Welcome from President G.W. Carter

A very warm welcome to all of you who have either registered at N.A.I.T. for the first time, or who have returned to complete your studies at this institution.

We are looking forward to a very successful year in which we hope to achieve N.A.I.T.'s two major objectives:

- 1) to prepare you in the best way possible for the career of your choice, and
- 2) to provide you with opportunities for social and personal development.

As you become involved in the social and academic life, I hope that you become a strong supporter of N.A.I.T. just as have the many thousands who have preceded you.

Some wonderful opportunities exist for you here. It may be one of the few times in your life that you will be in an position to take advantage of them.

I think that you will find that the more you become involved, the more you identify with the institution, and the more you enjoy the total experience.

Although the majority of activities center around the main campus, some of you may not be aware that N.A.I.T. has a number of satellites located throughout the city.

You are now a part of the biggest Institute of Technology in Canada, and we like to think that as well as being the biggest, it's also the best.

To give you some idea of the size of the Institute, and the student load that it carries, our total registration will end somewhere between 5500 and 6000 full time day students.

Add to this the number of people taking apprenticeship training at any one period throughout the year (there are 1200 apprenticeship students here right now) and you begin to get an idea of the total number taking some form of training at N.A.I.T. Last year there were 6,700 apprenticeship students over the 1975-76 school year and in 1976-77 that figure should come close to 8,500. Don't forget, too, that there are evening classes which bring as many people to N.A.I.T. as the day programs. On an average week, there will be about 12,000 people taking some form of training on the N.A.I.T. campus during the evenings.


Because of the demand for space on the existing campus, it was necessary to open satellite campuses to help accommodate people until new teaching areas could be provided. There are three satellite campuses operating now, one on the south side for the Architectural and Interior Design students, another at the Patricia Building for Auto Body and Metals apprentices, and still another in Jasper Place for the Tailoring Technician programs.

From the space point of view, help is on the way. Renovations to the Loblaw's and Simpson-Sears automotive area are being completed in time to take care of some classes this fall, and the remodelling of the Simpson-Sears plaza area is currently out to tender, and is estimated to cost \$2.5 million dollars. This space should be ready for the fall of 1977.


And that's just part of the N.A.I.T. story. Welcome to the Northern Alberta institute of Technology - a great place to train for the career of your choice.




BIG SISTERS






BEAT THE RESUME SHUFFLE

One of those inevitable surveys made by college researchers shows that about 30 million resumes are lying around on the desks of personnel managers across the United States.

The survey notes that another ten million are mailed by job hopefuls every year, and that new resumes are outstripping the rate at which old ones are being destroyed.

If resumes continue to multiply at this rate, eventually there will be more resumes than people.

So far as I know, there hasn't been any comparable Canadian survey, but since we usually follow American trends, it's safe to assume that our own personnel managers are also being engulfed.

An executive friend of mine told me that between engagements he ground out about 800 job applications. A few were in reply to ads, a few more went off to business associates, but most were direct mail letters to personnel managers. Each application consisted of the approved two-page resume and short covering letter.

None of his 800 applications was productive. He didn't even get a single acknowledgment.

in each application he gave highly laudable references. He asked his references to let him know if any company called to check or him. None of his references received a single nibble.

I told him he had done one thing correctly and two things wrongly, and that the wrongs outnumbered the rights. He was quite correct to sent his application in large quantities because the job applicant has to play a numbers game. But he was wrong to sent it to personnel departments.

Personnel departments, like other non-producers, justify their existence by surrounding themselves with paperwork, in this case resumes. Otherwise they do very little except when a producing department in the company instructs them to find some specific talent.

When told, for example, to "find three good salesmen", the personnel department will spring into action, place an ad, screen the applicants, then leave the final choice to the sales director.

Many management consultants, with no axe to grind, recommend the abolition of personnel departments. Robert Townsend, in Up The Organization, goes further and recommends an end to other parasitic departments, including advertising managers (if the company uses an outside ad agency). When Townsend was president of Avis, the company that "tries harder", he abolished not only various unnecessary departments, including personnel, but even his own private secretary. (He either replied on incoming letters and Xeroxed them, or he used the typing pool.)

Anyway, I told my friend that the best way to get a hearing is to send the application to the president or the appropriate vice-president - finance, sales, production or whatever. I said that only executives on this level know about pending company expansions, branch openings, incompetents on the staff and a dozen other factors that may lead to company hirings.

