



That is, we agree the report fails to begin to realize just how critical the seemingly small land use ical the seemingly small land use problems of today become, especially when projected into might add!

The nine issues to which the forum was to direct its attention are most certainly a resentative cross-section of the controversial issues which have plagued government agencies in De past. However, I note an hir of inadequacy, completency, and bind-sight as I read through the report. The report's recommendations fall far short of able" or "realistic" steps by concentrating on a wishy-washy and political "yes man" strucpossible outcome to be that of uselessness. We are left with a paper written to allow government to say. "We had an inouiry into the area of land use and the initial claims put forward by the critics were shown. for the most part, to be unfeetiffed."

In quoting from the section on forum states, "It is generally accepted by all citizens, including landowners, that man has a responsibility to maintain and wardship and the law provides penalties for those who fail to moet minimum standards. In order to fulfill his responsibilities, an owner must have the right to manage to his perceived best interest, but of course, The report then proceeds to exrights, today they consist largely of the right of possession and some control of trespass, with cortain circumstances giving rights to compensation.

I would cortainly argue that the grossly oversimplified. Deposding on the title that an owner may have, he may possess mineral rights to such natural resources as oil, gas, and coal. He has cortain water and surface rights which include the right to sand and gravel. Also, he can claim, in a majority of cases, the air space about his property and protection from trespas-

Equally he has the right to be tree of missace such as seismic waves interfering with his water wells and sonic booms, creating disturbances to his

The forum was instructed to determine what foreign ownership of agricultural land, if any, existed in Alberta. In Europe farm land, let alone recreation land, is scarce, at least in comparison to Canada. Therefore, due to necessity, leg-Therefore, due to necessity. legislation has forced farm land to fulfill two purposes. Here in lousy ones, I would hope that Canada I doubt there are many farmers who would not allow passive recreation to take place permission was obtained first. This allows the farmer to check what you are planning to do. i.e. picnic, bird watching, and thus co-operate with you by giving you directions to suitable areas and also allowing him an opportunity to request that cortain areas be left undisturbed. crops, cattle herds, etc.) However, to remove this farmers' right of choice could only be justified if all urban dwellers opened up their back yards to the same.

Sky would you upset an honour system which works effectively, whom there are many areas of land wasultable for growing food

but are quite condusive to recreational activities?

There are many other issues discussed which raised my dander, such as urban sprawi, subdivision of land and so on. However. I feel the preceeding examples serve to illustrate my point quite sufficiently. The Alberta Land Use Forum's report has happened in the past, but the minute effort put forth to give recommendations for the future has turned out to be a miserable failure.

Certainly the report has made some good recommendations and has done some good ground work upon which to base these recommendations. Too bad these few oned recommendations have to be over-shadowed by so many the government would evaluate this report and then commission wrongs. The people of Canada are basically environment conscious, and land use is part of our environment.





Press Council Attacks

CALGARY (CUP) --- Alberta's gress cruncil has launched an investigation into the provincial government's lack of communication with the media.

manimous consent at a February 27 meeting, was prompted by recent complaints in the press secretary has not aided the flow of government information to the public and in fact, has actually restricted it.

Council chairperson Walter H. Johns said the probe is a dirset result of the general objectwes of the Council.

"Our two main guidelines are to greatest the freedom of the press sy ensuring adequate access for the press to information of public interest, and to protect them by ensuring that the press presents that information clearly."

The council will approach the provincial press secretary or Premier Lougheed himself if the inquiry does find the complaints. Johns said.

"Of course, we would handle all that in an air of sweet reasonableness. However", he added, "if we need to attack anybody God we will.

Board is now costing Canadian taxpayers one million dollars a month.

In the five and one-half months of its existence, the Anti-Inflation Board has cost just under \$5.5 million, with an annual budget set at \$12.53 million.

Trudeaus promise that the Board would have only 200 employees, the size is now 410 and still growing, mostly in the higher and highest paid categories. Board Chairman Jean-Luc Pepin says he doesn't know how the original figure was arrived at.

