nugget condemning the new gun-control laws strikes me as a particularly emotional and irrational response to a genuine and reasonable effort to improve the quality of life for all in this already great country.

Canada is justifiably proud of its crime-rates as compared with those across the border, and I strongly support any measure aimed at avoiding the kind of problems that are rife in the US (Detroit is less safe to live in than Belfast!). Mr. Sleeth is incensed because he may not shoot his gun whenever, wherever, or at whatever he pleases. Neither can he drive at 60 mph in the city and both kind of restrictions appear perfectly reasonable to me. It is my considered opinion (and not an emotional outburst) that responsible gun owners (and these are the NAIT majority) have nothing to fear from this legislation except a little paperwork. Professional criminals can be affected only by enforcement, and not by any legislation new or otherwise, but these fortunately are a minority. The majority of cases of misuse of firearms, the time and money spent by police forces on armed offenders, and worst of the killings and injuries involve disturbed people otherwise ordinary citizens, who use sport guns. More stringent gun-control laws will: a) enable police to trace firearms more easily (including many of those used by professional and amateur criminals).

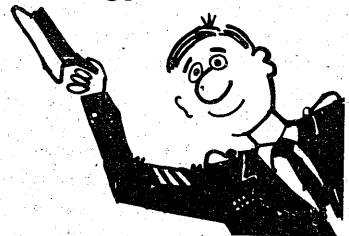
b) reduce the availability of firearms to irresponsible gun owners.

NAIT visitors parking

Commissionaires have been asked about Visitors Parking in and around the NAIT areas.

The following is presented in an attempt to answer some of these questions and to provide some information to those who may have doubts of their responsibility in parking.

During weekdays (Monday through Friday) STAFF and Students are not allowed to park in the MAIN VISITORS parking lot. Even if it is for a quick call to the classroom, bank, or other areas. A tip to remember is that on the street (106 st.) along the flag-line - those yellow signs indicate that a 5 minute parking time is allowable. This is practically as good as parking why - the Commissionaires cannot allow Staff or Students to park in the Visitors stalls is:

(a) Many of the Visitors stalls are booked by prearrangement for dignitaries visiting the Institute.

(b) The number of Staff and Students are so great that this small parking area could be

continually filled, with no visitors being able to be parked at all.

(c) Many Visitors to this lot arrive to repair equipment or to check out services. If the lot is filled - there is the possibility the repair of service cannot be carried out.

(d) Many Visitors arrive to register for enrollment at the Institute. They are parked if humanly possible.

(e) Barber shop and Beauty Culture patrons arriving at the Institute expect parking in the Visitors stalls. As the south

lot is only fitted with 6 stalls for them it does not allow very accommodating facilities. However this area will be increased in the number of stalls and soon they should nearly be all accommodated. At present they are parked in the Visitors stalls available.

(f) Many staff members of the Institute investigate the possibility of parking in these Visitors stalls when the stall they have rented is illegally occupied. This is a NO NO again as it only prevents the legitimate visitor from parking.

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Summer

Chambers of Commerce and the Boards of Trade who have played such a major role in the success of past summer programs. My own department will be working closely with selected Chambers of Commerce in developing a pilot program called "Job Exploration by Students." This program will give potential high school dropouts a chance to gain experience in the work world by sampling up to three different types of work during the summer. They will then have the option at the end of the summer of returning to school or entering the labour force with the help of Canada Manpower Centres.

The support of trade and professional associations and major industrial employers will be enlisted and their co-operation and active participation encouraged in providing work opportunities for students.

Canada Manpower Centres for students will play a major role in assisting the private sector in filling their needs for summer labor. Specially trained student centre staff members will be attempting to fill all special needs of local employers. They will be manning the almost 300 Canada Manpower Centres

for students across the country. This year many of these centres will open in April. In addition, the more than 390 regular Canada Manpower Centres will be active in this area.

In the summer of 1874, more than 200,000 student placements were made through the regular CMCs and CMCs for students. This year's expanded network is expected to provide even closer liaison between potential employers and students seeking summer jobs. The Manpower Centres will also act as a clearing house for information on all component programs of Summer '75.

The 1975 Opportunities for Youth Program, funded at \$27.5 million, will provide over 20,000 jobs for young people. Areas where severe shortages of jobs are anticipated and where the private sector cannot meet student employment needs will have highest priority in the allocation of OFY funds. Applications are now available and the deadline for submission of project proposals is February 21. One change in this year's program is the salary range for participants. Maximum salaries will be \$80 per week for high

school students and \$110 for post-secondary students and other youth.

