F.A.S. CONDEMNS FEE INCREASE

The Executive Committee of the Federation of Alberta Students (FAS) has condemned moves made recently by many post-secondary educational institutions in Alberta to increase tuition fees for the 1976-77 Academic Year. Although Boards of Governors at many colleges and universities are still discussing the amount tuition fees will be increased, it is known that they are thinking in terms of a 25-40% hike.

At a meeting held at the University of Lethbridge on January 3 and 4, the Executive Committee of FAS cited the Provincial Governments' 11% ceiling on grants to universities and colleges as the main reason why institutions are now looking at increasing tuition fees to make up for their loss in revenue. Executive member Terry Sharon, also Vice-President of Services for the Students' Union, University of Alberta states that the Federation of Alberta Students, at its fall conference in October of last year, warned that if the 11% ceiling was implemented, tuition fees would be increased. Mr. Sharon says that any tuition fee increase would add further to the already great financial burden that students must face when attending any post-secondary institution in Alberta.

The Executive Committee agreed that FAS would intensify its campaign to get the Provincial Government to drop its 11% ceiling. The Executive feel that the Provincial Government will not know the effects on enrollment and accessibility to post-secondary educational institutions in Alberta if the move to have students pay a greater part of their education is continued.

CUT BACKS HIT OUTDOOR PHYS ED PROGRAMS HARD

I really don't know how many people know about this or how many people care. For the benefit of those who would like to know this is what is happening. There was a meeting of the staff and some of the administrators, at this meeting it was disclosed that Nait's financial standing was a bit shaky, so there were to be cut backs. The area that was hit by these cut backs was the outdoor physical education program, they were told to lower expenses. The result was a change in the location of the program, from Jarvis Lake which is 15 miles away from Hinton, to Elk Island Park. From this one major change there had to be a number of other changes, such as the cancellation of certain courses, the survival course winter camping, and the introduction to winter outdoor activities. Now they are offering cross-country skiing and nature interpretation. At the beginning of the first quarter there were 11 courses offered now there are only 10. This is not a very significant drop, but the facilities out at Elk Island Park can not accommodate very many people. In the first quarter 175 students went on these outdoor weekends, this quarter there will be only 120 students going. This caused another problem - who will be able to go on these trips? It was decided that the first year students could choose first and if there was any room left second year students could then choose.

It was also decided that since Elk Island was not that far away, the services of the Nait buses would not be needed and the students could drive out there themselves. That's fine if it is nice outside and you can

be sure that its going to be nice all weekend, but what happens if it gets cold, there's no plug-ins out there. Elk Island is a nice place, that is why it is a bad location for the program. On weekends you have people from the city going out there to cross-country ski, ice skate and ice fish, with all these people running around it makes it hard for the instructors to teach and for the students to learn.

Now I am not sure what exactly can be done about the situation but I am sure that they could make some one else tighten up their spending and loosen up on the outdoor program a bit. Also it might not be a bad idea for the students that want to go on these weekends to say that they would not mind paying a couple of dollars each for the services of the buses so that it would be possible to go somewhere besides Elk Island. After all most of us spend more than that a weekend anyways, and this way you are learning something and having fun at the same time.

I have already asked about the idea of students paying a couple of dollars each, and I was told that it could not be done this way because this is really a part of your schooling and we have already paid our fees. But isn't telling the students that they have to get themselves out to Elk Island the same thing, someone has got to pay for gas.

There were to be pictures to go along with this article but they were misplaced. If anybody has found these pictures, of people cross-country skiing, people in a lean-to and a couple of pictures of a signal fire, it would be much appreciated if they could be returned to me or if they could be dropped off at Mr. Daums' office T600.

STUDENT ORGANIZATIONS MEET TO DISCUSS "ONE NATIONAL ORGANIZATION"

Ottawa (CUP) - Canada's national and provincial student organizations are one step closer to possible amalgamation and will draw up a common program as a result of a two-day meeting here January 3 and 4.

A target date for the creation of "one student organization" has been set up for May 1977.

Delegates from five student organizations resolved to work on a "restructuring plan" which will be presented at the organizations' respective spring conference.

Also to be presented is a "common program" of actions which will be drafted when the organization next meet in February.

Included are the National Union of Students (NUS/UNE), the British Columbia Student Federation (BCSF), the Federation of Alberta Students (FAS), the Ontario Federation of Students (OFS), L'Association Nationale des Etudiants du Quebec (ANEQ), and the Atlantic Federation of Students (AFS).