Morris Fisher, Men's Athletics President, reiterated "The financial and human costs involved in merely administrating HUB have forsaken its original aims, in fact - reversed them." centered on further justifying the

SU's transferral of title.
Goldgerg plainly announced that

"HUB isn't ever going to turn a profit as it now stands."

And in view of the fact that a reassessment of mortgage rates 4100,000 - not to mention the immediate changes required - Goldberg felt "no hesitation" in offering HUB. "We'd then be able to redirect our resources back into student services." he said.

A group of chemists at Hebrew University have found a type of algae which grows extremely rapidly in highly salty warm waters. The research team reports it has achieved "promising results" in converting the algae into petroleum in laboratory experiments.

The scientist say that billions of the tiny algae plants can be grown in just one gallon of water in a matter of days. The team reports that the algae can then be harvested into high quality oil by a simple process known as "hydrogenation."

The university team says that if it can develop ways to keep the bacteria warm, harvest it efficiently, and extract the oil from the algae cheaply, their method could help many oil poor countries to becomen energy self sufficient by literally growing their own oil.

Those facts emerged from a report released in early December by the Council on Economic Priorities. The Council has surveyed a total of 61 oil relineries owned by the top eight companies.

The survey is particularly relevant due to the huge pollution problem caused by oil refining. The Environmental Protection Agency rates the petroleum industry among the three largest sources of air and water pollution.

The study also gave high marks to Shell and Exon, and low rating to Gulf and Mobil. But it concludes that the greatest variations in standards were not between the companies but between geographical regions. This, said the report, reflects the fact that the biggest hurdle to clean air and clean water is getting the regional enforcement agencies







The king and queen return to the screen

Facts and plot not relevant to movie

Hollywood's lovers' lives not really relived

NOW SHOWING AT THE ODEON

Universal Picture's Gable and Lombard, premiering tonight at the Odeon almost as much of a waste as the tragic death of film star, Carole Lombard in a 1942 plane crash.


The Harry Korshak production, starring James Brolin as Gable and Jill Clayburgh as Lombard, claims to turn back the clock to Hollywood's golden era, but it's nothing more than a hyped-up, Hollywood version of the love affair between the film idols.

It barely touches upon their careers and makes light of the control producers once exerted over the lives of their stars. All this only goes to prove Hollywood is still Hollywood and it has no intention of shedding its tinsel to expose the truth about the cut-throat motion picture business of the '30s.

Admittedly, life has dealt the lovers a raw deal until Gable's second wife Ria (Joanne Linville) finally grants him a divorce. They must meet secretly for three years, behind the back of MGM executive, Louis B. Meyer, monotonously played by Allen Garfield, and Paramount head, A. Broderick (Noah Keen).

But Hollywood would have us believe that it was mostly fun and games for Gable and Lombard, who playfully resort to various diversions and disguises to elude hounding studio executives.

James Brolin may have been the best look-alike director Sidney J. Furie (Lady Sings the Blues, Little Foss and Big Halsey) could find for the part of Gable, but he fails to capture the mannerisms and style of the king.

Brolin, who is best known for his role as Dr. Steve Kiley in the successful television series, Marcus Welby tries too hard in his over-rehearsed portrayal of the superstar, whose film career spanned three decades. It is embarrassing to watch.

Even the highly experienced Red Buttons makes a lack-lustre MGM publicity head, Ivan Cooper, probably because the role is too stereotyped to generate any enthusiasm.

The only rose in Furie's garden is Jill Clayburgh a newcomer who captured his imagination with her

arresting portrayal of a prostitute in the television special. Hustling. She is a natural for the wisecracking but loveable Lombard, who was known for her picturesque, vocabulary of four-letter words.

Lombard's humor and grace are certainly something to match but the talented Clayburgh rises beautifully to the challenge and manages to save what could have been a total bomb.

A sizeable portion of the picture's \$4.5 million budget was given to Academy Award winning costume designer, Edith Head, to create a nostalgic period wardrobe for the cast.

Head, who designed fashions for the real Gable and Lombard, has successfully re-created the look of the era and the musical score, by Michel Legrand, heightens the period feeling.

But the plot is corny and hard to swallow at times and leaves one with the distinct impression that nobody will ever know the real story of Gable and Lombard.

