NAITSA EXECUTIVE MEMBER CALLS AMENDMENTS-

“... the most ill-conceivable ideas thrown-up...”

First let me explain the situation!

It is very seldom (if ever) an individual student executive member will express publicly a dissenting opinion from the majority. At this time though I feel that the proposals (constitutional changes) put forward are not in your best interests. The decision you make on Wednesday, December 10th will affect your Student Association for quite a number of years to come.

The proposals are these:

A \$5.00 increase in Student Association Fees (you now pay \$30.00 at Registration which is included in your total Registration Fee) - this increase of \$5.00 would be budgeted towards Athletics (based on 3500 full-time students this would generate nearly \$18,000.00 per year more - adding to the \$10.00 that is budgeted at present from your fee, this would give the Athletics Board a budget of approximately \$2,000.00 a year)

THE SECOND PROPOSAL is for the creation of another position on the Student Executive; that being the office of the External Vice President.

THE THIRD PROPOSAL would create on paper (or legally) in the constitution a body which has been in operation for some time now - The Activities Committee. This committee provides a variety of entertainment for students, I.E.: movies, common hour activities etc.

Contrary to the idea some students have, the student body, must vote on these proposals before they become effective. As the constitution states, ‘an ‘Extraordinary Resolution’ (must be) passed by a majority of not less than 3/4 - three quarters of such members entitled to vote as are present in person at a general meeting.’ (these proposals will be presented during Common Hour Wed. Dec. 11, 1975 in the Auditorium across from the Cafeteria) In regards to the first proposal an increase in fee by \$5.00 for athletics this is definitely necessary. Although I am not what you would call athletic, nor do I agree with many of the policies or the actual budget of our Athletic's Board, athletics are a vital part of our institute, and lives in general. They provide us with both a physical and mental outlet of energy in addition to an atmosphere of (for lack of a better word) comradeship. The difference of opinion lies with the amount (increase of fees).

Our games Room has now been paid for and so will be another source of income (presently in the area of \$20,000.00 yearly). It is this income that the executive has proposed to use to supplement the remaining budgets. (ie. Publication, Public Relations etc.) of the Students' Association, in place of asking for an increase of Student's fees. Looking to the future, with the idea of near double size and double enrollment within the coming 2 or 3 years, I believe the Students' Association may require this \$20,000.00 for any number of purposes. For example: at this time there has been no decision on student housing for the new

campus. At present the executive and many students are wary of building, a HUB complex such as the U of A Students' Union has stumbled into, but at the same time, students have expressed their concern about student housing (whether it be on campus or in the form of low-rent projects etc.) In the plans for the new student services building, the Student Assoc. offices (includes Executive Offices, Nugget, Yearbook, CHNR) will be consolidated into one area in this building. It is possible new equipment for the radio station, or type-setting equipment for the newspaper, will be required. Today we can only guess at what will be needed. It would be better to invest (save) this income from the Games Room for the use of students in the coming years and add another \$3.00 to \$5.00 onto the increase, asked for, to cover the present budgets. Should we, go ahead and spend this additional income for our businesses, we may find the out-come being we have tied the hands of student councils, in the near future providing better or new facilities.

THE SECOND PROPOSAL is one of the most ill-conceivable ideas thrown up in quite a while. Our President gives the following reasons for the creation of an ‘External Vice-President’: In the last past year, the student union has become more involved with the outside community. ‘Due to the increased involvement, which takes time and planning we are asking for another position to be adopted on the student exec. The added cost would be \$85.00 per month, but in terms of added benefit to you the students in the eyes of employers in terms of added participation and acknowledgement of the NAIT student would outweigh this cost. An example of this is the \$12,000.00 raised for Shinerama, the whole community knew about NAIT student participation but it took over three months planning for that alone. Also the position would create just another way for a NAIT student to get involved.’

Over the past year the student assoc. has become not so much involved in the community (our present commitments are: Shinerama (Sept. Oct.) Poppy Drive (Nov.) Santa's Anonymous (Dec.) and the Red Cross Blood Donor Clinic at NAIT (Jan.) but rather we have gained a little more recognition from the community, due to the 1975 Shinerama Campaign. This comes to mind over the recent (numerous) requests (within the past months since Shinerama) by other charities, for the support of Naitisa, in their annual fund-raising drives. The increase in community involvement to date, has ventured mainly into the area of press-releases (from a more vocal member (s) of the student executive) stating ‘our concern’, ‘support’ or ‘dissatisfaction’ in such places as the provincial government and their lack of a rent review board, the CSA negotiations (also an internal matter) and the Enough is Enough Campaign. (The latter received the Student Associations’ ‘Stamp-of-Approval’)