NUS represents 150,000 of Canada's 591,000 students, while the remaining organizations represent 240,000. Next year they expect to have a combined income of \$5 Million.

The delegates agreed the common program should centre around the issue of universal accessibility as it applies to such questions as student aid, unemployment, tuition, spending cutbacks and student housing.

Each organization will outline its own "strategy" but a "commitment to intensity" the work on the program must be taken the delegates agreed.

The meeting was the second in a series to discuss improved cooperation among Canada's provincial, regional, and national student organizations, and delegates from each have attended with various types of mandates.

"Some organizations gave specific instructions to the delegates to work on certain directions" while others have been "less specific" as to their expectations, NUS executive secretary Dan O'Connor commented.

O'Connor said the organizations hold varying opinions on the nature of a unified student movement, ranging from ANEQ's conception of a "very loose coalition to mobilize students" to AFS's idea of provincial extensions of a strong centralized national body.

The BSCF delegation has specific instructions to study restructuring, he said. OFS has not yet clearly defined its position.

The delegates also discussed the national newspaper they agreed to set up when they met last October. The first issue is due at the end of this month.

CALGARY STUDENTS INCREASE CAMPUS SPORTS SUPPORT

Calgary (CUP) - Students at the University of Calgary have decided by referendum to increase financial support to their recreation program while maintaining intercollegiate activity support at present levels.

Chief Returning Officer Keith Roman said that although the results are not binding on the board of governors, the Student's Union will adopt the results as its official position with respect to an athletic fee increase.

The Physical Education Department voted three to one in favour of an expanded intercollegiate program however the other five polls overturned their decision by amassing more than two to one in favour of retaining current levels of support.

The increase granted to the campus program may make the construction of a sports complex for campus use only possible, said Campus Rec Director Alar Brawn.

Brawn added that the increased funds will be used primarily to assist clubs and non-credit instruction.

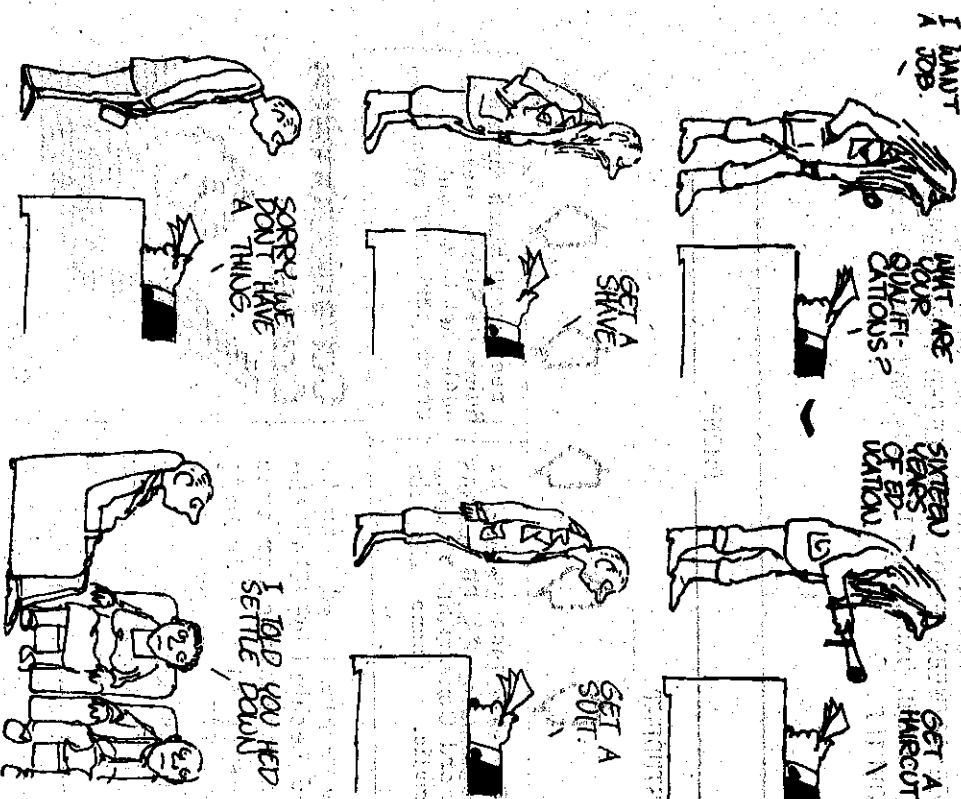

METIS EMERGENCY PROGRAM

W. J. Yurko, Minister of Housing & Public Works, has announced the signing of an agreement by Alberta Housing Corporation and the Metis Association of Alberta for an emergency repair program. The A.H.C. grant of \$200,000, will provide an immediate \$100,000 followed by subsequent installments of \$50,000 each.

