IT'S SHINERAMA TIME AGAIN

The months of planning are over and the week of SHINERAMA '76 has arrived. On the morning of Friday, October 8, your instructors will request that all students intending to shine shoes that day report to the main auditorium opposite the cafeteria to register for SHINERAMA '76. Those students not intending to shine shoes must attend classes or they will be considered absent.

When you reach the auditorium at 10:00 you and your team will be given all the necessary supplies for a day of shining. Your shoe shine box, your polish, rags, posters and promotional material. Each student shining shoes will also be supplied with a bag lunch courtesy of the Edmonton Chapter of the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation. After you have picked up your supplies and equipment, you and your friends will be given a team number, a destination or shoe shine location somewhere in Edmonton, and then be directed to one of the NAIT buses that will drop you off at your assigned location and then pick you up later in the day.

It would be appreciated if those students who have cars, use them to transport themselves and other members of their team to your shoe shine location. There will be a minimum of three students to a team and a maximum of six. Your team will be given an emergency phone number, to reach SHINERAMA headquarters if you encounter any difficulties.

The city is to be divided into six sections and each section will be under the supervision of a SHINERAMA section leader. It will be the responsibility of your particular section leader to:

- replenish supplies as needed

- pick up full coin cans and provide you with a new one the section leader can elect to change the location of a team to another location.

- he communicates with headquarters by telephone or radio cars.

At the end of the day your team captain is responsible for returning the full coin cans to SHINERAMA headquarters located in the NAITSA Student Executive offices. Your team number will be recorded in the

morning and will be checked off with the return of your coin can. If you were dropped off by bus in the morning a bus will pick you up later in the day. You will be informed of the time.

You will also be informed as to the location of the SHINERAMA party, free to all shiners that evening. Beer and other refreshements will be supplied, and a top city band will be playing for your enjoyment.

Remember that this year the students of SAIT have challenged all NAIT students to see who can raise the most money towards Cystic Fibrosis research. Five kegs are on the line. Don't let NAIT DOWN.

We will look forward to seeing you and your team out in full force Friday morning at 10:00 in the auditorium opposite the main cafeteria. Friday is your chance to shine, don't miss it!




No thoroughfare - through the inner institute areas.





You're Somebody Once You Leave That Closet

They didn't know t was gay (I wasn't feeling suicidal that day). After a lot of brainless chat on other subjects, they joked: "We're going to get Playgirl to photograph us nude for a centrefold, and every faggot in the country will lap it up." All sorts of comebacks occured to me ("I'd prefer to see you in the Joy of Cooking" or "Would you care to step outside - just you, and don't slow down," etc.) but all I managed was to ask to be let out at the next turnoff, in the rain. That should teach them a lesson!"

This excerpt is taken from an issue of Body Politic, a slick, informative and entertaining monthly publication serving Toronto's gay community. With an estimated readership of 15,000 it's a widely read Canadian paper devoted to strengthening the growth of gay consciousness in this country.

The features and news stories appearing in it publicize the plight of gays in a heterosexual society. Body Politic also reviews the gay culture that is beginning to emerge in the commercial press, it is readily picked up by an information-starved minority.

Now in its fifth year, Body Politic is put out by a 13 member editorial collective. There are no women in the collective but the members say they try to leave the paper open and encourage contributions from lesbians.

The Body Politic staff subscribes to "popular jour-nalism" to get its point across. Features are often written in the first person allowing readers to identify with them. In a section of the paper entitled Profiles in dividual lesbians and gay men are chosen to be interviewed. They're questioned on such topics as their youth, hobbies and ioys of being gay in this society. The people come across as pretty normal, which is perhaps the intent of the column.

Some articles are written by people ignored and alienated in our neterosexual society the middle-aged man, often established and married, who occasionally seeks impersonal companionship in public washrooms or the young gay under 16, who has to deal with school and parents and a lack of privacy and understanding.

By daring to print the un-printable, Body Politic gets shock value out of every issue. In a movement that has always been undermined by people too ashamed to let their sexual preferences be known, the paper reflects the current consciousness of militant gays. It encourages gays to be strident, to be openly and agressively gay until straight society comes around to accepting homosexuality.

The people who submit arlicles to Body Politic offer

readers some of the most honest and gripping writing to be found in any periodical publication in Canada. In an article Learning to Kill the author describes an incident in which he and three other gay men were beaten up in downtown Toronto because they were holding hands. The men didn't defend themselves because they were all terrified of violence.

As the writer put it "Even as a youngster when fights - real or play - were more common, I always really wanted to melt into the arms of the boy I was struggling with. I see my interactions with other men as erotic, not violent."

While Body Politic has broken new ground with the gay community in Canda, it has also come under heavy criticism from its readership. It's been charged that the male, middle-class Toronto editorial collective puts out a paper with little appeal to lesbians, workers and people who live in rural areas.

When questioned on this the men in the point,

collective reply that they're aware of their limitations, and that they bend over backwards to be representative to all gays in Canada. No small feat, mind you.

Another contentious point between the collective and Body Politic readers are the classified ads at the back of the paper. A typical ad might read: "Non-smoker looking for gay male friends between Hamilton and Guelph. Prefer age 35 - 45 with serious cultural interest. Welcome blind, deaf or handicapped. Not interested in casual sex. Discretion assured."

On first glance the classifieds look sleazy and out of place in an otherwise sophisticated newspaper. A bunch of men advertising for sex partners at 10 cents per word seems to defeat the purpose of a periodical that calls for openness, strength in numbers and a warm and understanding gay community.


While the collective runs the ads primarily for revenue, it acknowledges the need for classifieds for men who are

lonely and can't easily make friends. In defending its position, the collective demonstrates that it can be humanitarian as well as realistic and business-like. Aside from these drawbacks,

Body Politic should still be

commended for providing gays with a monthly shot in the arm. As gays know only too well, magazines that provide well-written and sympathetic articles for gays are few and far between.