I also mentioned that threequarters of all staff vacancies are never advertised or reported to the employment agencies. Many are filled through referrals, inquiries at the Chamber of Commerce, recommendations by the staff, requests to suppliers and so on. Some are filled because job hunters take the initiative and apply, often without knowing whether a vacancy even exists.

But when they send their applications to the personnel department, these applications just join the existing three million resumes (presumably the rule that Canadian figures are one-tenth the size of American still applies).

All right then, so you send the application to the president or someone on the vice-presidential level. But presidents, I pointed out, are not accustomed to reading resumes. Many can find their way around a balance sheet more easily.

Thus my friend's second mistake was to send a resume when a letter was more effective. But instead of a chatty letter full of clever phrases and irrelevancies it had to be a punchy letter stressing what he could do for the company.

For good measure I gave my friend some tips on the appropriate stationery to use. Many presidents don't use the familiar 8½x11 size sheets, but rather a 7½x10½ size known as Monarch. If he did the same thing,

the recipients would immediately identify him as "one of us" and give him a better hearing.

The letter should have his address and phone number discretely printed in the top corner, but not his name. The continuation sheet should be plain. Only white paper should be used, and the matching white envelope must have flaps that come to a point at both sides of the back.

My friend couldn't take my suggestions seriously, but I persuaded him to try it anyway, drafted a suitable letter and compiled a mailing list of presidents by name.

DEAL WITH THE TOP CARDS IN THE COMPANY Three weeks later he received his first interview. After another two weeks there were two more interviews. Seven weeks after he began the campaign he received a job offer so good that he accepted on the spot.

The company that hired him was one of those he had previously written to, without getting a reply.

Two questions now spring to the lips. What kind of letter will attract a president's attention, and will a graduate student have the same success with this technique as a veteran employee? The answers to these questions will have to be deferred as we have run out of space.

Talking to plants - a waste of time


WASHINGTON (ZNS-CUP) - If you are one of those persons who talks to your plants and tries to give them "good vibes", you've been wasting your time.



DESIGN SPACE


The fastest desk in the Wesk! With a sheet of three quarter inch thick poplar or birch ply measuring 4' x 8', a four-foot long piece of two by three inch No. 2 pine, or wood of similar shape size and strength, six five-inch shelf brackets and 24 1½" long by ¼" diam. round head stove bolts and washers and nuts you should be able to make this desk in about a day at most. The three-quarter inch ply should cost about sixteen to twenty dollars and the rest including paint should be another ten dollars. Total cost thirty dollars.

To start, trace out the "cut" lines on the pattern drawing below making sure your measurements are accurate. A little pain now can mean success or failure later on. You can cut the pieces out using an ordinary crosscut saw even for the curve cut. If using this method, saw at an angle of about 45 degrees. Use a little candle wax on the sawblade periodically, lubricate, and again, take your time. To get the tongues out of the slots use a three quarter inch drill bit and centre it at the end of the slot. Glue and screw a piece of two by three along the



middle of the shelf so that the 461/2" long two by three is 11/2" from each end of the ply. Take care with the size of the slots so that the pieces fit snugly but can be removed fairly easily. Mark off the lines where you will fasten the under-support to the legs. Sand the edges of the ply and assemble the desk. Fasten the under support piece using the shelf brackets with two on each end and two on the top. Install the brackets at the back of the under support to give a cleaner appearance. Place the shelf on top of the legs as indicated and screw four 2" screws through the legs and into the ends of the two by three. Paint or varnish to your wishes. Make sure that you construct the desk so that you can take it apart easily (i.e. as described) to make moving day easier.



SMOKERS GETTING LESS FOR THEIR MONEY

SAN FRANCISCO (ZNS-CUP) If you're smoking more but enjoying it less, there really is a reason.

The U.S. Department of Agriculture reports that the average cigarette in America today contains 30 percent less tobacco than it did 25 years ago.

The U.S.D.A. explains that filters have replaced some tobacco in many brands - and that other, more subtle techniques are used by cigarette makers to account for the difference. The government says that the tobacco in most cigarettes today is packed much looser than it used to be; and that companies now use a freeze dried technique which puffs up the tobacco like "puffed wheat" so that less tobacco is needed to fill up each cigarette.

The U.S.D.A. says that it takes only 1.9 pounds of tobacco to make 1000 cigarettes today, in 1952, 2.7 pounds were needed.




A snack bar adjoining the dance floor serves a variety of fancy fruit punches, sandwiches and hot dogs.
