
It took the Petroleum cowpokes about two minutes to find out that NAIT's Marketing squad wasn't a bunch of pansies.



'Befriended' by agent

CASTLEGAR (CUP) --- Twentythree West Kootenay residents from now on will be more cautious in choosing their friends. The unlucky individuals were "befriended" by an undercover narcotics agent who later turned them in.

All 23 were charged with trafficking in various illegal substances. Three face jail sentences of up to life.

Keith Beauchamps. undercover narc was sent into the Kootenay area last August disguised as a young longhaired, bearded, freak from a Slocan Valley commune.

He hung around beer parlours in several Kootenav towns playing pool, getting drunk and generally "making friends." He would then persuade people to get a "lid" of marijuana. occasionally a couple of "spoons" of cocaine.

None of the people involved

in the dope bust were dealers. Many of them have never sold drugs before in their lives and some of those charged never did sell anything to Beauchamps. They claim they have been framed.

For many, the alleged "purchase" consisted of Beauchamps giving \$20 for an ounce of marijuana to one person he had talked into finding some dope for him. The first person then found another person who had some extra marijuana, paid for it and then gave it to Beauchamps. But only after he had bugged them for it for days, and in some cases, weeks.

According to reports in local newspapers, Beauchamps spent \$10,000 on drugs while he was working there. The total street value of the small quantities of drugs he purchased from each individual charged is nowhere near that amount.





Operation Placement, a cooperative community effort designed to make available summer opportunities and employment for students, is again operating its student business program this summer. These businesses consist of students organized in an enterprise designed to provide services to the community on a competitive basis. Students usually specialize in a particular area where they have gained knowledge or the necessary skills from previous experience.

The program had eighteen companies successfully employed in providing services in the community. These companies included painting (interior and exterior), concrete work, lawn maintenance, landscaping, roofing, vinyl repair, and trucking. Painting companies were by far the most successful generating approximately \$42, 400 dollars in contracts. Even so, most companies generated enough income to provide worthwhile summer employment.

Operation Placement assists the companies in their initial establishment and operation by providing various services.



A question of trust

"The heritage trust fund is a huge lie and misleading to the public," says provincial Liberal leader Nick Taylor.

A trust implies a fund which is set up for someone else to spend at some future date unlike the heritage fund which may be spent at any time by the provincial government, he says.

Mr. Taylor sees the fund as a play on words to fool the public into thinking the money will not be spent carelessly or heedlessly. He also sees the fund as a shopping bag full of money in the corner for a rainy day. Mr. Taylor added it would start raining as soon as the fund is set up and only Mr. (Peter) Lougheed would be able to tell whether or not it was raining.

Our oil revenue surplus, contends Mr. Taylor, is causing

bad government because it takes that attention of the legislative away from items like justice, equity, fairness, individual rights, quality of life and dignity of the individual. These are all very important topics to the legislature and they are being swept into the background while the government plays a giant game of monopoly, he says.

"A sum of \$1.5 million per year is a lot of money to shop the safeway aisles of world commerce."

Should he become premier of Alberta, Mr. Taylor, a 47-year-old petroleum geologist, would like to see the Alberta economy focused on renewable resources such as tourism, service industries, agriculture and forest industries rather than the non-renewable oil re-

More money for future

The Conservatives by their promises are going to spend more money on Albertans in the area of quality of life for the individual.

Premier Lougheed recently announced a \$200 million dollar irrigation project in Southern Alberta.

Programs will be developed to alleviate the lack of rental accommodations in large urban centres.

The Premier also announced \$1,000 grants for home improvements thus allowing senior citizens to remain in their older homes. This would allow limited income senior citizens to enjoy

a higher than proverty level of life that they 'enjoy' now.

A revolving fund of morgages at lower interest rates will be made available. The fund is aimed at younger families trying to establish their first home.

In the face of criticism of the Alberta Hertiage Savings Trust Fund, Premier Lougheed said, "Our problems are that we're so much involved in longer term planning that it's often difficult sometimes - when things are going so well economically in Alberta today - to get our citizens conscious of the need to visualize down the road."

Party contends government mismanagement

The New Democratic Party of Alberta under leader Grant Notley accuses the government of gross mismanagement of Syncrude.

They are attacking the government in an effort to get an explanation of the escalation in costs of \$235 million since 1973 in the project. The NDP is contending the people

should know everything about the plant so the public knows where their money is going.

Grant Notley has announced many NDP policies such as forbiding export of gas, coal and water. He has promised the people a 6% ceiling on morgages and plans to shield Albertans from high interest

percentage rates.

The party line is also for a more in-depth dental care program for children in connection with the abolition of medicare premiums. The NDP would also like to see a branch line and grain delivery system set-up and floor prices to stabilize farm production costs.

Senior citizens their concern

"The present pension is not adequate to enable senior citizens to live with grace and dignity," says Alberta Social Credit leader Werner Schmidt.

A Socred answer would entail adjustment of the pension in relation to the cost of living.

Mr. Schmidt also feels that senior citizen developments and nursing homes should be built outside the major centres.

Werner Schmidt, a loyal 20 vear member of the Socred

party, thinks that government should stay out of private enterprise, they should not destroy or downgrade personal incentives by too much meddling.

The Social Credit stand on Syncrude is on the grounds of if the government had not interfered to mess up the 25 year old royalty scheme set-up under former Premier Manning, the Syncrude difficulty would not have happened, necessitating the action of the governments in bailing out the consortium.

How \$8.95 can cancel a million dollars of engineering.

I was asked recently by an eager young man why my views on "quickie lift kits" was something less than favourable.

To start with the general layout of your cars suspension just didn't happen by chance. Engineers, designers, racing car builders, and safety research groups have laboured long to ensure a safe, practical result. Even slight alterations in chassis, body ride height affect the stability of the vehicle.

Undoubtedly 99% of the cars on the road today with the rear end elevated as much as 1 to 3 feet or more are doing it with little regard to the safety or handling of the vehicle. Granted a 20" wide tire will not fit inside most stock wheel/fender wells. The obvious question here is, why the 20" wide tires

in the first place. I would be willing to bet the number of road cars that actually need or can even use the extra tread width could be counted up on 2 hands.

Essentially raising the vehicles rear end (more than 3" or 4") results in:


1) A raised center of gravity, or balance.

Negates much of, or all shock absorber control.


3) Induces lateral (side) axle wander, especially on rougher roads or under hard braking.
4) As the rear of the vehicle is raised more weight is shifted onto the front suspension, resulting in wheel camber changes, shock and spring over load, etc.

The solution? Use slightly narrower tires or have the wheel/fender wells modified as required.


