## Meet The Man . . .

Education for the province. "At that time I had a great deal to do with both NAIT and SAIT.

"The Minister of Education, Mr. Clark, talked to some of the people in the department, to the Deputy Minister, and to the Director of Technical Education. He asked if there was anyone who has had a background experience in the Northern Alberta Institution, that had some experience both within and without industry. My name was presented to him by my superiors. He called me into the office one day with the Director of Technical Education and the Deputy Minister. (The Minister) asked if I would accept the position of President of NAIT? Yes, I said I would. He said, well congratulations Mr. President! It was as simple as that."

To be in such a responsible position, what qualifications does one need? Mr. Carter said, "they wanted someone with an educational background. They wanted someone with an educational experience and pedagogy."

"More importantly, they felt that in a technical institution such as this, where we are so closely involved with the community, this person should have had good access, good contact, and good experience in the business and industrial community."

Mr. Carter said that the reason behind this was to marry the educational experience with the practical aspects, and these various contacts.

I was fortunate to have that sort of background. I started out as a teacher at nineteen, and I taught at an agricultural college, and at various high schools.

"Then I was in industry for ten years. I was in various positions in manufacturing and construction. And everything seemed to fall into place."

For a man who has achieved so much, I asked Mr. Carter what are his good memories?

"The thing I enjoy the most about this job is the contact with students, particularly, the NAITSA Executive."

He enjoys other members of the student body too, and its these kind of associations that I cherish. And they're really some of the fringe benefits of this job.

"I find it very very thrilling to run across past graduates who, as a result of their work at NAIT, have become successful in their careers. After all, that's what the institution is all about."

But what are the plans for NAIT? "NAIT's mandate is to provide education at the post secondary level to prepare adults for careers in industry and business."

Then Mr. Carter stated his second objective, "to provide an environment or the opportunity for our students to develop socially, or to provide the atmosphere in which to come to work as part of a community, or part of an organized unit."

"We look to the NAITSA Executive to organize the social activities where you can bring people together. And we look at the Student

Services Committee to provide the various activities.

If we can interest (the students) in some recreational hobbies, physical or otherwise, that will provide them with a life-long support and satisfaction, then we have achieved this purpose (stated above)."

Those were the long-range plans. Mr. Carter then mentioned some medium-range plans, "I want to see this institution become recognized as one of the best technical institutions in the country."

"I would like to see us become considered as having the best quality of instruction in technical education that we could possibly achieve."

"From a growth stand point, I would like the institution to expand to its ultimate population of 8000 with excellent facilities,

excellent teachers, and excellent opportunities for students.

"We are already in the first phase where we will come up to a 6500 student population."

Mr. Carter stated that the government has approved the renovation of Simpson-Sears' Park Plaza that will come into operation this fall of '77. He said, "Loblaws was already renovated this summer and is now in operation."

"An architect will be appointed on Phase II, to design and construct a completely new building. It will house some of our central services such as the library, Audio-Visual, Food Services, class rooms, etc. We hope it will be designed to accommodate the ultimate total of 8000."

The completion of the above plan should be "just ten years down the road."

"All that Simpson-Sears

will do, will allow us to bring back our satellite campuses."

And that is just two years down the road, Mr. Carter thought. I asked Mr. Carter how our association with business and industry is maintained. He said, "It is vital to our existence that we have contacts with industry and people in business."

"Our sole purpose is to prepare our people for careers in these areas."

"We have 450 representatives of business and industry who are members of our various advisory committees. On each and every programme we have an advisory committee that meets once or twice a year. It is composed of ten or twelve members. And some of the things they do for us is simply a matter of curriculum. (They advise us) of new trends that are developing in a field for which our people

should be prepared, so that they will be ready and not be two years behind."

Mr. Carter said that we ask these members 'what do you want our graduates of a said technology to be able to do?' The members of the advisory committee tell us and we subsequently set our curriculum around that.

