



Commonwealth Cultural Travel

Project to India and Sri Lanka

A living experience with the cultures, customs and people of the Commonwealth will be shared for 37 days this winter by a group representing the Association for Development of Commonwealth Cultural Knowledge Inc., a non-profit corporation based in Windsor, Ontario.

Behind the expedition is John Stevens, association's Executive Director, who co-ordinated a contingent of 127 Canadians on a similar expedition in 1974: John is looking for at least 50 people from Canada, and the United Kingdom to qualify as members of the expedition.

Applicants will be screened priority. It is also necessary that all participants be in good health.

Once accepted, expedition members will pay \$1,450, plus \$75 registration fee and \$5 for association membership. Then they will spend four days in London, England, experience in Sri Lanka (formerly Ceylon) for ten days. live on a train for 20 days as it travels throughout the Indian sub-continent, then stop for a tour of Amsterdam on the way home.

The adventure lasts from December 1 to January 6, and includes on-site lectures, yoga instruction, visits to the religious, cultural and historic places, visits to educational institutions and the Commonwealth Institute in London, and meetings with both dignitaries and the average citizens.

While the experience will further the participants' personal interest in Commonwealth peoples and cultures, they will also be training themselves to be

"As a passenger involved in a head-on collision on Groat Road in March, 1975, I firmly believe that the seat belt I was wearing at the time of the accident saved my life.

The driver of the other vehicle suffered multiple facial cuts as a result of striking the windshield. In all probability, these injuries could of been avoided if he had been wearing his seat

"It has long been a policy of B.C. Telephone for all employees to wear lap belts while travelling in company vehicles. Two employees of an associated company, Canadian Telephones and Supplies had their lives saved by this policy.

During the winter of 73-74 while travelling in a severe blizzard, their pickup truck collided with another truck stalled on the roadside. The impact was severe enough to drive the engine block back and beneath the seat. A 45 pound tool box in the rear of the truck came through the back of the cab and lodged between the two men.

The truck was a write-off by the company but neither man sustained any serious injury, because their seat belts prevented them from exiting via the windshield."

Note: Obviously the seat belt is not going to prevent injury or death in all cases but it definitely will help in most situations. The above testimonials were only a couple of the many provided. Editor.


Evening Visiting Lecturers - Must present visiting Card to Commissionaire on duty or accept possible refusals to park.



Retail Outlets Criticized

The Alberta Federation of Labour had sharp comments to-day towards retail outlets who observe Remembrance Day by holding "holiday sales".

Reg Basken, Federation president said, "The problem of stores remaining open for

business on holidays must be dealt with by the Provincial Government. An increasing number of stores are observing holidays by advertising sales to attract customers. It appears that greed and profit take precedent over special days of observance established by society."

"The employees in these establishments are, deprived of these holidays and many small businesses are being

forced to open because of regulations established in large shopping malls,' Basken said.

It has been a long standing policy of the AFL that all nonessential businesses should be required to close on holidays. Basken said the Federation is pleased that the Retail Merchants Association is now seeking store closures on holidays and the Federation will join with the Retail Merchants Association in seeking legislation in this

Basken congratulated those businesses who remained closed on Remembrance Day. He concluded by saying "those businesses who opened at noon are displaying nothing more tokenism." than



Meet The Man -> -> Art Hooks



Mr. Art Hooks, assistant Director of Student Services, was interviewed last Wednesday. This is a continuing effort to discover some aspects of prominent members of NAIT.

I asked him what an Assistant Director was. He said, "essentially, the main responsibility would be working with student government as an advisor to them. Also, to help them coordinate some programs that they don't have time to do.

"A lot of my time is spent with the Activities Committee. That means from bringing in films for weekend movies, to helping set up cabarets, and bringing in

"A couple of times a year, we have a couple of large functions . . .(concerts). We bring in fairly expensive bands for that.

"The common-hour activities committee responsible for that and I think we're going to see a bit of change in the format. The committee feels that right now we're probably doing the wrong thing. Bringing in singers doesn't seem to be doing the types of things we want common-hour to do." NOTE: This is because of poor attendance at these functions.

Mr. Hooks said that the committee has been trying to "drum up" some ideas for common-hour. He mentioned other responsibilities of the assistant director by saying "I work with foreign students and attempt to assist them in their stay in Canada.