Yankee flicks have Canadians seeing red

Pierre Berton HOLLYWOOD'S CANADA: THE AMERICANIZATION OF OUR NATIONAL IMAGE McClelland and Stewart Ltd. 303 pp. \$13.95

The first movie Hollywood ever made about Canada was Acadian Elopement in 1907. It was a harmless little onereeler about "the Normandie of the New World with its blossomy fields and lanes shaded with the masses of pendulous foliage, colored with the ephemeral clusters of wild flowers", to quote the press release.

From 1907 to 1974, American movie pompanies filmed 575 movies with the plot set entirely or mainly in Canada. Not many of them improved on Acadian Elopement.

The misconceptions these shoddy flicks fostered about Canada to the world and to Canadians themselves, prompted Pierre Berton to write his twenty-second book entitled Hollywood's Canada: The Americanization of Our National Heritage.

He writes: "The first movie that ever made me really mad was a picture about

the Klondike gold rush, The Far Country, starring James Stewart. I saw it in 1954, when I was working on a book about the same subject, and it made me mad because it was so wrong. It had very little to do with the real Klondike and even less to do with the real Canada, although it was supposed to be about both.

"It was a shoot-'em-up American Western, which helped perpetuate the easy assumption that there is no essential difference between Canadians and Americans."

Berton gets hot under the collar not because the movie was such a turkey and a tasteless waste of talent, but because it was so historically wrong, something Hollywood was never strong on anyway.

Stretch the point far enough and a bad B-movie becomes a sly piece of propaganda. Wave the American flag in front of any Canadian nationalist and all he'll see is red. And nationalism sells a lot of books these days.

This isn't an accusation that he slanted his material to cater to the growing anti-American feeling in this country, thus harvesting a big seller. Berton has more class than that, and God knows he doesn't need the money.

The idea behind the book is the popular assumption that every form of culture south of the border has a poisoning effect on our own. American movies about Canada not only en-

tertained Canadian audiences, - they convinced us we were seeing the real thing—that Randolph Scott built the CPR single-handed, that the Metis drank pure grain alcohol and raped white women, and that the RCMP's motto was "We always get our man." (It is "Maintain the right.").

Poor taste is the issue here, not propaganada. Hollywood made a lot of lousy movies and many of these they they inflicted on themselves. Custer, of Little Bighorn fame, for instance, was not the hero that Errol Flynn portrayed him as, but a mass murderer and fool. The American Plains Indians, probably the best mounted fighters th e world has ever seen, came off as fall guys for John Wavne.

So what goes for the Hollywood characterization of Canada, goes for every country in the world.

The British were clipped and precise, the Germans cold and mechanical, the French prancing gigolos, and depending on whether we were allies or enemies at the time, the Russians were portrayed as either carefree cossacks or sombre, murderous Bolsheviks.

So don't take umbrage at the fact that the movie moguls slaughtered our selfimage on the silver screen. We were not unique. Everybody got clobbered with the same blunt instrument. They didn't take it to heart and neither should we.

All this is not saying Berton hasn't written a good book. It's humorous, easy reading (I read it in three hours), and packed with facts and trivia on the movie industry.

Did you know for example that the Indian head band was a Hollywood invention? Indians in the West rarely braided their hair, but they did in the movies and this called for cumbersome wigs. The head bands kept the wigs from falling off.

Another Hollywood peccadillo was the Indian war bonnet. Crowned with a rainbow of eagle feathers, war bonnets were worn in ceremonies, but never, as they were shown on the screen, in battle. Indian tribes fought guerrilla wars, preferring harassment in difficult terrain to a head-on charge. Can you imagine trying to blend into the landscape wearing 400 eagle feathers on your head?

It's a good book for film buffs and a must for anyone seriously considering the film industry. And if you want to pick nits against the American giant, you've got a reason to buy this book,

Berton concedes in the book, "I don't think Hollywood had any particular duty to show the real Canada anymore than it had a realy duty to show the real Himalavan frontier or the real Sahara. It didn't take Canada seriously, but then why should it? Its business was fantasy, not education."

Exactly. So relax, Canada, and

forgive the Americans their past sins. Cecil B. DeMille knew not what he did.