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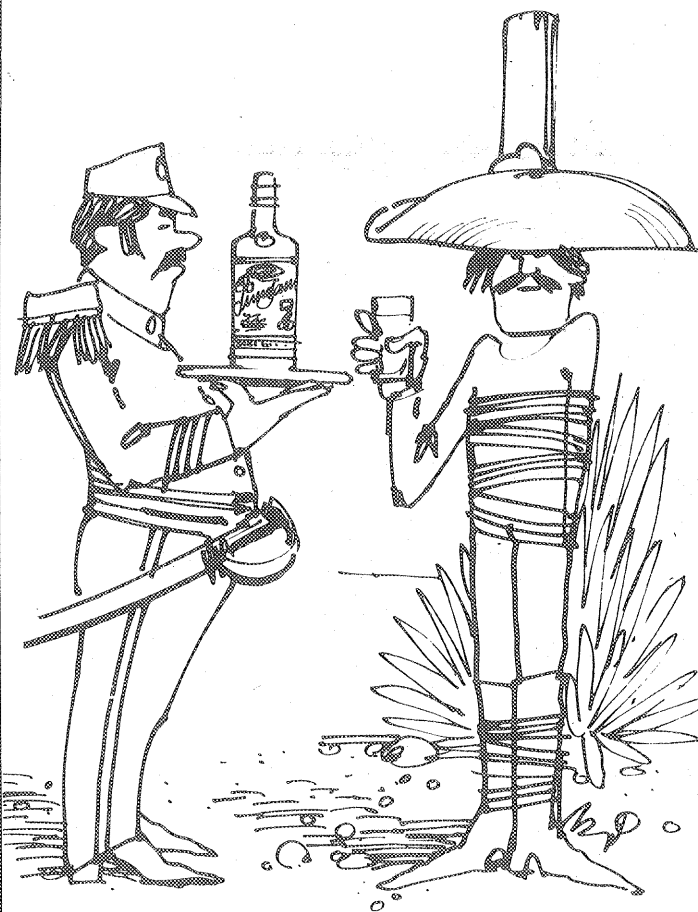

John Entwistle was his usual quiet self. His lead vocals are a vital part of the

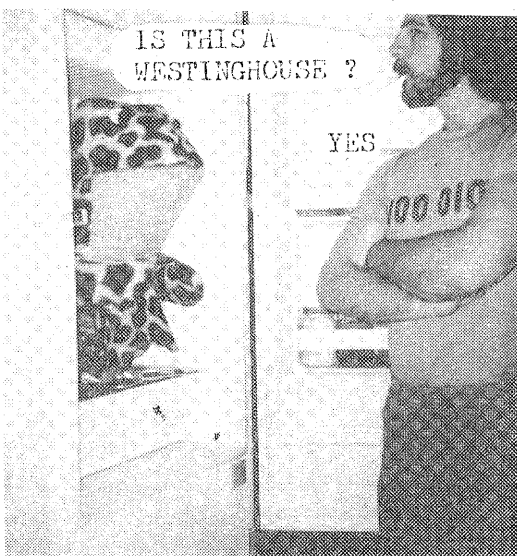
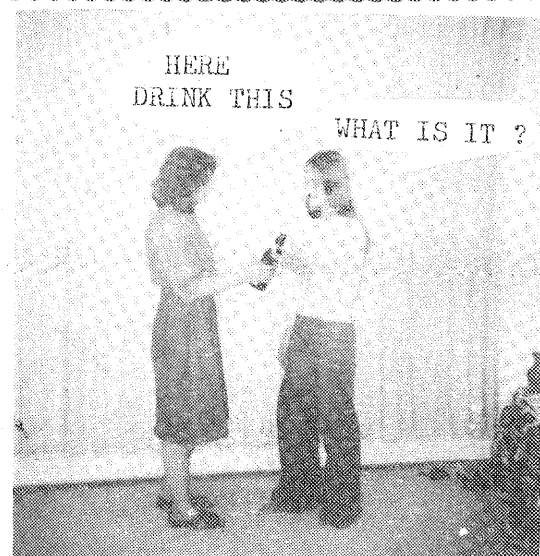
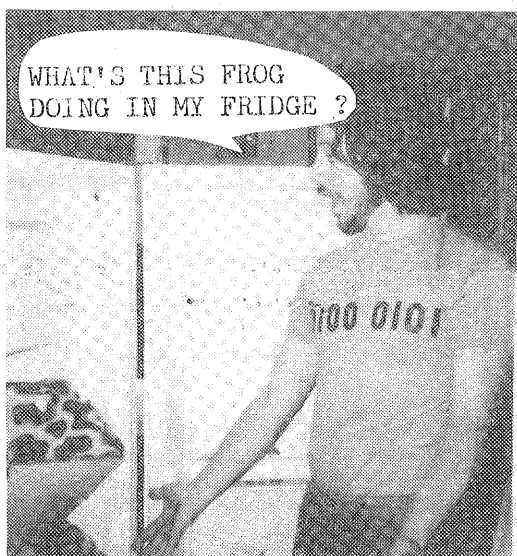
show. Bass playing was straight and powerful as usual.