The program is available to Metis and non-status Indians with a limited amount of funds available for status Indians living off reserves. Priority will be given to families of low income and large family size whose homes require basic renovation and upgrading to make them habitable. The grant will be used for such repairs as: improvement of insulation for floors, walls or ceilings; repairing a leaking roof; repairing or replacement of windows and doors; and repair or replacement of heating equipment, etc. This emergency repair program will continue until March 31, 1976.

The Metis Association will administer the program. A monitoring committee comprises representatives from A.H.C. and the Metis Association, who will review the disbursement of funds and the progress of the program to ensure its objectives are being met and to work out problems that may arise.

ONTARIO GOVERNMENT TO ANNOUNCE INCREASE IN MANDATORY LOAN CEILING

Toronto (CUP) - Ontario students will have to borrow more money next year under the Canada Student Loans Plan before receiving any provincial grants, informed sources here revealed on January 13.

But the increase in the mandatory loan ceiling - from \$800 this year to \$1000 next - will not be publicly announced "for sometime" the source said.

A spokesperson for Minister of Colleges and Universities Harry Parrott would neither confirm nor deny a possible increase in the loan ceiling, and would only state that some changes in the student aid plan would be announced "within several weeks".

There is no indication yet whether the government will reduce student grants at the same time, but the sources termed such a move "likely".

The sources said the decision to raise the loan ceiling was privately announced by Harry Parrott at a closed meeting of the special advisory committee now studying the provinces student aid system.

Parrott "made it perfectly clear" the decision had already been made, and instructed the members not to reveal the change until formally announced by the government, the sources said.

The sources also said they doubt the government will make its official announcement prior to the province-wide student rally planned for January 21 in Toronto organized by the Ontario Federation of Students.

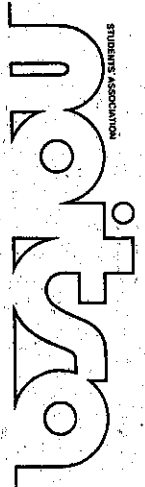
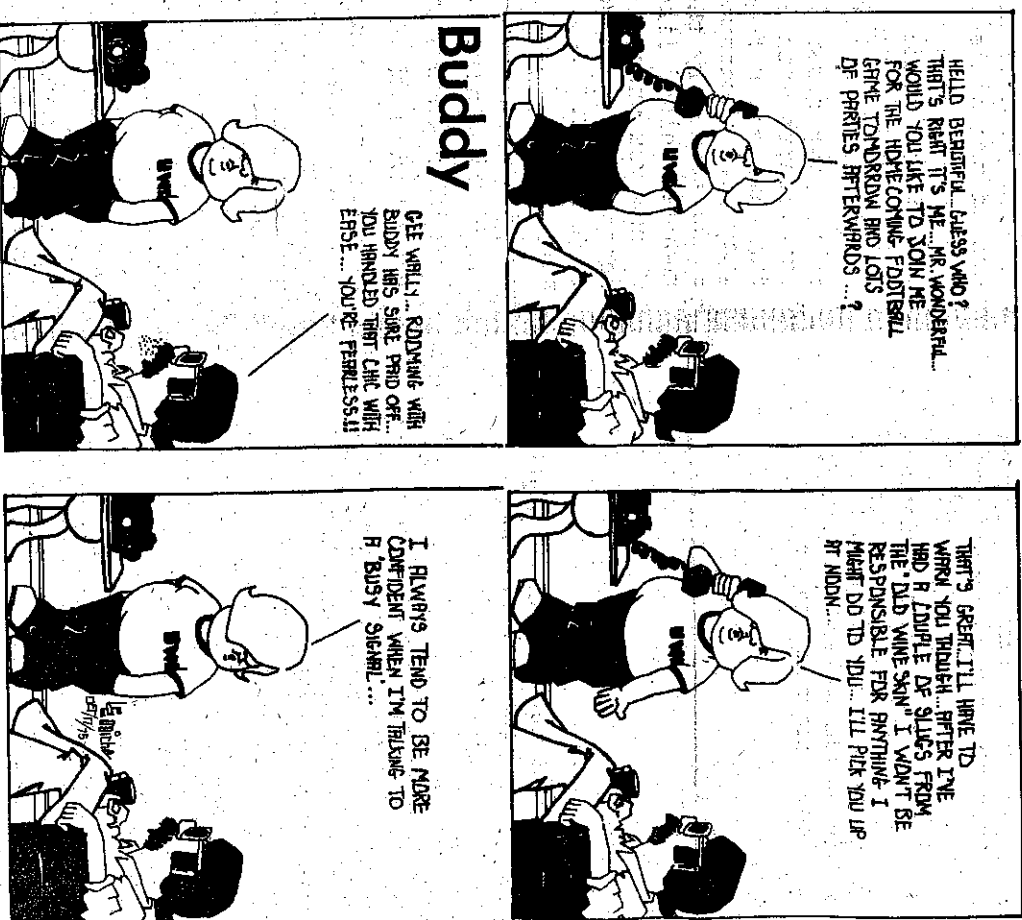