Other programs and departments from part of Summer '75 are: Parks Canada, the Indian High School program, Native Summer and Northern programs through Indian Affairs and Northern Development; Student Community Services, Youth Hostels, and Travel and Exchange through the Secretary of State; Cadet Activities, reserve Training, and the Community Assistance Program through National Defence; Public Service Employment, including career-oriented programs, through the Public Service Commission; Drug Research and Community Agencies program through Health and Welfare; Tourist Survey Project through Transport Canada; the Improvement Agriculture program through Agriculture Canada; special research projects under the auspices of Revenue Canada Customs and Excise; on going scientific and administrative activities through Energy, Mines and Resources; support for the Fifth United Nations Congress on the Prevention of Crime and Treatment of Offenders through

the Solicitor General.

We can reduce high unemployment rates for students only if everyone works together. Not only must the private and public sectors combine their efforts to combat this perennial problem, but students must also face the challenge of tackling the work that is to be done. We would encourage employers to co-operate by hiring students for their unfilled jobs.

Work experience is important for Canada's students. It helps give them confidence and develop expertise, and the money they earn will help take them back to their studies in the fall.

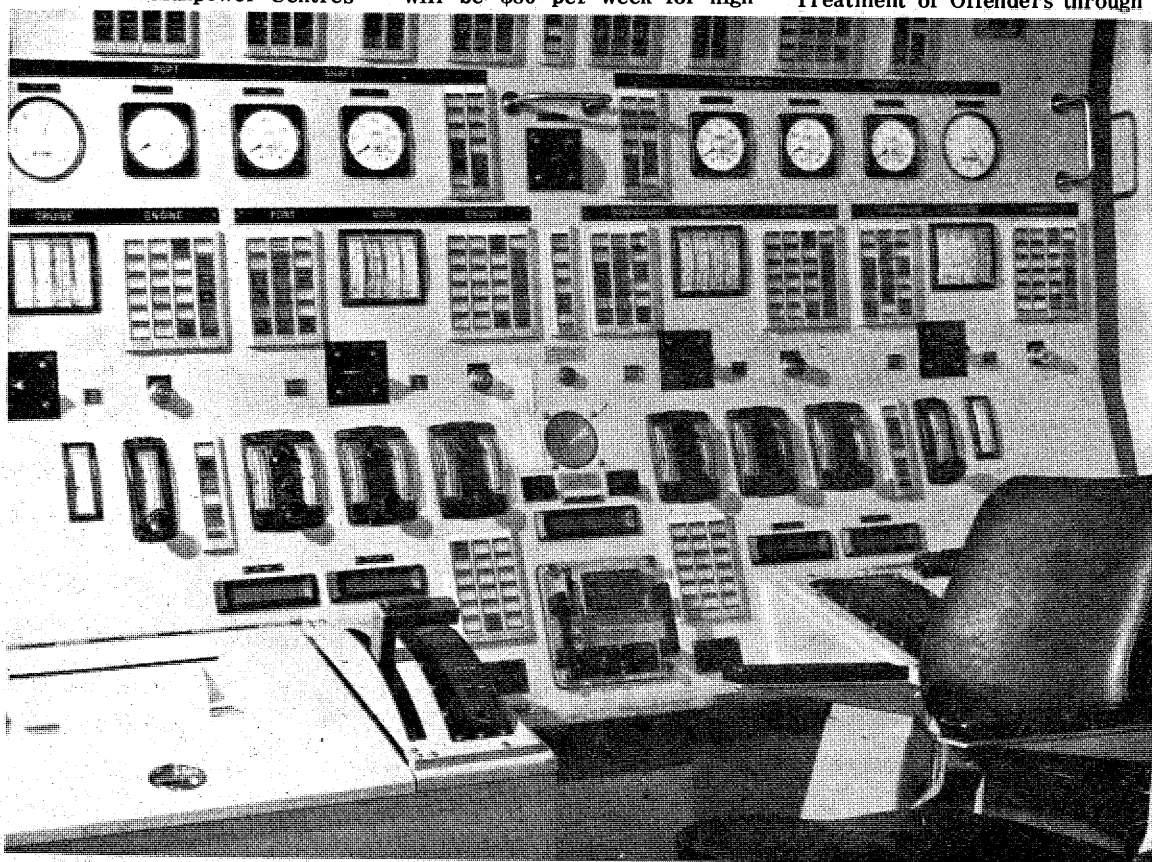

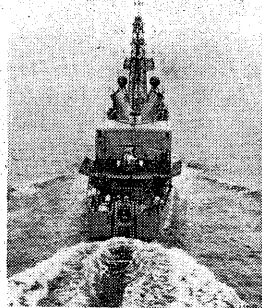

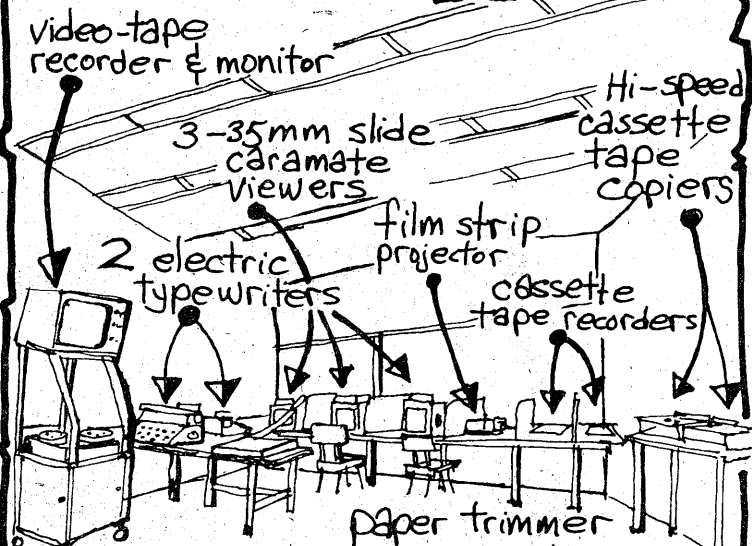

Taylor's 'crude' letter

Alberta Liberal leader Nick Taylor, concerned about the oil and gas situation in Alberta, wrote to Prime Minister Trudeau to express his opinions. Following is a copy of that letter.

My Dear Prime Minister:

Albertans are as interested as other Canadians in seeing that the people of Canada are self-sufficient in oil and therefore want to see oil and gas discovered and developed in the other sedimentary areas of Canada, particularly the Northwest Territories, the Arctic and Eastcoast. The Alberta Energy Conservation Board estimates Albertans alone will need 5.6 billion barrels of oil over the next 30 years, yet we have only 7.5 billion barrels reserve of conventional crude in Alberta. Since the whole synthetic crude idea may not be viable, it becomes apparent that Albertans want to do everything possible to encourage the rest of Canada to find their own oil, so to speak.

I would respectfully suggest that the federal government concentrate on a program of Canadian self-sufficiency and give it the highest priority by doing the following three acts:

1. The forthcoming federal land regulations should provide for the lowest royalties and rentals possible --- preferably zero. A royalty is a front end load

which increases the cost of the oil before a profit is made and ultimately is passed on to the consumer in much higher prices. It is particularly onerous now that it is no longer deductible in calculating income tax. Rather than royalties, rents, or cash bonuses, I suggest a tax surcharge on net income over and above the basic 25 to 28 per cent corporation income tax. This surcharge on net oil income could be in the 40 per cent range. This would yield more income than royalties to Canadians in the long run, and still encourage immediate exploration and development.

2. The privilege of deducting 100 percent of losses or expenses from income in looking for oil should not be restricted to oil companies, pipeline companies and drilling companies alone, but be extended to every Canadian. A large part of the capital developed from a maturing oil industry in the provinces will be siphoned off by the provinces, causing a tremendous capital shortage for oil exploration outside the province. It is illogical and almost ridiculous to depend on foreign capital to make up the cash needs as the provinces did when they first developed the oil industry in the provinces. Let's use our own capital and not continue to legislate against (non-oil business) Canadians who wish to

enter the oil business.

3. Since the federal government seriously considered, or is considering picking up almost one-third of the Syncrude project, it must have been prepared to lay out approximately six hundred million dollars for the creation of its share of the one hundred and twenty-five thousand barrel per day capacity. This same six hundred million dollars if put out as an incentive in the form of dry hole wildcat contributions for people willing to drill in the Arctic and East-coast, (a million dollars each for six hundred wildcats, or two million dollars each for three hundred wildcats) will find much more oil than one hundred and twenty-five thousand barrels per day. As a matter of fact, twenty billion barrels of oil have been discovered in the North Sea for an expenditure of six billion dollars. The productive capacity generated in the North Sea will be approximately four million barrels per day, at about one quarter of the cost per daily barrel of Syncrude's cost.

Also, unlike the Syncrude investment of six hundred million dollars, six hundred million dollars laid out under an incentive scheme could be made recoverable from production discovered by the drilling companies.

Brazilian - Canadian relations still OK

OTTAWA (CUP)---While many international agencies condemn torture and repression by the Brazilian government, Brazil's leaders must at least be happy to know that Canada still likes them.