Charles Byer portrays the noble Mountie capturing the stereo-typed native renegade in a 1928 movie.

Your great grandfather had a combination for life: it was a winning combination, and it was based on being "manly."

He learned very early to be a little man, to act and dress like one. He could harly wait to get into long pants, since this was the visible sign of manhood.

He knew that he was expected to get married, and he knew that he couldn't get married until he could provide. So, his first obligation was to be a good provider. That could take a good number of years.

Until then, there were two kinds of girls. There were "good girls" like his mother, his sisters and their friends. There were "bad girls," who were no better than they ought to be. Manly men did not bother "good" girls. When the time came, manly men looked around for an attractive "good" girl and began courting.

Courting was serious business. There weren't many divorces, divorce was a real scandal. This woman would bear his children, live with him for the rest of her life, and it was important that she be "right." She probably wasn't in a hurry. Once married, she lost her identity completely. She could not have any property of her own. She could not have custody of her children. If she worked, her wages belonged to her husband. Bearing and nursing children would take their toll, and she would probably die long before her husband.

No sooner than ten months after the wedding, no longer than a year or two, your great grandmother was expected to produce a baby. After that they would probably come every year or two. There were lots of miscarriages, and lots of women died in childbirth.

Your great grandfather didn't expect your great grandmother to enjoy sex. After all, she was a "good" woman, and "good" women weren't supposed to enjoy sex. He didn't expect to "understand" her either. She had a role to fulfill, and that's what was important.

Married men lived the longest and were the happiest. It was a winning combination. The loser was your great grandmother.

A lot of men, and a lot of women have changed the combination.

Even though the combination has been changed, many of the things we do and learn are based on the old combination.

You can't hate girls and like women

Men are taught to regard women with both disgust and fascination. The teaching starts in grade school or before. They learn that men are capable and strong and that girls are dumb and fragile. They learn that certain things are "men's work" and other things are "women's work". They learn that it's somehow "unmanly" to do "women's work." Boys must not play with dolls. Boys must not

sew. Girls cannot be on the Little League

In the fifth or sixth grade the girls see a film on menstruation. All the boys are shut out, and there is a lot of giggling and dirty jokes. If the boys are shut out it must be taboo, right? Why would they shut out the boys otherwise? It goes on through high school, with the "manly things" and "womanly things" strictly segregated.

This kind of education has a purpose, and the purpose is to make boys regard women and women's bodies and women's work with enough disgust that boys will want to act as "manly" as possible. For girls the purpose is to make them believe that they are slightly disgusting and only fit for staying home and having babies.

Things which are disgusting and taboo become fascinating, just because they are forbidden, Your parents do not want you to be a homosexual, so they begin to focus you on girls sexually about the time you hit puberty. Meanwhile, of course, the girls have been focused on boys since they were two years old. The old combination was that girls had to be focused on men because if they didn't get married and have babies they might as well be dead.

What happens is:

- You date her that once, maybe twice, and then don't do it again because the whole thing was just too phoney and uncomfortable.
- Or, you find out that you and she have sex in common and that keeps you together for a while.
- Or, you find out that you like her.
 She's interested in some of the same things that you are, and it's fun being with her. You tell her that she's different from most girls.

She really isn't it's just that this particular girl turned out to be someone you could be friends with. If you could have known that in the first place, it would have saved you and a lot of girls a lot of trouble.

But you didn't know, because you didn't have any female friends. The solution is simple. Don't date. Make some female friends, and spend your time with your friends, male and female, but don't date. Why should you go through that courting routine when you aren't courting? Why should you hustle a girl you don't even know or like? Unless, of course, that's what you're really after. It's a good way to get hated.

Who does what?

It's easy to destroy people and put them down. It's also stupid. It's easy for men and women to destroy each other, but it's stupid. No one gets hurt if each person remembers that the only thing people owe one another is courtesy.