tactics with the Alberta Association of Students? What common problems do they have in mind? We would be more than foolish to take up the University's cry for a cut in tuition fees in view of the reasonable amount Nait students pay each year.

Mr. Sinclair's reference to smaller colleges shows his lack of understanding of the position of students' associations at these colleges. Our experience in the Western Inter-College Conference with institutions like Red Deer and Medicine Hat Junior Colleges and Camrose Lutheran College indicates that their students' associations are run much like those on a high school level. They might be looked upon as puppets of their respective school administrators.

The only other institution besides Nait, which would be in a position, both financially and administratively, to enter an association of the level suggested by the organizers of AAS, would be the Southern Alberta Institute of Technology.

The Nugget feels that an organization such as AAS would serve no other purpose than to back the universities in their numerous crusades. When the WIOC meets in Banff, November 11 and 12 it is expected that Sait and Nait will discuss the possibility of forming an association of institutes of technology in Western Canada. In an organization of this type there will truly be "common ground" and "common problems" to discuss.

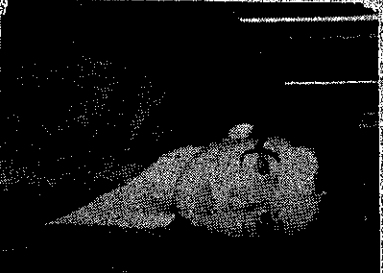

Brother fails to entertain

Sherlock Holmes would turn in his pipe if he saw it. The reason? Elementary, dear Watson. The movie, The Adventures of Sherlock Holmes Smarter Brother, rates somewhere between sick and terrible.

The film, at the **RIALTO 1** is a parody: Gene Wilder, who wrote and directed, plays Sigerson Holmes, Sherlock's brother. He has been asked by the vacationing Sherlock to solve a case for him.

Marty Feldman plays Sigerson's Watson. Madeline Kahn is the young lady the two heroes are trying to help. Eventually we discover what they are trying to help her with, aside from her sex life. She has stolen some important papers from her father's safe and now, feeling guilty, she wants them returned.

Sigerson describes her as someone who "must be sexually stimulated before she'll trust anyone." So he decides, like any good detective, that he must gain his client's confidence.

It appears that the lady is also a compulsive liar and she leads Sigerson and assistant on several wild goose chases that add nothing to the story except confusion.

The whole movie seems to be a series of separate incidents spliced together in an effort to make some sort of structure.

There are two scenes of the trio suddenly and for no apparent reason, deciding to dance the kangaroo hop. Just for good measure (or in this case bad) there are also bits and pieces from Sherlock Holmes' past adventures thrown in.

Several disgusting close-ups of people chewing food and spitting it out are shown. We see a gross shot of Sigerson, his face smeared with chocolate and the syrupy glop dribbling from his mouth.

The entire production can only be called funny in the sense of peculiar. The best idea for anyone intent on seeing The Adventures of Sherlock Holmes' Smarter Brother is to wait for its television appearance. At least then it can be turned off.

Not even sex can salvage

Reynolds' Hustle

Not even the presence of one of the world's most beautiful women can save Hustle (**Capitol sq**) from being one of the year's 10 worst pictures.

When Catherine Deneuve and Burt Reynolds get together and make love, the previews say, it is like nothing you have ever seen before. That's right, because that's what the movie is—nothing.