Canada's Minister of Industry, Trade, and Commerce, Alastair Gillespie, was recently hunting for investment opportunities in Brazil.

While there he told the Brazil-Canada Chamber of Commerce that "Canada likes Brazil. We admire what you're doing here. We believe we can help you do many of the things you still want to do to develop your country. Naturally, this suggests a selfish interest---that we are interested in selling more goods and services to you."

While Gillespie's speech touched on some aspects of inter-government cooperation, he told his hosts "the main op-

portunities lie in the private sector---between businessmen from our two countries... We want to do business, that's why we're here. We want to talk to people who want to do business with us. We want to persuade you that Canadians can help you to build an even stronger and more industrialized Brazil..."

Gillespie's speech concluded on a note of optimism for future profits.

"More than anything else right now, we need to know one another better. The better we know one another, the more profitable business we will do with one another. I think your hospitality has advanced the understanding and knowledge of one another... and has shown us the promise of opportunities that lie ahead for two very enterprising groups of entrepreneurs," he said.

An auto-racing fan in Watkins Glen, New York, died months after he was stung on the tongue by a bee that slipped into his

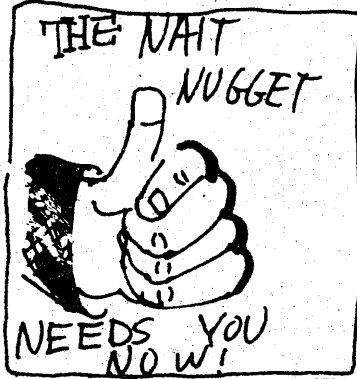
beer bottle. Police have said the bee flew into the bottle unnoticed and stung the 59-year-old man when he took a swallow of beer. Cause of death was never established.

HYPNOSIS and YOU

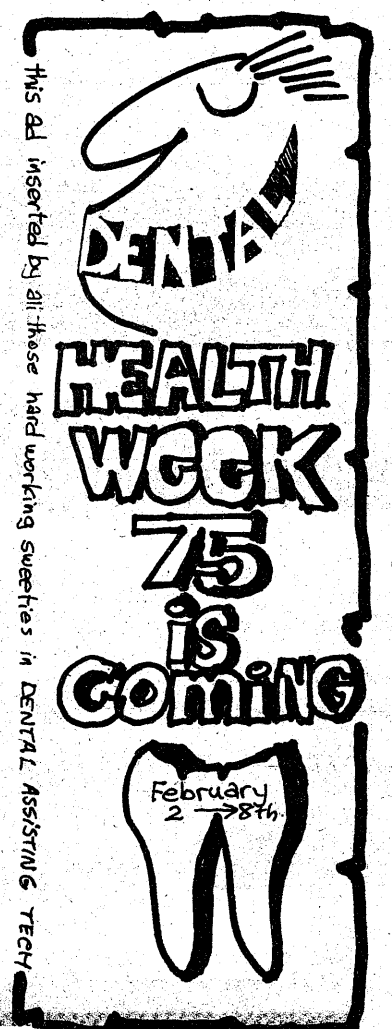
In 1964 an article entitled "Hypnosis in Student Coun-

selling" was reported in the American Journal of Clinical Hypnosis. In the article a counsellor named Mellenbruch reported success in using hypnosis for study problems, class attitude changes, personal adjustment problems, mental blocking and emotional upheavals.

A year later two college counsellors reported in the same journal that they were having success using hypnosis to help students; who were striving beyond their capacity; who were overinvolved in extracurriculum activities; who had reading speed and comprehension problems; who had feelings of guilt because of neglect of study; and who had chronic feelings of inadequacy.

B. J. Hartman at the University of Southern Illinois Counselling Clinic reported that he had been using group hypnosis to overcome problems in weight control, smoking withdrawal, relaxation, concentration and examination anxiety, and shyness. He held clinics once a week and reported steady improvement for all clients who regularly attended the clinics.

At NAIT we have used hypnosis for examination anxiety where a student blocks on an exam and "can't remember anything." Hypnosis has also been used for students who block on their aural presentations in Communication classes. For students who were having trouble because of shyness, introversion or submissiveness assertive training using hypnosis has been successful. In one case, hypnosis was used with an instructor to increase his concentration for an athletic event. (He won.)

He lived 4 times 14 years, 4 times 14 days and 14 weeks, was killed a 14 of May and his assassin, Ravaillac, was executed 14 days later. "The world is constructed on the power of numbers," said the great Pythagoras. He probably was right.