If you do decide to ask a girl out, even if you spend a week's pay on it, she doesn't owe you anything but courtesy. She doesn't owe you a kiss or a quick hop into bed or going out with you again. If she's polite and she likes you, she'll issue the next invitation herself if you've indicated that this is O.K. You say, "It was fun. Give me a call if you'd like to get together again." She may send you a note or a little impersonal gift to thank you for your thoughtfulness. At that point, that's all you've got coming. If you're already friends, courtesy is less important than honesty. If you're not friends, courtesy lets you find out about each other without hurting anyone.

If she says "no," it doesn't mean that she hates you. It may mean that she cares about someone else, or doesn't want to get involved just now, or that you aren't the type of person she relates to easily. That's her problem, and courtesy demands that you don't hassle her.

In other words, you are taught that girls are not suitable as friends, that they are slightly disgusting as people, and then you are taught that it's all right to think of them as sexual objects. You learn to hustle girls, or use girls, or be mothered by girls, but you don't learn to like them

Meanwhile the girls, who don't really like being hustled, or used, or treated as mother, learn to be suspicious of you.

And the two of you come together in the biggest con game in the world dating.

The dating game

If you don't start dating by the time you're sixteen or so, or at least start talking about it, people are going to worry. They're going to think you aren't normal or something, or that you have bad breath or a rotten personality or are too shy. They're going to push you.

What do you do? Do you date to get your parents off your neck? Are you interested in sex? Do you ask a girl out or pick up a girl somewhere? Do you like or hate it? Does it bore you?

What about the girl? Was she afraid to say "no"? Remember, girls are still taught to be more passive and polite, and many of them don't know how to say "no." Did she really like you, or was she just tired of staying home?

Did you spend money on the date and resent it afterwards? Did she offer to pay her own way? Did she seem happy? Were you? Did you hustle her? Do you plan to see her again? Will she want to see you?

It's a game. It isn't courting, because you aren't looking for a wife for the next fifty years. It isn't a ball game, because the score may be 0-0. It may not even be fun. You can have more fun with your friends. You could have more fun if she were your friend.

The female as friend

In a study done not long ago, a group of people was asked to select from a long list of characteristics the ones which were male and the ones which were female. Then another group was asked to select from the same list the characteristics which were adult and those which were childish. The "female" and "childish" lists were very similar. Why? Because the women have been taught that men and society do not like strong, capable women. Such women are called "masculine," "unwomanly," "deseved"

Girls don't want to be "masculine," they just want to be people.

They don't really want to hide their personalities behind a silly baby mask. but the world keeps forcing the mask onto them. Their fathers call them "baby doll." Men on the street call them "baby" and make remarks about their tits. Their schools push them toward home ec and away from math and science. If they are intelligent, their mothers tell them to hide it. By the time most girls are through high school, their abilities and minds are permanently warped. No girls wants to be called "unwomanly" or "desexed", but underneath there is a lot of resentment toward the people who put the baby mask on her and tied it there.

The part that hurts girls the most is this. Many of them refuse the mask, try to live as they really are. They want male friends because they find men interesting and attractive. But, the men seem to give all their attention to the girls who wear the mask best, the baby dolls with six pounds of eyelashes and silly giggles.

If you're serious about having female friends, judge them the way you judge your male friends.

Sex rears

There are only two basic kinds of sex: sex with victims and sex without. Sex with victims is always wrong. Sex without is always right.

Sex with victims leaves someone abused, hurt, demeaned, of damaged, either mentally or physically. The girl at work who is coerced into sex on Saturday night and then is talked about on Monday is a victim. The guy who pays all his wife's bills while she runs him down to her friends is a victim. The girl who accepts a ride home from someone she's just met and then get raped on the way is a victim. The guy who helps a girl out, time after time, while she laughs at him behind his back is a victim. The girl who gets psyched into sex by a guy who uses every trick in the book is a victim.

Men have a whole mythology which they use when they victimise women. They say things like:

"Ohothey have to fight a little, but

they really love it." "Never believe a women when she says 'no'." "A girl who will do it with somebody will do it with anybody." "She's lucky I even looked at her."

Sexual athletes don't have lovers or friends, they just have victims. Sexual athletes can be either male or female and what they count up as "scores" their victims count up in hate and resentment.

One way to avoid having victims is, of course, to have sexual relationships only with your friends. If you can't manage that, at least try to observe the ground rules.