Director Robert Aldrich is under the impression that when you put the sexy Deneuve and the hairy-chested Reynolds on a bed where all they do is kiss you have the makings of a winner. But he is mistaken because it doesn't work. The love scenes are out of place in a detective story or the detective story is out of place in a love drama. Take your choice.

Love scenes are not for Reynolds. He is too much the tough guy as he was in The Longest Yard, which was an Aldrich-directed movie, or in Deliverance and White Lightning. Ever since Reynolds came into prominence after he posed nude for Cosmopolitan magazine he

has been cast in movies where he comes across as the hard-hitting stud with a sense of humor and no worries. To see Reynolds struggle with love problems that plague most ordinary people is painful indeed.

As for Deneuve we know she can act if director Aldrich had only given her the chance. Deneuve was acceptable as the bored housewife in Belle du Jour and exceptional as the psychopath in Repulsion. In Hustle Deneuve plays the role of an expensive call girl whose clients have to pay heavily for her services. But in this movie all she does is sit around and look beautiful. It's almost like watching two heaves of the Chanel perfume commercial she stars in. When Deneuve isn't fawning over Reynolds she is whispering innuendoes over the telephone to one of her many clients.

The plot of the movie is loosely tied around the murder or suicide—even at the end of the movie we still don't know—of a go-go dancer. Much against his better judgement Reynolds and his partner, played by Paul Winfield, decide to investigate the case at the insistence of the dead girl's father. In their investigation they come across the

usual amount of corruption that is not really much of a surprise. There are some good action scenes which save the movie from being a complete bore. But just when you think the movie is going to pick up Aldrich takes us back to the love struggles between Reynolds and Deneuve, and puts the audience back to sleep.

Putting in strong supporting roles are Ben Johnson and Eileen Brennan, the dead girl's parents. Also strong in a minor role is the crooked but almost likeable

lawyer, Eddie Albert, formerly of the television comedy series Green Acres.

This movie doesn't do much for the careers of either Deneuve or Reynolds. If you are a fan of either and even if you're not, stay away from this one.

This performance against Mount Royal, gave the Nait team tremendous momentum which enabled them to defeat Sait and Olds very convincingly.

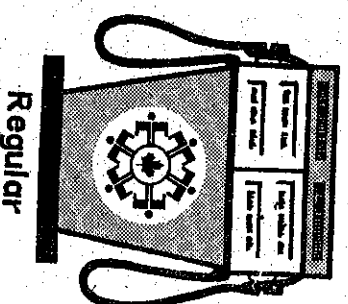

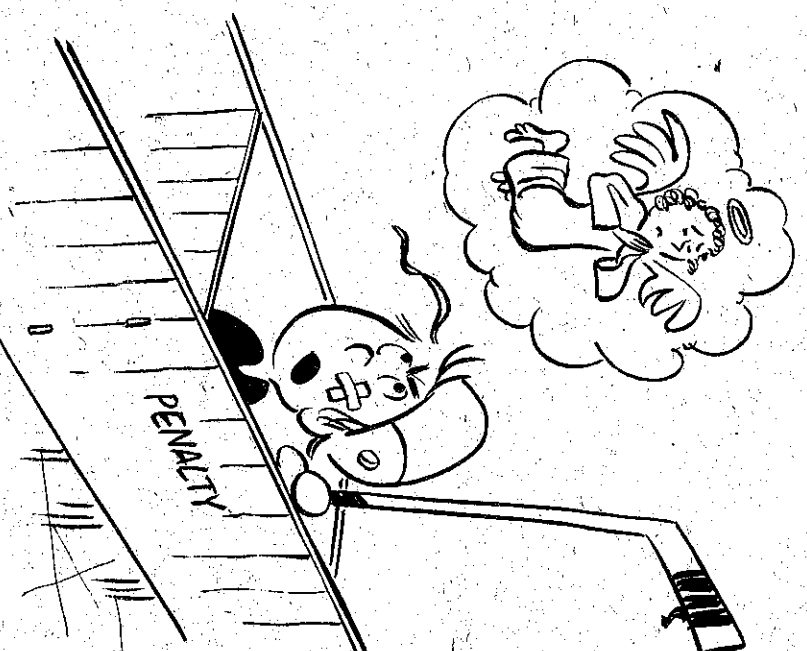
GLENMORE JINX HOLDS MOUNT ROYAL SQUEAKS BY NAIT 2-0

The 9 Nait players deserve a hearty slap on the back for a hard game won.

