A.S. CONDEMNS

FEE INCREASE

The Executive Committee of the Federation of Alberta Students (FAS) has condemned moves made recently by many post-secondary educational institutions in Alberta to increase tuition fees for the 1976 77 Academic Year Although Boards of Governors at many colleges and universities are still discussing the amount tuition fees will be increased, it is known that they are thinking in terms of a 25 - 40% hike.

At a meeting held at the University of Lethbridge on January 3 and 4, the Executive Committee of FAS cited the Provincial Governments' 11% ceiling on grants to universities and colleges as the main reason why institutions are now looking at increasing tuition fees to make up for their loss in revenue. Executive member Terry Sharon, also Vice-President of Services for the Students' Union, University of Alberta states that the Federation of Alberta Students, at its fall conference in October of last year, warned that if the 11% ceiling was implemented, tuition fees would be increased. Mr. Sharon says that any tuition fee increase would add further to the already great financial burden that students must face when attending any postsecondary institution in Alberta.

The Executive Committee agreed that FAS would intensify its campaign to get the Provincial Government to drop its 11%ceiling. The Executive feel that the Provincial Government will not know the effects on enrollment and accessibility to post-secondary educational institutions in Alberta if the move to have students pay a greater part of their education is continued.

It was decided that the first year students could choose first and if there was any room left second year students could then choose.

It was also decided that since Elk Island was not that far away, the services of the Nait buses would not be needed and the students could drive out there themselves. That's fine if it is nice outside and you can

be nice all weekend, but what happens if it gets cold, there's no plug-ins out there.

Elk Island is a nice place, that is why it is a bad location for the program. On weekends you have people from the city going out there to cross-countryski, ice skate and ice fish, with all these people running around it makes it hard for the instructors to teach and for the students to learn.

Now I am not sufe what the situation but I am sure that they could make some one else tighten up their spending and loosen up on the outdoor program a bit. Also it might not be a bad idea for the students that want to go on these weekends to say that they would not mind paying a couple of dollars each for the services of the buses so that it would be possible to go somewhere besides Elk Island. After all most of us spend more then that a weekend anyways, and this way you are learning something and having fun at the same time.

I have already asked about the idea of students paying a couple of dollars each, and I was told that it could not be done this way because this is really a part of your schooling and we have already paid our fees. But isn't telling the students that they have to get themselves out to Elk Island the same thing, someone has got to pay for gas.

A target date for the creation of "one student organization" has been set up for May 1977.

Also to be presented is a "common program" of acts which will be drafted when the organization next meet in February.

Included are the National Union of Students (NUS/UNE), the British Columbia Student Federation (BCSF), the Federation of Alberta Students (FAS), the Ontario Federation of Students (OFS), L'Association Nationale des Etudiants du Quebec (ANEQ), and the Atlantic Federation of Students (AFS).

NUS represents 150,000 of Canada's 591,000 students, while the remaining organizations represent 240,000. Next year they expect to have a combined income of \$.5 Million.

The delegates agreed the common program should centre around the issue of universal accessibility as it applies to such questions as student aid, unemployment, tuition, spending cutbacks and student housing.

The BSCF delegation has specific instructions to study restructuring, has aid. OFS has not yet clear defined its position. O'Connor said the organiz ations hold varying opin ions on the nature of a unified student movement, raging from ANEQ's concer of a "very loose confeder ation to mobilize students" to AFS's idea of provincia extensions of a strong cen tralized national body.

The delegates also discussed the national newspaper they agreed to seup when they met last October. The first issue is due at the end of this month

His last line: "...unless the Nugget shows condi



In the period of 1968-74, the gross national product of the industrialized nations grew by 4.23 per centannually. On a per capita pasis, the weall industrialized nat ed an avera an average yearly in ase of 3 percent, where was no increase e poor nations.
