NAIT Enrolment Off Target

A lack of money may be affecting enrolment at the Northern Alberta Institute of Technology, (NAIT) says registrar Len Semrau.

Although enrolment is up almost 200 over last year, it still falls short of expectation.

"We had a number of cancellations at the last minute," says Mr. Semrau. "I'd say we're about 100 short of what we expected."

NAIT now has 3,885 firstyear students and 1,315 in upper-year programs, but by Christmas, Mr. Semrau expects first-year enrolment to reach 4,500.

In addition, NAIT will train almost 8,000 students in the apprentice program — about 2,000 more than it handled last year.

The continuing education centre offers courses of general interest to an additional 20,000 people, which means a total of about 32,000 people will go to NAIT this year.

Mr. Semrau says there are a few programs that are substantially undersubscribed.

"These courses are just over half full," he says, adding that job opportunities for students in these courses are good, with many employers contacting NAIT to offer jobs.

These courses are instrumentation technology, which teaches students to handle automatic controls; materials engineering technology, which concentrates on such things as materials testing, strength of concrete, and metal fatigue; plastics technology and foods technology.

"We have about five job offers for every graduate," Mr. Semrau says. He says a number of students have indicated they chose NAIT rather than university because of the income possible after studying two years.

But, he says, it's getting more difficult to get into the glamor programs at NAIT.

"We have about 5,700 applications for 3,000 first-year positions. And we have a long holding list."

Grant MacEwan Community College enrolment is also up about 200 this year, with 3,032 students registered in credit courses.

The college also offers general interest courses, and about 2,000 students have enrolled for these.

The college has not experienced a loss of students due to financial pressures, says a college spokesman.

Who Wants Common - Hour?

Rod Osborne, President of NAITSA, has something important to say to the students. He feels that "common-hour" isn't common anymore.

"Some technologies have it in their time-tables and some don't. That's the basic message I want to get across to everybody.

"Common-hour, by indications from the students, is a time when they can do some kind of activity other than academic. It may be used for some social functions.

"If they want to come in to see me and talk about it, we may be able to do something about (common-hour) for the second quarter.

"If we can work something out with Mr. Carter and his Executive and get a timetable, that's fine. But I can't stand up for (the students) without them behind me."

"If the students who don't have a common-hour timetable and tell me they are behind me, and that their technology wants it, then I know I've got their support.

"As of right now nothing's being done and nothing will be done until the students show their interest.

"As far as I know, (the students) don't have it scheduled right now and no one cares because no one has come and talked to me about it.

". .we want them to be interested. Right now they're not showing the interest.

"There is no use in having a common-hour when it won't be the same for everybody."

The objective of commonhour is to get people from different technologies interacting with each other.

"If you have someone in a different technology that you want to do something with, then there is one hour you'll both have free.

"What we are looking for is to put something on for the students. If they want a movie, we'll put it on for them. But we've got to know if they want it."

At the beginning of this year, musical concerts were put on during the commonhour. But Mr. Osborne said, "obviously what we're giving (the students) isn't what they want, because there isn't anyone there attending them. We're reaching about twenty or thirty students a week when there are 3,000 students here.

Then Mr. Osborne said, "If they don't want commonhour, fine, but if they want it, they should let me know so I can help them. And secondly, it's hard to put something on for someone when you don't know what they want.

"We ran a survey last year that included all the students. We asked them if they wanted common-hour and the majority of them said yes. Then we asked them what they wanted out of common-hour. Four main topics (appeared) - musical concerts, sports, movies, then informal activities."

However, "what was number one on their list last year is not number one this year . . . or else too many technologies have classes."

Mr. Osborne reiterated, "if they are not concerned about common-hour, we're not going to try and change it."

But if the students want it, he said, "somebody can come to a council meeting, or come to my office and tell me they want it. Then, with their support I can do something. Without their support I can't do anything.

Mr. Osborne mentioned, "I don't think students will be apathetic if they are informed and are interested. The problem is that most students aren't informed.

Mr. Osborne said that this item was brought up on the October 6 council meeting. The next meeting will be held on October 20 and again on November 2. Again, if you want to discuss commonhour, come to either of those council meetings, or to his office.

Institute Lockers Security By S-SGT Johnston

A few words of caution are felt necessary to attempt to bring to your attention the safety factor of institute lockers.

They should not be treated as security vaults. Their construction is of thin sheet metal which can easily be bent and twisted to allow access without too much difficulty.

Valuable items such as calculators, watches, rings, wallets, etc., should be either carried on your person or

given to a trusted person to hold.

The design of the lockers is to provide a minimum security for articles while the owner is attending an area where the items are not required. (During lunch or sports for example).




Work Weeks Aren't Getting Shorter

DETROIT (ENS-CUP) — Despite the popular notion that people today have more free time and shorter work weeks, a Wayne State University professor has found that working adults "have had no net gain in their leisure time" in the last 30 years.

John Owen, in the Monthly Labor Review, says the average U.S. work week fell from 58.4 hours in 1901 to 42 hours in 1948. Since that time there has been "little or no change."

Owen says that despite economists' predictions, most people don't want to give up any of their income in favor of shortened work weeks because of the high cost of living, particularly the price of post-secondary education and raising a family.