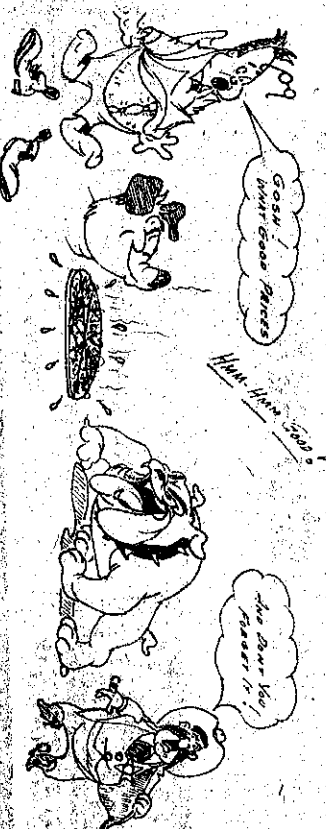

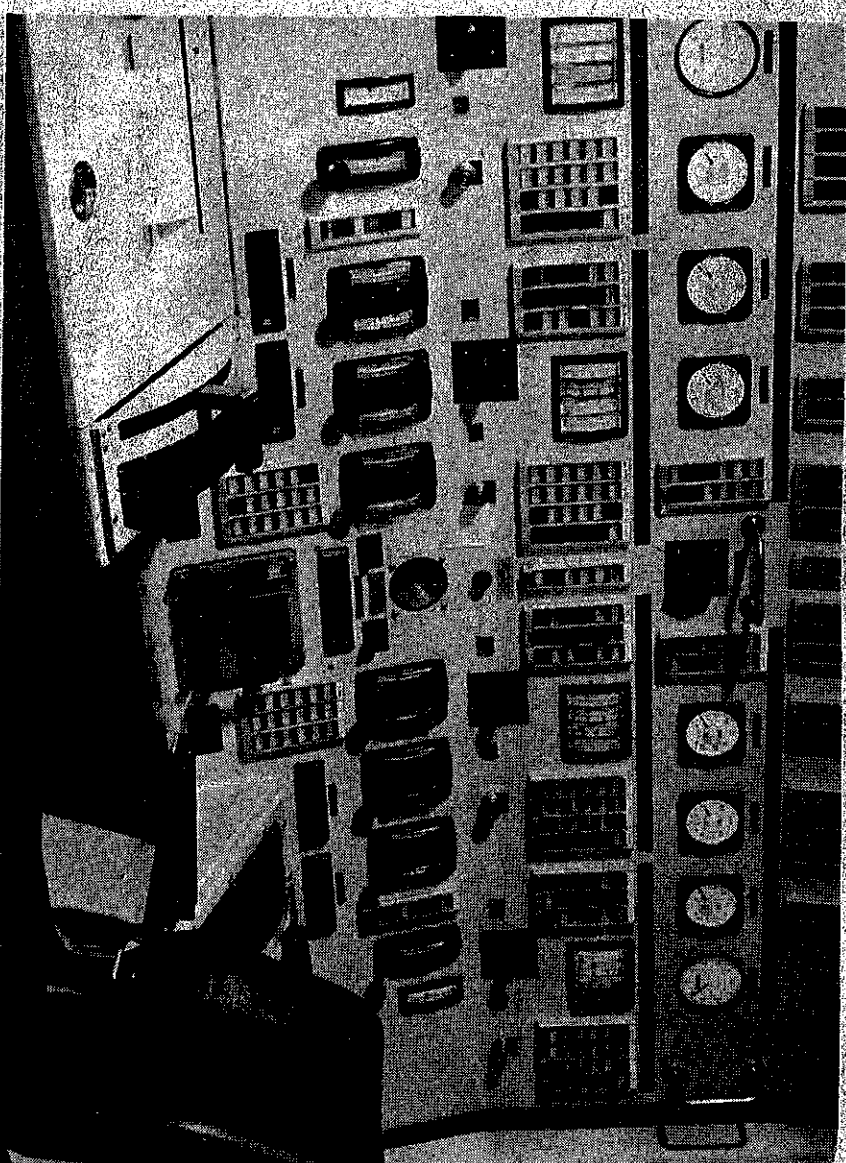
As most of you know by now, the B.A.S. had to cancel its cabaret on Jan. 9. We hope this article serves as an explanation for this unfortunate turn of events, and as an apology to those of you who bought advance tickets. We also hope that we can help other technologies to avoid the same hassles we went through.