IT'S FUNNY HOW THESE THINGS GET STARTED

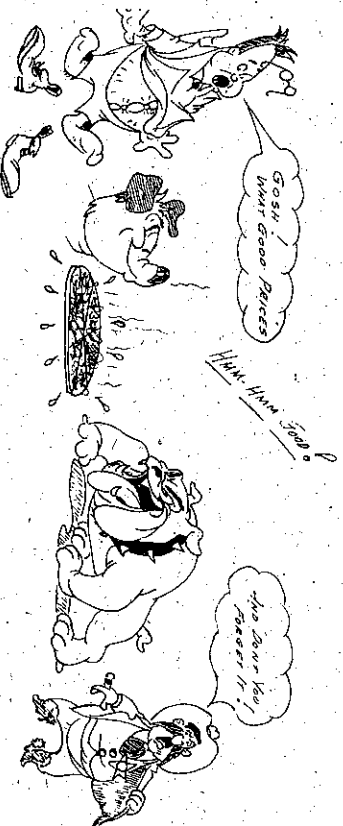

The following job opportunities are available now through the Canada Manpower Office, Room E132.

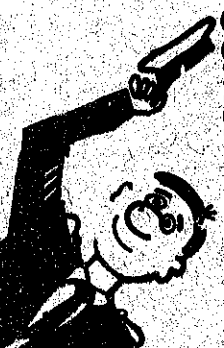

ACTIVITIES CENTRE

In response to several inquiries the following procedure should be followed to avoid any embarrassment when either entering or departing the Activities Centre.

Identification - NAIT cards must be carried at all times this can be the difference of being able to enter or depart the Activities Centre back into the Institute.

Students, instructors, and Staff should attempt to plan any activities in the Institute areas and ensure they are completed before going to the Activities Centre. Of course the reverse would apply should any sports activities require the use of the Activities Centre before any studies, etc. in the Institute.

Students, instructors, and Staff should not sign in the register at the MAIN entrance for sports activities in the Activities Centre. Parking is available and the doors are open in this area to receive anyone for quick entry.

The Commissionaires on duty in the LINK portion Activities Centre have to enforce the control of persons arriving and departing the Activities Centre. This control is necessary as a protective security measure.

Students, instructors and Staff having reasons to be in the Institute after normal hours should sign in the register and sign out to clear the Institute area before proceeding to the Activities Centre. This provides a safety precaution for locating persons in the event of fire, etc.

Another point to remember when in the Institute area - visit your locker and take items including clothing and books with you the Activities Centre after repeat AFTER you have signed out.

a) Constitution

PROPOSED AMENDMENTS

INTRODUCTION

As was stated in last weeks Nugget, we the Student Executive are asking for some constitutional changes. The student executive has after long debate decided on these changes as necessary and therefore are soliciting your support. The changes are listed below and our justification for them.

CONSTITUTIONAL CHANGES

I Athletic Budget

Reads now - nine or eight month courses - \$30.00 of which \$10.00 will go towards athletics.

- 5.00 increase of fees to athletics would read - nine or eight month courses - \$35.00 of which \$15.00 will go towards athletics

The Athletic Board's financial situation will be in the red in 1976-77 unless more funds are made available.

Situation 1975-76 I-M and Athletics

Coaches estimates for I-M & Athletics \$59,000.00 Athletic Board cut budget to 50,500.00

The Athletic Board's budget of \$50,500.00 can be met in 1975-76 because the Student's Association owed the Athletic Board \$16,000.00 in back dues (1973-4 and 1974-5)

Any further cuts would be virtually impossible unless we start to cut out teams in Athletics or Activities in I-M. Any cuts in teams or I-M Activities would drastically limit student participation.

I feel that it is essential in an educational institution that we provide a total Athletic and I-M program. Please consider two statistics relayed over the communication media

- (a) The fitness level of Canadians is pathetic in comparison to other countries.
- (b) The number one disease amongst young people is alcoholism (Time Magazine 1974)

If we at NAIT can do anything to help improve these statistics, to make our graduates better citizens, is one of the basic overall functions of an educational institution.

II Activities Committee

The activities committee is a separate body from NAITSA, but liaison is maintained by three members from the student executive. The remaining members are three staff and 3 students at large. This ensures the students a majority of voting power. The major purpose of the committee is to provide a variety of entertainment for students and not to act as a money making venture.

This committee is already in effect but this has not been constitutionally adopted, we are asking for it to be adopted for us the students' benefit.