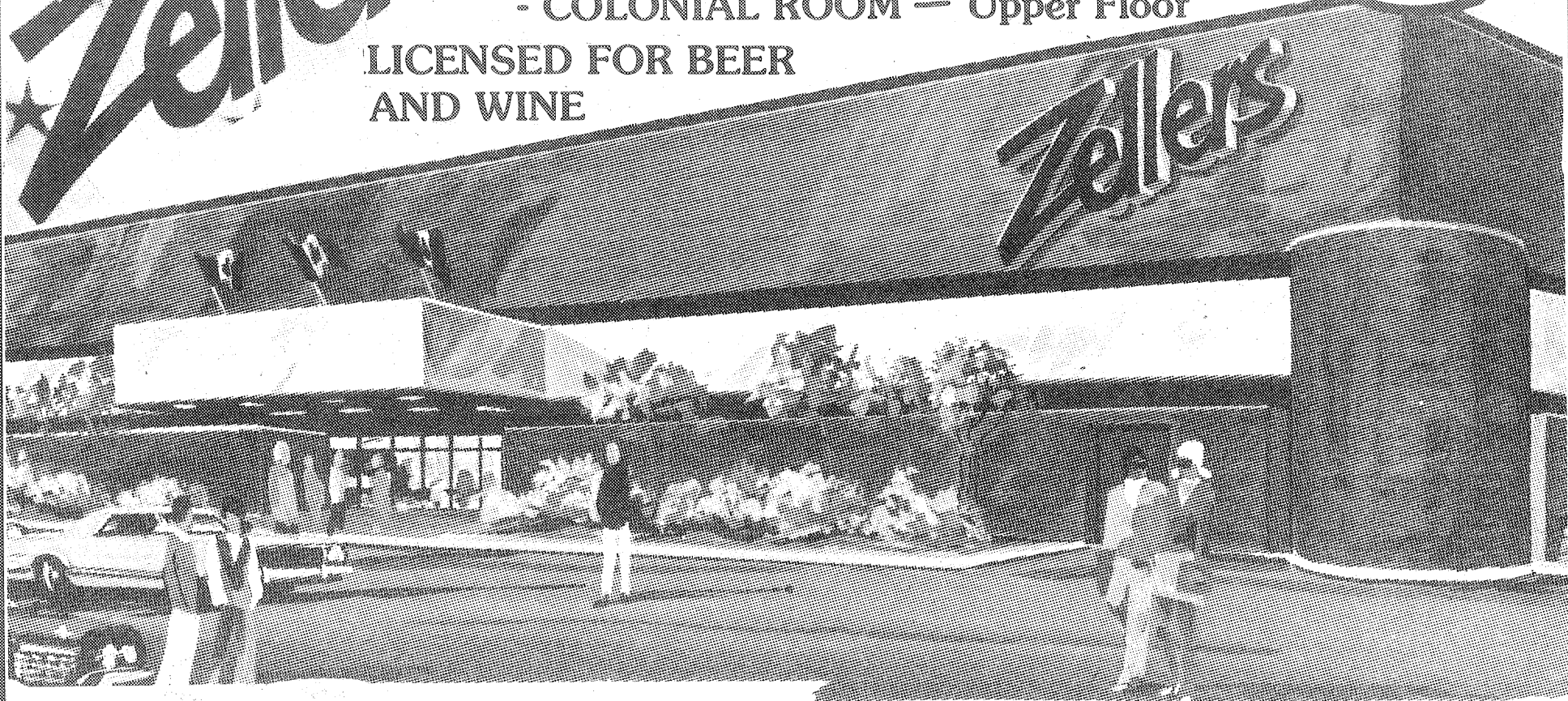
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