You've probably heard that the A.L.C.B. has been cracking down in the new year and shutting down taverns in town for breaking various regulations. Well, it seems that student groups are the next on their list, and the B.A.S. is one of their victims. The A.L.C.B. is now enforcing many regulations that have previously been ignored or loosely enforced. US STUDENTS PROTEST CIA-NSA CAMPUS RECRUITING

San Diego (Guardian-CUP) Some of the most militant campus demonstrations since the late 1960's have erupted in recent weeks against recruiters for the Central Intelligence Agency and the National Security Administration.

At Michigan State University in East Lansing, 500 people chanted "No more murders, no more lies, CIA of campus now" in a militant action November 19. A leaflet particularly attacked the CIA's "national operation to enlist minority students".

At the University of California at Berkeley, several hundred people took part in a series of demonstrations in late November protesting campus recruitment by the CIA and NSA.

Third world groups participating exposed the hypocrisy of the spy agencies posing as "equal opportunity employers".

"There is nothing affirmative in the hiring of third world people by the CIA," said Vivian Gutierrez of the Movimiento Estudiantil Chicano de Aztlán.

At the University of California in San Diego, 100 angry students confronted university president David Saxon at the close of a school-wide meeting in early December at which he announced that he would not bar the CIA from the campus.

Saxon says the students "jostled" and "spat upon" him and that he will take disciplinary action against eight or ten of them.

In his address, Saxon had reaffirmed his intention to send university representatives to a CIA conference on minority recruitment in Washington because the agency is a "perfectly legal organization."

INCOME GAP WIDENING WORLDWIDE

Ottawa (CPA-CUP) According to the World Bank, the income gap between rich and poor countries is still widening. The economic growth of the 21 most industrialized countries has surpassed that of 35 of the poorest countries in every way.

In the period of 1968-74, the gross national product of the industrialized nations grew by 4.23 percent annually. On a per capita basis, the wealth of the industrialized nations showed an average yearly increase of 3 percent, while there was no increase in the poor nations.

But the biggest GNP increase was in OPEC countries. In 1974 the average GNP of the oil-exporting nations rose by 145 percent. Using this standard, the United Arab Emirates became the richest nation in the world with a per capita of \$22,060. Kuwait was next with \$20,700.

Poor countries like Bhutan (north of India) and Mali (north-west Africa) had a per capita GNP of \$70.

Per capita income is the figure arrived at when the total annual income of a nation (GNP) is divided by the total number of people in that nation.

Per capita GNP is used to measure comparative wealth between nations, but does not take into account inequities of income distribution within a nation.

US RELIES ON POSTAL LAWS TO PROSECUTE TERM PAPER COMPANIES

Washington (CUP) The U.S. Government seems to be winning the battle against the term-paper companies.

"We have been successful in all but one of our cases," said Postal Service Lawyer Thomas Ziebarth. "We think we are stopping the computerized plagiarism that was so prevalent on the campuses a few years ago."

The nation wide term paper trade opened up in the 1970's when entrepreneurs took advantage of the computer technology.

Educators spoke out against the trade but the government at first thought it had no legal basis for moving against the mail-order companies.

"The problem was in prosecution," Ziebarth said. "This isn't like a simple mail-fraud case where a customer is misled by someone selling something through the mail."

"Here both the students and the term paper company know what is going on. The person misled is the professor, who thinks the term paper is the work of a student when it really isn't."

But in 1973 the government won it's first case. The court of Appeals in Boston held that when the professor is misled, that is using the mails to misrepresent.

The Postal Service has used this precedent to win nine of 10 recent cases against term paper companies Ziebarth said.

"Now we are winning the battle," he said. "The term paper industry is much smaller now. The specter of being closed down has relegated it more to an under-the-counter business."

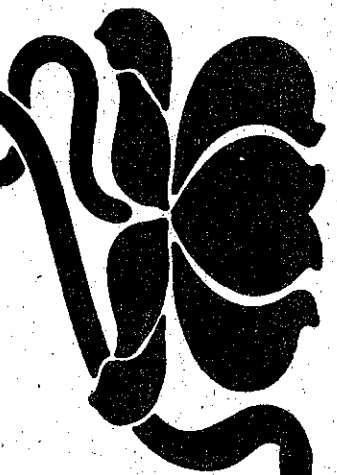