"I work with CUSO, the Canadian University Services Overseas, whereby students apply to get a posting overseas in another country. They can do this through CUSO, and this office is essentially responsible as a 'go between. They apply here, we in-terview them, and send the information on to Ottawa who will accept or decline the

"The student I.D. card originates from this office. This office is responsible for producing up to 10,000 different types of cards a year-library I.D. cards for night people, I.D. cards for daytime students, I.D. cards for

person.

"NAIT goes out to a (career) fair in another town. They (the towns) have various career fairs and I coordinate that program and make sure NAIT is well presented.

"Housing? Though we don't have housing as such, we work along with the Alberta

Housing Co-orporation in an attempt to get the students placed in the housing across the street.'

Mr. Hooks said that he is a member of the board of the Alberta Housing Corporation and the students have to apply through them. He said, "the applications are reviewed by this board, and if accepted, then an attempt is made to put the students in these houses if vacant.

"We have a housing list that is computerized. We put up new lists once a week of housing available students. This list is on the counter (of the office), one list is across from the Nugget Office in a glass case, and another list is down at the 106th Street entrance."

Moving on to other duties of the Assistant Director, he mentioned, "I personally coordinate the students' capital and supply budgets.

"I work for Mr. Meadus in special events as graduation and Open House."

"My major responsibility is to work with the student government and maintain a good working relationship with them.

Mr. Hooks pointed out he is to assist them in co-ordinating their activities; to assist them in anyway he can.

Several years ago, a meeting was held amongst the President of the Student Association, and Mr. Meadus,

and Mr. Hooks. It was decided then that the Assistant Director act as a business manager as well. What has come about from that meeting?

"I set up personnel for the student stores. I hire and train the personnel for the games room. These people report to me. So I act as the responsible person.

But why does he want to be the responsible person? It seems that it all started nine years ago. Mr. Hooks said, ''l



In a very scrambly first period, the Ookpiks scored first, but RDC counted 3 fast goals to lead 3-1 at the completion of the first frame.

After a drastic first period, the Ookpiks regained some poise and played very well for


the final 2 stanzas and the overtime period.

(Continued from Page 1) informed Commonwealth lobby upon their return. bringing back new insights to be shared with their fellow countrymen.

"We are planning a Bon Voyage reception in Toronto before we leave on the expedition," notes Mr. Stevens, "with the High Com-missioners of Sri Lanka and India invited."

"On our arrival in London, we will travel by private bus to a tour class hotel in the Paddington district. There will be orientation meetings each morning, and we will see the changing of the guards at Buckingham Palace, and visit Canada House and the Commonwealth Institute. At the institute we will be greeted by the Director and his staff. Lectures on the Commonwealth and a tour of the institute will follow, with Paul Martin, Canada's High Commissioner invited.

After a brief stop in Amsterdam we will be flown to Colombo in Sri Lanka by Singapore Airlines. Then we will visit tea and rubber plantations, beach resorts and hill station outposts, plus all the most famous sites on our ten day tour of the

country. "Our journey through India will begin with two days in Madras. We will be living on a train for 20 days, travelling mostly at night and experiencing the various cities by day. There will be many activities on the train, including yoga, disco dances, films and lectures. We will sleep four to a compartment, and notably each will be equipped with four fans. It will be hot in the south, but India is so big, if will be cold in the north.

"The trains first stop is Calcutta where we will spend a weekend. Next we travel to Varanasi, a city every Hindu wants to see in his lifetime. We will be in India's historic capital Delhi for five days ncluding Christmas.

Arrangements are being made for us to visit with the Indian Prime Minister while in Delhi.

"In Agra we will see the Taj Mahal both by day and moonlight, also go to Jhansi, where we take a side trip by bus to see the exotic (and erotic) Hindu temples in Khajuraho. Again we take a bus trip to see the caves of Ajanta after our train arrives in Jalgaon. Then we bring in the New Year in historic Bombay, and stop in Amsterdam and London on the way home.

Stevens adds, "There will be time for individual side trips too. I personally plan to take in a few plays while in London, and I think a few people will leave the expedition to visit Katmandu in Nepal. No one who makes this trip will ever forget the experience of a life-fime.