III External Vice President

In the last past year, the student union has become more involved with the outside community. Due to this increased involvement, which takes time and planning, we are asking for another position to be adopted on the student ex. The added cost would be \$85.00 per month, but in terms of added benefit to you the students in the eyes of employers, in terms of added participation and acknowledgment of the NAIT student would outweigh this cost. An example of this is the \$12000 dollars raised for Shinerama, the whole community knew about NAIT student participation but it took over three months planning for that alone. Also the position would create just another way for a NAIT student to get involved. The above are the constitutional changes we are asking you to vote, in favor, on Wednesday Dec. 10 (General Referendum on Constitution changes)

These changes are or are not, for your benefit that is up to you to decide. We the executive, your elected representatives feel that they are beneficial to you as the NAIT student, please take part and vote, make yourself felt on Wed. Dec. 10 at 1:00 p.m.

VARSIY BANS TERRY PAPER ADS, EDITOR UNHAPPY
Toronto (CUP) - -
The Board of Directors the student newspaper the University of Toronto the Varsity, has decided the paper will no longer publish advertisements "pirate" essays.

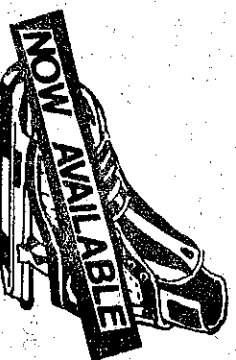
Previously the paper received and published offering prepared the papers for students could afford to buy way out of academic segments.
The November 12 decision of the Board, which representatives from university, administration, students and staff of the University of Toronto came after considerable debate on the subject, including the solicitation of reader's views. None reported continuation of ads.

But the editors of the paper aren't happy with Board's decision, which passed by an 8-2 margin in an editorial published November 14, the editors argued that the decision reads on "danger ground" since it assesses the Varsity is subject to the provisions of the University Code of Behavior which they feel could be a threat to the editorial freedom of the paper.

The editors also claim the Board "made a decision that stops of the crucial point" the Board wishes to be moral, they said, "let's take a long look at advertising that promotes sexual activity as a common promotes sexual activity or in the case of arm recruitment ads, promotes the possibility of murder."

Drawing the line at services, they claim "sheds absolutely no light on a problem that every newspaper in country".

In reference to Shimerama, President Dave Edwards and I forgets to mention the three (?) months of planning were performed during the summer months of June, July, August and all of September; of which we conversed by phone with the Vice President, D'Arcy Levesque. (The V.P. is co-ordinator of Shimerama) in Peace River since he was working there during the summer. The actual mailing of Public Relations material, setting up of Advertising, etc. for Shimerama was handled thru the President and myself (and Student Services Staff and other executive members who were in and out during the summer). In actual fact it wouldn't matter a damn if we would have had an "External Vice-President", since he also may have had to work over the summer out-of-town.

In talking about planning, many of your services are set-up for the coming year during the summer months. In Publications the Telephone Directory (which should be here in 3 weeks) is partially set during the latter part July and August, the Frosh Handbook is typed, pasted-up in June and early July so it will be ready for the first week of registration. The Nugget starts operation with only the ditto and executive around during the last two weeks of August, to put out the first couple of issues. For our President to say this new position would "create another way for a NAIT student to get involved" reflects as mismanagement of priorities. Last Wednesday we were barely able to hold a General Council Meeting due to the lack of attendance by tech. reps. (we must have 10 tech. reps. to call a meeting to order; 10 members finally did show). This attendance problem (it varies from 10 to 20 attending per meeting) is one area in which more than a single student can get involved. It is at these General Council Meetings where the final decisions are made effecting the entire institute.

We presently have 7 executive members on the Student Association; I suggest it would be more beneficial to the students and their association to utilize these members to their maximum before adding more deadwood to the fire. It would be worth the money to pay the Vice-President and Publications Chairman a full time salary during

the summer months (June - July & August) and allow them to take only a minimum of courses during the summer months to get Shimerama etc., term, and provide the time during the year to organize and manage their other respective duties while at the same time handling the so-called, "ever increasing", commitments in other areas as community involvement.

THE THIRD PROPOSAL is self explanatory. It is more or less simply a write-in radification for those purposes of bringing the constitution up-to-date. The most important aspect of this general referendum and its proposed changes are the effects it will have on future Student Councils. On December 10th I hope you will vote whether it be for or against - a NO VOTE will mean we (the executive) have to go back and re-evaluate the positions taken on the increase in student fees and creation of the office of "External Vice President". It is a referendum long overdue but unfortunately the proposals were not given much thought and now appear to be on the course which will try to see them railroaded through.

In last week's Nugget Dave gave you the reassuring thought that "after long debate (the student executive) decided on these changes." - The long debate has been going continuously from last year, the final decision came at an extremely short executive meeting last week. This choice of alternatives only serves to reflect the amount of thought and judgement given to these "bottom of the barrel" decisions. It does not give the credit due to last year's executive (notably President Russ McLeod) for the amount of time energy and thought given to such amendments.