1. Never assume: Never assume she can't get pregnant. She may look and act sophisticated. She may have been married and have two children. Don't assume she knows what she's doing at this particular moment.

She may have quit taking the pill three months ago when she broke up

with her boyfriend, and she's too high at the moment to remember that.

She may be having a personal crisis right now and not be thinking too clearly.

Don't assume. Ask. Ask before things go beyond the point of no return. If she's young, always ask. If she blushes and mumbles something, don't take that for an answer. If you know her well enough to be getting into bed, you know her well enough to get that little point straightened out.

Don't tell her you've had a vasectomy, or that you're sterile, unless you really are. You may not be gambling with your life, but you are gambling with hers.

- 2. Be honest about your intentions: If this is a one nighter, and you don't intend to be around, say so. If you're just lonely and down, say so. If this is a girl you've just met and she agrees, you're in the clear provided that she's old enough to have some sense. If you lie to her, or coerce her, she's the victim even if nothing happens to her later that may hurt her physically. You don't want to be honest because she may turn you down? Right. She may.
- 3. Be fair: The girl is a human being, not a plastic doll for your convenience. You may have picked up a dose of something at the party two nights ago, but you're not sure? She can always get a shot of penicillin, can't she? Maybe she can and maybe she can't and maybe by the time she does it will be too late and she will be permanently sterile.

The man or woman who passes on a venereal disease by carelessness or dishonesty is dirty. That's it. There's no other word. It is not like a simple cold; it is not simple to diagnose in many women, and if you're not sure, use a condom. If you won't use a condom, masturbate. It's not "unmanly." It's a lot manlier than taking the chance of crippling someone.

Performance

The penis seems to be a wild animal which some men succeed in either taming or domesticating. Men call this process "performance," which means getting it up and keeping it up reasonably on command. Even young men worry about this, or brag about it, which is the same thing.

Who is performance for? The curtain goes up, the scene is set, the act goes on. Who is the audience? Who sits in the theatre and cries, "Look, look. He's performing."

A "performance" is staged, scripted, and acted. The feeling is all pretend. A great actor may give a great performance, but it's still only an act. If the actor is sick, or the curtain sticks, or the prompter gets the hiccups, the performance doesn't come off. Meanwhile, the audience has been taught to expect a performance.

Just as women have been masked as "baby dolls," men have been masked as "performers." It's men's insistence upon performance which has led women to expect it. Most men teach most girls to believe that all men are insatiable sexual performers, all the time. Then, when the performance doesn't come off, the girl believes that it is her fault, that she isn't attractive, that she isn't womanly. She starts to hate herself, and she takes it out on the man in her life, which makes him feel worse, and the whole thing is miserable.

With friends no faking is necessary, no performance is necessary. People do what they feel like doing, when they feel like doing it. They don't force themselves. They know that there are a lot of ways of satisfying one another and that what is important are the feelings, not the ritual.

Of course, we have to admit that there are some sexual sickies around who simply can't have friends. There are men who can only feel sexual if they are hurting someone or dominating someone. Rapists are like this, men with inadequate personalities who substitute a knife or a gun for the maleness they

don't have and then lie about it to themselves. There are female rapists, too, women who substitute predatory sexuality for personality and then try to convince themselves they are irresistible.

Sexual sickies grow up in homes in which sex is taboo. The best protection against growing up to be a sickie is to talk about

sex (not brag, talk) to both males and females until the horrid fascination is gone and the healthy interest remains.

Role playing

A lot of the traditional Male-Female stuff is tied into small actions and courtesies which men are supposed to perform for women. Men are traditionally supposed to walk on the outside, open doors, help women in andoubt of cars. Most of it had a purpose, once.

A man walked on the outside to stand between a woman and the muck thrown up by the horses in the street. His clothes were easier to clean than hers. A man opened carriage doors and give a woman his hand because she had on thirty yard of petticoats and skirts, one handfull of purse and fan, the other holding her shawl. A man opened doors for a woman because she needed both hands to get her skirts through. Did you ever Wonder

why doors in old houses are wider than doors in new ones?

- Traditional role:

She never calls you. You call her. You make all plans and invite her. She accepts

You pay. When you can't pay, you don't

You always call for her at her home and take her back to her home.

