Now he says, "I haven't received any invitation to participate . . . and I don't know if there is a staff advisor in A.M.S."

Much diversification appeared now as none of the persons interviewed had related ideas. Some of the other major points made by Mr. Seethram were that we only support to the extent of providing facilities. "If they don't request, it is none of our business to interfere with their financial affairs."

Mr. Seethram's main reasoning behind this is that because he has no stake in the society, he cannot control their money.

Other points expressed by Mr. Daum indicated that perhaps there is a communication breakdown. He noted, that A.M.S. was very inactive this year. Maybe it was too early to tell.

Mr. Daum said, "I do not like the idea of having so many clubs in one department. What I would rather have, since this is the Business Administration Department, is a Business Administration Club. great advantage is that therewould be a greater mix of persons."

Mr. Daum pointed out that if each separate club was under the auspices of the B.A.C., then members could openly attend another section's function or presentation at no cost. He wondered if there might be a greater flow of information? And would this not be better for the students?

One person we haven't heard from is Karl Paul, Section Head in Marketing. His thoughts are without a doubt, opposite to what has been expressed by the other people. He, more than anyone else, does support his Marketing Administration Society - M.A.S. He said, "We are in marketing, we are people - oriented."

Mr. Paul added, "we depend on people . . .on behavior." He mentioned that his department was one of the first ones to get involved with the students. He thought it was necessary to, "pay attention to the students, because we believe in people. . .That's why we join in these cabarets."

Mr. Paul exphasized that point several times during the interview. He thinks it is necessary to support the clubs because marketing is dealing with people.

Mr. Paul also pointed out that M.A.S. had a few problems last year which required assistance. He wanted his staff to help look after the morale of the students, and join in the student functions.

Mr. Paul thinks an unfortunate situation has occurred in that, 'other instructors feel they are here to teach and that's it."

Mr. Weir does feel somewhat this way. He says, "my job is to instruct, and make sure there is an en-

vironment in which you can learn. We're here to give an education in computer systems technology. The social aspect is nice, but it's not a high priority."

Mr. Weir did say that he would give advice if asked, but it is of secondary importance. He said that he would not encourage his staff to attend the "beer-bashes".

Mr. Weir did say, "I'll no longer put up with the student who comes to me and says that "you were sure drunk at the beer-bash last night". One ignorant person spoils it. for everyone (else)."

Mr. Weir said that he used to go to a lot of student parties. But now, "there are one or two people who just don't have enough sense to realize that there is a time and place for everything. If I can't go and party with you and then get back to business the next day, then I guess I can't be involved."

LOS ANGELES (ENS-CUP)--The world has twice come within 60 seconds of total nuclear annihilation in the past 20 years, according to Daniel Sheehan, aftorney for Daniel Ellsberg in the famous Pentagon Papers

In both cases the U.S. was the country that almost set off a nuclear holacaust, Sheehan said at a recent convention here, basing his charges on top secret documents he found while researching legal

He said that in 1958 a commercial airliner crossed the DEW line, a radar network once maintained by the U.S. and Canada, and was wrongly identified as an enemy supersonic missile. Defense installations went to full mobilization status and came within 56 seconds of launching a full-scale nuclear attack on the Soviet Union. action against nuclear

OTTAWA (CPA-CUP)--Canadian families enjoy eating out as much as their American counterparts.

They spend an average of just over one-fifth of their weekly food budget to do just that, according to a recent publication from Agriculture Canada's Economics Branch.

In 1975, about 78.5 per cent of total food expenditures in Canada was for food consumed at home. The remaining 21.5 per cent was spent on meals away from home.

Americans spent just slightly less (76.5 per cent) for food eaten at home and somewhat more for food away from home (23.5 per cent).

Crisis in 1961, Soviet ships came within 50 miles of Cuba's coast, defying a U.S. ultimatim to stay at least 64 miles offshore. According to Sheehan the U.S. National Security Council voted unanimously to go on a full, first-strike attack on the Soviet Union, a move that was only then blocked by then president John Kennedy's veto.



Careless Partying Could Mean End . . .

Most students drink. A lot of students drive. The mixture of the two is deadly. According to the Traffic Inquiry Research Foundation of Canada a 16-17 year old driver was 165 times more likely to be killed in a crash than was the average nonimpaired driver on the road.

As for 18-19 year old drivers, they are likely to be killed 70 times more likely than the average non-impaired driver. Even in the 30-34 year old age group, chances were 17 times more likely to die than the average sober driver.

And don't think age has anything to do with drivers who drink. The average rate is 39 more times likely to die than the straight driver for those over 50.

These are facts, hard and cold. Every year in North

America people drink, drive and die. Any state policeman or provincial copper will be glad to tell you. The autoroutes are strewn with dead or dying people, who had to have that one last drink.

In certain provinces the police are now allowed to take random breath test on drivers. Quebec is planning to legislate even tougher laws, that would crack down on anyone in a car. The police will do it. No traffic ordinance, no speed limit, no law can adequately protect people, when alcohol is involved. Only tough and often aggravating measures can be encouraged.