You do not involve her sexually unless you're engaged to be married.

She does not plan any career which may not fit in with your future.

She does not commit her time to other people or activities. And so forth.

- Contemporary role:

You call one another when you have something to say or share.
You make plans together, or go places

separately.
You both pay, or either one, or decide on

things that don't take money.
You meet wherever is most convenient

for both of you.

You decide together on your sexual relationship.

You each plan for the future individually. You each do things and see people you like. You feel that you are more interested and interesting this way.

If the two of you decide to play a traditional role for an evening, with long skirts for her, perfume, jewelry, and getting her hair done, great. Play it to the hilt. Open the doors, offer your arm, get the fun out of it. If you never play those roles, fine.


Remember that most of the traditional courtesies offered to women are the same courtesies provided to the elderly and infirm. Most of them are based on the assumption that women are fragile and in need of protection. Under some circumstances this assumption may be true for everyone. True courtesy consists of moving to meet people's real needs, not the phoney ones. If someone is struggling to get through a door on crutches, you don't worry if it's a man or woman, you just help.

The dreadful don'ts

- Don't pull the trigger unless you're ready for the bang. Sex is emotionally loaded. Only kids, drunks, and sickies play Russian Roulette with it.

Inside each person there are at least four people. There is the child that plays and giggles and cries and wants to be cuddled. There is the thinking, planning person. There is the sexual part, the part that lusts and rampages. There is the male or female part that carries all kinds of deep instincts, role models, strange expectations, and guilts. Sex can be the trigger that fires these parts of people into conflict with one another.

A perfectly rational, nice, friendly woman has sex and then, for no apparent reason, begins to cry. A perfectly pleasant, considerate guy has sex and comes all over violent/nasty. A woman who needs a baby like she needs a hole in her head starts talking about getting pregnant.



So, you and she have agreed that you don't want marriage, that you don't want children, that all that must come later and maybe not with each other. Then, suddenly, she starts in on the relationship, wanting to get married, wanting children. You begin to feel hostile, there's an argument, you both feel miserable, you decide women aren't worth it.

The male-female part of people is in constant tension, like a spring wound tight. Sex may release that tension, letting all the feelings, wants, hopes, fears and frustrations out at once. Let it go by. Take thirty deep breaths. Kiss her and tell her you'll talk about it later, and then do talk about it later, with a table between you.

- Don't lie to yourself. Decide honestly what you want from your relationships with women. Do you want a convenient warm body? Buy one. That's right. There are women who have freely chosen that business, buy one. Don't ever brag to your friends, "I've never had to pay for it," when you've lied, threatened, coerced your way through sex. You've paid for it. You just don't know it.

Do you want a virgin to marry? Buy one. There are girls in that business, too. Marriage is the price you'll pay, and you'll get the virgin. Very temporarily.

Do you want a woman to abuse and dominate in order to make you feel like a "man"? Buy one. Buy yourself a full size plastic model, and when you've broken that, admit you're a sickie and buy a psychiatrist. Watch for the symptons: You get furiously angry when a woman says "no." You are tempted to use force, or do use force on women. You consider the sexual act to be a "score." You think that if a girl gets raped, "She probably asked for it"

Do you want a housekeeper-cooklaundress? Buy one A good housekeeper is darned expensive, but they can be had.

Do you want a lean, elegant model type to make everyone stare, a woman that makes you say, "Hey world, look what I've got?" Buy one. The price may be high, or you may be able to swing it for the price of a good dinner.


Do you want a friend to share things with, to care about you, to have a sexual relationship with that's more than performance? They aren't for sale. They can't be possessed, or forced, or abused into friendship. They can't be bought.

- The right combination

The right combination of you and a woman is you the way you want to be, no lies and no performance, and a woman the way she wants to be, no mask and no pretences. You will be happy with her and away from her; she will be happy with you and away from you. It will not depend upon the size of her breasts or the size of your penis, upon her eyelashes or your reputation as a mighty hunter. It will depend upon the persons involved who are friends of one another.

The right combination always starts with friendship. It can't bemore than that until it has been at least that.