Bishop's isn't in the clear in regards to drinking and driving either. There has been an incident at Champlain concerning those who have died because of this lethal mixture. And is it any wonder? It is a fact that drinking is a way of life here. While students are hassled over marihajuana, the more deadly drug of alcohol is screwing up more people. As a result, students, as well as parents, and prominent community members tend to rationalize for drinking because it is legal.

Sooner or later you are going to drink. I personally enjoy a good belt of Chevas Regal. Nobody is saying don't drink. Everyone knows the consequences of being drunk. That blasted hang-over the next morning is a universal problem.

The point is this: For your sake and for the sake of everyone else. If you have to drink, leave your car or truck at home. Give your keys to a

friend who hasn't been drinking. Hitch, walk, take a taxi.

You'll be lucky after an accident if you're dead. Most car accidents concerning alcohol are a prolonged series of agony. I knew one former friend who lay on a road for five hours, in the middle of nowhere, waiting for help.

It's not worth suffering. And even those who don't die but become maimed wish they hadn't had that drink before they left.

From what I can gather it was a super effort by everyone involved, and all for a great cause. The major reason NAIT and other colleges around the country host Shinerama is so that money can be raised for cystic fibrosis. prevented from obtaining the top jobs at Woodward's? Mr. Bailey, store manager at Edmonton Centre, said, "There is no truth to that as far as Woodward's is concerned."

He said, "As far back as ten years ago, Mr. Woodward said that women would have equal opportunity to become assistant managers and managers in the Woodward organization."

Mr. Bailey pointed out that inhibiting women 'is just not the philosophy in this company. If Mr. Woodward heard that rumor, he'd be most annoyed.'

He added, "Women will not be immediately hired as managers, but they will be hired to go into management training and could ultimately become managers."

"We have a number of women in our company today who are assistant managers, and we have a number of women who are managers," Mr. Bailey stated.

He wished to make one point clear: Women in the Woodward's organization are as capable in a managerial position as are the men. He said, "Women have equal opportunity in this company as do the men, providing they are willing to accept the responsibility.

We even have some women who travel for the company. They not only travel in the United States and Canada. but also over to Europe to buy fashions for us. And they are doing a tremendous job. I think they do a better job than many men could do when it comes to fashion.

We have a female manageress in our Vancouver operation, and she is the training officer for the company.

Mr. Bailey has been a store manager for Woodward's for three and one-half years. Prior to coming to Edmonton Centre, he was manager at the Southgate plant.

B.A.S. is Alive and Well

What is B.A.S.? That is a common question asked by First-year students and even a few Second-years. The letters stand for the "Business Administration Society", and it has an appointed executive. Here are a few descriptions.

few descriptions.

"It is a student-run body for students to have fun at NAIT and to get an idea of how to run a business and get some experience," said Gordon Snow. Mr. Snow is the president of the society for this year only, as he intends to graduate, in the spring of 1977

Dan Mott, a member of the B.A.S., said, "it's a group for all accounting, finance, and

administrative management students, to help them organize themselves in sports and extracurricular activities.

It's a chance for business students to mesh, and talk about courses, and what's in store for them."

Art Hooks, Associate Director of Student Services, said B.A.S., "is a small portion of people in the tower building who are in Business Administration. (They are) a small unincorporated technology society, and they fallunder NAITSA as a society or a club. But they are an unsanctioned group."

An unsanctioned group is a society with limited authority

to operate on the NAIT campus. They cannot get loans or even facilities for holding their functions at NAIT. B.A.S. was an unsanctioned group, like Mr. Hooks said. But, as of Thursday morning, things have changed. B.A.S. is now sanctioned and is a fully recognized society under the auspices of NAITSA.

Paul Benedetto a member of B.A.S. said that in the past, the records were not kept well. They were just a pile of bills and cancelled checks. But B.A.S. has never considered itself to be in the red, even at the beginning of this year. I asked the president what his comment was, and he said, "no, definitely not."

Money obtained by B.A.S. is usually gained through having functions. To improve the economics of his group, Mr. Benedetto said, "we'll plan our first cabaret near the end of October," as the present amount of funds is fairly low. The date remains tentative, but it was thought to be around October 22 or 23.

Mr. Mott, Mr. Benedetto, and Mr. Snow said, "the membership fees had been raised to \$4. Last year we competed with other groups, and each tried to run their own 'grad'. Neither had enough members to cover the cost. M.A.S., Marketing Administration Society, went under and cancelled their 'grad'. (Then) M.A.S. converted all their tickets to the B.A.S. 'grad'. Thus, it was a joint-graduation."

"This year, we will be cooperating with each other to some degree. Memberships for either functions would be accepted," said the president, and it was endorsed by Mr. Benedetto.

Co-operation of the two groups is for large functions mainly like ski trips. Smaller activities as "happy-buses" will be managed by groups seperately.

B.A.S., a non-profit or ganization, has joined NAITSA officially and requires a loan to carry on operations. But by the end of the school year, B.A.S. hopes to have accrued a fair

amount of money. This money will be used by the organization to pay back the loan, and for the cost of the graduation in Spring '77. Monies left over will be used by the new executives for activities and entertainment for its members.

A final comment by Mr. Snow was, "I would like to see M.A.S. and B.A.S. merge. Two small organizations are not as effective as one large one"


